O'Neill Suggests Change In Sanitary Sewer Charges

Director of Public Works William O'Neill is recommending two changes in Manchester's sanitary sewer rules, both designed to bring in more revenue to the sewer department.

Under existing rules, no outlet charge is paid when a dwelling is built along an existing sewer trunk. Outlet charges are collected only when the sanitary sewer is extended to reach the new user.

O'Neill is proposing that all new users be charged an outlet charge when serviced by a sewer trunk already in front of the new construction.

Democrats Rename Mrs. Hammer

Incumbent State Central Committeewoman Mrs. Naomi Hammer of Vernon was re-elected to a third two-year term at last night's county convention by a closely contested 28-19 vote on the first ballot.

She defeated Mrs. Marie Johnson, also of Vernon, who had just entered the race during the past week. Mrs. Johnson, who is black, is vice chairman of the Vernon Democratic Town Committee.

The three-way contest for the post was narrowed to the two candidates after Lt. Gov. Attilio Frassinelli read a letter from the third aspirant, Mrs. Diane Kearns of Hebron, at the start of the convention.

In her letter Mrs. Kearns cited her reasons for withdrawing from the race. Although she was assured of sufficient support to run for the post back in March, Mrs. Kearns claims this delegate support dropped by 50 per cent during the past week. She said she was denied the courtesy of meeting with the delegates in three county towns.

The reason for losing the delegate support was her refusal to "make any promises or be part of any deals to insure a victory in this endeavor."

Throughout the campaign she had stressed her desire to devote her attention to equal town on an "honest and equal basis."

Although the spot of State Central Committeewoman has often been the subject of contention, last night's convention was unusual due to the even split of votes. Even on a vote in favor of a secret ballot ended up in a 21-21 tie.

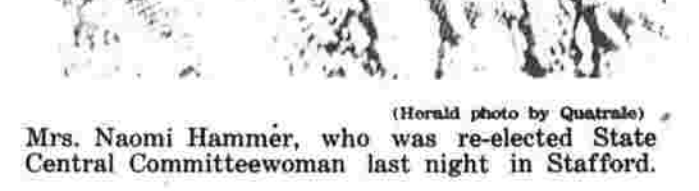
Those involved in last night's contest moved to make the vote unanimous and both groups heard support by State Rep. Audrey Beck and from Mrs. Hammer to heal the wounds of the contest. Somers cast two of his three votes for Mrs. Johnson, Ellington and Somers.

Vernon led the voting support, with six which appear to be letting their delegates vote according to their own conscience. This represents the largest block of votes, totaling 16 votes.

The two unsuccessful candidates for the State Central Committeewoman spot were elected unanimously to the honorary convention positions. Mrs. Johnson was chosen as honorary secretary and Mrs. Kearns as honorary treasurer. This arrangement was apparent last week when Mrs. Johnson was appointed to the committee by the convention.

Appointed to the committee by the convention was Aloysius Ahearn of Bolton; appointed to the committee on Permanent Organization, Alphonse DeCicco of Willington, and to the Rules Committee, Earl Porter of Hebron's three votes; Andover's three votes, and Hebron's three votes for a total of nine. Andover's delegates were also voted in a primary, and also support Donahue.

Vernon and Mansfield appear determined to be voting together, account unanimous.

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The old Aragon Ballroom, for years the home of Lawrence Welk's "champagne music," collapsed in flames early today as a massive fire sweptlick Pier in the coastal Venice.

More than 125 firemen battled the fire on the 2,000-foot pier.

No injuries were reported. Cause of the fire was not immediately known.

The flames also swept onto the pier of adjacent Pacific Ocean Park, an amusement area closed for several years and scheduled for demolition.

The old Aragon, used in the filming outside scenes of "The Shoot Horses, Don't They?" had been converted into a large discotheque, the Cheesha, in recent years. But lately it has been vacant.

Malaysians Are Annoyed With U.S.

