Success Not Always Good News ween the United States and Russia at deneva is that they are talks in the wrong context, based on the wrong assumptions, and aimed at the wrong kind

If we are to concede that this basic trouble is not likely to be remedied, we then confront ourselves with a subsidiary question. Do we still want these wrong talks in the wrong context toward the wrong kind of solution to have some

It is a question difficult to answer. The situation in SALT is that Russia and the United States find themselves standing on the brink of an expansion of their armament race with one anoth-

They have sufficient dread of one another, sufficient conscience in their leadership, to want to do something to slow this arms race down, to lessen the burden on their peoples, to lessen the chance they will engage one another in mortal conflict they know this increasingly fragile globe cannot take.

They haven't, however, the alightest intention of translating their mutual dread, their conscience, or their acknowledged responsibility to all mankind into a basic shift away from the nationto-nation basis on which they have arcurately but hopelessly phrased it, on the hope for a nation-to-nation agreement which "enhances the sense of security

That happens to be a goal which cannot eyer be attained within the context in which the two nations are meeting

of both sides."

What should happen is obvious, and yet, so far as one can judge the present mood of great nations, most unlikely. It is that both great nations, instead of trying to seek security in keeping themselves at precisely the same armament weights on opposite ends of a seesaw which keeps slipping its fulcrum first one way and then another, should enter upon a program designed to convert the United Nations into enough of a world government to operate a world police force which would permit the

This much of a world government is day's world, and that kind of disarmament represents the only kind of disarmament which has a chance of eliminating the prospect of recurrent war. If, however, the big nations are not in any mood to head in the direction of such sanity, what do we want to have

happen in SALT? Do we want Russia and the United States to make progress in agreeing to cut down the weight and terror and the expense of the armaments they will continue to build and deploy against one another? Do we believe that such success

SALT might, by developing trust and theory between the two great powers, lead them on toward still more disarma-

Or are we afraid that to take success at SALT as any kind of reassurance would be merely to give us a false sense of security without making any basic change in our situation, which would continue to be one of the inevitable progress of big nation power politics toward war? Might it not be healthier for world thought for SALT to fail, so that we would all be forced back toward the basic solution - that of general disarmament under a United Nations with its own police force?

It's Awards Time

NEW YORK (AP) - This is the season for summing up, for patting on the back and for passing out awards.

In television, preparations are under way for presentation of Emmy Awards for programs, performers, writers and directors on June 7 during an ABC program.

This year, technical and craft awards of little interest to the general public will be presented a couple of weeks from now at an untelevised dinner of the National Academy of Television Arts and Sciences as a means of cutting down the clutter and length of the big show.

Close to 170 programs and individuals have been nominated for industry honors, Here follows the choices of this viewer —who would skip a ballot in a lot of the categories.

NBC's "My Sweet Charlie," a film feature with Patty Duke and Al Freeman Jr., certainly shaped up as the scason's outstanding single dramatic program and the performances of the two leads were superb.

CBS's "Annie, the Women in the Life of a Man" starring Anne Bancroft was original, charming and funny. It towered
