## Social Backgrounds Divide **Guardsman from Student**

By HAYNES JOHNSON The Washington Post KENT, Ohio - What brought Sandy Scheuer of Youngstown,

Ohio, to the parking lot at the foot of the hill at that hour, on that day, was chance. Sandy, whose last name had been mispelled "Scader" in the 1969 Kent State University year-book, was heading, book in hand, to her "speech disorders, organic" class in the music and speech center building. She was one of the four who died shortly after 12:30 p.m. (EDT) Monday.

What brought Troop G of the 107th Armored Calvary Ohio National Guard, to the crest of the hill at that same moment were circumstances beyond in-dividual guardsmen's control. They were there because of a specific situation and a specific job; they were there because

of duty, orders, and the history of an increasingly familiar and turbulent' American story, the college confrontation. Fate had placed them in the first wave of advancing guardsmen. The bullets came their guns. What led them to kneel and

fire into the crowd, what extent of provocation and personal danger they faced, whether they were justified or not, and who bears the final responsibilwho bears the final responsibil-ity are all still the subject of bitter debate here. is beyond dispute: The differences between

students and guardsmen, near-ly all of them young and from the same section of the country, go far beyond the tragedy at Kent. They are divided by dif-ferences in outlook and oppor-tunity, in background and be-havior. At the extremes, these differences take on something close to class distinctions—and antagonisms. It plus the less favored against the more afflu-ent. "These people all live in this area," said a guard officer who holds a professional job in civ-lian life in Akron. "They were firing at other people of about the same age who live in Ohio. "Cancelvably, they could even be neighbors. It's like the Civil Was." That doesn't mean the guards-

men who have been on duty here since last Saturday night are all representatives of some monolithic Middle America. Their ranks include college graduates, urban planners and teachers, as well as factory workers and farmers. Yet all week they have been

expressing a strong sense of dis-approval of what they see taking place on college campuses. Their remarks range from de-risive comments about 'long hairs' and the use of profanity among students ("everything they say seems to come from the word 's-' " said a guardsman who is an Akron policeman in civilian life) to "you can't

#### The Two-Way Domino Trail The domino theory has been put into

Originally, one graphic way of describing why we are in Vietnam was to say that, if we let Vietnam fall, that would be the first in a row of dominoes. Laos, Cambodia, Thailand, Malaya, Indonesia, the Philippines, would be some of the other dominoes which would then fall, in response to the impulse given them from the fall of Vietnam. Eventually, that way, we would, in the favorite phrase of those who expounded the theory, wind up fighting the North Vietnamese-or their allies-in Seattle. Now, it is to be noted, the chain of

consequences has been altered, and set in a different direction

We ourselves now move into Laos and Cambodia in order to protect our position in Vietnam. By this strategy, it may become necessary to renew our attack on North Vietnam, to protect\_our operations in Laos and Cambodia. And anybody who wanted to make scare predictions about this kind of a game of dominoes would say that, in the end, we would be likely to end up fighting in

In other words, letting the dominoes ill one way led, in the old scare threat our own hawks made to us, straight back to our own soil, while pushing the dominoes forward takes us toward Mos-

Let us hope the one concept is just as unvalid and unlikely as the other.

"What is your opinion," Premier Kosygin was asked when he went the extraordinary length of holding a televised press conference the other day, "of President Nixon's statement that the action in Cambodia was essential to the continued successful evacuation of U.S. troops from South Viet-

"We think that by employing this logic," the Russian leader replied, "it is possible to organize intervention in any country of the world and say that it is essential to the withdrawal of troops from Vietnam."