KUALA LUMPUR, Malaysia (AP) — This country, long considered a bastion of support for the United States, is currently annoyed with Washington.

Officials speak of shabby treatment, citing a U.S. decision to resume sales of stockpiled rubber and a refusal to grant Malaysia an increased quota for textile imports.

Malaysia accepts no U.S. aid and leaders insist they don't want any, but some officials say the country's attempt to get along by itself got a minimum amount of attention in Washington.

These officials wonder if they have to present an image of U.S. support, like South Korea, or one of radical danger, like Indonesia.

"To remain in the middle ground is to remain an underdog," says one Foreign Ministry leader.

In broader terms, Malaysian leaders seem frustrated by Nixon administration calls for a more independent Asia—but no positive assistance for this relatively stable nation.

"We felt left in the lurch by the Guam Doctrine," a source with access to foreign policy decisions said recently. "We examined the President's declaration for a year now and find no place in it for ourselves."

Malaysia's sympathies in the Vietnam war are less with the United States and its interests than with the people of South Vietnam.

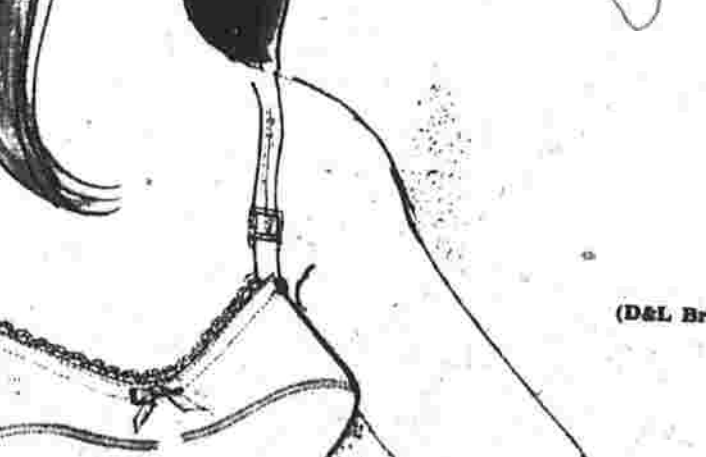

THE FIRST TO FLY. By Sherwood Harris. Simon & Schuster, \$7.50.

play was negotiated by Postmaster General William M. Blount with postal unions after a postal strike last March.

While the Senate bill would take Congress out of postal rate making, the House measure would give either branch a veto over rate increases ordered by the proposed board of governors. The House bill has no provision for a separate rate-making commission.

The Senate bill provides for a 5-member board of governors appointed by the President, subject to Senate confirmation.

In addition, the Postmaster General and the assistant postmaster general would serve on the board.

Although the Postmaster General no longer would be a member of the President's Cabinet, he would be paid the \$20,000 a year received by Cabinet members. Other board members, except for the assistant postmaster general, would be paid \$10,000 a year plus expenses.

The board would be empowered to negotiate wage rates with postal unions and to advise the rate-making commission of the additional revenues needed. If the commission failed to act within 90 days, the Postmaster General could put interim rate increases into effect to cover the added costs.

Middle Students 'In Saddle' In War Protests

WASHINGTON (AP) — Two university professors call them "the middle students," the ones who are lobbying in Washington and working on their campuses against the war.

"The middle students are in the saddle," Roger Hillman, Columbia University professor of government, said.

"They're not going to throw a bomb. But still they're going to do something. They're not just going to sit by," Howard Wriggins, also a Columbia professor of government, said.

The two men were in Washington for a foreign policy seminar, but the talk at a Tuesday press conference inevitably turned to the thousands of students visiting congressional offices these days.

A group from Cornell University has taken a house near the Capitol. They're asking their parents to stay with them June 24 for a "Parents, Too" anti-war lobbying effort at the Capitol. There's a Dartmouth Lobby and a Princeton Lobby.

The "Parents, Too" project is being sponsored by an adult coalition and some 30 student organizations working here to bring an end to the Vietnam war. The university professor emphasized that there's a wide range of action in the student movement.

