





Coleman On School Integration

One trouble with the passionate way we divide among ourselves on the great sociological issues of our day is that all of us tend to find ourselves paying most attention to those statistics and those surveys which justify and sustain some direction or choice something inside us has already dictated to us.

What this really means is that, when such a sociologist as Dr. James S. Coleman of John Hopkins testifies before Congress, there is no sure way of testing the validity of the statistics he may present or the surveys he may cite.

Dr. Coleman is a crusader on the civil liberties front; he is an activist in behalf of integration; he is not likely, therefore, all his academic poise and calm and studied effort at objectivity notwithstanding, to be spending his time cherishing and citing those statistics or surveys which challenge the directions of his own heart-felt belief.

limilarly, there is no guarantee that of his view, and his supporting statistics or surveys, in accord with their own instinctive pre-judgment of the main is-

All these perils of fleshly unreliability having been conceded, we proceed to observe that Dr. Coleman, in his appear ance before the Senate's new Select Committee on Equal Educational Opportunity the other day, made a very straightforward assertion of conclusions which do not fit well with some of the latest directions of the national debate on racial integration and the schools.

We have all heard the recent concentration on the suggestion that perhaps the only cure for what is wrong with the different kind of schooling different races may be receiving is to try harder to improve the quality of the schooling of the blacks where they are.

What Dr. Coleman says, on the basis of massive study he has made, is that "the most effective educational resource" in any school is the background brought to the school by the children from their home environments.

Going on from there he finds that "If a child is going to school with other children who are performing at a high level, he himself will do better than if he is going to school with other children who are performing at a low level.

or economically homogeneous, the disadvantages a working class or Negro child experiences in his home environment are multiplied by disadvantages he experiences in his school environment."

As for the proposition that the real way to attack the problem involved is to raise the quality of the school in the ghetto, Dr. Coleman claims that study of such experimental schools showed that, even though expenditures for ghetto schools had been doubled, evaluation of the pupils involved could "discern no improvement in learning."

Dr. Coleman has his studies, and his predilections. Perhaps he should at least be allowed to balance the debate back toward where it should be, which is, in our opinion, in a readiness to consider and accept and put into practice a wide variety of potential answere to America's greatest problem. We don't know of any remedy, including that of mproving the schools that are still in the ghettoes, we can really afford to

Congress and Foreign Policy

The efforts of Congress to assert itself in foreign policy express a legitimate and important concern, but the fitful course urged from the anti-war bastions of the Senate won't solve anything. No one has ever doubted Congress' power to rip things into mincement; its problems is to find ways to have a more sus-Beyond doubt the Vietnam war teach

es some weighty lessons about the necessity of Executive-Legislative consul-tation on foreign policy. In the early stages of the war the President never did consult Congress in a forthright way, and Congress made little attempt to assert authority or accept responsibility for policy. One result was that th issuen raised by the war were never faced squarely by either branch, and the conduct of the war suffered badly. Another result was that the issues were never faced squarely by the public, and the unity of the nation suffered accordingly when events turned sour.

This disturbing background gives us a queasy feeling about President Nixon's failure to consult Congressmen prior to sending U.S. forces into Cambodia. We can understand his hesitancy, especially when a Senator recently released on his own initiative secret testimony about U.S. intentions, But we think the President would have been wiser to swallow this hesitancy and trust Congress to behave responsibly. Whatever the shortrun problems, in the long run building some sort of basis for meaningful con sultation is vastly important. By the same token, though, no base

future consultation will be laid if Congress now jumps into the foreign policy process with a raft of hasty and arbitrary restrictions on Ecexutive authority. It is rather late in the day for that, Congress has appropriated fundfor this war for many years, and the President does have responsibilities as Commander in Chief. Restrictions ignoring such reality ring artificial.

The Senate Foreign Relations Commit-

tee deliberated all of one day on its proposal to restrict funds for operations in ambodia, and the result is about what you would expect. The Senators who vot ed for it talk of "gray areas" in the war power, of "going further than ever before" in restricting the President, of its ot applying to current operations but to future ones, and generally in terms that suggest they have not the least idea what it actually means. It is nothing but a Gulf of Tonkin Resolution in reverse. Most specifically, the Committee's action gives us a lot of decisions on details but no clear answer to the question comprising them: What should American policy be toward Cambodia? Is the Com nittee resolution an attempt to say that he United States should do utterly nothing to bolster the anti-Communist government in Cambodia, despite its patent interest in that government's survival? Or is the resolution an attempt to specify limits beyond which the U.S. should not go in pursuit of that interest? We doubt that the Senators know themselves, and until they do no amount of legislation or various nits will allow them to assert themselves in foreign policy in any

The best way to build a meaningful basis for Executive-Legislative consultation is to strive toward some limited agreement between the two on at least the opening premises of general thrust of foreign policy. We think the basis for such agreement is available in the Nixon doctrine, which contemplates some U.S. help to governments like Cambodia but tries to set definite limits on whatever mmitments result from such aid. Congress, it seems to us, ought to be trying specify the conditions on which would cooperate in providing some aid, with a mind to making sure the Executive observes the limits if a clutch comes.

Perhaps the Senate Foreign Relations Committee is unwilling to operate on any such basis, preferring some far more lationist course. If so, the nation deserves a far more articulate elaboration of precisely what course the Committee would follow, and why. Then any differences could be debated and perhaps resolved, and at least Congress would have discharged its responsibility.

Nothing will be accomplished, though, by fiddling with details and leaving large questions untouched. The way for Con gress to assert itself in foreign policy, in short, is for Congress to say something cogent. WALL STREET JOURNAL.



The nine Republican members of the committee filed separate views in which they also said that present Social Security levels were inadequate. In addition to urging addition-

al across-the-board boosts, they recommended automatic cost of living increases and persons who continue to work and pay Social Security taxes after age 65 be given extra benefits. The report said also substantial improvements needed to be made in the medicare system. Medicare now covers less than 50 per cent of the health costs of the aged, it said. The panel recommended strong consideration of eliminat-

ing the deductibles and coinsurance features of medicare, combining the hospitalization and physicians' services parts of the program and dropping the monthly premium now charged for the latter, and including prescription drugs under the program.




