Two Declare For Congress

Manchester State Sen. David Barry now has two declared opponents to his expected candidacy for the Democratic nomination for First District congressman - State Sen. Jay Jackson of West Hartford and former East Hartford mayor John D. Brennan.

Last month, by a unanimous vote, the committee endorsed Barry for a candidacy and urged him to enter the race.

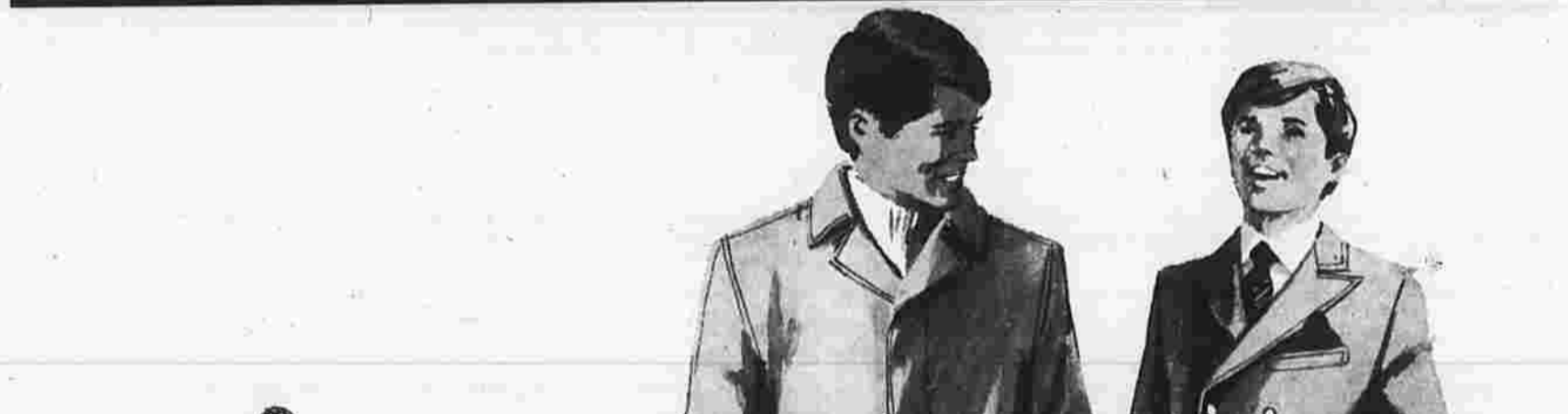

Pill Probe Causes Panic, Senate Told

WASHINGTON (AP) - A catastrophic abortion "where the woman birth control specialist told a Senate subcommittee today that its hearings into the safety of the pill had created international panic and prompted a wave of unwanted pregnancies."

Dr. Elizabeth B. Connell of Columbia University said a step-down in pregnancies "strikes profound fear in the hearts of those who deal daily with women and population problems."

She also criticized some of the conclusions reached by witnesses at hearings last month by the Senate subcommittee.

Doctor Says Hospitals Bed Needlessly

By WALTER B. REKABS WASHINGTON (AP) - A family doctor from North Carolina testified today that about 10 percent of the people admitted to hospitals do not need to be there.

Dr. Connell, a mother of six and the first woman to testify at the hearings, said even the most violent of critics of the pill had to concede its safety was limited and that many of its side effects were based on unsupported speculation.

She commented in testimony prepared for delivery before the panel headed by Democrat Gay Johnson of Georgia, N.C., former president of the American Academy of General Practice.

The subcommittee is resuming its hearings on the pill. Dr. Connell was invited to testify at the instance of Republican members of the subcommittee.

Some of the GOP members have said the information they have gathered in a three-year probe by Nelson of drug industry pricing and development has been biased against the industry.

Dr. Connell, associate professor of obstetrics and gynecology at Columbia and director of research and development for the International Institute for the Study of Human Reproduction, said:

"We are just beginning to see the first of the pregnancies of women who panicked in January, stopped their pills, and did not seek or use another means of birth control."

"These women will not be here to testify," she went on, "but they now bear within their bodies the testimony of the ineffectiveness of induced fear."

