Panel Wants GIs Taught POW Care

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Army investigative panel that charged two generals with lower ranking officers with violating military regulations in the alleged My Lai massacre, said it wants GIs taught how to care for prisoners.

The special panel also urged revamping reporting procedures to ensure that inquiries into any future incidents will flow up the chain of command and not be blocked at company or battalion levels.

The recommendations were included in a report made public Tuesday that resulted in charges of dereliction of duty and failure to obey regulations against 10 field grade officers and three captains in the alleged massacre.

Lt. Gen. William R. Peers, who headed the Army investigation, refused to characterize the original field probe—which produced negative results—as a cover-up of the alleged massacre of Vietnamese civilians March 16, 1968.

But he stated "our inquiry clearly established that a tragedy of major proportions had occurred there" March 16, 1968. Peers said his group received testimony and evidence "to indicate that certain individuals, either wittingly or unwittingly, by their action suppressed information from the incident from being passed up the chain of command."

The report said the Peers inquiry prompted them to file charges against Maj. Gen. Sam W. Koster, who commanded the American Division, elements of which swept the Son My area in the weeks following the alleged killings of more than 100 civilians.

Also charged with dereliction of duty and failure to obey regulations was Brig. Gen. George H. Young Jr., who was assistant commander of the American Division at the time.

The 12 other officers, ranging from colonel to captain, were charged with such offenses as false swearing, failure to report possible misconduct, making false official statements, dereliction, failure to obey regulations and orders, and "misprision" of a felony, which is defined in military law as knowing of a felony and concealing that knowledge from authorities.

Grand jury-type formal investigations now will be held to decide whether the officers should be court-martialed.

Koster asked to be relieved from his current position as head of the U.S. Military Academy at West Point and said goodbye Tuesday to the 3,700 cadets who gave him a standing ovation.

Army officials said Koster will serve as assistant to Lt. Gen. Jonathan Seaman who is 1st Army commander at Fort Meade, Md. Most of the 14 officers charged are to be transferred there.

Young, who commands the 24th Infantry Division in West Germany, was reassigned to Ft. Meade, but spokesman in Germany said it was not known when he would return to the United States.

The 12th annual such affair is on this week with such delights as street shootings by a group of make believe desperados called Carson's Raiders, free camping facilities and all-day barbecues.

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Cambodian Coup Unseats Prince in Wake of Riots

SAIGON (AP) — Cambodia's Parliament overthrew Prince Norodom Sihanouk today, charging the chief of state provoked the political crisis gripping the nation, Radio Phnom Penh announced.

Asian diplomats in Saigon received reports that Cambodia troops surrounded the Parliament building and had sealed off the airport in the day for Peking.

The cause of the crisis was violent demonstrations last week against the presence of North Vietnamese and Viet Cong troops in Cambodian border regions. During the demonstrations, Cambodians sacked the North Vietnamese and Viet Cong embassies in Phnom Penh.

The Cambodian radio said the reigns of power as chief of state were turned over to Cheng Heng, president of the National Assembly. The assembly, the lower house of Parliament, met in joint session with the Royal Cambodian Council, the upper house, and voted no confidence in Sihanouk.

A report received by the government in Saigon said the real power in Cambodia now rests with Gen. Lon Nol, premier and chief of the military forces, and Sirk Chhoeun, a top government minister.

The two men are known to be close friends. Sihanouk's neutralist policy, which had been opposed by the 40,000 North Vietnamese and Viet Cong troops in Cambodia, was often baffle to the outsider. He cut ties with the United States and turned toward China, which he called "my children."

He also told Tass he intended to maintain Cambodia's small Communist party, but Phnom Penh became a city where peddlers sold the work of Mao Tse-tung in restaurants.

Once a sharp critic of the Soviet Union and Red China, he turned toward them because of criticizing the United States.

When John F. Kennedy visited Cambodia in November 1967 the dapper prince displayed his personal playing guitar and called "my children."

It is difficult to be a prince nowadays, he said a few years ago. "The people believe that princes only build palaces and make gold and silver. But nowadays we have to work."

