The general expectation is that, if the Supreme Court is forced to face this question on the Vietnam war in particular, it will find a technical basis for the President's authority in the Tonkin Gulf Resolution, or in some of the other broad

ed into the hands of the Presidency during the cold war and never formally

But although some kind of legal cover may be found for the war which has never been declared, the passage of the Massachusetts bill and the arguments that may take place before the Supreme Court will have their main importance, t seems to us, because they will highlight moral and policy issues also in-

Here we are, in the midst of the longest war our nation has ever engaged in, and a war in which more than 40,000 Americans have given their lives, and most of us did not seem to realize what a war we were in until long after our massive physical entry into it had been made an accomplished fact.

Finch Intensifies **Integration Goal**

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary Robert H. Finch of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare set a goal today of doubling the present amount of school desegregation in the South by next fall. That would have 80 per cent of the area's Negro children at-tending essentially desegregat-

school desegregation would change their department's poli- Dr. Jack Davidson said today Pottinger read the President's message "as a clear mandate to bring into compliance all school districts which discriminate against children on the basis of race, color or national origin."

Finch said the department's previous desegregation guidelines are still in force, existing policies on busing have not changed, and Southern cities will still be required to eliminate dual systems based on past policies or practices.

Birch Bavidson said totay he had wrested control of Manatele County schools back from Gov. Claude Kirk and that his staff will act as quickly as possible to carry out federal desegregation orders.

"I have taken over and assume the governor will not resist the court order further," said Davidson, suspended temporarily by Kirk as superintendent of schools Sunday.
