So far as anyone knows, Sills probably is the first person in this country sentenced to 1,000 years in jall. The outward circumstances of the meeting at Erfurt, East Germany, last Thursday were that the head governmental figures of two independent and separate states were meeting to discuss possibilities of future greater cooperation between themselves.

The meeting had to be cool and correct and formal, and within its prescribed bounds, or Chancellor Willy Brandt of West Germany and Premier Willi Stoph of East Germany could never have found their way clear to attending it in the first place. Neither, in advance, nor in this meeting itself, could possibly surrender one inch of position to the other. It was hold enough, and risky endugh, of both of them, menely to meet.

In spite of all that, three things happened that showed the powerful and eventually irresistible fundamentals lurking just underneath all the surface protocol about separate sovereignties.

First, and most important, was the fact that a crowd of East Germans somehow managed to assemble and surge through police lines, and give a cheerful welcome to the West German

This was symbolic of the rushing torether of the German people which is going to take place, sooner or later, mite of the fact that Russia and the United States, for their own blind power politics purposes, may wish to perpetuate the unnatural partition they blunder ad into after World War II.

This natural surging together out of an unnatural separation was the main de velopment of the day.

But it was underlined by two ver minor but very eloquent sub-develop

When the East German crowd bey shouting "Willy" for Brandt it realized that it sounded just like "Willi" for Stoph, a reminder that they shared ommon language and nomenclature.

And when the two German leaders got ogether for their own conversation, they ound themselves quoting a certain cul tural giant named Goethe to each other

inadvertent bits of emphasis of their common heritage intruding, they got safely back to their formal distances again when it came to the playing of national anthems. There was "Deutschland Uber Alles" for Willy" government, and something called "Auferstanden Aus Ruinen" for Willi's, anthems equal in their place on the program but not, one can guarantee, in the pulse of their hearers.

Our First Formal Veto

Perhaps the greatest enemy to truth and to balanced thinking in our time has been the circumstantial fact which constitutes the substantial lie.

Such a circumstantial fact-absolutely actual-came into the news the other isy, under headlines proclaiming that the United States had just cast its first veto in the Security Council of the United

It was indeed true that, on the Security Council vote on Rhodesia - the issue being an African-Asian resolution which sought to condemn Britain for not using force to overthrow the white-minority rovernment in Rhodesia - the United States voted no, and thus, under Security Council rules, killed the resolution all by tself, even though Britain also voted

against, and therefore also vetoed. But the inference created by this statement of the circumstantial fact - that this was our first veto - was false

This was not the first time we had kill ed resolutions or blocked actions in the Security Council. This did not mean that we had previously displayed for Security Council decisions we didn't like or didn't consider in accord with our own national interests a greater acceptance than that Security Council jurisdiction and action received from wicked Russia, with its historic line of 105 vetoes.

The truth has been that we were often able to "veto" issues before they even got on the Security Council agenda. In many instances we needed no veto because a bloc we led had an easy major-

For some time past, our own easy control of the United Nations has been fading before the influx of new members and under the influence of a lessening of those cold war tensions which once put almost all nations clearly into one camp or the other.

So it happened, the other day, that resolution of which we did not approve, would have gone through to victory if we had not exercised our veto. In the actual result, there were nine votes for the resolution and two against it, which defeated it since each of the two negative votes was a big power veto.

This was, literally, our first veto in the United Nations, but, in reality, merely the first time we had been forced to let our action be called a veto.

What of our vote itself? The situation in Rhodesia itself is bad enough without having bloodshed added to it. There is no guarantee that an effort at war could have been decisive, or could have been kept limited to just one part of Africa, or would have helped procure better justice for those whom it spared.

Decisionitis

The hitherto distinguished Arthur J. Goldberg, rightfully respected for his service to labor, for his service on the Supreme Court, for his efforts in the post of Ambassador to the United Nations, and for his decision to get out of that post when the hypocrisy required of performance there became too much for him - this same Arthur J. Goldberg has now given his public an imitation of Governor Nelson J. Rockefeller at his

Governor Rockefeller at his worst and in the behavior which cost him a nomination - was the Rockefeller who kept changing his mind about seeking the Presidency in 1968. He consulted the seers and he consulted the polls, and he consulted his chromosomes, and he coded up getting out of the race too carly and getting back into it too late, and, above all, giving his public a glimpse of a bad case of decisionitis.

Justice Goldberg has now ofsame kind of routine with rethe Democratic nomination for ernor in New York-State. He took himself out, last December, when he might have had an easy run into the nomination. Now he has put himself into the race after other candida cies have developed to the point where cannot all withdraw easily. He more of a fight for the nomination than need have been necessary. But much more important, he has put his indecision and irresolution on pubdisplay to such an extent that he is no the formidable candidate he might have been.

If, next November, the people of New York State are asked to choose between kefeller and Goldberg, they may well that Rockefeller's brand of inmore robust and impulsiv uvenile and therefore much more and forgivable, than the rahbit-like quivering and fading in and out of a political Harvey,