Sihanouk was once king of Cambodia, taking the throne in 1941. During World War II and after, he supported a Cambodian movement for independence. He was named chief of the nation's two illustrated magazines.

Diplomatic relations between Cambodia and the United States were broken in 1965 but restored last June on a low-level basis.

In his last reported comment on the domestic turmoil in his country, Sihanouk told the Boston Herald.

BOSTON (AP) — A pilot shot in both arms landed an airliner with 73 persons aboard after a mile high cockpit struggle Tuesday night which left the cockpit dead and a passenger seriously wounded. The passenger was charged with murder.

East Boston Municipal Court issued a murder complaint today against John D. Divivo, 27, of West New York, N.J., in connection with the death of James E. Hartley, 31, of Fort Lee, N.J., the slain cop.

Divivo was reported in satisfactory condition at Massachusetts General Hospital, where he underwent emergency surgery for bullet wounds in the arm and abdomen. He was under police guard.

Passengers reported there was no panic aboard the plane after the shots were fired. When the airliner landed at Logan International Airport after a flight from Newark, N.J., the pilot, Capt. Robert Wilbur, 35, of Fairlawn, N.J., "broke me out."

The plane was then a mile high over the town of Franklin, about 30 miles south of Boston, when the pilot was shot.

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Prince Sihanouk Peking-Bound

MOSCOW (AP) — Prince Norodom Sihanouk left Moscow for Peking today without making a statement that he had thrown him as Cambodia's chief of state.

Asked where the prince would go after Peking, the spokesman said: "In principle, he will return to Cambodia's small Communist party, but Phnom Penh became a city where peddlers sold the work of Mao Tse-tung in restaurants."

Battles Over SST Loud as Sonic Boom

NEW YORK (AP) — Will the new Boeing Company commercial supersonic transport, scheduled for use in 1978, be permitted to fly over populated areas, accompanied by a sonic boom that some critics estimate will be as loud as a bomb?

Place your bets. Those concerned with environmental noise cannot be permitted. Cynics remind anyone who will listen that technology has a way of rolling along against all obstacles, including human cries.

The anti-SST forces, which include myriad groups and individuals, have focused on the threatened noise pollution as their most potent weapon. But curiously, they seem to ignore equally hazardous effects.

Consider some of them, taken from a report to President Nixon last fall:

"Passengers and crew will be vulnerable to a number of potentially serious physical, physiological and psychological stresses associated with rapid acceleration, gravitational routes compared with international routes."

Bouillon, a low-keyed engineer with a record of brilliant work, we are reminded, would result in all aboard losing consciousness within 15 seconds. "Somebody the SST can be an ovotoxic agent," he said, "to let the argument 100 times greater than on land."

Nepal's Resident Russian Lands in Royal 'Hot Water'

KATMANDU, Nepal (AP) — A legendary White Russian has fallen out of royal favor in the wake of a national scandal involving the theft of sacred art treasures.

For 15 years Boris Lasanovich entered for royal functions and provided a warm fire and elegant surroundings at the Royal Hotel for men who came to climb the Himalayas.

The fireplace of the hotel's Yak and Yeti bar still burns brightly these days, but an uneasy quiet hangs over the Royal.

Boris, 64, is in jail, charged with possessing valuable and sacred idols.

Those closest to Boris claim he is a victim of palace intrigue and has been treated. The government says Boris was caught with 200 idols in his hotel, some ready to be shipped abroad in violation of the nation's laws.

A former ballet dancer who fled Russia during the Bolshevik Revolution, Boris came to Katmandu in 1951 as the guest of the late King Trishuvan, father of the present king. Because of his ability to entertain and organize, Boris was an immediate hit with the royal family and eventually opened the Royal.

Over the years he made powerful enemies and in 1966 was locked up in a tax dispute over a distillery he had opened. The matter was finally settled when the government realized there was no one else to feed King Mahendra's coronation guests that year, Boris was released.