Students are becoming more perceptive and the radicals have learned that just being noisy doesn't help very much, Wriggins said.

A third professor, John S. Eades, former U.S. ambassador to the United Arab Republic, said "the question of student self consciousness is a global phenomenon" which takes different forms in different countries.

In the United States, he said, the students have been asked to fight a long war. They have been engaged in the service of society," he said, "and they say if they are going to be engaged in the service of society they're going to have something to say about it."

Eades said the youth movement is not simply an antiwar protest, but is "a search for a role."

Hillman said that since the extension of the war to Cambodia he has visited about 16 campuses of all sizes and leanings. "I've been at campuses where radical students are shouted off the stage," he said.

The middle students, he said, are deeply opposed to the war but they want to work within the system.

"The extremists are frightened; the extremists are in total disarray," he added.

Hillman said he wouldn't say what would happen if the Indo-China war continues to be escalated.

In his prepared symposium speech Hillman predicted that if the war continues, the youth that have to fight it will "increasingly refuse to fight and their opposition will become increasingly violent."



Rig Flips, Ties Up Traffic on Highway

A large tractor-trailer rig hit a guard rail and rolled over early this morning on the Wilbur Cross Highway near the Manchester-Vernon line, snarling westbound traffic for miles in both directions for nearly three hours.

The crash was a contributing factor in two other accidents that occurred later in the resulting traffic jam, as drivers attempted to thread their way west toward Hartford.

No injuries were reported in any of the mishaps, but arrests resulted in all three cases, according to state police. Men from both the Hartford and Stamford Springs troopers responded, but Manchester police were not called.

Hartford trooper, which investigated the truck crash, said the vehicle, owned by the Continental Baking Co. and driven by George Mullane, 44, of Bayshore, L. I., was headed east toward 9:15. It veered into the center divider and flipped, partly covering both lanes and a truck.

Peking-Sihanouk Alliance Frustrates Soviet Union

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS Soviet fury over Red China's initiative in Indochina leaves the impression that the Russians feel they have been outsmarted and fear that Peking stands to be the long-term and perhaps only beneficiary of the events in Cambodia.

Though they may plan escalation from the difficulties Cambodia has created for Washington, the Russians may look upon the turn of events in Indochina as a disaster of sorts for Moscow, too.

While the Kremlin hung back indecisively after the overthrow of Cambodia's Prince Norodom Sihanouk, Peking acted swiftly to capitalize on the situation. The result as of now is that Peking has a large section of the Asian Communist movement—along with Sihanouk—echoing its cry for "protracted war."

If the American and South Vietnamese incursions into Cambodia happen to extend the war and make it less susceptible to solution by negotiations, it could be just what Peking wants. Perhaps the situation now really is less susceptible to political solution, Sihanouk is denouncing the suggestion, hinted at not long ago by the Russians, of a new Geneva-type conference on Indochina. The "protracted war" cry also seems to dim chances for talks.

So long as it did not involve them too directly, a protracted war could help the Red Chinese to parry Soviet attempts to nail down Moscow's influence in Southeast Asia.

Peking makes no secret of its claim to lead a "third world" revolution from which it would exclude the Soviet revisionists. Mao Tse-tung has used the Cambodian events to stake out Chinese claims in Asia and to thumb his nose at Moscow.

Sihanouk is active as if Peking owned him. His speeches in Peking, the base of his government-in-exile, sound like a replay of Mao's as he pledges Cambodia to "protracted war."

Nations "who love freedom and justice," says Sihanouk, have recognized his government. This suggests that those falling to recognize him are no better than the "imperialists."

The Russians and Soviet-camp nations "who love freedom and justice," says Sihanouk, never recognized the mercurial Sihanouk and pro-ventive. My trust him even less now that he appears to be locked into Mao's back pocket.

