BOGOTA, Colombia (AP)-They could have been doing something else last weekend, but 50,000 Colombians filled Bogota's main square to cheer an ex-dictator trying to win the presidency.

That raily for Gen. Gustavo Rojas Pinilla brought the biggest turnout anyone has received yet in the campaign for the nation's presidential election April 19.

It also pointed up the fears of officials in the Liberal-Conservative coalition, long dominant, that Rojas at the age of 70 has t good chance to win. Road Builder Turns Park Saver Perhaps there has been no better sample warning against trusting routine expectations in the field of politics than the way federal super road policy has turned out under President Nixon's Secretary of Transportation John A. Volpe. Mr. Volpe himself used to be a big time road builder. It was assumed therefore, that as Secretary of Transportation in Washington, he would give the pave - the - country - solid buildozers the greatest push in history.

In office in Washington, Secretary Volpe has so far become famous principally as the character who has been halting the building of highways through existing parks, historic landscapes, and fine residential districts, and forcing highway planners, state and federal, to reconsider much of the routing they did in the days when people, homes, and scenery had no representation on the maps in front of them.

This is the main thing Secretary Volpe has done. By blocking highways that were going to cut through parks in San Antonio, through Franconia Notch in New Hampshire, and through existing residential districts in other places. Secretary Volpe has given people everysavagely unnecessary and a chance of getting somewhere when they do fight.

And since the highway planners are thus being placed under notice that their routing is likely to be questioned in the future, they themselves are likely to be taking more pains, from now on, to see they don't run unnecessary risks of stirring up trouble for themselves.

So the appointment which originally encountered some criticism because it seemed dangerous to put a professional rond builder in a position of supervising road building is turning out to be an appointment strong in defense of a variety of public interests which never before had attained much strength against the onrush of the paving machines.

The Cambodian Contrast

Prince Sihanouk ran a loose ship of state, which may be why mutiny had such an easy time of it taking over while he was away trying to talk Moscow and Peiping into helping him pressure North Vietnam into more respect for Cambodian sovereignty.

Between such a totalitarian touch which tries to come closer and closer to us and the loose-reined neutralism by which Prince Sihanouk always tried to keep some distance from us, which is the better for us? Perhaps the shiver which travels down our bones as we watch the young Cambodians learning their new "patriotism" gives us the an-

Parental Example

Well, anyway you can't say it's a dul If you live in New York City, when you get up in the morning you never know whether you'll have a morning paper. Or whether the subways will run. Or whether there will be any school, garbage collection or snow removal. You can't be too sure whether there'll be any one to take care of you if you go to the hspital, or anyone to bury you if you'r There are few cities of any size that

have escaped one or more of such shutdowns within the past year or so, and even those which have so far escaped know that they are no longer immune. it could happen anywhere. And of course no matter where you live you can't be sure the planes or trains will run, the telephones work or the mails get through.

There are several things common to these lively experiences. All involve not acts of God, or accidents, but strikes With the possible exception of newspapers, they all invoive essential public ervices, and at least you can say that without newspapers it's harder to keep track of what else isn't working. Many of them, moreover, are caused by strikes of public employes and are therefore no only inconvenient but illegal

Finally, they are all caused by adults This last bit of commonalty, which at irst may strike you as laboring the obious, is really worth pondering. We of the parental generation spend a great deal of time berating our young for their resort to confrontations as a way of impressing their views upon society. We cry alarm at their disregard of the public order, their disdain for all authority, their lack of a sense of responsibility toward the community, whether in evading the draft or shutting down the college. The question is, Who are we to com-

In the listing above of the wayward behavior of the over-30 generation there is no intent to put all of the blame for the public disruptions upon strikers. In some cases, anyway, those dealing with the situations — adults too, of course — left andone the things they ought to have done, and so bear some responsibility when things reach the confrontation

Take the mail strike. Almost everybody agrees, row, that the mailmen had some grievances. A pay scale can't be judged in the abstract; there being no such thing as an "absolute" wage, it is relative not only to time and place but to other wages. On that basis the postal pay scale was, to say the least, somewhat askew.

