Board of Education Refuses To Cut \$400,000 from Budget

By BARBARA RICHMOND (Herald Reporter) The Board of Education says it cannot take a \$400,000 cut in its proposed budget without impairing the educational program. Board members plan to vote on this decision when they meet the Board of Representatives Thursday night and present figures showing a \$244,000 cut. The representatives two weeks ago requested the \$400,000 cut from the original \$6.4 million education request. The education board was asked to come back with some figures. The two groups will meet Thursday night. Last night Dr. Raymond Ramsdell, superintendent of schools, told the Board of Education that he had studied the budget for several days and reviewed it with members of his administrative staff and finally decided that a \$400,000 cut would seriously impair the educational program. Two plans were submitted to the board last night. The first outlined areas totaling a \$189,828 cut. This amount was already given to the Board of Representatives as a possible cut and was included as part of the suggested \$400,000 figure. In addition to that amount, Dr. Ramsdell strongly recommended that the board adopt what he called exhibit B, which would allow for a further cut of \$54,831. At the same time he urged the board to take a firm stand when it meets with the representatives and to state that this is the amount the budget can be cut and still not seriously affect the program. Cautioning the board that it would have to tighten its belt on the program, as proposed with the cut, Dr. Ramsdell said he had prepared a third proposal which totals \$250,000 and when added to the others would be \$440,000. Dr. Ramsdell told the board that the third proposal would make it necessary to delete many programs, both educational and non-educational. He said, "It is our collective, professional educational judgment that the deletion of these items from the total school program would seriously impair the quality of the education now being offered in Vernon." Dr. Ramsdell further stated, "I do not believe the citizens of Vernon would tolerate an edu-

(Continued from Page One) Dr. Gerald Gruman, associate professor of history at the University of Massachusetts in Amherst, said white church bells toll 286 members of the university strike steering committee will lead students to the bus near district shortly before noon. He said the presidents of the three banks—First National Bank of Amherst, Amherst Savings Bank and Hampshire National Bank—had been advised of the plans and had promised to cooperate. "We don't have to wait for November to elect a Congress to end the war," the committee said in a statement. "To end the war we can show that students have economic power to stop war dollars. Help us show this power to change the present war-recession econ-

omy into a peace and prosperity economy for all Americans." Dr. Gruman said the Amherst College strike committee approved of the plan and would join the UMass protesters. This committee said it urged "others throughout the country to join with us in attempting to alter contemporary American society." "We figure for every dollar withdrawn about \$5 will be removed from war resources," Dr. Gruman said. Elsewhere, students broadened their activities against the Southeast Asia war but managed to avoid violence. Some areas reported an abatement of antiwar activity Monday. Students at Southeastern Massachusetts University in Dartmouth and Bristol Community College at Fall River ended week-long strikes. Attendance at both schools was reported near normal Monday. But at Brown University the University of Rhode Island, faculty and student groups voted for a week's suspension of classes in October to give students time to work in political campaigns.

