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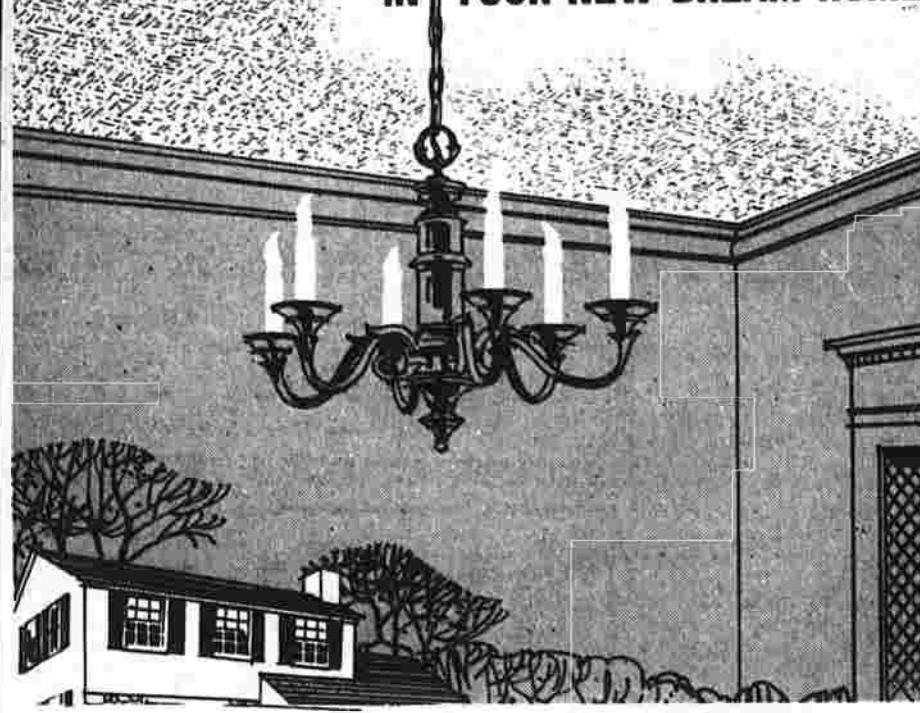

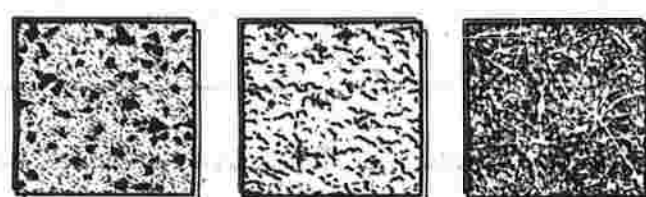

Atheneum Workshop A Light Show Artist Shows How

There was art displayed in the Austin Gallery of the Atheneum in Hartford Tuesday afternoon, but it seemed that the very stuff of which things are created had escaped their surfaces. Color and line moved on the wall in slow rhythmic, impressionistic abstracts mingled with geometric images, some of it light in the air before you.

The phenomenon was a light workshop, one part of a three-day festival of workshops and concerts featuring electronic music and light. It was presented by The Electric Band and sponsored by the Hartford Conservatory in cooperation with the Atheneum with support from the Connecticut Commission on the Arts.

During Tuesday's workshop one of the top light artists in the country, Tony Martin, explained the basics of a light show. Martin has been using light media and total environment techniques in San Francisco, Los Angeles, Seattle, Vancouver and New York, including seven years in concert with the San Francisco Tape Music Center. He developed many of the techniques in use today.

The trappings from which the mysterious images emerge were the subject of the session which drew mostly bearded young men in jeans, well able to converse freely in terms related to the make of wires, plugs and electronic consoles scattered about the room. There was even an analog computer used in connection with the music, and many recognizable tape recorders.

