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The Secret Nobody Ever Buys

There is only one important secret in life, and it can be disclosed again and again without ever losing its secrecy. The secret is this: The only way anybody ever learns anything is through experience. Nobody can ever be told what somebody else has already learned.

It happens to them before they believe it. Then, too late, after the event, they become wise, and can tell other people what they have learned. Only no one ever believes them, either.

Such thoughts may occur to us Americans as we read that Russia is on the verge of a great "motoring explosion" in which, at last, automobiles are going to be mass produced for the eventual use and pleasure of all the Russian people.

To the good people of Russia we say something like this: Good people of Russia, think twice about the kind of life you are leading and the kind of life you are choosing to bring upon yourselves.

Remember that when everybody has an automobile nobody really needs one, but that when everybody can have one everybody will have to have first, and then two. Remember how slow and pleasant life has been in the past, and take our word for it that it gets very fast and hurried once you let the automobile set the pace and the mood.

We are surprised, therefore, at everything China manages to do in the way of modern technology.

We have had an equal amount of trouble accommodating our thinking to some of the things the Russians have been able to accomplish in recent years.

We thought, first, the explanation that the Russians were imitating us, or aping out our secrets. We had to admit, sooner or later, that the Russians had the capacity to be first, on their own, in space.

Our capacity to be continually surprised at the appearance of anything scientifically or technologically impressive from either Russia or China is founded on something more than our tendency to consider both nations historically backward and culturally inferior, in comparison to ourselves.

We have always, to some extent, sold ourselves on the idea that the creed of Communism, being false and evil, will somehow inevitably cast a barren curse on its own sciences.

Obviously, we have been wrong in trying to apply such theories to Russian and Chinese capabilities, and we have Russian space exploits and now a Chinese satellite in orbit to prove it.

If we can bring ourselves to acknowledge the error of our own instinctive expectations with regard to Russian and Chinese technological capacity, we might try projecting a little of our own thoughts and wisdom into our expectation of what these Communist countries may try to do with the technological achievements that are theirs.

Once again, our own routine reaction is grooved. They are the world's wicked ones, the power-mad barbarians, the ceaseless aggressors, the perpetual plotters. If they ever see a chance to do so, they will let us have it, right where it will destroy us. So we must expect and prepare for the worst.

That may not be a bad rule for anybody, in any situation. Still, just as in their scientific and technological capacities they may be more like us than we think, so in diplomatic, power politics, and prospective use of military power we may be more like each other than we, for our part, would like to concede.

Beginning with the fact that each side of the cold war accuses the other of having been the first to start it, there has been much more similarity than contrast in the conduct of the great powers of East and West in the past quarter century. Both sides have, in the name of their own security, plotted and pursued and maneuvered for the power-political advantage point over the other, and they have sought to use not only their adventures in use of their own military force on the territory of other nations, but in their recurrent disarmament negotiations with one another.

There is, of course, a wild chance that Communist China will seek especially rank advantages from its own progress in military and space technology. But Chinese really think to expect is that China will seek from its technology essentially the same things we seek from ours.

To be realistic, we should fear what we ourselves may do with the weaponry of the nuclear-age age as much as we fear what anybody else may do with it.

School Principal

Ray Rogers Quits Long Island Post

A. Raymond Rogers Jr. has resigned as principal of Locust Valley, L. I., N. Y. Junior-Senior High School, effective Aug. 15 "or on a mutually acceptable date between myself and the school board."

His resignation from the Long Island school position came almost a year to the day from the submission of his resignation as principal of Manchester High School, where he served from 1960. Prior to coming to Manchester, Rogers was teacher and administrator in several Maine schools, and assistant principal of Newton, Mass. High School for three years.

In an interview with a reporter from Newday, Long Island daily, Rogers said his decision to terminate his latest position after one year resulted from a combination of incidents, not any one. The decision apparently was the result of being caught between two generations.

"I'm considered ultra-permissive by one element of the community and authoritarian by some of the students," Rogers commented in the interview. "He's not just liberal, he's ultraliberal," one parent said. "He believes the children should run the school. We don't give them a world without rules and regulations and then send them out into the world in im-

possible." That parent is the wife of a Nassau County District Court judge who, in November, presented a petition to the school board, requesting the prohibition of Moratorium Day activities in the school. It contained more than 700 signatures. A former vice president of the student government said, "I consider him (Rogers) wishy-washy. On various issues he's really been talking through both sides of his mouth." The same student said the principal's unpopularity was due, in part, to his reluctance to permit some films and rock groups in school, and his policy of checking lavatories. The Newday reporter said Nassau County officials considered Rogers a tough drug foe. On April 8, his 19-year-old son Daniel was arrested, charged with sale and possession of marijuana. Rogers said this was the crisis in his decision to resign. The Rogers, who live at 11 East Ave., Bayville, L.I., N.Y., have four other children. He reportedly is seeking a position in New England.

'Virginian': New Image

NEW YORK (AP) — NBC is about to put "The Virginian" through a much-needed face lift in hopes of sparking the same kind of interest generated by "The Name of the Game."

This 90-minute Western, now in its seventh or eighth year, had become tedious and worn around the edges. A few months ago, rumors had it, NBC was preparing either to cut the show to an hour or to drop it altogether. Instead, NBC is remodeling it in the image of "The Name of the Game."

Next season, James Drury as the Virginian, Doug McClure as Trampas, and Lee Majors as a new character will rotate the lead each week. Majors was formerly on "Big Valley." The Shiloh Ranch will be the central focus, as Howard Publications is for "Game." Each segment will have its own producer and will be handled as a 90-minute movie.

In addition, Stewart Granger will take his first television series role as a former British army major who becomes the new ranch owner.

The time period is being advanced to the mid 1890's so that the story may deal with more contemporary issues. Frank Price, in charge of production for Universal, said that period experienced many of the same problems facing the country today.

For the spring and summer reruns, the best episodes from past seasons of "The Virginian" will be brought back. Among them will be the story starring Lee J. Cobb, who was the owner of the Shiloh in the first few seasons. Other episodes will tell how the Virginian and Trampas came to the ranch.

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