Since then, the royal family has turned to him again and again to prepare dinners, parties and banquets. In January Boris entered Crown Prince Birendra's state dinner for Vice President Spiro T. Agnew.

Progress finally caught up with Boris in the form of a new hotel owned by King Mahendra's brother, Prince Himalaya and managed by a prominent Indian hotelier.

As a result Boris was no longer as vital to the royal family as he had been. He remained in jail during the crown prince's wedding in February.

Boris was arrested Jan. 26 in the midst of a scandal over theft of idols. A taxi driver was stabbed and in another incident a gang of thieves shot and wounded several persons. These incidents, unrelated to Boris, caused an uproar in this nearly crime-free country.

Members of the diplomatic corps say Boris' situation was not helped by a London magazine article which quoted him as calling King Mahendra a simple man.

Boris' wife Inger, a Danish citizen of 42 who could pass for 29, says Boris was misquoted. "He said the king is a man of simple tastes, which is a compliment."

Mrs. Boris, as she is known to the hotel's employees, says her mother traded in art objects here for many years and that she and Boris became collectors. The mother died in January.

Palace sources say Boris is "being given every protection under the law" but cannot be released on bail because the case is being handled by a special tribunal still gathering evidence. His wife is permitted to visit Boris daily.

"Even in the central jail he has made new friends," she said.

Greece Denies Travel Rights To Intellectuals

ATHENS (AP) — They tell in Athens of a university professor who made plans to leave the country after he was purged from his job. As he was about to walk to his plane a loudspeaker boomed his name with the order: "You must come back!"

His colleagues now regard this professor as lucky; authorities later let him leave Greece. Others fired from universities by the military-backed government have been unable to go. Some have had to renounce professorships, offered by foreign universities. Some former politicians and their wives report they are barred from vacations elsewhere in Europe.

The travel crackdown comes at a time when many educated Greeks, including artists, actors and students in foreign universities are reportedly leaving Greece for indefinite periods because they oppose the authoritarian regime.

Fear of brain drain does not seem to be the main reason for keeping the purged professors in Greece, according to diplomatic and academic circles which depict the teachers' plight.

"The regime's attitude toward people seems to be one of pure malice," says one Western diplomat. "Their brains are not being used here. Some are taking a hard time earning a living, let alone being able to take jobs offered abroad."

More than 50 faculty members in Greek universities were fired in January, 1968, nine months after military officers took over and installed martial law.

The teachers were accused of siding with having favored a "particular political camp," meaning they were regarded as liberals.

Only a few, those who have taught for 25 years, are entitled to pensions. Many of the rest were at least temporarily without income. Some have turned to writing, doing research for private firms or other jobs only marginally related to their academic careers.

The Answer To Frustrations Of Commuters?

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — A University of Pennsylvania law student has uncovered a 97-year-old law in Greece that forbids Penn Central Co. to pay damages to every commuter made late or left standing on New Jersey routes.

James B. Craver said the 1873 law calls for all trains to run "at regular times to be fixed by public notice" and requires every railroad to "furnish sufficient accommodation for all passengers." He said the law with valid passports apparently could not get past frontiers because their names were on a master blacklist, estimated by some regime opponents to contain 5,000 to 6,000 names.

Diplomats and other sources believe the primary reason for the restriction on travel is a fear that those leaving will speak out against the regime once they are abroad.

Another fear is thought to be that the flight of academic figures might give a boost to the state of academic freedom in Greece.

The regime does not acknowledge any policy preventing emigration of scholars or politicians.

A spokesman insisted that any one is free to leave Greece "so long as the person has all his affairs in order, like the payment of taxes and noninvolvement in any pending trial."

Bomb Scare Disrupts Work on Chicago Eight

NEW LONDON, Conn. (AP) — A program at Connecticut College featuring a member of the Chicago Eight was interrupted by a bomb scare Tuesday night that caused authorities to evacuate 1,500 persons from an auditorium.

A switchboard operator at the college said a man called at 9:15 p.m. and threatened that if the audience was not out of Palmer Auditorium within 15 minutes they would all be "blown to hell."

