The Peril And The Push The tobacco industry is itself recon ciled to the prospect that the day is swiftly approaching when it won't be advertising cigarets on either television

That leaves to somebody else the brunt of the battle being fought in Congress over the question of cigaret advertising. One part of the battle is being taken up by the broadcasting networks. They are concerned because Congress seems determined to create a precedent by outlawing the advertising, on two particular media, radio and television, for a product which is still quite legal.

The networks alone are not likely to win their battle, unless ordinary Americans are interested, not in smoking, or not smoking, but in principle, and prepared to defend their point of view.

What Congress is itching to do on the smoking issue is to go beyond mere regulations of where and how cigarets can be advertised. Congress is itching to extend its moral and medical judgment and regulation not merely to advertising, but to the consumption of cig-

aret itself illegal, and thus eliminate

In such an era as ours, with such motiprofit interest involved and even those citizens who themselves have no interest in the cigaret because they themselves have given it up to go on the alert.

The most terrible dictatorial mastery of men is that which starts off doing things to them for their own good, narrowing their freedom of choice because they may make a choice which is dangerous to themselves, prescribing for ordinary people codes of conduct which the more elite have decided would be good for them.

The typical crusade toward such dictatorship is likely to be composed of equal parts of a noble concern for the welfare of others and an instinctive lust for the privilege of pushing other people

The lowly cigaret stands, at the moment, as the most popular of public perils and, at the same time the implement some people are trying to use to push other people around.

The peril content of the cigaret may vary, with future medical record keeping and analysis, to be either less, or even more, than is now generally as-

But the lure of the instinct to push other people around, if not for one cause then for another, if not by one pretext then by another, is a strong, constant factor in human behavior.

Crowding The Air

Because the Federal Aviation Adminisration wants to be on the safe side, it has instructed its air traffic controllers to be sure to keep all other planes at least 2,000 feet below and 10 miles behind any of the new 747 jetliners.

By the time the problem has been studied, it may prove much less serious

Still, it seems almost certain that the present FAA distances, keeping planes at least 1,000 feet below one another and from three to five miles behind one another horizontally, will have to be increased considerably.

The fascinating thing about this is that it illustrates how swiftly we are managing to shrink what must once have seemed most certainly a truly limitless travel medium. The air, as we first contemplated using it, must have seemed free of all the limitations and boundaries of either land or sea. Still, by leaping progressions in the speed and size of the aircraft we build, we have 'created equally progressive reductions in the amount of real safe air available. We have already crowded, beyond the saturation point, the air immediately around our airports. Now, with our superjets, we are marking out wider and deeper corridors that will have to be watched out for in our cross country air. Eventually, no doubt, we will have a turbulence to turbulence traffic up there to match the bumper to bumper crowding we have achieved in our streets.

A Hospital Is Costly

Manchester Memorial Hospital's manchester Memorial Hospital's new wing is costing an average of \$56 to \$60 a square foot to build, according to Jack R. Hunter, chairman of the hospital building committee and president of Jack R.

Recently, Hunter took the time to go over the photographs on these pages to try to explain why a hospital costs so much to build. "Half the cost is in heating, plumbing, and air conditioning. The whole building is going to be air-conditioned, you know," he

He pointed out special concrete-enclosed steel beams, steel instead of wood wall studding, vast inter-twining networks of pipes and ducts, and many other items that

make a hospital so expensive. In contrast to the \$60 per square foot cost of a hospital, a comfort-able home can be built for \$25 a square foot, and a recently com-pleted school in the area was built for \$33 a square foot.


There are many reasons why a hospital costs almost twice as much as a school. Vast mazes of pipes to carry oxygen, suction gas and other things needed in hospitals, as well as water, air conditioning, and fresh air ducts, have to be sandwiched between floors. The space these pipes and ducts take up is lost.

Another reason hospitals cost more is more expensive construction techniques are required to meet the tougher fire standards in hospitals.


"Everything has to be fire proof

or fire resistant," Hunter said-"We have to use steel wall stud-

ding instead of wood, and we have to box in with concrete all the steel beams and columns to meet the two-hour fire rating required."

Other items that add to the cost are valves costing \$300 each, emergency generators, fresh air sysarea will be added.


Plans for the new wing were publicly announced July 9, 1968. The front-page headline in The Herald read: "Hospital To Build \$4 Million Wing," but soon after, much to their dismay, the members of the board of trustees learnbers of the board of trustees learned that the wing was going to cost \$5.15 million. The increase was at-tributed to the rapidly rising construction and equipment costs. "The project was on the drawing boards for more than a year during which costs rose faster than expected," one hospital official

The primary purpose of the new wing is not to increase the number of beds; there will be only 34 more beds. New facilities including seven operating rooms, a completely new radiology department,


and a new central sterile supply

The bed increase will include three new intensive care units including one five-bed coronary care unit plus 22 intermediate care beds in 11 rooms.

The contract was signed with the prime contractor, Standard Builders, Inc. of Hartford, on Nov. 26, 1968. Hunter said that construction is about 62 per cent complete. He estimated that the building would be finished in January 1971. Originally the board of trustees had hoped to open the new wing nearer to the hospital's anniversary in November, but because of some setbacks, including the iron and steelworker's strike last summer, that date doesn't seem to be possible to meet. The architects for the wing are Frid, Ferguson, Mahaffey and Perry of Hartford.