Adding that it was "axiomatic" that illegal abortions also will increase, Dr. Connell said her conclusion that panic had been caused was based on statistics such as these from a Detroit clinic:

"In Detroit, 115 patients asked to discontinue pills and were fitted with diaphragms. Examined with diaphragms, 100 patients were trained in general practitioners, with the other 85 per cent becoming specialists. He said the ratio should be reversed."

Dr. Paul Patterson of Albany, N.Y., Medical College, said general diseases are responsible for 25 per cent of admissions to hospitals and institutions for the handicapped - often at a "home destroying cost."

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World Pilots May Strike

NEW YORK (AP) - The president of the International Federation of Air Line Pilots Associations has warned of possible worldwide strike if efforts are not made to protect civilian planes.

Capt. Olo Forsberg said he would ask the United Nations and the airlines to guarantee an end to repeated incidents of terrorism against civilian aviation.

He said a 24-hour, worldwide work stoppage may be considered if his organization's annual meeting March 11 in London.

In London, British air transport service Arab airlines refused to fly over the Middle East.

The workers agreed to service Iranian planes only after Iran air officials promised the airline was not Arab.

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Laird Unveils ABM Growth

WASHINGTON (AP) - Secretary of Defense Melvin Laird unveiled today plans to defend a third U.S. missile base with Safeguard antiballistic missiles and to prepare five other sites for possible later expansion of the system.

The plans for the groundwork for the administration to build at least two-thirds of a \$12-billion system that some members of Congress fear will become even more expensive.

Laird, testifying before the Senate Armed Services Committee, called it "the minimum we can do and must do to defend against missiles of the Soviet Union and the emerging Red Chinese missile threat."

The administration initiated the Safeguard system last year with defenses of two Air Force Minuteman bases at Malmstrom Air Force Base in Montana and Grand Forks Air Force Base in North Dakota.

Under the latest expansion, which will involve annual spending at this point of only \$620 million because of the early stage, Laird said the administration plans to:

Deploy an additional Safeguard defense site at Whiteman Air Force Base, a Minuteman complex, in Missouri.

Begin advanced preparation work on five other sites "without a deployment commitment" in the northeast, northwest, the Midwest and Ohio area.

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B52 Bombers Hitting Laos, Sources Say

SAIGON (AP) - The United States is waiting the Vietnam government to authorize B52 bombing campaigns in eastern Laos, informed sources said today.

Sources estimated that more than 200 sorties - sorties in one flight by one bomber - have been flown over the Ho Chi in the Michigan-Ohio area.

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Thirty Lives Believed Lost As Avalanche Hits Village

RECKINGEN, Switzerland (AP) - An avalanche crashed through this village at dawn today and 30 persons were feared dead.

Seven bodies were recovered but 10 hours after the slide struck 20 persons were still listed as missing.

Villagers said there is "no hope" for those still buried. Many of the victims were Swiss army officers whose barracks was crushed by the massive snow which piled up 30-feet high. They were attached to a small anticaircraft unit stationed in the village.

More than 20 persons were dug out alive, but several were badly injured and in a critical condition.

A storekeeper's wife, Mrs. Leo Mueller, said: "I didn't hear the slide. I was awakened by uproar and shouting in the village - I thought someone had been celebrating. My husband and I rushed outside and saw that the military barracks and seven houses had been raved. One of the barracks walls was over 200 yards away."

"Two of the houses were vacation chalets, but only one was occupied. Fortunately the Swiss family in it was sleeping in the cellar and managed to get out. But the soldiers had no chance - two of their bodies were decapitated. There is no hope for the rest still under the snow."

Hotel employe Heinz Jerjen said: "I was awakened by a tremendous roaring sound. I knew right away it was an avalanche and I dove to the wall for cover but it did not reach the hotel."

Reckingen is in Valais state, about 20 miles northwest of the town of Brig.

Five of the dead were identified as officers, two women and a 12-year-old boy, all Swiss.

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Rogers: Red Threat Negligible in Africa

MONROVIA, Liberia (AP) — Secretary of State William P. Rogers ended his 11th African tour Sunday with the conviction that black Africa can and should be kept isolated from the cold war.

