The Cooper Amendment

The other day the Senate adopted, not on motion of Senator Stennis of Mississippl or Senator Ribicoff of Connecticut, but on that of Senator John Sherman Cooper, the Kentucky Republican, an amendment which would have the effect of bringing into sections of six Northern states, including Manhattan, Brooklyn and the Bronx most importantly, the same kind of federal law on voting rights which already applies to the

South By the Cooper amendment, the Voting Rights Act of 1965, if it continues on the books, would produce relaxation of literacy tests and the invasion of federal voting registrars in any section of the country where less than half of the voting population was registered or voted in the 1968 national elections.

Apparently there are some Northern ghettoes in which registration or voting was below the 50 per cent level in 1968.

By voting the amendment, the Senate held that a disenfranchisement in the North, whatever its particular causes, even if it happened only by the neglect of people to exercise citizenship privileges freely open to them, was just as serious a problem as any disenfranchisement down South, even though the latter ing-out policies on the part of the whites. As might have been expected from his record on the Stennis amendment a month ago, Senator Jacob Javits, the New York Republic n .'beral, led the fight against the Cooper amendment. Once again, his fear was that this was a kind of legislation which would let the South off the hook without accomplishing anything constructive or valuable in the North.

And once again we wonder what is wrong with the opposite theory, which says that perhaps the best way to persuade the South to try to comply in good faith with the necessities of any all-American future is to have the North lemonstrate that it does recognize and accept all its own parallel responsibili-

Higher, Tougher Than Mountains mund Hillary climbed Mount

Everest, back in 1953, "because it was here." That is the immemorial reason for

numan challenge to obstacles that seem impassable.

Mountains always yield, in the end. What does a man like Sir Edmund Hillary do, after he has climbed the highest mountain?

Well, if he happens to be Sir Edmund Hillary in person, he looks for other sup-

posedly impossible worlds to conquer. Reports on the latter day career of Mount Everest's famous conqueror indicate that he has succeeded in the search for obstacles which can give him a tougher time than Mount Everest ever could.

He has, in his native New Zealand, undertaken to challenge that element which, in every human society, often seems to loom taller and more formidable than any. Mount Everest - the socalled establishment.

Sir Edmund has made himself something of a one man crusader for honesty in government, a challenger of the complacency with which, he charges, New Zealand's leaders ignore the urgent social and spiritual problems of the time, and a special pleader for such causes as conservation and anti-pollution.

Some of his fellow New Zealanders think he is making himself the national

conscience, and applaud his attempt to move up the great mountainside of na-

tional inertia. But the great massive formations of the establishment he is trying to scale are outraged, and consider him an impudent crackpot.

Why, they probably want to know doesn't he go off and climb another mountain? Why does he have to pick on the possible political, social, and moral imperfections of the New Zealand so-

We suppose the answer is that he attacks the blank walls of his society for the same reason he attacks mountainsbecause they are there, and seem to boast that they are unclimbable.

Hypocrisy? Cheers!

If there's one thing we of the parental generation ought to know it is that we are shot full of hypocrisy. Our young tell us that all the time.

The proposition that hypocrisy is one of the evils that we, the elders, have folsted upon the world to our shame isn't intended to be discussed, any more than one would debate whether the world is round: You are supposed to start with that as a philosophical premise, and then listen to how the young are going to change all this.

There's a temptation, of course, to retort that the young are not exactly free of it, if the word means pretending to eelings one does not have. To preach love not hatred and then spit on a teacher; to preach peace not violence and then tear up the pea patch; these are hardly consistent

More, to pretend to certainty about everything while you are conscious inside of a turbulent uncertainty is certainly a form of self-deception. Th young are no more free of this than their elders.

Or, I suppose, you might note that at least the milder forms of hypocrisy have their merits. They are the lubricating oils of society. Life is more pleasant for our hiding, now and then, our true opinions of our kin and neighbors, or for our patience in a queue when actually we feel otherwise

But all this is really no answer to what the young charge us with. To answer thus is either to be trivial or specious. The true charge cuts deep, for it is nothing less than that we do not live up to the virtues we pretendand preach.

That charge cannot be denied. We do indeed, all of us, preach peace and make war. We profess to believe, let us say, in the sanctity of marriage and we preach it to our young as a holy estate, or at the least an honorable one; in fact we treat it as a casual contract to be broken when inconvenient.

We say we are a society of laws. In fact most of us ignore those laws we think little of, whether it is going through a traffic light or guzzling whisky during prohibition. We say we believe in order and non-violence, but the young militants are not the first to take to the streets. Our forbears dumped some merchants' tea into the sea, and in our own time we took to the barricades at the River Rouge.