State Drops Expansion Of Bradley

HARTFORD, Conn. (AP) — The state is planning a major shift in its policy for expanding Bradley International Airport, State Transportation Commissioner George J. Conkling said Monday. Conkling said he has dropped controversial plans to acquire additional property in Brattleboro and East Granby. The land would have been used to build additional 10,000-foot parallel runways. Conkling said a "miraculorum" has been put on the land-acquisition plans, and that it could last as much as 10 years. This means the state will withdraw the case now in Superior Court appealing Brattleboro and East Granby opposition to the state's planned takeover of 200 acres of land in East Granby and 600 acres in Brattleboro. In addition, Conkling disclosed plans for major expansions and modifications in the areas of baggage handling, passenger services, and auto and plane parking. The improvement in baggage handling will be completed by this summer, he said. The rest of the changes should be completed within the next two to three years. Conkling says he plans to add another small runway within existing land and expand terminal services within the existing Murphy Terminal. Conkling says these additions will take care of Bradley's needs until 1980. After investigating the Landrum-Brown report which recommended a 10,000-foot runway parallel to existing runways and the building of a new terminal north of the existing terminal between the runways, Conkling said he disagreed with the proposed siting of these measures. The report had claimed the present terminal would be jammed by 1972 and that a new terminal would be needed by 1975. Conkling claims much can be done to take care of immediate needs within the Murphy terminal area. After 1980, he said, "we should be moving in the direction of a new terminal building." 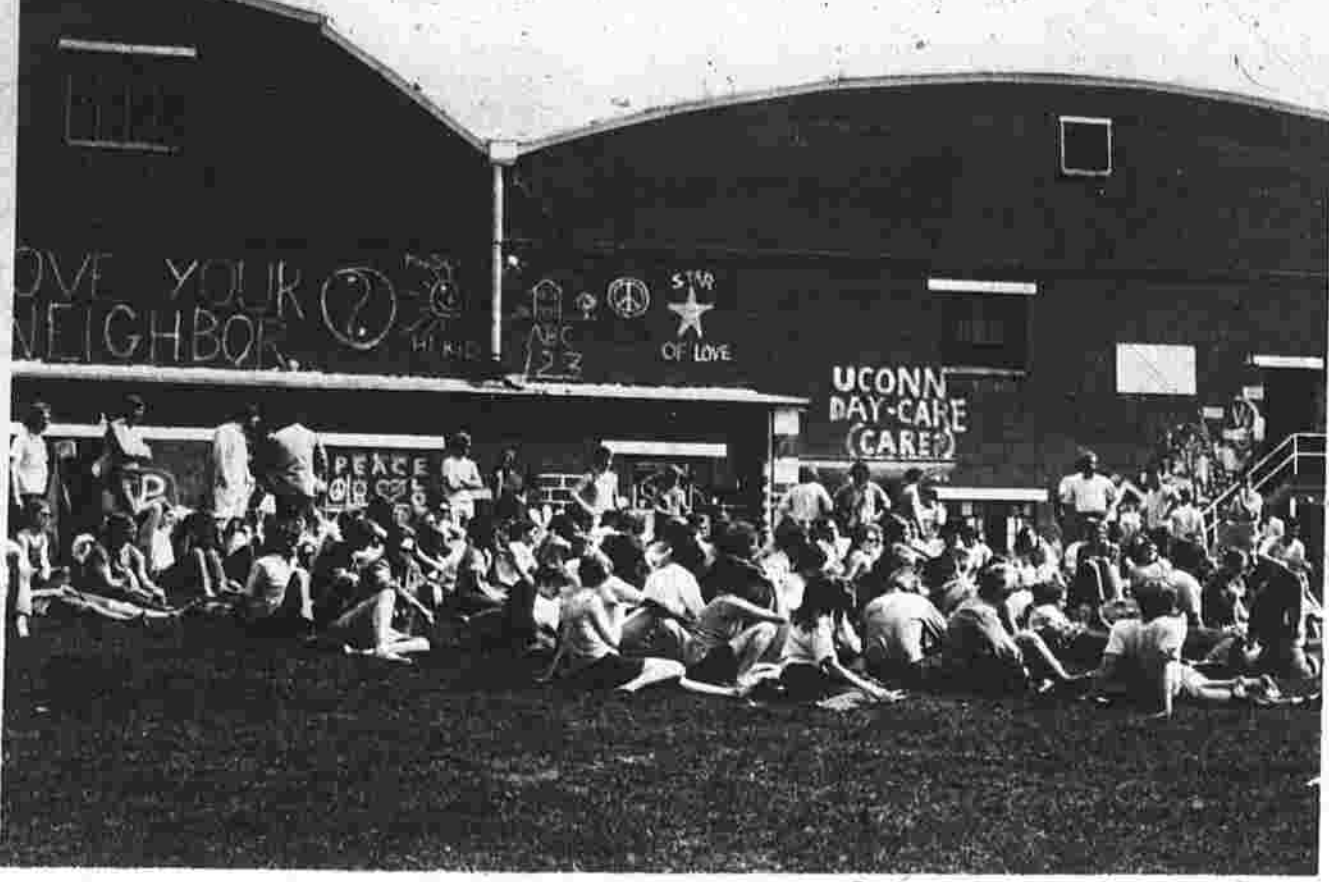

Seized for a Day Care Center UConn's ROTC Hangar Turns to Pastel

Whatever opinion taxpayers may hold about painting government property pastel, the ROTC hangar at the University of Connecticut yesterday afternoon was beautiful.