Officials emptied the building about 9:25 p.m., but found nothing. The audience at the predominantly female college had just listened to journalist Paul Cowan when the threat came. After the evacuation, the program resumed with a film entitled "The Streets Belong to the People," concerning the 1968 Democratic National Convention in Chicago.

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25 Years Ago Today U.S.'s Most Violent Tornado Swept Its Destructive Path

KANSAS CITY (AP)—Forty-five years ago today the most violent and destructive tornado in the history of the United States swept out of cloud-lined skies over Ellington, Mo., and killed 659 persons.

No tornado nor group of tornadoes has matched that twister in the number of fatalities. It seldom has been equaled in size, with speed and length of track on the ground.

Fat, black and ugly, almost obscured in the heavy cloud lay-out surrounding it, the twister started at speeds up to 70 miles an hour from Ellington in southeastern Missouri across southern Illinois, and finally lifted 219 miles to the northeast at Princeton, Ind.

Allen D. Pearson, director, and L.A. Joos, climatologist of the National Severe Storms Forecast Center, recalled the killer tornado in an interview.

"This was one of the fastest moving tornadoes ever known," Pearson said. "In a 3 1/2-hour period, from 1 p.m. to about 4:30 p.m., the twister covered the area from Ellington to Princeton, leaving virtually total destruction in its path. It traveled from 60 to 70 miles an hour and never left the ground. Its average speed was 62 miles an hour."

"The twister injured some 2,000 persons," Joos said, "and caused damage which amounted to \$16.5 million—around \$80 million in today's money."