Martin explained that one of the areas of compositional technique and the first used in light shows was the projection of images. He illustrated one method using a high-powered overhead projector which he said can be used to fill very large spaces for an environmental effect. He emphasized that there was no limit to what can be projected and illustrated by putting a large glass dish (actually a clock face) on the projector surface and filling it with a liquid.

A large image of splashing water appeared on the wall and as he red dots appeared in a line. He added colored oil soft swirling designs began to take shape, depending on what was added and what was done to the dish, and to the focus, the wall image couldn't have been done 10 years ago; the air was too clean.

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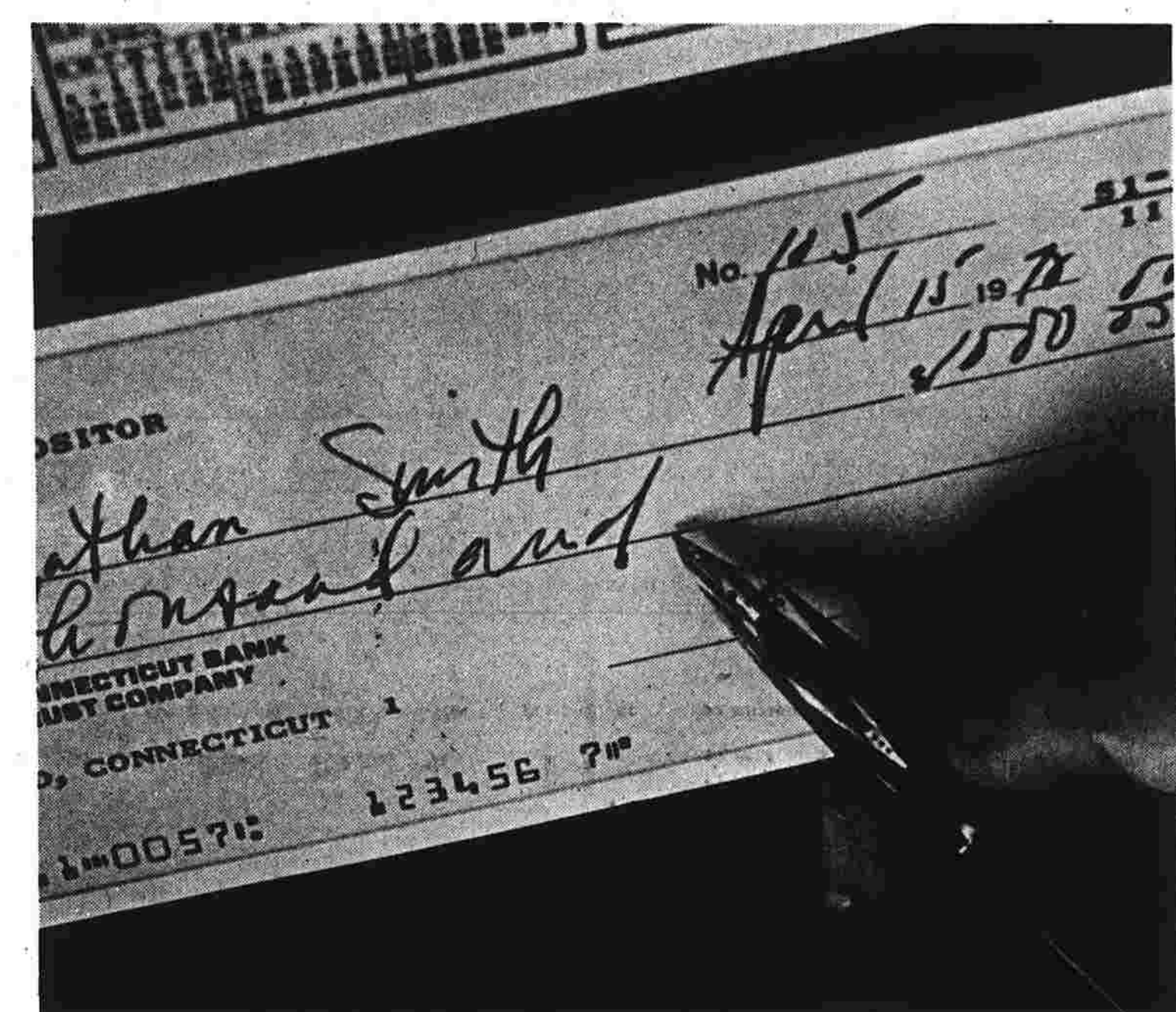