As part of their continuing Strike for Peace, students recently occupied the ROTC building after a rally on the Student Union Mall. Here some 4,000 students heard a Kent State University sociology professor speak about the slaying of four students on his campus by the Ohio National Guard. He urged UConn students to protest nonviolently, to wear black armbands and to work during the summer for the election of antiwar candidates to Congress.

Following the rally, about 1,000 students proceeded to the ROTC hangar, where they met no resistance. Supplied with hundreds of gallons of water-base paint, they began to decorate the large drab one-story building for a day care center.

A day care center for children of working mothers is being pushed by the Women's Liberation Movement, which has been gaining support at UConn this year.

Non-participants who had driven in mid-afternoon to pick up concert tickets were astonished on getting out of their car, to find the cinder block hangar in full bloom.

All military designations had been painted over. "Day Care Center" spelled out in huge letters, and flowers, boats and

other designs appropriate to children had sprung up in all colors of the rainbow outside the huge building. In contrast to some demonstrations, there was not a single obscenity among the many words — "love," "peace," "non-violence" and "children."

A cheshire cat grinned above an indoor balcony. Humpty Dumpty sat on a wall. Hopscotch courts, ABC blocks and a continuation of wall designs covered the cement floor. Visitors had to walk gingerly to a few amateur artists who had avoided the still-drying paint.

Outside, a carnival atmosphere prevailed, as it does on all campuses in the spring, with ice cream salesmen doing a brisk business. The only difference between this and any other warm May afternoon was the concentration of students in one area and the lack of sunbathers on lawns beside the dorms.

UConn, along with colleges and universities throughout the country, has been on strike for a week, with class attendance and upcoming exams optional during the night. UConn President Homer Babidge reportedly went to the building after midnight and urged the 200 students there to

leave, saying "continued occupation of this building puts you individually and collectively in jeopardy. The occupation of a public facility will not go unpunished."

At 7 a.m. today Provost Edward V. Gant reportedly asked the remaining half-dozen students to leave peacefully. They refused. Gant said that students found to have been involved in the painting would be held liable for the cost of removing or covering it. It was not certain who would be penalized—the individuals or the groups they represent.

Meanwhile, ROTC classes have continued as usual but in a pasted. Students were planning to guard the building through the night. UConn President Homer Babidge reportedly went to the building after midnight and urged the 200 students there to

affidavit from one witness to the U.S. attorney.

Young made his statement as a Life magazine published a copyrighted photograph showing one guardman apparently an officer, aiming a pistol toward a group of students.

An Ohio National Guard official in Columbus said there was no indication that any 40 caliber pistols were fired during the incident. The spokesman added that only officers carried 40 caliber pistols at Kent State.

Two Associated Press reporters examining the scene of the shooting shortly after the incident reported finding a spent bullet that appeared to be larger than the 30 caliber slugs fired from M1 rifles.

The exact diameter could not immediately be determined, partly because the bullet had become deformed on impact. The slug was turned over to a guard officer who pocketed it without comment.

Meanwhile, Asst. Atty. Gen. Jerris Leonard, the government's chief civil rights attorney, assumed command of an expanded investigation into the fatal shootings.

Leonard added that no decision had yet been made on whether to convene a federal grand jury to seek indictments in connection with the incident.

CLEVELAND, Ohio (AP) — A group of Kent State University students, faculty and staff called today the Committee of Kent State Massacre Witnesses to send representatives nationwide to urge students not to let their campuses become another Kent State.

Raid Breaks Gaming Ring

Few details of the raid were immediately released. U.S. Atty. James DeLoach brushed aside newsmen's questions, saying no information would be forthcoming until a news conference today.

The raid marked the culmination of the third federal gambling probe in the Detroit area in recent months.

The first investigation involved what federal authorities termed a national sports betting ring. After a series of raids which began New Year's Day, 10 persons were charged with conspiracy to violate federal gambling laws and six others were named as co-conspirators.