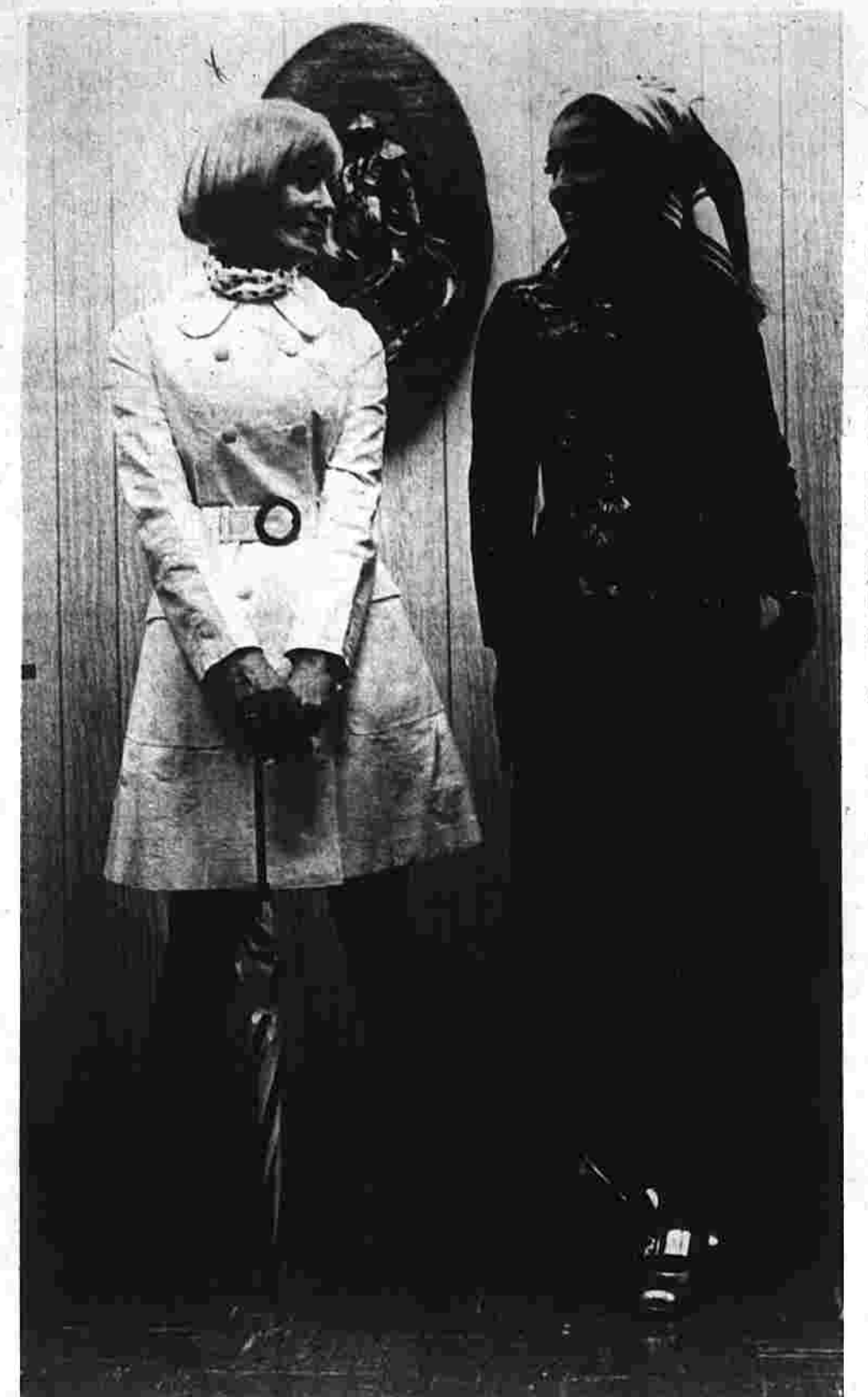

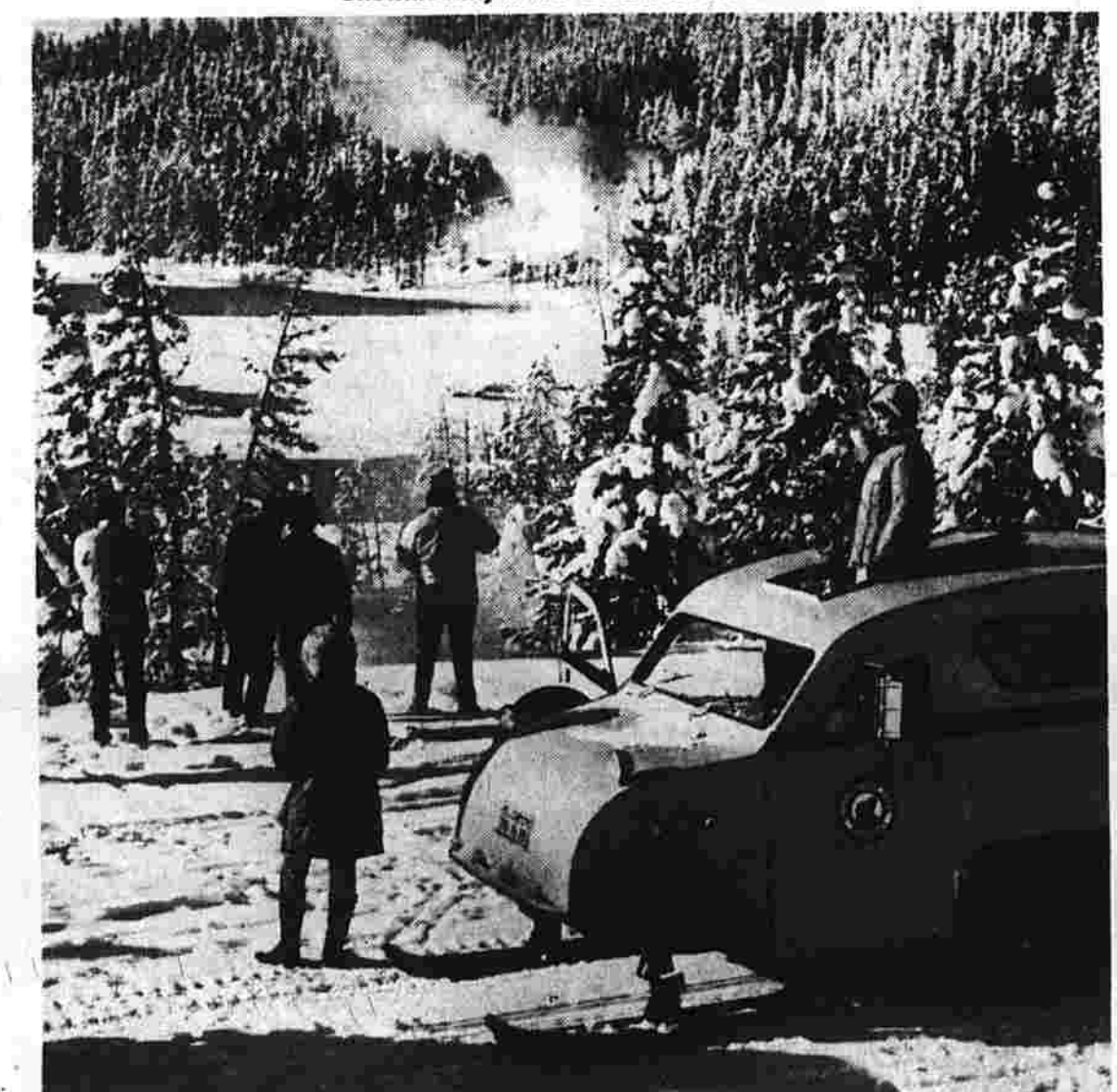

London Cedes Size Honors For a Place in Man's Esteem

LONDON (AP) — London is pulling out of the "biggest city contest," ceding honors to New York and Tokyo aiming instead to maintain "London's place in the esteem of mankind."
The government is studying a development plan to make London swing for the young set, excite the monarchy-loving tourists and preserve the treasures of a 2,000-year-old community—all this while Londoners enjoy the housing and amenities of the jet age yet reach their jobs on time every day.
"Our task is to create an acceptable environment for our people and allow London to function, and if we cannot do this adequately for 7 million, we will have to accept an even smaller population," says the strategic planning committee of the Greater London Council.
London's population fell from 8.6 million in 1959 to 6.5 million in 1968 and is now estimated at 7.8 million. The planners say it should be below 7 million in 1981. Some experts favor 6 million by the mid-'80s.
Greater London's 400,000 acres are locked by law in a green belt of parks, pastures and forests. The council plans to keep it that way to escape sprawl in the American style.
The plan designates 50 "action areas" for comprehensive development in the 32 boroughs and the City of London comprise streets collides with some morning of earlier glory, a building of architectural merit or a suggested development of these areas involves new shopping centers, road development, enlarged parking facilities, more housing, civic centers, per cent of those consulted said
London is becoming "a worse place to live in." Traffic jams, auto-tive fumes and noise from traffic were high on the list of nuisances.
The planning committee's determination to preserve elements of London's fragrance was indicated in its attitude toward Soho, a shabby district of preciously notable for its strip-asean parlors.
"Soho is a disgrace, a tourist attraction and the necessary home of all-but-lost causes," the committee said. "We can easily clean it up—and lose a great deal more than we should gain."
Big Ben, the House of Parliament, the courts (Old Bailey), London University and the British Museum are not in danger.
But the committee emphasizes: "Not everything that is more than 50 years old is a gem and not everyone who now lives or trades in a building has a prescriptive right to continue his tenure."
The innermost ringway will cut through some of the obsolete housing. The committee wants these areas be replanned. Other proposals:
—Two new in-town air terminals with rail links to airports.
—Protection of London's many wooded squares, all areas of historic or architectural interest and areas of special character.
—A ban on high buildings in inappropriate areas.
—More hotels in or near central London.
—Removal of some of the eight markets in central Lon-

