Can We Renew Our Compact? It is both extraordinary, and yet logical, that big news should be made by a letter written by Secretary of the Interior Walter Hickel to his President.

Hickel's original appointment to the Cabinet was questioned because it was feared he might be insensitive to the gentler things of life.

His letter to his President was a plea for the Nixon Administration to adopt a sentler, more understanding attitude toward the youth of the nation, for fear that, otherwise, this youth might be driven more and more toward anarchy.

Secretary Hickel feared a loss of communication between this nation, as represented by its adult leadership, and its

But it was perhaps even more striking that, at the end of his letter, this member of the Nixon Cabinet made his final plea one for more communication between the members of that Cabinet and the President who had appointed them.

Why should a letter on such intangible things create such a stir, and be considered worthy of national headlines?

A

The answer would seem to be that it goes straight to the heart-sick heart of blem, which is not any one specific issue but rather our inability to reach communication with ourselves, remember and renew compact with ourselves, on any of the problems which face us.

On front after front, we face problems which seem insoluble. We cannot handle a war to our satisfaction and our honor. We cannot resolve our domestic problem of race relations. We cannot deal with our own children.

And then we face each other across , these insoluble problems and cannot even agree on our approach to them.

We look at one another, and cannot even remember, vividly enough, that sense of belonging together in one society which used to be good enough to persuade us to close ranks over our differences of mood and method.

In our despair, we tend to grow cold and heartless and cynical, until we even begin to lose the capacity to be hurt by terrible things that happen among us.

It is as if we needed to found our nation, and our society all over again, agreeing on fresh terms for our forward living together which will enable us to renew our American compact, our mor-'tal, human being compact with one an-

Keep Ecology Pure

There is the beginning of shadow on the bright shining edges of the ecological

Nobody has noticed supermarket ustomers bringing their own containers or choosing items in returnable containers or selecting products which have been rated more pollution-safe than oth-

People have begun, on the other hand, to pay some attention to the possibility of a threat to their jobs, or to their usiness as usual, or demand that they change some life-long habit of their own. Furthermore, it has been discovered that the anti-pollution cause may, after all, be anti-American. The Daughters of the American Revolution, who ought to know about such things, have adopted a resolution saying that the pollution problem "is being distorted and maggerated by emotional declarations and by intensive propaganda."

Still worse, it has been discovered by one of our most patriotic Southern newspapers that Earth Day, April 22, when we were supposed to be thinking pure thoughts about our environment, was also Lenin's birthday. "The date," said this newspaper editorially, "was not selected by chance. Here we have a classic example of how the Communists pervert idealism and worthwhile causes to their own purpose."

What that means is that every time a beer can was picked up or a tree planted anywhere in América that day, the Communists were laughing their heads off, because they knew we were really ionoring Lenin, even if we didn't know ourselves.

The moral seems clear. If we want to be safely American, we had better not ol around too much with any silly, issyish crusades. It's a good thing to emember, there's nothing as American as dirt.

If you do have to plant a tree, plant a Commie with it.

That tentative deision became moot when the Presidnet decided-on Monday evening, April 27-to approve the far more ambitious attack on the Cambodian sanctuaries which he announced last Thursday night. The original operation was expanded from the relatively limted penetration of the Parrot's Beak area, to be conducted wholly by South Vietnamese troops with no U.S. help on the ground, to the far more sensitive and dangerous area in the north known as the Fishhook. the vital Communist sanctuary in the Fishhook area posed a far more difficult problem. Here were not only vast food, medical, and ammunition stores, but also highly trained Com munist troops. Mr. Nixon's military commanders in Saigon, strongly backed by Ambassado Ellsworth Bunker, warned that if South Vietnamese troops were sent into Fishhook alone and a strong Communist force engaged them, they might be slaught ered. In short, this was an operation that could be safely entrusted only to American troops. The President agonized over his decision for days, then decled on the first of two major gambles, the military gamble of junking his earlier, limited plan for Parrot's Beak. He aproved full-scale intervention by U.S. troops in the Fishhook. With American combat forces entering one area of Cambodia, all reason to bar U.S. advisers

And Dr. Sidney Cohen, director of the department of microbiology at Michael Reese Medical Center in Chicago, likened the work of laboratory re searchers to "the accepted has ards of any trade or profes

The leading authority on laboratory-acquired infections, Dr. S. Edward Sulkin, a virologist, says the number of persons who work with agents which might potentially cause them to be ill or die is not known.

Sulkin is professor and chairman of the department of microbiology at the Southwester Medical School and, with a colleague, Dr. Robert M. Pike, conducted the first survey of laboratory-acquired infections in 1949 with a questionnaire sent to nearly 5,000 laboratories in the United States.

He estimated in 1951 that there were about 121,000 scientists and others working in laboratories where they might become ill if proper caution were not exercised.

Now, he said, he has no estimate of the number because sion" since then, with the discovery of new ones and a consequent increase in scientific interest in studying these viruses. considerable proportion of laboratory infections." he said. Since publication of the initial survey in 1950, Drs. Sulkin and Pike have continued to update their information. Through last year, they had recorded 3,255 mown cases of "overt laboratory-acquired infection" in the world, which resulted in 132 deaths. Most of these infections have occurred since 1930. . More than half of the cases resulted from bacteria and vi-

ruses, the rest from other agents. Bacteria and viruses also caused 95 of the deaths ... The diseases most frequently encountered recently have been, in order, brucellosis, which

causes fever, headache, chills, sweating and other symptoms; tuebrculosis; and hepatitis, a liver disease. But this order is not constant.

Cambodia Move Goes Faster Than Expected

Allies Send Ships Into Cambodia

SAIGON (AP) - A force of 30 U.S. naval boats and 70 South Vietnamese craft launched a drive up the Mekong River today in the first waterborne assault into Cambodia, allied eadquarters announced. Within hours, six South Vietnamese gunboats suppressed enemy fire nore than half way up the riv-

A dispatch from Cambodia said that after enemy sniper fire was silenced, helicopters began unloading South Vietnamese troops near the enemyheld ferry crossing at Neak Luong

At the same time more than 10,000 American and South Vietnamese troops launched three new drives inside Cambodia against enemy bases. Hundreds American tanks, armored personnel carriers, helicopter gunships and fighter-bombers were committed to the new ofensives. The official announce tents came one on top of anoth-

Military sources also announced the biggest success in the campaign to wreck enemy bases-a 300-ton stockpile of munitions and food found by U.S. troops in Cambodia 8 miles northwest of Saigon. I was called the biggest cache ever found in the war. The combined river force,