The alleged co-conspirators included baseball Hall of Famer pitcher Jerome "Dizzy" Dean and Howard Robar, a wealthy Lansing businessman.

A second investigation in Washington, Mitchell said, involved alleged bookmaking activities in Flint, Detroit Tigers pitching ace Denny McLain was called to testify. Later Baseball Commissioner Bowie Kuhn suspended McLain until July 1 for "involvement in 1967 bookmaking activities."

There have been no arrests resulting from that probe.

An FBI spokesman said Monday's raids came as the climax of an investigation in progress since early March through the downtown section ended at the Augustus municipal building and a small group ripped down a Georgia flag there and burned it.

Sheriff's officers said the 16-year-old prisoner, Charles Ostman, was beaten to death by other prisoners. They said two of the cellmates had been charged with murder.

Sheriff E. R. Atkins said the two, Sammy Lee Parks, 17, and a 19-year-old whose name was withheld in accordance with Georgia law, beat Ostman with a belt and a shoe and knocked him against a wall Sunday.

The two hospitals in the city, Fairbanks Memorial and University, said they had treated more than 63 persons for various wounds, including gunshot, cuts and bruises.

Guardmen muzzling the roadblocks had their bayonets fixed but sheathed.

Officers said the number of arrests could easily go into the hundreds. "We've got 'em stacked up all over the place," a jailer said.

The violence broke out after a peaceful march through the downtown section ended at the Augustus municipal building and a small group ripped down a Georgia flag there and burned it.

Sheriff's officers said the 16-year-old prisoner, Charles Ostman, was beaten to death by other prisoners. They said two of the cellmates had been charged with murder.

Sheriff E. R. Atkins said the two, Sammy Lee Parks, 17, and a 19-year-old whose name was withheld in accordance with Georgia law, beat Ostman with a belt and a shoe and knocked him against a wall Sunday.

Negro militants, however, claimed there were reports that Ostman had been beaten by officers.

We also must determine what we want done about the drunken driver, the speeder, the chronic traffic law violator. In other words, who should be licensed to drive?"