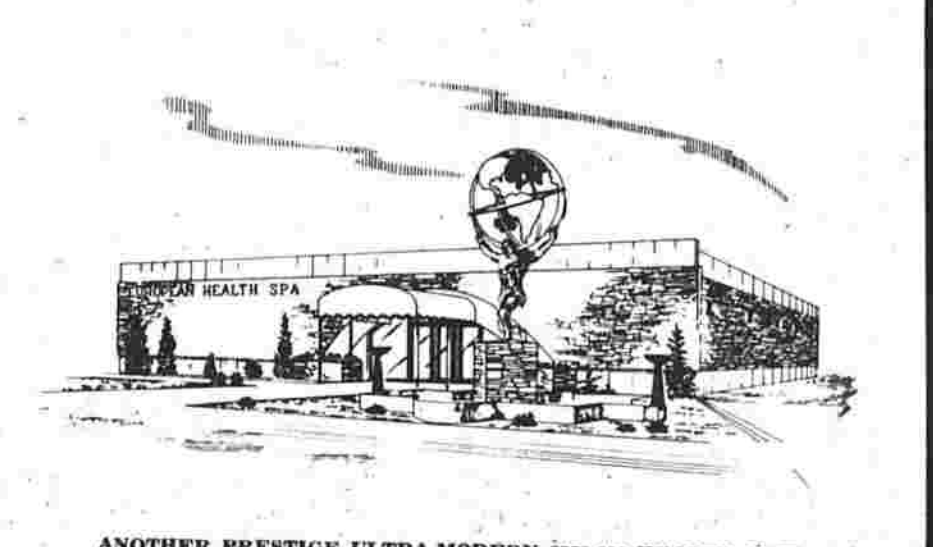

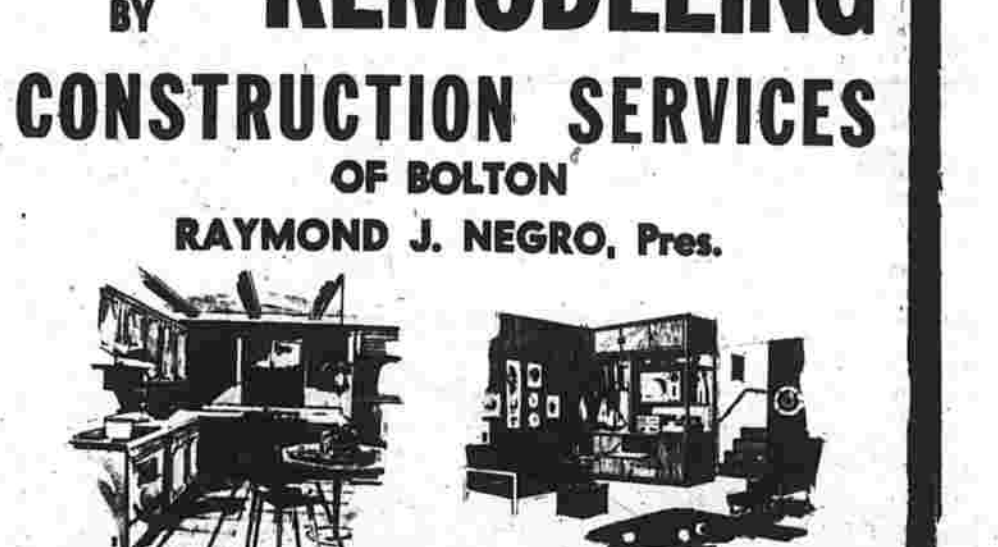

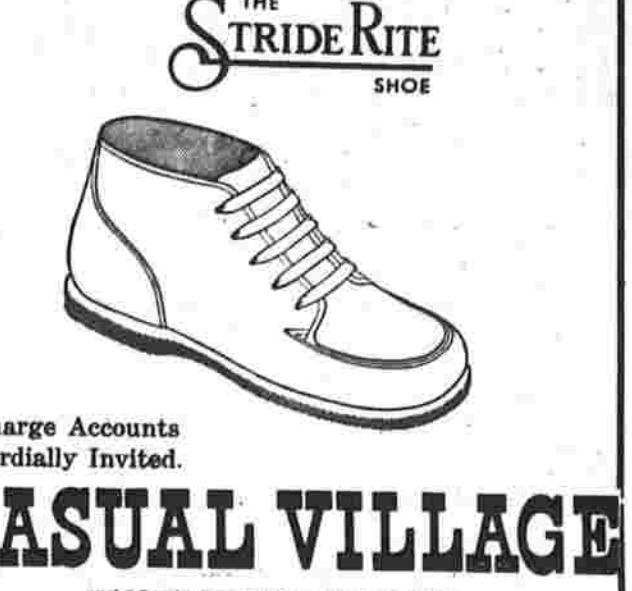

'Speedy Trial' Decision Leaves Questions Open

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Supreme Court has again cautioned the states they must enforce the constitutional right of defendants to be brought to trial quickly.

But the ruling, contained in the sixth amendment and applied to the states by the court beginning in 1961, remains largely unenforced.

The court's latest involvement was a decision Monday that up-set the holding conviction of a Florida truck driver who was not tried until 7 1/2 years after arrest.

Three years ago an American Bar Association study group said the delay obviously prejudiced the delayed defendant of criminal defendants before Robert Dean Dickey, since two witnesses died and police records were lost or destroyed.

Moreover, Burger said, Dickey's three times as long to be tried and was turned down before of- ficials, under pressure of Florida courts, finally decided to prosecute.

Crowded dockets, a lack of judges or lawyers and other factors sometimes make delay inevitable, the chief justice said. But the delay is for the convenience of the state and is pre- judicial to the defendant, it is intolerable and impermissible.

The ruling only begins to re- solve a serious legal problem, Justice William J. Brennan Jr. noted in a concurring opin- ion that the court has left sev- eral questions open.

For example: Does the right to be tried quickly also involve a right to be indicted quickly?

And: Does a convicted man have to show he was prejudiced by delay, or a long delay out- ficient ground to invalidate the conviction?

"Last week, two New York bar associations asked the U.S. Circuit Court in New York City to guarantee all criminal defend- ents a trial within four to six months of arrest."