The point need not be labored. All of us-some more, some less-have some private pretense by which the virtue we nonor is observed more in the breaching of it. As a group, as a society, we do not in fact live up to those standards which we proclaim are those of the good society. If hypocrisy means the pretense to virtues one does not possess, then that is the word for it.

But where is the wickedness? Is it in what we are, or in what we pretend to? Do we diminish the hypocrisy by striving further, or end it by naming virtue that which we do?

All we are really saying when we decry hypocrisy is that none of us-individually or collectively-live up to the standards we proclaim. True, and men never have. Socrates, that wise man of the Greeks, stood alone in his own time. So did Jesus, the great prophet of the Jews. To say that neither of them fares well in our time is only to say what they both knew, that we are frail creatures incapable of full self-wisdom or selfless love. But is it evil to admire the one man and revere the other?

If the young wish to berate us for our failures, well and good. But you can't help wishing they could understand that hypocrisy is the consequence of the one virtue known to man alone that he can aspire to be what he is not. Even when hypocrisy comes in its worst form, as when a man pretends to believe in honesty only to fool his neighbors, it remains that homage vice pays to virtue. If his neighbors did not value honesty there would be no need for pretense.


When it comes, as it does to most of us, because we cannot always love our neighbors as ourselves, because we are not always honest or charitable or compassionate, it proves only that our reach exceeds our grasp. That is a cause for regret, but not for shame. If we have made any progress from

slime, it is because we are constantly making ourselves hypocrites by setting ideals beyond us. There was a time when we preached the brotherhood of man and practiced slavery; dreamed of justice and hanged a man for stealing a loaf of bread; praised God and burned those who praised Him in a different fashion. Had not hypocrisy pricked our conscience, there we would be still.

We are made hypocrites by setting ideals beyond us, and then as we creep slowly toward them we push them yet . Without an ideal of learning befurther yond the capacity of most of us, no one would have built universities where old and young do meet. Without an ideal of the oneness of Man beyond our ability to practice it, we would not be struggling to bring black and white into common fellowship.

Somehow these young have got things turned around. What they ought to be telling us is that the gap between what we are and do, and what we should aspire to be and do, is not great enough. The sin, if there be such, is shriveling dreams to match our deeds.

Anyway, young fellows, put me down as a proud hypocrite. It's probably as close as I'll ever come to virtue .- VER-MONT ROYSTER IN THE WALL STREET JOURNAL.

Only when capitalism needs a reserv labor pool, as in the time of war, or someone to do menial jobs, are women brought into the work force in numbers.

(One argument against this theory is that, even in Engels' primitive state, women still did domestic chores and childrearing. All that modern times has done, the argument goes, is remove from women the extra burden of raising food as well as cooking it.) Women's Lib states further, that with the advent of mass consumption, women were given the primary consumer function. "Consumerism," too, depended upon the maintenance of marriage and the family, be cause marriage was big bus

Before marriage, women are sold products to 'get a man' (clothing, cosmetics, acces-sories). When she does marry, she must buy everything to out-fit a home. Men may buy clothes, a car, sports equip-ment and tools, but the wife buys-regularly -food, clothes, children's clothes and toys, major appliances, home furnishings and cleaning

products. Since she is the biggest consumer, this makes her the prime target of Madison Avenue, says Women's Lib. This further contributes to her umanization because they see her as a passive "market" to be manipulated. Since the usual function of a

woman in a capitalistic society is not one of primary wage-





> Battle Appears Won Sex Education Introduced

NEW YORK (AP) - Sex education may still be a highly controversial subject among parents but it has been introduced in almost every school in almost every area of the nation, an Associated Press survey shows. Once the chief target of the antisex education forces, the Sex Information and Ecucation Council (SIECUS) headed by Dr. Mary Calderone has retired from the front lines, convinced that the initial battle has been won.

Leaving the spread of formal sex education classes to local and state educators, SIECUS is turning its attention to other matters, including research into the effects of sex education on the first generation of school children to undergo widespread sex teaching.

A state-by-state survey shows that the parent protest continues, that no area of the country is immune from these protests, and that they often determine how far school officials gowhether the information supplied on sex is full and frank, or turned into another "hygiene course.

A lawsuit has been filed Connecticut by several parents, challenging the right of the state and a local school to give instruction in sex education. Connecticut has had required sex education since 1938, calling it "health education," but officials say new methods of teaching apparently inspired the suit. Thousands of school districts