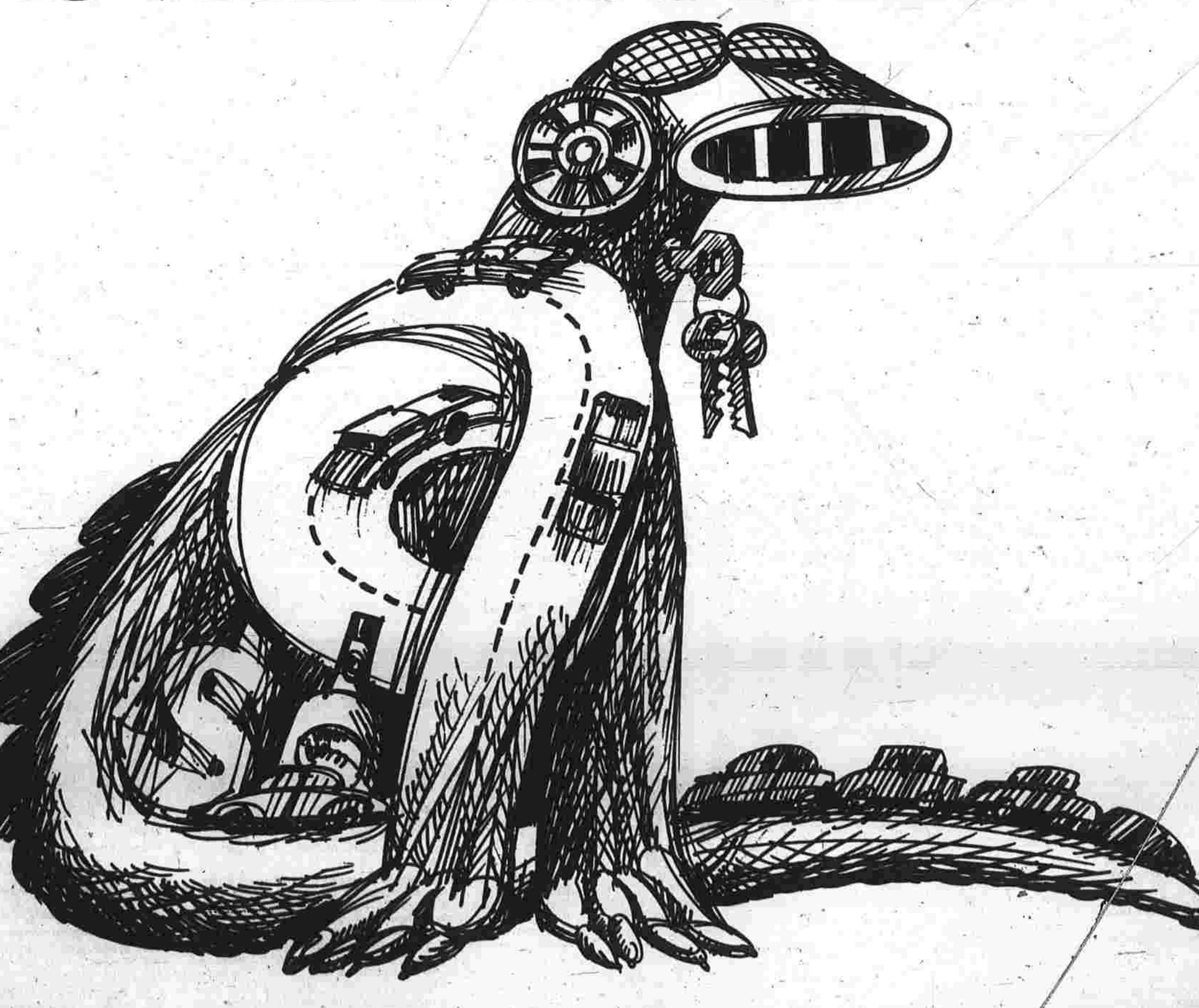

Potter Says Subsidies Needed To Fulfill CRPA Housing Goal

By WILLIAM COE (Herald Staff Writer)

If the Capitol Region Planning Agency's goal of "decent housing for all" is to be realized, government subsidies will have to be given both to towns and to the needy, says Manchester Town Planner J. Eric Potter.

This view is outlined in a letter to Lefroy Jones, commissioner of the Department of Community Affairs, in which Potter discusses several aspects of the problem of housing in the 28-town Capitol Region.

Potter's letter was written in response to the CRPA's recently released "Preliminary Planning Plan" for the Capitol Region. The plan calls for the construction of "new neighborhoods" throughout the region, which would consist of a mixture of housing types, including low and moderate income housing.

The housing plan — in reality a report and recommendations — is generally opposed by those opposing the construction of public housing last week at Drovers School.

Many of the persons who spoke against the plan were from the East Windsor-Bronck Brook area, which is being developed by the CRPA for a "new neighborhood."

"I am tired of hearing the term 'low cost housing,' because inherently there is no low cost housing today.

"If the social need is to be met, the term 'subsidized housing' will have to be used, and this assistance should be available on all counts — to the needy and to the town."

to the subsidized housing may well turn out to be a complex problem, and I sincerely think that this will have to be the responsibility of the senior governments if any real progress is to be made.

"A town responding to the social needs as outlined in the CRPA report, or inflicting and accepting the consequences towards this end, would be faced immediately with two intractable problems — these being revenue and education."

Potter goes on to state that the state's property-tax system is "to a great extent unjust" because it is not based upon ability to pay, nor upon the principle of equal sharing of the tax burden.

Also, the problem of revenue and education are related to a large degree, he points out, citing the following example: "A town allows low-income housing within its territorial limits — say 200 units of apartment construction.

The school system is operating at full capacity. The apartments can easily be built within one year. The estimated school children resulting from the apartments very likely will be only about 200.

Two hundred extra students may have to be accommodated within a 12-month period.

"The town is caught unprepared on two points immediately: lack of accommodation for the 200 students, and lack of funds within the annual budget to provide even temporary accommodation.

"Even a town with adequate funding (if such a creature exists) to build new schools, is caught in a nasty squeeze because, although the apartments can be built and occupied in a 12-month period, it usually takes much longer than this to build a school. Especially if the town is unprepared, site purchase, architectural planning, state approval, referendum, etc. are unpreventable delays and tremendous expense.