When Judge Clement Haynsworth was defeated, almost every comment in the country looked forward to an easy approval of President Nixon's next nomination to the Supreme Court bench.

Then it developed that Attorney General Mitchell and FBI Director Hoover had not, after all, been 100 per cent thorough in their research.

These two discoveries were not, in themselves, enough to cause the rejection of the nominee.

But they were enough to keep the issue open and alive, when, without them, it would most certainly have been closed, on an early day, in the nominee's favor.

Now, as before, President Nixon should have an easy approval for any reasonable choice he presents. The Senate has more than exhausted its rejection energies.

This has been a slow, teaser spring, reluctant to make any full, unrevealed gift of itself. It has pushed its blackbirds and its robins forward in between squalls of snow; the peepers have been forced to try to sing from swamps still fringed with ice.

Such beleaguered signs of spring are just enough to maintain our faith in the movement of the earth and its seasons, but not enough to make it feel like spring.

That takes temperature. It has to be a temperature which benignly enforces itself to eat at their costs. It has to last long enough at a time to register on a thermometer. It has to have a chance to make stones feel warm to the posterior. It has to hit at least sixty.

When it comes, as it finally did come, on Wednesday, the sixty degree temperature produces mixed results. First, there is a fleeting realization that this is the kind of weather people have been waiting for in order really to get at all these chores every spring saves from one spring to another, in infinite, inexhaustible challenge to the energy of mere human beings.

Second—taking over instantly before that first impulse to do and accomplish something leads to any foolish challenge of the infatigable—there comes a warm, purry feeling of relaxation and comfort which leads into the same realization that those days are just too perfect to be soiled by any of kind. After such a long journey, it is more important to stretch out and recover than to be in haste to start working your way toward another winter. Later on, when it gets into the nineties, and too hot to rest comfortably, will be time enough for the work.

"Twin Trailers": New Hazard?

"We are also aware of the trucking industry's position on the use of so-called 'twin trailers' on Connecticut highways. I assure you that I have been fully briefed by representatives of your industry on the benefits, both from an economic and a safety standpoint, of this type of operation, because of the growing concern over air pollution caused by cars and trucks.

It is my feeling that the Transportation Department should review the position taken by the former Highway Department in the use of twin trailers. We should do everything we can to cut down on pollution.

On the other hand, you've got to be kidding!

The quote above is part of the message of Connecticut's Commissioner of Transportation delivered to the fifth anniversary dinner of the Motor Transport Association of Connecticut.

Use of the anti-pollution argument. Fewer trucks on Connecticut highways might, indeed, contribute in a small way over the years and decades to keeping the air a bit clearer.

WASHINGTON — Although the first large-scale deliveries of late-model surface-to-air missiles (SAM-3) are now being hurriedly installed by Soviet technicians in Egypt, there are strong indications that the Russians have not decided whether to place them along the Suez Canal.

That decision is a critical one, because it would risk the possible loss of hundreds of Soviet missile experts in predictable Israeli air attacks on the installations, both during and after construction.

So far, all indications are that the Russians are holding back on a decision. Thus, despite strong evidence that some of the estimated 20 or so missile assemblies already delivered, each with two to four launchers, are now all but installed, their location is deep in the Egyptian hinterland.

There is reason to believe that if Nasser chose that course, he would not only be exposing the air attacks but could be expected to permit Nasser to install SAM-3s—or any other equipment he wanted—along the Egyptian side of the Canal as long as the cease-fire was honestly in effect.