Nader's Raiders Seek Replacement of ICC

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Interstate Commerce Commission, the country's oldest regulatory agency, serves not the public but the private industries it supposedly regulates, a group of law students led by consumer critic Ralph Nader charges.
"The ICC has become an extension of the industry it supposedly regulates," they said Monday in a 1,200-page report and in testimony before a congressional subcommittee.
"In a very real sense, the industry regulates the ICC," the report says.
The seven students, from Harvard University and the University of Pennsylvania, contended the ICC should be abolished and replaced by an agency regulating all forms of transportation.
The report also charged the 11-member commission is a refuge for political hacks and noted that all but one of the commissioners who left the agency in the past 10 years has gone into a well paying job with an industry related directly or indirectly with the ICC.
"Most young attorneys view the ICC as a training ground for later transportation practice," the law students contended.
The commission had no immediate comment on the report, result of a year-long study by the seven and Nader. Sen. Winston L. Prouty, R-Vt., a member of the Senate subcommittee to whom it was presented, criticized Nader for releasing the report to the press before it could be digested by the agency and the subcommittee.
In an introduction, Nader said that "for generations, the ICC has operated as a shield protecting and preserving economic groups from the discipline of the marketplace... Long before it became a pattern of our political economy, the ICC and the transport industries forged a corporate state that utilizes public power for private pursuits."
The report said that rather than watching out for the public interest, the ICC "is primarily a forum where private transportation interests settle their disputes."
The critics recommended:
"First, it must be abolished so that the American people will no longer be under any illusions about who is controlling the transportation system of our nation—the rail, motor, water, the pipeline industries, their rate bureaus and their trade associations."
"Secondly, we are asking for the ICC's abolition so that a new interstate commerce act can be written with a new regulatory agency."
Whistle May Go
LONDON (AP) — The police whistle may be on its way out. Scotland Yard's management services chiefs believe there is no room for the whistle in a modern police force.
Said Police Inspector Charles Smith: "They were all right in the days before personal radios but they do seem rather a waste now."
The police force journal said, however, that Police Commissioner Sir John Waldron is now studying a specialist's report and it is up to him to decide whether the whistle stays or goes.

Boston Globe Censures Cigarette Advertising

BOSTON (AP) — The Boston Globe announced yesterday that it is ceasing publication of all cigarette advertising, effective immediately.
The two-sentence announcement on the front page said "accumulated medical evidence has indicated that cigarette smoking is hazardous to health."

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Tuttle Support Withdrawn, Carswell Backers Perplexed

WASHINGTON (AP) — Administration leaders in the Senate today said they would not testify in support of Judge Tuttle in the Supreme Court.

Sen. Roman L. Hruska, R-Mich., floor manager of the nomination, had been ready to rest the administration's case today after less than three full days of debate.

But "there is some uncertainty now about whether or not to put up some more speakers," said a reliable source Tuesday night after the new disclosures by Sen. Joseph Tydings, D-Md., sparked heated debate.

During the debate, however, Carswell backers labeled the disclosure "much ado about nothing."

Tydings, a leader of Carswell opposition, told the Senate floor that he had changed his mind about testifying for Carswell after first volunteering to do so in a letter to the Senate Judiciary Committee.

Tydings said Tuttle informed him of the change of heart in a telephone conversation Tuesday morning of Jan. 28. He said Tuttle told Carswell he had become concerned about reports of his involvement in forming a private golf club in Tallahassee, Fla., in 1966 that barred Negroes.

Tydings said after the telephone call Tuttle's original letter had "no business being in the record and Judge Carswell knew it."

But, said Tydings, even though Carswell had been asked to review the record and correct it he "never said one word to my knowledge to any senator that Judge Tuttle had called him up and said he would not testify."

Tuttle, a resident of Atlanta, Ga., stepped down as chief judge of the appeals court at New Orleans two years ago upon reaching the mandatory retirement age of 70 but still sits as a federal judge.

Carswell, of Tallahassee, served as a federal district judge from 1968 until Judge Tuttle was elevated to the appeals court last year.

Tuttle, in a handwritten note sent from New York Jan. 22, told the Senate Judiciary Committee he was prepared to testify to correct the "erroneous impression" that the speech made Carswell a racist.