They presented figures that showed 2,800 indicted or arrest- ed people had been in jail, awaiting trial, for more than three months as of last April.

The city bar association said the circuit court should throw out on appeal any case where the trial was delayed longer than four months.

All About Bulgaria

SOFIA, Bulgaria (AP) — fertile Bulgaria has remained a land of cars were driving over the hills of Lenin Boulevard on their way back from a Sunday picnic in the nearby mountains. In the ballroom of the glass-and-aluminum Sofia, the capital's most modern hotel, dark-suited men bowed to kiss the hands of female guests at a gala dinner. At a bar, Boyan Radner, 1968 Olympic wrestling champion, was talking to one of the first Bulgarian-licensed Mustangs, an over-a-cocktail known as the Harvard.

The average Bulgarian, cars are still far out of reach. A dinner at the Sofia could cost a worker four days' pay. So would a round of Western drinks, preferred fare at the bar. When occasional dots of affluence are distinct in this Communist country, it boasts the fastest growing economy in Eastern Europe, largely fueled by rubles and dollars—both shelled out by Moscow.

In the heart of the Balkan peninsula, once a crossroads of Europe, Bulgaria is emerging as an economic and ideological showcase of the Kremlin. It is ringed by two NATO members, Turkey and Greece, and two Communist dissenters, Romania and Yugoslavia. But Bulgaria has been an unflinching partner of Moscow. Unlike other Soviet allies, it has never presented an armed or political challenge to Moscow's power.

Prussian sympathies blending with innate conservatism determine its orthodox political position. For more than 1,000 years Russians and Bulgarians have used the same Cyrillic alphabet.