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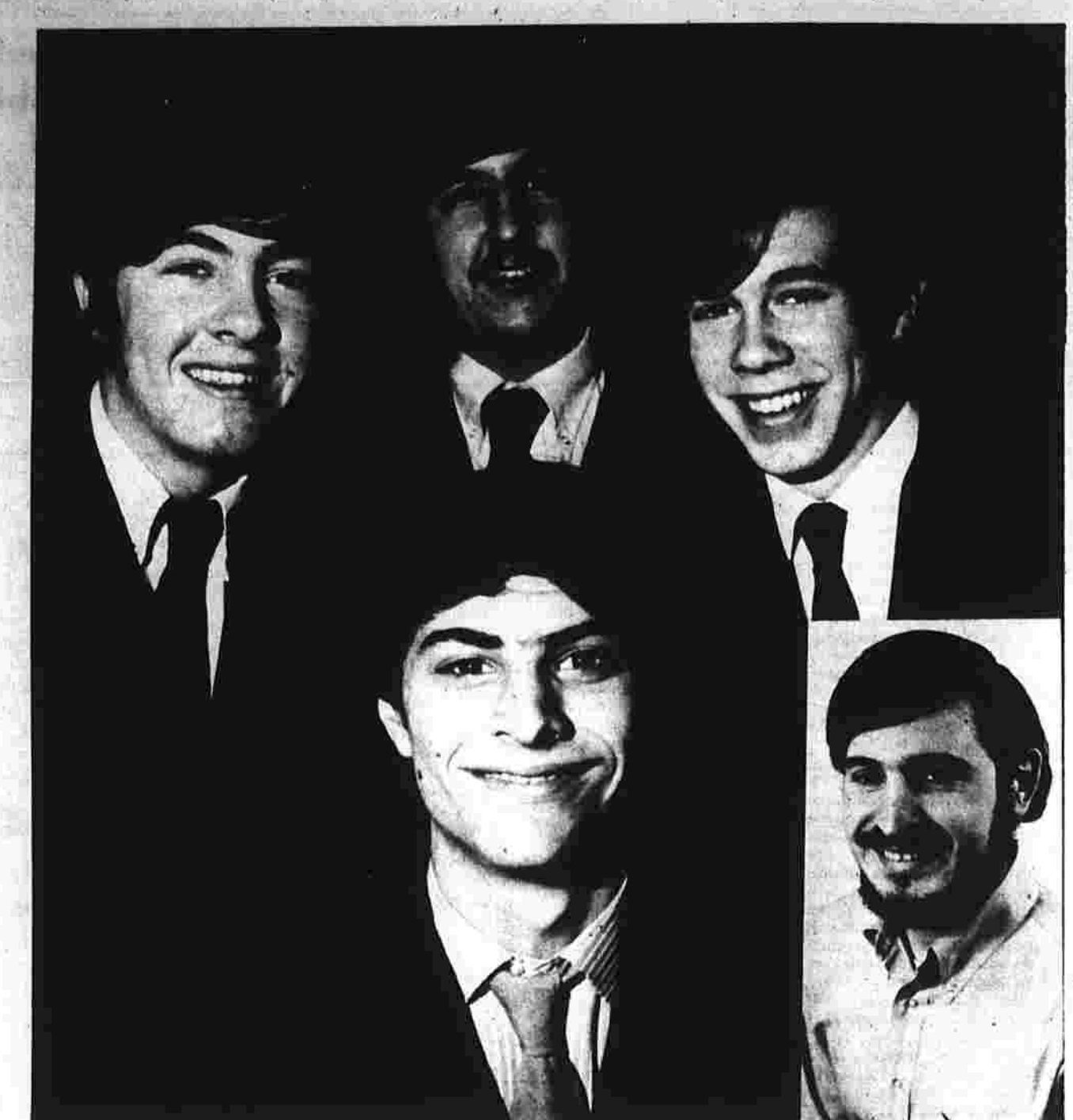