Tydings, however, said in a story in the Atlanta Constitution of March 3 quoted Tuttle as telling Carswell over the telephone he was upset.

"Come see me when you can. I want to talk to you about it," Tuttle was quoted as saying.

"That's all right. You don't have to explain," Carswell is quoted as replying.

Tydings introduced the original letter, the Constitution story and an exchange of telegrams with Judge Tuttle into the record. He said Judge Tuttle had told him "the article was accurate."

In one of three telegrams he said he had been "surprised to learn that the letter was used for a purpose inconsistent with my decision not to testify as communicated directly to Judge Carswell."

That telegram was dated March 24. In another on March 27, Tuttle said he did not believe "Judge Carswell had any intention to or did deceive the committee with respect to the matter of my letter to the chairman."

"As to why Judge Carswell did not clarify the record and remove the letter I draw no conclusions," Tydings said.

Judge Tuttle was presiding in a case in San Francisco Tuesday and his secretary said she had been instructed to refer newsmen to Tydings' office.

Sen. James O. Eastland, D-Miss., chairman of the Senate Judiciary Committee, said Carswell had not asked to withdraw the letter and he had "not withdrawn it."

"The letter," said Eastland, "goes much further than the telegram because it is a blanket endorsement of Judge Carswell. If anybody is in a bad light it is certainly not Judge Harold Carswell."

As far as he was concerned, said Eastland, a private telephone conversation between Judge Tuttle and Carswell was not a retraction of the letter.

"The place to retract that would be the Judiciary Committee," he said.

"This is much ado about nothing and a very confused judge," said Sen. Edward Gurney, R-Fla., "is in quite obvious that Judge Tuttle was very confused."

Sen. Spencer L. Holland, D-Fla., said that in none of the telegrams did Judge Tuttle indicate he had turned against Carswell.

"He wasn't saying he did not support him," Holland said.

Vicious Dog

Taking a short cut through an unfenced back yard, Ed was attacked and bitten by the property owner's dog. In due course, he retaliated with a suit for damages.

"That is precisely why I keep him, to attack trespassers," he told the court. "I keep him chained, but the chain is long enough for him to protect my property."

However, the court threw out this defense and granted Ed's claim. "The safety of human life," said the judge, "may not be unnecessarily endangered in the protection of property."

Generally speaking, the law considers the keeping of a vicious dog similar to the keeping of a dangerous weapon. The dog, like the weapon, must be handled with extreme care.

In fact, some courts impose liability on the owner even if he tried his best to prevent bites. One homeowner kept his vicious dog locked in an enclosure beneath the front steps.

On the other hand, the owner is usually not responsible if the victim plays an active role in bringing on his own trouble. Take this case.

A man went to pick up his car at a repair shop, which had already closed for the day. He knew the proprietor kept a vicious watchdog, but "took a chance" and went in anyway.

Could the man collect damages? In these circumstances, the court said no.

"He fully appreciated the danger," said the court, "and voluntarily incurred the risk."

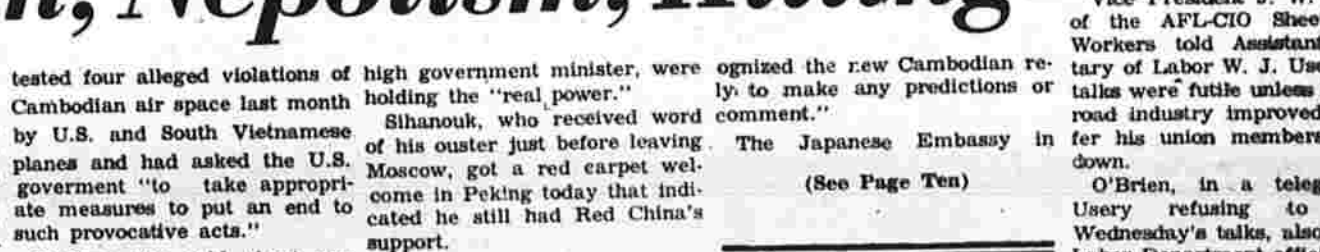