Not all the African leaders he met on his 16-day safari shared Rogers' view. But when Rogers' itinerary crossed that of Yugoslavia's President Tito in Addis Ababa and they conferred for 75 minutes, their only point of substantive agreement was that the African countries should keep out of power bloc and military alliances.

Rogers himself did not seem concerned over this threat. Nor did he seem to feel there was any danger of growing Soviet influence over the Nigerian government of Maj. Gen. Yakubu Gowon, which created the Biafran secession last month with every part of Africa. It was the help of substantial Soviet arms to black Africa that he feared.

"I have the feeling the Soviet Union is giving up the ambition of turning Africa into a Socialist area," Rogers told newsmen on his return. "I did not detect any direct Soviet involvement in the Biafran crisis."

Rogers expressed American sympathy with the African leaders' concern over the white regimes in Rhodesia, South Africa and the Portuguese colonies but he said the energetic American Embassy staff in Accra, Ghana.

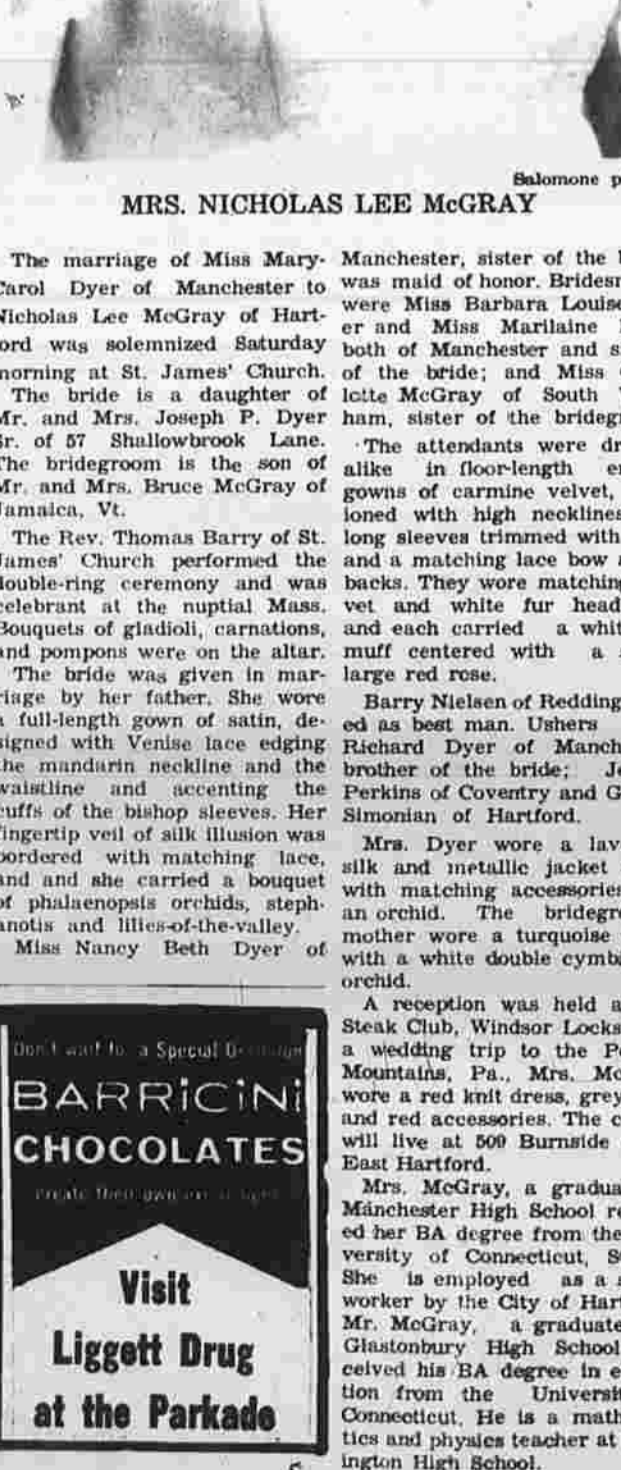
Despite some isolated misgivings, Rogers found the African leaders' attitude toward the United States as a role of friendship, mutual trust and mutual cooperation. "The leaders have been... warned the African leaders that they should expect less direct American military and economic aid in the future and should concentrate their efforts on encouraging private investment and regional cooperation among the African leaders."