"It is quite understandable why towns are not enthusiastic with this kind of development, and even the most zealous proponents of decent housing reflect on the outcome — the immediate problem and the eventual result.

"I predict," said Potter, "that the goals of the CRPA and all concerned agencies will never be reached until funds are granted to match the effort, and that the state must move as quickly as possible in this direction and that the full funding instead of matching funds is necessary."

"The town has been able to absorb the extra burdens which this type of development has caused, but a danger signal has appeared, and from this point on, much caution may have to be exercised.

"A study of the development in Manchester revealed that approximately 1800 units were constructed between 1960 and 1969, and that generally the apartments were not such a financial drain on the town's resources. The ratio of children was a 3 per cent unit, of which 50 per cent were below school age.

"However, in the past 12 months a church group—operating out of 120 low rental units was built, and the apartment picture has changed. This project now contains 241 children at a ratio of 1.77 per unit.

"The impact on education is obvious.

"The ratio of 1.77 children per single-family unit of 3.6, the intensity of development for the apartments generally on the needs of the single-family, there being approximately 14 families per acre for apartments and the single-family average is 2.5 they felted to rise for the first time in 18 months.

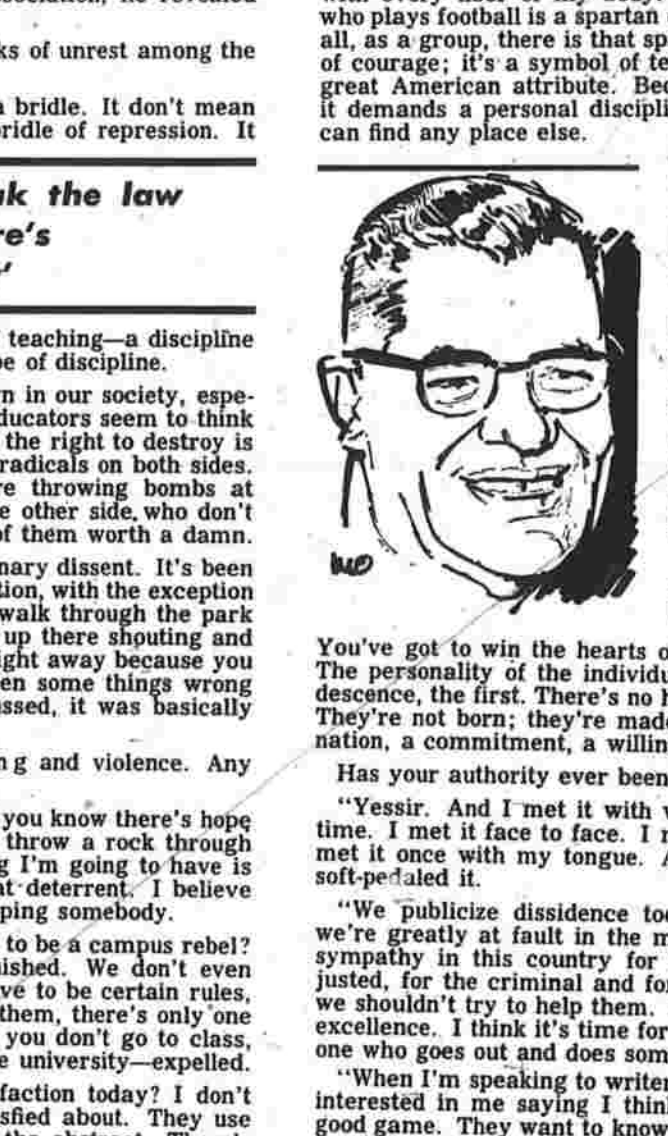

Israeli Jets In Attack On Lebanon

(Continued from Page One)

is just east of the battle zone. Syria is a strong supporter of Arab guerrillas, and military men in Tel Aviv say members of the El Shams sabotage organization, a Damascus-based group, are among the irregulars who are attacking Lebanon, a target of Israeli attacks.

An Israeli spokesman gave the location of the battle zone as the southern slopes of Mt. Hermon. But Lebanese military reports indicated the Israelis crossed the border from the occupied Golan Heights of Syria and drove through rugged mountain terrain in an attack on the Arubou region.

