

Les Enfants De La Patrie You would never think, to hear the way France is complaining, that France is solving what is supposed to be one of the great emergency problems of world survival in our time.

But to France, by some curious reversal of thought and appraisal, the same thing that might be taken as great good cheer for mankind is being taken as if it were dismal news for French

We refer to the complaint of France's Minister of Labor and Population, at a news conference the other day. "We are an underpopulated nation." said he.

This, which might be considered good withdrawal or its defeat. news for the world, seems such bad news to France that the government has been making a formal investigation of the possible reasons for it.

The French investigation gives some blame to the high mortality in France from accidents of all kinds, including the automobile, with alcoholism being given an important assist in keeping the acci-

But the prime cause the investigation found turned out to be mainly psychological. French couples, it seems, live in a "climate of insecurity." This is caused by their worries about wages, housing,

In truth, then, the things which are helping hold France's population down, as so many experts agree the world's population ought to be held down, are not pleasant attractive solutions that can be recommended for adoption or imitation elsewhere. More drinking, more eckless driving, more nervous insecurity are not things to recommend to the rest of the world, as population-control

Perhaps, however, there is something France has to tell the rest of the world. Its current official discussion of the population problem exposes some of the reasoning which goes into France's obvious official desire for more population at a time when a decline in world population is considered desirable.

One thing that worries France, for instance, is the fact that, in France, there are only 238.3 people to every square mile of territory, while in neighboring Germany there are 606 people to every square mile. Instead of worrying over having its land become too crowded, France manages to worry over the possibility it may be too thinly settled. This s important to France because France lives in apparently continual contemplation of possible tests of strength, military and economic, with Germany.

Another thing that officially worries France is the fact that a stable population - the rate of increase has averaged only one per cent a year since World War II - also means no expansion in the nation's labor force. Almost everywhere else in the world there is, these days, something of a problem of unemployment, and in the country, for instance, there is great interest in anything, including longer years spent in school, which can help reduce the labor supply. But France, with one eye on Germany, is willing to risk all the perils and discomforts of unemployment in a

gamble to increase French production. The net result of all this? France, at the very moment other nations are officially encouraging their people to have fewer children, and even considering financial rewards to people who limit their families-France, at this very moment, is considering setting up bonus benefits to encourage families who now have two children to go on and have one

Is there a moral, or a piece of advice, in this?

Obviously, it has to be saying something to us. And what it says has to be this: that if the world population explosion is the great decisive problem some people think it is, it can only be solved on a world basis, with world standards and world codes and world law backed by governmental authority enough to guarantee that various nations won't be heading in opposite directions on the very same problem.

The same moral applies to the problem of pollution which, whatever its origin, manages to spread itself around to all nations, the polluters and nonpol'uters alike. What we have now, and are likely to have for some time, is a situation in which some nations are trying to control the amount of pollution they create while others are busy increasing their capacity to produce

The world cannot survive in conditions of population anarchy or pollution anarchy any more than it can survive in conditions of nationalistic military anarchy. The question is whether the world is going to believe any of these inescapable mandates in time.

NEW YORK (AP) — Moral and social concerns will attain equal weight with financial con-siderations in the stock market the future if the Council on mic Priorities is success

Young and spirited, its mem-bers are confident they can in-fluence the nation's corporations to be more concerned with human needs by providing factual information on their comnitment to social, environmental and military issues.

This information, they feel,

will enable socially concerned individuals and nonprofit groups such as churches, universities and foundations to exert influence through the power of their illions of dollars in stock hold-

"Social accountability will be forthcoming if a concerned and nformed public demands . it," the council announces in its

prospectus.

Many months in formation, the council has scheduled its first news conference for April 16 at its Washington headquar-The very idea is bound to

bring snorts from some Wall Street oldtimers who hold to the belief that so long as a corporation makes money for its investors, the investors should not concern themselves further. The council, however, has apparently won the friendship and dlegiance of some young securities analysts, as well as educators, clergy and students. It welcomes an invitation to tell its story before the N.Y. Society of Securities Analysts.

"The general public, students, investors and corporations need objective analyses of the effeciveness of the activities of specific corporations in meeting human needs," the council states Almost every conceivable type of information relating to a company's profit situation is available, the council's founders claim, and for the easily under stood reason that investors decline to buy into poorly run It adds, however, that there is

no central source of information regarding a company's attitudes and activities in meeting humar needs. The council hopes to fill that need. "Corporate advertising in-creasingly reflects social con-

cerns. The public relations re wards are clear," the counci But it adds: "There does not exist any single clearinghouse

of information which would en courage a corporation directly to undertake programs in so-It feels that many investors, own more than \$26 billion of stock on the N.Y. Stock Exchange, would be able to exert their influence if more information were available. The council's first project,

listing of corporations which hold antipersonnel weapons contracts, is to be the subject of the first news conference. From then on it hopes to pour out a steady supply of factual data. The 20-year-old University of Florida junior, his body and his car doused with gasoline, burned to death Feb. 19 about 100 yards from his apartment building. A coroner's jury ruled the death suicide. "This Christmas I had a very experience with a drug ed mescaline. I have

Cambridge police said "about 30" persons were arrested and charged with various offenses, including assault and battery on a police officer and unlawful assembly.

The first charge by police in lowed the setting of a massive bonfire in the midst of the square by demonstrators.

Fires burned in all trash barrels in the area, and a fire broke out in the Northeast Federal Savings Bank where, like all banks in the square and along the route of the march, the windows had been smashed.