A maximum of about \$8,000 could hardly be considered riches anywhere today. but it is certainly a larger real wage in Rocky Mount, N.C., or Peoria, Ill., than it is in New York City. And in New York it is considerably lower than the pay of garbage collectors or subway workers, both of whom had got their higher wages by striking for them.

authorities, not the Nixon Administration, not the Congress. Indeed, they planned to do something about it. But they hadn't gotten around to it, and showed no signs of doing so soon. Let us concede, then, a cause for the postal unhappiness, especially in New

York where it all began. It remains true, though, that postal workers knew the rigidity of the pay scales when they joined, knew also that it was balanced by a stability of employment not enjoyed by those on private payrolls. They likewise knew and accepted the fact that theirs was a public responsibility for an essential public service They could quit if other fields looked greener, but they were not to strike against the public. Take it all in all, there was enough blame to go around. But however you spread it the fact is that we had the postal strike, brought on by grown men, and everybody suffered. The public weal was ignored and the public authority

Nor is that likely to be the end of the example. The confrontation, it seems, is going to be rewarded. The President, properly enough, refused to negotiate while the postal employes refused to honor their responsibilities or, even, obey the law. But now he - and the Congress - will not only do what they might have done earlier, grant a pay increase,

but also make the pay increase bigger than it would otherwise have been and make it retroactive. Thus the rewards of confrontation That being so, how do we explain here after to policemen, or firemen, that theirs is a public responsibility, that we depend upon them for order in the community, that being public servants they have no right-legal or moral-to blackmail the public community? Governor



Somehow all this ought to lead to a

profound comment, but it escapes me. What is left is only the observation that we live in a time when, for unknown rea sons, few of us are willing to live by the principles we profess and preach. We preach order, respect for authorithe use of democratic processes to

bring change, responsibility to society. But when the spirit moves us we say to hell with the mail, the trains, the planes, the garbage, the sick or even the dead. Whatever the temptation, it's futile to cry O tempora, O mores. But while we are drawing up our indictments of the younger generation, we ought to berate them most for following the parental example. In Washington, Kennedy said: 'I'm happy this case seems to be coming to a close. I'm relieved as well for everyone who's involved and I hope the transcript of the inquest will be made public as soon as possi-

Kennedy drove his car off the side of a narrow bridge on Chappaquiddick Island into a deep tidal pool last July 18. Miss Kopechne, 28, and a former secretary for the late Sen. Robert F. Kennedy, was trapped in the car and drowned. Kennedy escaped and, after he delayed for some 10 hours in reporting the accident to police,

He pleaded guilty a week after the crash and was sentenced to two months in jail on the charge. The sentence was suspended and he was placed on probation for a year. The night of the court arraignment. Kennedy went on national television to give his recollection of the accident and express

THE FARM BOY AND THE ANGEL. By Carl Carmer. Dou

Historian, poet, novelist and anthologist Carmer offers in this book a review for the general reader of the whole story of the Mormon church (formally known as the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints). Carmer, as an experienced chronicler, is careful to remain as objective as possible. A non-Mormon (or Gentile, as the Mormons would say), he uses much of his material from Mormon sources, in order to be historically correct; he documents statements of the period Quite naturally, the main seph Smith, the farm boy of

Carmer has explored carefully the evangelistic background of the period and place. After Oil Spill: **Beach Takes** On the Look Of Coalfields

ARICHAT, N.S. (AP) - The tanker Arrow, which went aground and broke in two in early February, has left a per-manent calling card on a huntred or more miles of shoreline in Chedabucto Bay. The most successful cleanup levice tested so far is mechanical, basically a conveyer belt with towelling attached. To be really suc cessful, a spill must be reached before it spreads to the beaches Dr. Harold Sheffer of Ottawa vice chairman of the Defens Research Board and one of several scientists studying the Ar row spill, said the canvas conveyer can fill a 45-gallon drum in about a minute. One machine is in operation and two more are to be built.

Amino scids are the building blocks of pro-tein, an essential component of all living organisms on Earth.