A military spokesman said the raid was the deepest penetration so far into Lebanon. The Lebanese army reported its positions throughout the region were being pounded by heavy artillery and Israeli jets. Bitter fighting raged around the village of Khabze, four miles from the frontier, Lebanese said.

At Patah, most powerful of the guerrilla organizations, reported its men were in action with the Lebanese army all along the front. Israeli infantrymen were backed by more than 100 tanks and landed paratroops at a number of points, Al Patah said.

The operation was in retaliation for rocket attacks by Lebanese-based guerrillas that killed three Israeli civilians and wounded several more. A spokesman in Tel Aviv said.

The action began at 4:30 a.m. and will end by sunset, the spokesman said. A Lebanese communique estimated the Lebanese army at brigade strength. It said the attackers were backed by "several squadrons of jet planes" and heavy artillery fire.

The Israelis penetrated at least four miles into Lebanon and there was heavy fighting around the village of Khabze, said the communique. Lebanese guns shot up two Israeli tanks and disabled two halftracks, the army claimed. Israeli police closed all roads to the area and kept newsmen from the scene. There was no immediate word of casualties from either side.

Several thousand Arab guerrillas have operational bases in the Arubou area, a wilderness of rocks and forest on the slopes of Mt. Hermon. The region has been hit several times recently by Israeli attacks, but the guerrillas are well hidden in deep caves and steep gullies.

The raid followed several warnings from Israeli leaders to Beirut to stop the guerrillas or face retaliation. The guerrillas hit hardest at the Israeli border town of Irbid in northern Golan. It came under three rocket attacks in four days beginning last Thursday. Three civilians were killed.

Defense Minister Moshe Dayan said Israel would retaliate against the guerrilla activity. Following an attack Saturday night, he said that if the raids continued the fate of south Lebanon would be like that of Egypt's Suez Canal city, which has been devastated by artillery fire.

Israeli warplanes strafed and bombed suspected guerrilla bases in southeastern Lebanon Saturday morning for about 90 minutes but the guerrillas attacked continued. Rockets were fired at an upper Galilee settlement Monday night and mortar hit another Israeli community near the Mediterranean coast. There were no casualties.

Between the 1968 Arab-Israeli war and the 1967 Middle East hostilities there was very little fighting between Lebanon and Israel. In December 1968, an Israeli force slipped into Beirut International airport and destroyed 13 airplanes in reprisal for a terrorist attack on an Israeli airliner in Athens.

Swigert Spends Long Weekend 'Back Home'

John L. Swigert Jr. said his trip to the Apollo 13 mission was not a last-minute "fire" course; that neither he nor mission commander James A. Lovell Jr. nor Fred W. Haise Jr., LM (lunar module) pilot, had a feeling of complicity about the routine nature of their mission, even after two successful moon landings; and that, personally, re-entry was not the tensest part of the flight, following an explosion within the spacecraft.

Swigert, who lived at 607 W. Middle Tpk. while a test pilot from 1957 to 1964 for Pratt and Whitney Aircraft, and the first full-time student at Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute Graduate Center in East Windsor, made these points yesterday following acceptance of a Citation for distinguished achievement from the Center at a luncheon reception at the Hotel Sonesta.

H. M. Horner, chairman emeritus of United Aircraft Corp., made the presentation, which states: "In an age when human ingenuity often seems to be overshadowed by logic and precision of technology, your demonstrated creativity during the flight of Apollo 13 is to be lauded.

"Drawing upon the best of his education and extensive training, you innovated when the need was greatest. You improvised with the resources at hand when the procedure was not clear. "I know just how the command module would behave at all times," he said, "and Haise knew the same about the LM." Then, stressing the specialization of each crew member, he added, "When the trouble occurred, Haise thought it was in the command module, and I thought it was in the LM. Although he hasn't been in Houston very much because of post-flight assignments (speaking engagements), Swigert said he believes NASA has determined the mission was aborted because of an explosion in the No. 2 oxygen tank. "But the cause has not been uncovered." Almost eliminating the possibility of external damage, he said, "I have heard the odds are about one in a billion of external damage."

Rules Out Computer
