An Omission And Neglect

The most important thing in President

lixon's message to Congress on foreign policy is an omission and a neglect. It is an omission of any significant recognition of the United Nations as an important agency in world life and death and peace and war.

It is a downgrading of the importance

and stature of the United Nations. In this omission, in this downgrading President Nixon's foreign policy follows the lead of President Johnson and President Kennedy before him.

Dwight Eisenhower was the last American President to act as if he thought the United Nations had to be at the center of future world life, if there was to be life.

Presidents Kennedy and Johnson both thought it could be relegated to a background importance.

Each of them chose to act as a personal, dramatic, heroic champion of peace instead of making himself the servant of the world organization created to maintain peace.

President Nixon has joined Kennedy and Johnson in their instinct to act outside rather than inside the United Na-

And in this ambitious, extended discussion of every phase of America's relationship with the rest of the world, President Nixon did not once find it necessary to link the United Nations, its Charter, its principles, or its powers to any one of the many specific problems he discusses.

Somebody reminded him his report ought to include a section called "United Nations." Otherwise, he could have gone through the entire document without mentioning it once.

In the section of his report titled "United Nations" he devoted himself mainly to a polite downgrading of the world institution.

Its friends, he said, have a responsibility to study the record of its 25 years "and apply the lessons of those years, to see what the U.N. can and cannot do. The U.N., and its supporters, must match idealism in purpose with realism in expectation."

"We can," the President warned, "as easily undermine the U.N. by asking too much of it as too little.

This year's 25th anniversary of the United Nations is, the President said, "an occasion for more than commemoration. It is a time to acknowledge its realistic possibilities and to devise ways to expand them."

In his own exposition of such "realistic possibilities" the President listed securing the safety of international travelers from airplane hijackings, encouraging international voluntary service like that of the Peace Corps, and "protecting the planet's threatened environment."

By this state paper, the United Nations stands condemned with faint praise and with piddling assignment.

The leading founder of the world organization becomes its leading deserter.

And a whole vast document supposedly concerned with the problem of peace loes not once seriously discuss the one basic, unavoidable truth the whole world thought it knew so well 25 years agothat peace could only come through the enactment and enforcement of world law against war.

The result was that President Nixon, wittingly or not, spoke not in the context of peace, but in the language of conflict, and was building, not with the blocks of potential peace, but with those of potential war.

"Death-Oriented Idiocy"

As short a time ago as 1937, thinks Dr. Albert Szent-Gyorgi, the noted Nobel Prize biologist who is now publishing a book called "The Crazy Ape," we had a society which was "life-oriented." Since that time, however, a great change in our society has come about, mainly as a result of our growing reaction to the discovery of cosmic forces we didn't even know about until the turn of the century.

The discovery of the electron, X-rays, quanta, radioactivity and relativity, says Dr. Szent-Gyorgi, gave man command over cosmic forces, in exchange for what had previously been merely the force of his own arm.

Given command over such cosmic forces, man has chosen the wrong path toward the wrong goal.

"American society is death-oriented," according to the biologist. "If you watch and if you read the newspapers, a great part of it is taken up by war, by killing, by murder, atomic bombs, MIRV's, gases, bacterial agents, napalm, defoliants, asphyxiating agents and we have

war. All our ideas are death-oriented." Dr. Szent-Gyorgi sees little that is good or hopeful happening in our world. Indeed, he thinks we are putting up with a "terrible strain of idiots who govern the world."

He sees some hope in our youth. He hopes that, before they themselves grow up and turn idiots in their turn, they would get together "and hammer out the constitution of the future world, which they can then implement, not to freeze up before they have thought up what the world should be like."

Such the famous biologist's despairing verdict. Most of us have an automatic instinct

to deny and refute it.

What we should do, then, is begin t collect any evidence we can which might seem to prove that our world is not being run by idiots. If we find some instances in which sanity has actually prevailed, we should not keep our discovery to ourselves, but share it with the world.

Police Undercover Operations The death of an undercover agent who was fatally shot in his role as a Congress Avenue store operator raises serious questions for the New Haven Police De partment and the community as a whole Despite the seriousness of rising crime statistics and the intensity of the chal lenge which policemen face today, there

is something repugnant about the idea that police agents should themselves resort to petty crime, on a continuing and indiscriminate basis, as a means of checking on other criminals. The use of paid underworld informants is understandable - but such informants

are not usually poli-The use of detectives and special operatives in the investigation and pursuit of a particular crime or set of crimes is standard - but such agents penetrate the criminal world for a spe cific purpose and it is not expected that they will abdicate their own obligations

o the law. The establishment of "listening" posts in high-crime areas would seem to have adequate precedents - but the public assumption is that all such fact-gathering and rumor-gathering agencies function legitimately

In the case at hand there are indications that participation in small-time racketeering --- a slow "payoff" on a numbers bet - led to tragedy. The loss of the young, dedicated policeman who accepted the risks of an unusual assign ment is one grave aspect of the incident But the assignment istelf also comes into question.

Is there any circumstance or condition serious enough to justify police authorities in setting up an enterprise which consistently breaks the law to help keep tabs on lawbreakers? Is there civic morality in an approach which leaves any neighborhood and all the people in it - young or old, exposed to constant, secret police scrutiny which is directed at everyone and at no one?