That is, of course, an exaggeration, but also an illustration of a theory to which there is some truth - that this game of dominoes does stretch all the way between Washington and Moscow,

The idea that the two capitals are on the opposite ends of the long line which eads all around the world, through the Middle East as well as through Southeast Asia, has, in the past few days, become more than a theory. When Kosygin holds a televised press conference, when President Nixon warns unidentified third parties not to concern themselves with events in Cambodia, \_ there is some transmission of force energy brough the long line of dominoes, so hat Moscow begins to feel Washington ushing, and Washington begins to feel Moscow pushing. In such a game, the fominces will never all fall one way or the other, but rear up against each other at some intermediate point where the sum of the two opposing pressures nounts explosively high.

#### Something To Investigate It would be difficult to imagine a more

ironic task for New York City's Commis sioner of Investigation, Robert K. Ruskin, than that of investigating how it happened that the city-owned car assigned to him became involved in an accident up in Vermont, where it was on holiday outing with his family last Feb-

Actually, there was little mystery to be resolved. Commissioner Ruskin himself was driving the city's car on his Vermont holiday. And he is one of a list of New York City officials who have permission to take the city-owned cars assigned to them outside the city, the theory being that they might need to return to the city on business suddenly.

The Commissioner's investigation, so far, has revealed that he paid for the gas and oil on his trip, and for the tolls he encountered, and also for the towing he needed after the accident, in which, by the Commissioner's own investigation, he himself was blameless.

No one really expects the Commissioner of Investigation to press too vigorously into the question of the consistency of his Reform and Fun City Mayor.

#### Tragedy At Kent State

A tragedy like the one at Kent State University leaves a drained and empty feeling. There is much that can be said but one is left wondering if any of it has real meaning.

The first thing to confront is the ghastliness of the act of National Guardsmen shooting into a crowd of students leaving four of them dead. Perhaps there may have been a rooftop sniper; it at least seems likely the Guardsmen thought there was. But neither this nor the excuses of weariness and panic detract from the utter brutishness of firing at random into a crowd.

This ghastliness must be confronted specially by those of us who have r peatedly warned that appealing political lecisions to the streets is a risky tactic that will inevitably lead to grief. We must make it clear to those who will listen that we are absolutely heartfelt n deploring the tragic consequences against which we have so often warned.

That need not mean, though, that we must abdicate repeating that the warning still applies. One of the most touchng things about the Kent State episode s the report that when the firing started students assumed blank bullets were being used, Coming as it does after the students had indulged themselves with arson and after the authorities had explicitly declared martial law, this assumption casts a painful poignancy on the sense of game-playing that permeates so many of these student uprisings. somehow the students are convinced that whatever they do nothing tragic will happen to them.

How should they know otherwise, with their experience embracing only a few cloistered years in what is still, despite its current passions, a singularly clois-tered nation? Nothing in their limited experience or tentative learning prepares them to understand the deadly serious facts - that mobs bring repression, for example, or even that when you throw rocks at armed men eventualsome of them will either panic or urn inhuman. Somehow this ought not be too much for a 20-year-old mind to grasp, but it is also true the failing is ot only theirs but ours - those of us who ought to have some grasp of history's lessons, some duty to communicate them to youth, and also of course some wit to guard adequately against predictable breakdowns and excesses in uppressing violence.

Somehow the trends of our times have made a tragedy like this one inevitable at some point or another, and this makes hard to lay any ultimate blame on anyone at Kent State. Perhaps these rends are pure fate, beyond control nat drained and empty feeling again) But surely they must be powerfully afby responsible men, political eaders, editors, educators and so on. Those who have set the prevailing tone among this group have failed. We as a nation have not managed our affairs. prudently, and we have been equally imprudent in our reaction to mistakes. There is a lurching around, a tendency to think in one absolute or another, th betrays a loss of leadership and self-

So after the tragedy at Kent State, the question to ask is not whether the blame lies here or there, not where the absolute can be found. The appropriate question is whether it is possible to give either rebellious students and those who must confront them a better notion of how to perform where there are no absolutes. And if responsible persons are o help others toward the needed sense perspective and balance, the firs thing they must do is get a good grip on that sense for themselves. - WAL STREET JOURNAL