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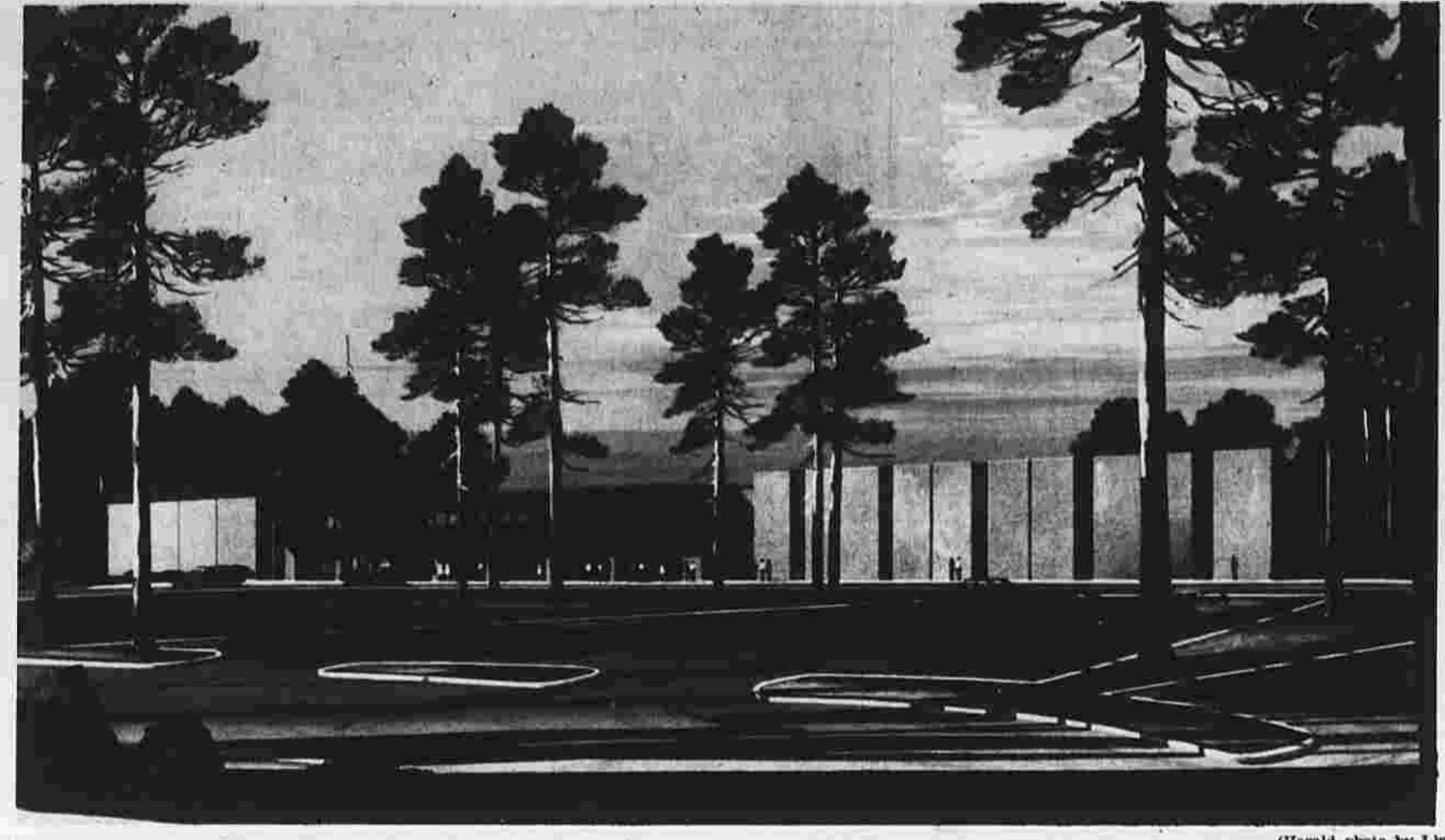