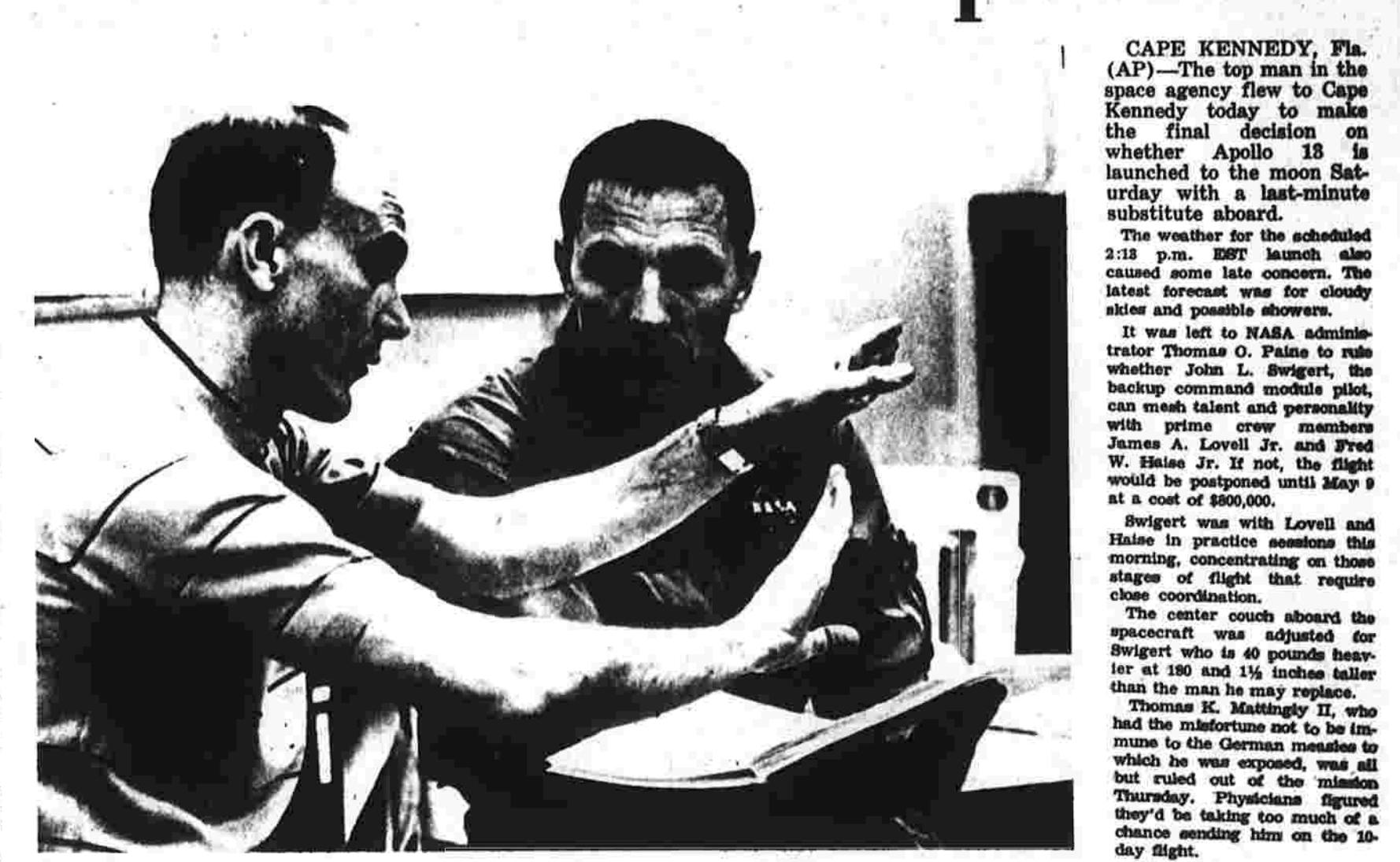
