



WASHINGTON (AP) - The price farmer Calvin Goecke gets for his cattle is about the same as a year ago. The price Ricky Muriph, mother of three, pays for beef is 8 per cent high-

Both are caught in an erratic beef price situation still recovering from a spasmodic summer and responding to the rising prices of competitive meats. Both are unhappy about the prices, and both are reacting in similar fashion. Goecke is handling half as many cattle on his Marshalltown, Iowa, farm, Mrs. Muriph is feeding fewer expensive cuts of meat to her South Weymouth, Mass., family. But there's enough money in the pocketbooks of other farmers and housewives to mute the actions of the Goeckes and Mu-

riphs. So analysts expect prices to keep going up. "We don't look for lower meat prices," says C. William Mc-Millan, marketing executive for the American National Cattle men's Association. "People are -generally paying the prices." Why are retail beef prices higher than they were a year ago, while farm prices are the

same? One reason is that retailers markups are slightly fatter than they were last summer. Retailers say this is necessary to make up for thinner profitsor even losses-they endured

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Extending Principle Down, Not Up The Supreme Court the other day, with its new Chief Justice Warren Burger joining Justices John Harlan and Potter Stewart in the dissent they used to maintain during the Warren court's rulings on the same subject, decided that the one-man-vote principle must be extended down to any level where people are being elected to serve any governmental functions - even, 'in the particular case at hand, election to the board of trustees for a junior college out in Kansas City. The language of the decision went as follows: "We think the decision of the state to select official by popular vote is a strong enough indication that the choice is an important one. . . We therefore hold today that as a general rule, henever a state or local government lecides to select persons by popular election to perform governmental function, the equal protection clause of the Fourteenth Amendment reguires that each qualified voter must be given an equal opportunity to participate in that election and that when members of an elected body are chosen from separate districts, the districts be equally apportioned."

By this ruling, the bothersome business of trying to keep all kinds of election districts qual in voting strength has now bee, parried down to the lowest possible and least important level.

If the principle involved is right and sacred, as a majority of the Supreme Count has been believing for nearly 10 years now, there should not be any limitation to the area in which it is to be enforced, and there can, on that basis, be no quarrel with the Court's decision to extend it down to the very littlest election imaginable.

What should be pointed out, however, is that if the principle of one-man-onevote is so totally right it deserves to be extended down to every littlest election, then it should also be extended upward. Quite obviously, if principle is the thing, the one-man-one-vote principle should be extended upward, first, to the United States Senate, which is still allowed to get itself elected by a system now denied to any state or local official. There has never, anywhere in the nation, been any example of violation of the one-man-one-vote principle any more glaring than that of the disproportion between two votes in the Senate for the state of Nevada, with a population of 285,000, and two votes for the state of New York, with a population of 

This nation's next glaring violation of the one-man-one-vote principle survives in our system for our most important election of all, that of the President. Every tabulation of electoral votes contains some instance of rape of the oneman-one-vote principle.

Our Supreme Court, for all its zealousness for its principle, and for all its willingness to extend the operation of the principle all the way down the political scale, has never dared face honestly, even for a moment, the question of whether the same principle should not be applied to the election of the United States Senate and the President.

We happen to think the one-man-onevote principle should not be applied at all to the election of the United States Senate and we wouldn't care to have it applied too strictly and too directly to the election of the President either. In fact, we find ourselves agreeing with Prof. Alexander Bickel of Yale Law School, who holds that some kind of 'malapportionment" is what functions best for a democracy which has to maintain a variety and diversity of practices and institutions if it is to protect its minorities from too complete a rule by the majority.

Nevertheless, we suggest that, in these days when all kinds of remedies and health and safety and anti-pest measures and pills are proving to have hidden boomerang effects in them some where, it may still be a little early to close the book on the seat belt and consider that we have reached a final determination that it is the perfect safety

The railroad industry has reason worry. While the nation's freight trains are indispensable carriers of the nation's oods, the industry has become ever furer removed from the public consciousness. It has often been noted that the blame for the deterioration of American passenger trains must be spread widel The Federal Government, which subsi dizes airlines by building and maintaining airports, and helps keep the mer-chant fleet afloat by subsidizing shipbuilding and some operating costs, has neglected to give the railroads a similar

On the contrary, taxes at every level have made railroading a hard business. Beyond that, the extravagant demands f unions have cut deeply into the rails' budgets - although one may fairly wonder why rail executives have given in to rganized labor so meekly over the

The one big break the train people ceived occurred when the nation was younger. In the 19th Century, the railroads were given, free and with practically no strings, vast tracts of land on which to build their roadbeds. Tycoons quickly made immense fortunes.

But railroading in this country has it nodern times appeared to be an in dustry with relatively little imagination Aside from a few innovations, such as piggy-backing, in hauling freight, the rail companies have been content to milk their valuable routes and almost completely surrender their passenger business as a hopelessly uneconomic nui-Who, they seemed to be saying, wants to bother with people, when, it is so much easier to stuff a slatted car with hogs!

All of us can understand that no carrier can afford for long the great financial losses piled up by many passenger trains. What is less understandable the inability or disinterest of the rail companies to place the case before the

American people. The railroad companies have many legitimate complaints about unions, taxes and stultifying Federal regulations. But none of the problems these things represent are immune to change. What is disappointing and inexcusable is the stance of the railroads themselves.
