The President's New Choice We speak for a great majority, both vocal and silent, when we confess that, if there is anything wrong with Judge Harry Andrew Blackmun of Minnesota, we would almost rather not hear about

The latest Nixon appointment to the Supreme Court is described as scholarly and mildly conservative. We hope Judge Blackmun continues to seem what h seems, through the official research the Senate will be doing into his career, and through the volunteer research that may be done by some who may have begun living in the illusion that if they keep kicking any Nixon nominee long enough, they can destroy him.

The great chances are that this is the kind of nomination President Nixon should have made all along, and should, if he were sincere in wishing to give the South new representation on the Court, have found and named from the South.

There is no reason why any President should have trouble finding suitable and distinguished appointments for the very few vacancies which occur, in any one generation, on the land's highest court

It is to be hoped that, with Judge appointment, we are Blackman's emerging from a rather discreditable cycle of questionable appointments which really began with President Johnson's crony - oriented selecting process and which carried over into President Nixon's attempted "Southern strategy" in his second appointment opportunity.

No President, for any reason, whatsoever, should have any desire to put anything less than the very best at his disposal on the Supreme Court bench. There are enough other pieces of patronage at hand for the playing of politics. If it is legitimate for a President -and almost inevitable for that matter - to seek to give representation of his own philosophy and his own view of the law in his high court appointments - then he should honor the philosophy and principle he is trying to serve by finding the finest and cleanest champion of such philosophy and principle.

President Nixon, for two nominations let himself slip into a careless disregard of his own best objectives and standards. The subsequent penalties have been high. His choices themselves have encountered unnecessary hardship. He himself has been goaded into a loss of temper which at least momentarily threatened, again unnecessarily, relations between the White House and the Senate, and which seemed to establish vengefulness as an alternative to policy. The blame for all this is not all to any one quarter. There is enough to go around, on both sides.

Now, in the new and latest round, President Nixon seems to have led with a reasonably high card. Let us hope the response matches, and the President can get back to being President, the Senate back to being the Senate, and the Supreme Court back to being nine.

Apollo's Problem Studied In 1966 Back in 1966, more than four years ago, our space engineers set themselves to answer the problem of what they would do with a moon shot which ran into power trouble or failure while it was on its way to the moon.

As the engineers, were then contemplating our operations around the moon, they had our Apollo on a trajectory which, even if Apollo had lost all power, would still have carried the ship around the moon and then into a free fall back toward earth on a path that would permit a safe re-entry.

What happened to Apollo 13 had one important difference, apparently also recognized and planned for four years ago. In order to permit it to land on a different section of the moon, Apollo 13 was taken off the "free-return" trajectory which had been used by previous flights, and put on a hybrid trajectory which, if it continued in control of an Apollo completely bereft of power of its own, would have continued hurling the Apollo through space, but not within some 60,000 miles of the earth.

What had to be calculated for the accident to a hybrid trajectory Apollo was, then, the use of rocket power, just beyond the moon, to shift the Apollo back from its hybrid no-return trajectory to a free return trajectory.

It was completely essential to the survival of the Apollo 13 crew, then, that it have rocket power enough to fire its space omnibus into a new and different trajectory.

Fortunately, for this state of their emergency, the power they had to have was surviving for them, in the lunar

There can be no let-up in our anxiety until, tomorrow afternoon, there is a splash-down in the Pacific. Meanwhile, however, it makes tensely reassuring news to be able to read that, four years ago, men had already studied out what would have to be done in the situation which did develop with Apollo 13 Tuesday night.

Such cautions having been recommended, we can now look at the degree of progress that has been made toward an artificial blood

It was reported, to the American As sociation for Thoracic Surgery, meeting in Washington the other day, that there is now in laboratory existence a milky, transparent substance which, in experiment with animals, has performed some of the vital functions of blood. It ha proved capable of carrying oxygen t tissues and removing carbon dioxid from tissues. It might also prove cap able of transporting enzymes. If should ever be developed to the point natural blood, it would have one special asset, for it does not contain some of the natural elements which clot in real blood.

new substance is far from any human veins. For one thing, it retains its useful functioning properties only for about an hour. For another, the laboratories aren't sure what kind of residue it leaves behind itself.

For the moment, the only possible practical human use for the new substance is that it might serve as a solution to keep human organs in healthy condition while they are waiting to be used in transplant operations.

This is only a possibility.

The laboratories are a long way from the end of their quest. But they have come this far


Blame To Share

Mr. Nixon's enemies had a lot of fun over the weekend jumping up and down about the President's remark that the rrent Senate simply would not approve a Supreme Court nominee who was both onservative and Southern.

The President had given his enemies little something to work with, of course; his remark wasn't exactly the smartest thing he ever said. Anit-Southern and anti-conservative feelings in the Senate were far from the whole reason far from the major reason - the Carswell nomination was rejected. Despite Judge Carswell's origins and philosophy, he would have been confirmed if he had had a few marks of dis tinction in his record and a little support from legal scholars. Since the President offered a nominee without such a background, Mr. Nixon isn't quite the person

to be criticizing the Senate. Yet anti-Southern feelings aren't at all unknown in the Senate, and neither is a political desire to embarrass the President. In retrospect it seems quite clear that these motives, and not the trifling conflict-of-interest charges, were the major ingredients in the previous defeat of Judge Haynsworth. The Senate does have some criticism coming, even if in this instance the President isn't the most gracious source of it. As we have been aving all along, the realistic judgmen of the ongoing Court hassle is that it reflects credit on no one concerned. Which makes it a little hard to understand the extreme pitch of excitement over the President's two-minute speech. Here we have a political spat with lots of blame for both sides to share, and we find it depicted in tones suitable for a battle between darkness and light. Tom Wicker, the New York Times' high-decibel columnist, even calls it "Mr. Nixon's Bay of Pigs." We hope Mr. Wicker is right, If this is the worst trouble Mr. Nixon gets into, the nation is in for a pretty good eight years. - WALL STREET JOURNAL