There are many other complicated le gal, moral, and political puzzles to be drawn from a situation like this. It opens a Pandora's box of issues revolving about police responsibility and personal

The difficulties of the situation however, must now be faced by the Police Department and the community. From where we stand, a sad precedent has been exposed and must be abandoned. In this case the killing of one man by another is a matter for the courts. But the use of police methods which themselves seem to abuse the law is a matter for instant public rejection. - NEW HAVEN REGISTER.

When a motor is used in a fan or vacuum cleaner, electricity is fed into the stationary part which, in turn, makes the inner part rotate. However, if it is laid out flat, then the inner part instead of rotating will move forward in a straight line.

The electromagnetic launcher is then a flat motor which can imitate a giant slingshot. It can project objects at very high speed. Far from being a wild dream, this device was built by the Westinghouse Corp. and was successfully used to launch various types of planes.

In the Westinghouse launcher the induction motor was laid out flat into a 1,400-foot track with a small shuttle carrying the plane on the track. The shuttle acted as the rotor and at the instant of take-off a power of 12,000 kilowatts was applied to the stator or launcher. The shuttle literally leaped ahead carrying with it the plane. The plane shot into the air with a speed of about 125 m.p.h. in slightly under five seconds after a run of about 400 feet. The power for the motor came from energy stored in a







The suit seeks an injunction against state laws which set up elementary and secondary school districts as part of town structures. The plaintiffs claim these laws are unconstitutional because large concentrations of minority groups in Hartford cause the school systems to be

Hartford's minority school enrollment is now in excess of 62 per cent.

According to the suit, numerous schools within the Hartford District already have a minority group enrollment in excess of 90 per cent.

The suit suggests that the solution for the Hartford schools integrate them with the towns of Windsor and West Hartford, which abutt the north end of the

"On the town lines between Hartford and West Hartford there are children living 100 feet apart. However, one child goes to an all black school and the other to a lilly white school," said suit.

Attorneys for the plaintiffs denied their suit was in any way affected by the U.S. Congress' decision to make school desegragation plans equal for both the north and the south. The suit also states that segregation in Hartford "encourages and fosters" a movement of non-minority group members away from the city and into the

surrounding towns. The suit asks for a permanent injunction to prevent the defendants from enforcing state laws with respect to school districts and for an order compelling the state to control school systems so that equal educational opportunities are

provided for minority groups. Blind Aid 'Blind'

Through Maze Of IRS Forms

WASHINGTON (AP) - Sometimes the blind can guide those who see, and it's happening during these days of worry over income taxes.

The Internal Revenue Service has 31 blind persons in major offices across the country answering telephones and fielding taxpayers' questions. They are among the some 1,300 taxpayer service representatives who give advice for free.

Although the taxpayer with a problem has no way of knowing whether the voice of the exper on the telephone is that of a blind person, it's possible he could hear the click of an abacus. The Oriental calculating instrument with counters on rods or in grooves is used by most of the blind tax experts for arithmetic problems. They wear telephone headsets to keep their

hands free. The IRS started its program of training the blind to help taxpayers four years ago and hopes to have 75 or 100 at the telephone posts in the next few

Vears. "We've not had a single failure in this program," Nicholas Williams, IRS coordinator for the employment of the handicapped, said in an interview.


"We don't pamper them. These people stand or fall and so far they have all been successful." Larry Greco, publications an-

alyst for IRS, said the blind are not coddled and "they want it that way; they want to accomplish something on their own." Greco is involved because the tax instruction booklets and

pamphlet aids are published in braille for the blind. The braille publications for the blind taxpayer can be re-quested from the Library of

Congress-free, just as the ordinary sighted taxpayer gets them in the mail with the form. The IRS experts who are blind get additional helps in braille,

including a pamphlet called "The Fifty Most Asked Ques-The blind workers are trained

NEW YORK (AP) - In private sultes and viewing rooms at ABC, CBS and NBC, network executives are making the final decisions on the program schedules for next season.

They are looking at dozens of pilot films and presentations, from among which they will select next fall's new shows. The selections probably will be announced by the networks next week.

Six shows have already been inked into the new schedules. NBC is replacing Debbie Ry-

nolds and "I Dream of Jeannie" with a Don Knotts variety hour. CBS has Andy Griffith and

ABC is bringing back Danny Thomas in "Make Room for

Possibly as many as 20 shows may be scuttled by the networks to make room for the new programs.

The most likely candidates are those in the bottom third of the Nielsen ratings, although one or two with potential may be saved.

An active report in the industry is that CBS, which has all but lost the ratings race to NBC for the first time in 14 years, will begin to abandon its rural image. Such shows as "Petti-coat Junction" and "Green Acres" may be dropped.

Other shows in danger at CBS include "Lancer," "Get Smart," "When in Rome" and Tim Conway's midseason replacement.

NBC has fewer candidates for oblivion. Besides Debbie Reynolds and "Jeannie," shows in trouble are "Then Came Bron-World," "Bracken's son," "Daniel Boone" and "My World

CBS, in line with reports it will shuck its old image, is looking at a number of dramas of people who are involved with the times, such as "Storefront Lawyer," "Crisia "Shepherd's Clinic." and Flock" The latter is about a minister involved in social work.




