Treaties For Others, Not For Us One of the things President Nixon is trying to do, to his great credit, is to lead the United States out of that instinctive, arbitrary isolation which has hitherto kept it from ratifying some of the documents by which the world has tried to give itself guarantees of its own civilized conduct.

The President has asked, for one thing, that we formally bind ourselves to the Geneva Convention, adopted after the first World War, by which its signers renounced the use of gas.

And now he has asked that we reexamine all our previous refusal to ratify the international treaty against genocide which was written and adopted just after World War II.

As a preliminary move toward trying for favorable action in the Senate, the Nixon Administration had its representatives before the House of Delegates of the American Bar Association meeting at Atlanța the other day, presenting the appeal and the case for ratification.

The Bar Association had originally opposed ratification, back in 1946. Now, after hearing arguments pro and

con again, the House of Delegates still voted, 130 to 126, against recommending ratification. Two arguments apparently won

day for the opposition.

One former president of the assoc ation argued that, if the United States ratified the treaty against genocide. which means the systematic extermination of racial groups, any American individual could bring charges against his own government, which would then have to answer them before an international tribunal.

The second argument against ratification held that, if we joined the treaty, then American soldiers in . Vietnam might face charges of genocide.

On the contrary, positive side, President Nixon's Solicitor General, Erwin N. Griswold, told the delegates ratification offered the United States "an opportunity to exercise that great function of leadership, to restore this nation to the great role of leadership in international law." And Bernard Segal, present president of the bar association, told the delegates that all of our allies have ratified the treaty. "We stand alone," he said.

So far as the recommendation of this group of lawyers is concerned, we will continue to stand alone, approving of certain laws for others, but not for ourselves. As is quite natural for our power and size and conceit of special virtue, we are the world's leading nation in refusing to submit ourselves to international law or judgment. If we ever become the world's leading nation in strengthening and spreading and respecting international law and judgment as we at some moments in the early history of the United Nations almost promised to be-we will have advanced toward true world leadership and our own potential greatness.

Presumably, he now believes in repeal of anti-busing laws in both the North and the South. Should he not move forward to an effort to get such laws repealed, in both New York and Alabama, together? Or does he think the federal government should find some way of moving to compel Alabama to repeal, first? What does the mirror say?

Jewels On The Landscape

This is, visually speaking, the merciless season of the year, when all that is left of winter is its ravages, and there is as yet no healing touch from spring upon the landscape. 11.1

As in other, recent springs of utter landscape nakedness, the Sunday drive observer is certain to notice a new kind of jewel on the landscape. Usually standing in some position far down a woodland lane where it would be well-hidden by the foliage of summer, the new kind of adornment for the landscape is that of the abandoned automobile. It usually has both its engine hood and its rear compartment hood raised aloft in gay greeting to all distant viewers. Its very comfortable squat - down, lethargic appearance bespeaks its obvious intention never to travel again, for anyone's pleasure or mischief, of its own motive power. So far as its intentions are concerned, and those of the sporty characters who once owned it, or who may have borrowed it for its last evening, that is where it will now remain, growing a little less gay and jewel-like in appearance each

Conceivably, the abandoned wreck may not continue lonely. Other automobiles on their own way to happy dumping grounds may gather round, and form a cluster

This is what President Nixon was talking about, in his message on pollution, when he suggested including the cost of disposal of automobiles in their original price, and this is why the City Club of New York has just proposed that the city pay a bounty of about \$35 to car owners who will turn their cars in to authorized abandonment depots instead of just leaving them alongside the citys' parkways. We out in the suburbs probably are still some distance away from any such remedial measure. We in Connecticut have many old winding lanes, which twist their way between fields no longer ultivated, and we have room for lots of clusters no one will ever notice except in that annual interval, just between winter and spring, when the countryside is so otally naked.

Safety In The Law

Gov. Sargent's highway safety message to the Legislature this week assumes special importance - not only beause highway casualties in the Bay State are mounting - but because much of the motoring public is indifferent to safety for its own sake.

No matter how ingenious an auto safey device may be, it is completely inefective if the motorist doesn't use it. This is the sad - sometimes tragic story of the seat belt. Americans were using the belts even less last July, according to Marketing-Communications nagazine, than they did a year earlier. before the start of a \$51 million national safety campaign to persuade motorists to "buckle up" when they drive. Other devices; such as collapsible pumpers and steering columns, recessed ioor handles and cushioned dashboards are probably more effective because they are built in and don't need to be activated by the driver. Nevertheless, it has become clear that much of the notoring public is not interested in safety to the point of spending more for it unless the law requires it.

Against this background, it is the more argent to devise stiffer laws as a deterrent to the kind of driving responsible for many of the 893 highway fatalities in the Bay State last year. Drunken driv ers are the main target of proposals by the governor that would lower the alco holic content of the blood on which a legal finding of drunken driving may be pased; and that would withhold licenses of alcoholics or drug addicts convicted of driving under the influence of alcohol narcotics, until they are deemed

Other aspects of the message are also sponsive to specific needs. Penalties would be established, for instance, for leaving the ignition key in an unattended vehicle. Tire safety standards could be imposed by the registrar of motor vehicles. It would be illegal to allow

standees in school buses. Neither legislation nor automobile and highway design can do the whole job o highway safety; the human element will always be a most important factor, But the time has come to exploit every possible way of cutting back on the loss of life and limb on the state's highways. NEW YORK - Mary Welsh Hemingway was making duck soup. She had shot the ducks, served the meat to visiting Russian writers, and was simmer ing the bones. 'When you see them rise out

Mrs. Hemingway is a hunter, writer and explorer. She is also heiress to what may be the hottest literary property of the age.
