

> **Tainted Food Not Distributed** In Connecticut HARTFORD, Conn. (AP)

Connecticut officials report that there is no danger in the state of buying contaminated foods listed Wednesday in a report from the Food and Drug Administration.
None of the packaged soups, popeorn or candy recalled by the FDA have appeared on shelves in Connecticut, spokes-men for the State Consumer Protection Department said

Wednesday.

The recall, on a voluntary basis, involved nearly 14 million servings of nationally distribut-ed Lipton soups. The FDA also said that since January, a na-tionwide recall had been made on 334,000 pounds of popcorn packed by a Milford, Ill., firm, 24,000 frozen strawberry pies made by a Columbus, Ohio, firm and 2,000 cases of a name-brand

candy.

The soups involved were contaminated with salmonella bacteria which can cause food poisoning, the FDA said.

One of the soups had been test-marketed in New England, the state agency said, but the contaminated cases in New England were recalled before sale. The state also tested some of the cartoned soup not declared contaminated, and found it to be pure, the Consumer Protec-tion spokesman said. None of the other products listed by the FDA as contaminate were ever distributed in Con-necticut, the spokesman said.

Let It Be A Trial seem to have agreed, temporarily at east, that what is being attempted in that New Haven courtroom under the gavel of Judge Harold Mulvey is an attempt to serve the interests of justice, perhaps it can be hoped that various oth-

er parties whose involvement is something less direct will decide to let the trial conduct and prove itself. It was becoming difficult to understand why so many volunteer crusaders, including many members of the activist clergy, were proclaiming, even before it had started, that the New Haven trial was going to be a "lynching," but seem-

ed to be forgetting, somehow, that the trial was being held because there had allegedly been one "lynching" which had already taken place. It was also difficult to appreciate the propriety of having the student body at Yale begin acting as if it had somehow been admitted into the case as a sort of

H

mass amicus curiae, entitled to evaluate the evidence before it had been presented, and render the verdict before the case had been argued. Was murder done, and if so, by whom?

Until the Connecticut system of justice has begun to demonstrate anything unhappily different, the assumption should be, out of deference to its high tradition and its unassailed excellence in the past, that the Connecticut system of justice is going to be able to handle this case as if there were no color of skin and no ideological label involved. For those who truly believe in that

kind of justice - and who perhaps believe in letting a system of justice exhibit itself before they sit in ruthless judgment on the system itself - the proper formula is to treat the trial as if it were a trial, not an inquisition, not a demonstration, and not something to be decided by any mass unsworn jury recruited from either ghetto or university.

It's The Optimism Worries Us On the level of the experts, we have

draped our economy, and our concern with it, in many learned and relatively painless disguises. The experts talk to one another in their own gobbledegook, and what they say never bothers us. When we ourselves want to go near

the topic, we find that we have been provided with a game that we can play, called "Inflation And Recession." We get so interested in trying to decide which piece of economic news fits into which definition that we forget all about any real application of the news.

Along with such elegant formulas for evasion of reality, we seem to have adopted, as if by common consent and consideration for one another, one firm rule for our conversational approaches to one another.

Nobody ever asks anybody, any more, such a brutal and tactless question as: "How's business?"

We are, therefore, pretty well insulated against any direct mental encounter with any possible temporary unpleasantness which may be skulking about the nation's production line and market

There is only one possible gap in our armor, only one thing that still goes wrong occasionally.

Now and then we see that some government economist is predicting that economic expansion is about to follow some temporary downturn. Something very pleasant, it seems, is just around

the corner. Somebody has unlimited con fidence in the future. The economy, it is proclaimed, is fundamentally sound. It is when this kind of stuff starts slipping through and getting at us that we come closest to worrying.

The sources estimate 40,000 to 50,000 North Vietnamese and Vet Cong troops are in eastern Cambodia. One source said Cambodian troops had withdrawn from all their outposts
