Jobless Claims Increase 7.6%

A 7.6 per cent rise in unemployment compensation claims was reported for last week in the Manchester office of the State Labor Department. The figure was 802 for the week ending April 11, compared to 752 for the week ending April 4. Statewide claims increased last week by 2.61, or 6 per cent, to a total of 10,400. 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Eco-Theory Gains Strength in Churches

NEW YORK (AP) — "Earth Mother," the ancient mystery religions called it. St. Francis of Assisi expressed man's identity with nature in terms such as "Brother Ant" and "Sister Water." The late theologian-activist Albert Schweitzer summed up the same attitude in the phrase, "reverence for life."

Such recurring intimations of the interrelationship of all creation, great and small, and humanity's stake in caring for it, are moving to the forefront of the ecology today in the awakened anxiety about environmental abuse.

Some scholars have claimed that the problem stems partly from dualistic influences in Christianity, separating spirit and matter, and the "divine spark" of God as utterly transcendent of the world.

Ecology theologians point out that the Psalms, prophets and many other Scriptures emphasize God's close affinity with nature, as does his incarnation in the flesh through Jesus. And they see the rise of modern ecology as an emphasis on the material aspects of life.

"The earth is the Lord's and the fulness thereof, and he, the Psalmist, adding that so are the mountains, stars, seas, rivers and the birds of the air—all that move in the field."

It is divine property that man is not that which moves in the field. It is his duty to be a steward of the earth, and to be ravaged by their tenancy of it, religious scholars are emphasizing the need for a new modern ecology as an emphasis on the material aspects of life.

"Ecology," it has been called, a theology of ecology, of concern for the environment, of nature and "ecological ethics." A headline in the "New York Times" read: "For 'too long Christians have been preoccupied with the command to exercise dominion over the earth as a mandate to conquer and exploit nature," said Dr. Richard A. Baer Jr., a New Testament scholar at Barham College, Richmond, Va.

He adds that the utilitarian attitude, coupled with modern America's constant urge to boost technological capabilities and the survival of life on the planet. "Failure to fulfill our obligations as stewards of creation will inevitably bring God's judgment upon us," he says.

The Rev. Joseph Billiter of the University of Chicago, who has long stressed the unity of the religious faith with the material cosmos, says the present despoiling of land, air and water is not only a technological failure but a moral one. "We have fashioned a society which is in a state of ecological crisis and the bill is now due and payable," he says.

Churches across the country were urged by a National Council to observe a special "Environmental Sunday" this weekend in advance of the country-wide "Earth Day" next Wednesday.

"We need to appreciate more fully the religious and moral dimensions of the relation between nature and the human community," says Dr. Richard A. Baer, a sociologist of Kalamazoo College in Michigan.

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





Syndicated TV Gets New Image

NEW YORK (AP) — Increasingly, syndicated television is changing its image from that of a "bicycle service" offering fourth reruns of network cast-offs.

Many advertisers, including some of the biggest, now are producing first-run programs for syndication directly to stations across the country.

They see it as a means of reaching the audience they desire at rates lower than those offered by the networks.

A common practice among advertisers is to produce the show and offer it free to the stations in return for three commercial minutes. The stations can make a profit by selling another three minutes to local sponsors.

"A great advantage," said one producer, "is that off the networks you only have two ratings a year rather than the weekly ratings. You're not living and dying by the old ratings game." Rating services sample local stations' audiences twice yearly.

First-run syndication is a \$30 million a year business of up to 15 hours a week of game, talk and variety shows, which makes it an effective fourth network.

The show business weekly Variety calls it "the bicycle net-

work," after the old practice of bicycling the prints around.

Among that top syndicated programs are "The Mike Douglas Show," "The David Frost Show," "To Tell the Truth," "Girl Talk," "Beat the Clock," "He Said, She Said," "The Galloping Gourmet," and "The Movie Game."

The syndicators and advertisers also have their eyes on cable television, which has been authorized by the Federal Communications Commission to originate its own programming and to sell advertising.

The syndicators could receive a shot in the arm from a proposal under consideration by the FCC to limit the networks to three hours of non-news programming between 7 p.m. and 11 p.m. each night.

The proposal is designed to stimulate first-run syndication. Another means of getting programs to the stations, other than mailing out tapes, is through the Hughes Television Network.

Since Howard Hughes took over the old Sports Television Network, its programming has become diversified.

One such program is a series of specials produced by Life magazine, the first of which, "Thirty Days to Survival," was

Who Won the Ratings Race?

NEW YORK (AP) — The annual television ratings race is a contest which each year reaches the significance and suspense of a soap opera.

Further, it is as intricate and as complex as one of those long-running stories, with all the subplots, the ploys, the intrigues, and all the entrances

and exits.

It has for years been played to the hilt, with the networks milking publicity from every favorable turn. It is of no small importance that a statistician with fast pencil can make anything short of an unmitigated disaster look like a triumph.

Last year's ratings race ended in a bitter feud between NBC and CBS. NBC said it was a tie. CBS said it had won for the 14th straight year. Lost in the cross-fire was the fact that the difference was within the margin of error.

The battle this year appeared headed for another showdown. But suddenly, this week, NBC decided to de-escalate.

As expected, NBC declared the season over as of March 22.

Unexpectedly, it issued only its own season Nielsen ratings. The figure was 20.2. It declined to report the ratings for ABC and CBS.

"I think what we're doing is running our own race," said Paul Klein, NBC's affable vice president for research. "We're just not holding the stop watch on the other guys. They don't like us keeping their running time and we don't like them keeping ours."

Is it simply one more twist in the plot? Probably, but even so the contest goes on, Klein said, "We're still in the ratings race for advertising. That's a fact of life."

The March 22 ending is something new, announced a few months ago. NBC said it premieres its shows ahead of ABC and CBS and goes into reruns earlier. Traditionally, the season has ended at the beginning of daylight saving time.

NBC's early premieres got it off to a fast start this year, while CBS, normally a slow starter, has been even slower than ever catching up. It was not until the new year when Michael H. Dann, CBS programming vice president and its chief protagonist in the ratings race, hatched "Operation 100" that CBS began to close the gap.

Operation 100, named after the number of days in which CBS had to catch up, was a daring plan involving the use of specials that were not really special. In fact, some were shown in past seasons on NBC.

But it turned the trick, although CBS has not yet overtaken NBC. But there are those
