Board of Education Refuses To Cut \$400,000 from Budget

Ramsdell, superintendent of schools, told the Board of Education that he had studied the budget for several days and reviewed it with members of his administrative staff and finally decided—that a \$400,000 cut would seriously impair the educational program.

Two plans were submitted to the board last night. The first equation budget is still going.

Another board member, Maucrice Miller, reminding the board the motion to approve the recommended \$244,659 cut to stand firmly behind this at Thursday night's meeting. The total budget to be presented will now be \$6,223,872.

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

Television And The Action the London Encounter, Mr. C. L. Sulzberger of the New York Times manages to get quite a column of his own on the difference television may be makng in the affairs of its time.

Sulzberger, for instance, quotes Day as wondering "whether in future a democracy which has uncensored television in every home will ever be able to fight a war, however just. However good the cause self-defense, resisting aggression, or even fighting under the United Nations flag-the brutal details of military action may be there on the television screen to shock and to horrify, sapping perhaps the will of the nation to resist the forces of evil or even safeguard its own freedom."

Just when we were about to call for pacifist cheers for such a possibility, Sulsberger put in his own comment.

"As far as Vietnam is concerned." wrote Sulzberger, "an initial mistake by Washington was to pretend from the start that it wasn't war and therefore to place itself in the position of never tary censorship which the American press had accepted in other conflicts for reasons of military security."

The formula we would suggest, of course, would be to see to it that both sides in any future war had to look at it on television.

Going back to Sulzberger quoting Day, he finds the British columnist holding the opinion that television has helped accelerate the Negro revolution in America, but also to stir up backlash against it. And he cites Day's opinion that the way television was able to get so much coverage and make so much of the Czechoslovakian surge toward liberalism in the summer of 1968 probably "helped create a situation which led in turn to a major act of international policy, the Russian invasion." If the Czechs themselves could have kept quieter about what they were doing, and so much dramatic picturization of them enjoying the intoxications of freedom had not gone out into the world, they might, Columnist Day suggests, have got away with it.

As the strike gathered steam last week, bail hearings preceding the trial afforded the first public glimpse of the prosecution witness, George Sam Jr., who has already entered a plea of guilty to second-degree murder in the case. He testifled he was present during these episodes: Panther member Alex Rackley was accused of being a police informer. Mr. Seale, chairman of the Black Panther Party, visited a New Haven apartment where Mr. Rackley was tied spread-eagled on a bec Apropos of the Panther slogan "off the pigs," that is, "kill the police," there-followed an exchange:

> Seale: "Are you the pig?" Rackley: "No, sir, chairman, I am not the pig."

Seale: "What you do with a pig? A pig is a pig. Off the (obscenity)." Whereupon, according to the testi-mony, three of the defendants took Mr. Rackley to a river in Middlefield, Conn. and shot him. "We were told not to come back unless he was dead," the testified. A second Panthe named as a gunman has also entered a plea of guilty to second-edegree murder a expected to testify later.

Now, none of this necessarily means Mr. Seale and the others are guilty. They are entitled to the same initial presumption of innocence as other delendants facing other charges, and they have skillful attorneys to rebut the accusations. The whole purpose of the trial is to determine whether such testimony is true.

What the strikers at Yale are contending, though, is that there should not be trial at all. In the face of such detailed eye-witness testimony, Mr. Seale and others should simply be turned loose. As Yale Chaplain William Sloane Coffin put it in inciting the strikers, Tell the nation some of us feel this whole trial was a dreadful mistake." Even the simply incredible, we sup

pose, should no longer be shocking when comes to what a good many people will believe about the Panthers, They were willing to believe there was national conspiracy of "genocide" against the Panthers because of charges that 28 of them have been killed by police; though when asked to name names, Panther attorney Charles Garry came up with only 12 even he asserte were killed by police, and in most of these cases he did not deny the Panthers were themselves armed and firing. 

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

He is also Vince Lombardi, legendary coach of the Washington Redskins and the world champion Green Bay Packers before them-a shirt-sleeve leader of young men. He is stern, moral, emotional and idealistic. And he doesn't like what he sees around him.

"It's very easy to break the law if you know there's hope of impunity. I'd like to go out and throw a rock through that window if I knew the only thing I'm going to have is a reprimand. Punishment is a great deterrent. I believe that, and it doesn't have to be whipping somebody. "What kind of courage does it take to be a campus rebel?

He knows he's not going to be punished. We don't even bounce him out of school. There have to be certain rules, regulations and laws. If you break them, there's only one answer-you got to be punished. If you don't go to class, then you should be thrown out of the university-expelled. "Can you understand the dissatisfaction today? I don't know what the devil they're dissatisfied about. They use rhetorical explanations and talk in the abstract. There's nothing really concrete as to why they're unhappy, outside

"I don't think our universities have done a very good job. The college group seems to be an extremely unhappy group. It's not just the war. They're unhappy about going to classes; they're unhappy about taking subjects which they don't think help them in what they want to do. And I'll say another thing. We've got a lot of people today in college who are unhappy because they don't belong there. "Everybody's got a right to be educated, but some people are beyond education. They lack the wherewithal to be educated or they don't have enough drive. You ought to be able to find out in six months in a university if a boy is capable of work at the college level or if he's willing to apply himself. A lot of them go to school right now-hell,

they don't do anything but walk the streets." "The things we forgot to teach as parents are duty, a respect for authority and the development of strong mental liscipline. We've idealized freedom against order. Before I can embrace freedom, I should be aware of what duties I have; I have to respect whatever authority there is, and certainly should have some sort of discipline. 
