

parents here have startled school officials by objecting to the standard textbook being used for Alabama's elementar state history classes on ground that it describes both slavery and the Ku Klux Klan in favorable terms. The textbook, "Know Alabama," is the only state-recom-

> ed fourth-grade course. Various editions dating from 1955 are in use in almost all districts Since five mothers protested to Birmingham school authorities in February about the content of the book, it has again been endorsed by members of the State Board of Education, who formally adopted it for

The immunity of diplomats used to amount to a reasonably effective guarantee that one nation could station its representatives within the borders of another without running risk of their individual safety no matter what political changes and storms might occur in the

Even if one nation declared war on another, it still allowed the other's diplomatic representatives to depart peace-

Now, like so many of the institutions, assumptions, and values of our yesterdays, this tradition of diplomatic immunity, this responsibility of the host country to guarantee safety to the guest diplomatic corps, is being turned and explotted against itself. It works this way:

A government - so far it has been some Latin American government - has this responsibility for protecting the safety of American diplomats who are its guests.

A native rebel faction, seeking leverage against its own government, seizes the body of an American diplomat and then threatens to kill him unless the government makes some concession to the rebel faction - like letting some of its

The Latin American government feels to the American diplomat, and meets the kidnapper demands.

This has now happened three times. It bears some similarity to another of the rough savageries of our time - the hijacking of the airplane full of innocent, uninvolved passengers.

There is no guaranteed perfect way of guarding against its repetition. Precautions can be increased, both by the native police and by the diplomats themselves, but never to any point which closes out risk. Every time the diplomat - kidnap

The Mythical Menace Of Militarism Has America become a militaristic so-

No question bears more importantly on the future of this country. History un lerscores the gravity of the issue. It's difficult to think of a democracy that became militaristic and remained a demoeracy. And it's equally difficult to name a militaristic nation that reversed its course except as the result of a war that is sought — and lost. Despite the importance of the question, it has hardly been debated at all.

Discussed, yes. One need spend only a minutes at the magazine and paper back racks of any large drugstore to compile a formidable list of critics and commentators who claim that militarism is in the American saddle — or at least has a foot in the stirrup. Among the gloom spreaders are well-known acadenfcians, scientists, economists, congressmen, novelists, editors, and an oc casional retired military officer. But what should be a dialogue has been very argely a monologue, with terms defined for the convenience of the speaker. This in itself, does not make for enlighten-

The relevance of the current discus sion becomes even more dubious when we consider the target on which it focuses - the military profession. That is the wrong target, Militarism is not a disease of the profession of arms. While we may find in the American military discrete attitudes toward discipline, authority and the legitimate or illegitimate use of of force, these are attitudes withou which the military could not function as a useful agency of the democratic gov-

> Militarism, rather, is the disease of a society that attempts to misapply to secular, civilian problems the kinds o attitudes and practices that are entirely proper, and uniquely required, in a military context. If we wish to discover tic, we should look at civilian attitudes-

not at the military profession. The study of militarism is hardly a new discipline Serious students have catalogued a number of its symtoms Among the most virulent are:

Glorification of war, supported by elaborate pseudoscientific justifications based on biological, psychological, ethinationalistic, or economic grounds The best sellers of this genre were writ ten by foreign despots and read here with horrified disbelief.

Public deification of the military, which was last observed in this country about the time of V-J Day. With twelve million men and women in uniform representing almost every American family, one could then have said quite accurately that the military was the pub-

An elite officer corps, with perquisites and privileges deried to most civilians. Ask any officers in uniform who eve tried to pull rank on a New York taxi driver or on a congressman about that. Belief in a military mystique, unfathomable to the layman. Maintaining such a mystique in a country with twenty-six million veterans, almost any one of whom believes that he could run almost any war better than almost any general, would be the neatest trick of

the century. A lack of control of the military by alected and appointed officials. Vietnam, where the military still fights an Asian land war against which they counseled for years, with strategy and tactics often not of their choosing but dictated by civilian leaders, provides its own refuta-

tion of this charge. A belief that external national goals can be attained only by military means. With few exceptions-none of them in cent years-the public has viewed the purpose of our armed forces as strictly defensive. This view has been shared almost universally by American military professionals. Certainly public belief in the effectiveness of military power as a solution to world problems other than defensives ones, is at an allime low today.

An interesting note is found in the January 1970 issue of The Center Magazine; publication of The Center for the Study of Democratic Institutions. Neither The Center nor its magazine will ever be described as a voice of the so-called mili ary-industrial complex. Seven associ ates and consultants of The Center were asked to comment on the question, "Has America become a militaristic society? Collectively, they represented five acanathematics, law, and the humanities. Among their responses, all the criteria described above were touched on direct-

ly or indirectly. Six of the seven answer When charges of American militarism have been made, they generally are hung on loose and rather rusty semantic hinges. Whatever malaise besets this country, it is not militarism by any accepted definition of the term.

The military is open to criticism for rrors of omission and commission, as t should be. It has not, however, committed the fatal error of trying to militarize American society, and the American people show no disposition to adopt militarism on their own.

We are not imperiled by militarism But there is a real risk that those who vould exorcise an imaginary devil may in the process, dangerously weaken and eriously alientate from American society, the only agency it has to protect t from an external military threat that not only is real, but is growing with each This kind of devil-chasing is about as