Almost 100 years ago, Russian armies helped Bulgaria throw off Turkish domination; monuments built in gratitude to Czar Alexander II can still be found in World War II Bulgaria, then ruled by a king of German descent, was an ally of the Hitler Reich but did not declare war on the Soviet Union.

A keen sense of realism, developed in 500 years of Ottoman rule, also plays a key role in Bulgaria's politics. "I'll never pay to be in the opposition," is a motto of Baj Ganju, a shrewd village trader and still hero of a still popular 19th century book.

The Central Committee building in Sofia, is this: "In 1968, the Czechs had 1,000 Soviet tanks moving into their country—and we imported 10,000 Soviet cars." Western diplomats believe that since the war, the Russians have poured some 1.8 billion rubles, officially worth \$2 billion, into industrialization of their most faithful ally. Part of it evidently was hard currency to enable Bulgaria to buy equipment in the West.

Quest for the tourist dollar has eased contacts at seaside resorts. Growing numbers of holidaymakers from Western and Eastern Europe enjoy the sun at the "Golden Coast." The country attracted a million visitors each from both East and West last year.

Authorities ban the sale of Western newspapers. Bulgaria will be barred from nudist colonies planned on the Golden Coast. The state-operated gambling casinos are off limits to all East Bloc visitors.

For most of the 4.4 million Bulgarians, tourism is still a one-way street. But a growing number of engineers and other specialists work abroad in developing countries. Part of their pay is in hard currency, which they return that is usually spent on Western cars.

Cars are also cherished take-home trophies of Turkish laborers, who cross Bulgaria on their way back from jobs in West Germany. Relations with Turkey, once Bulgaria's No. 1 enemy, have steadily improved in recent years. Members of the Turkish minority who have relatives in Turkey are eligible for repatriation under a 1968 accord. Greece, whose military regime is often denounced in Western Europe, rarely draws critical comments in the Bulgarian press, and trade with Greece has increased.

The United States remains the pet target of propaganda. Still diplomats don't expect a repeat performance on the 1967 incident at the U.S. Embassy. Or show the American flag. He was stopped by barred Bulgarian police and politely sent home.

Using the liner's heavy duty winches, the men finally dragged her back to her berth.

Housewives Beware

Relaxed Summer Living Prime Time for Crime

BY VIVIAN BROWN

AP Newsweek's "Who's Who" Summer is a prime time for prowlers and crimes committed by them.

Good weather may throw the most vigilant people off guard. Many housewives have become victims of the friendly looking face that appeared at the door asking to make a telephone call.

An unlocked door makes the prowler's job easier. Many families don't even have a key to their house nor do they have locks on their doors.

An intruder who wants to "make a telephone call" may be a prowler who is surprised that you are at home, and housewives should be aware that a prowler can be a dangerous criminal.

A law enforcement bulletin of the Federal Bureau of Investigation points out that the danger of the lurking prowler is the element of uncertainty—the unknown. Whatever the circumstances usually determine the course of his actions.

He may be only a Peeping Tom, but this may lead to murder.

He may be a thief and end up a child molester.

The psychopathic prowler is one who has no remorse, building up inside and from which he must find release by movement. These inner tensions he seeks to ease by moving about may lead to burglary, theft, or even rape. Circumstances determine his actions.

He frequently is satisfying inner compulsions to take anything he can find. The articles—bicycles, garden equipment, Christmas tree lights—may be of little value to him, but the mere act of taking them satisfies an inner compulsion, a need, a hunger.

The burglar is another type of prowler; the booklet points out. He may be expert or novice. The expert usually has a house checked out, familiar with exits and entrances, works according to a carefully laid plan, and will do anything to avoid encounter with the owner of the house. But novices may kill or injure in their fear of arrest.

The robber intends to take by force anything he sees out to take, and usually at the point of a knife or gun. He will even use a club or noose.

One type of robber is a mugger.

Data System To Give Order to Legislation

HARTFORD, Conn. (AP)—From the days when a committee chairman could prevent a bill from being passed just by leaving it in his pocket, the Connecticut General Assembly has moved toward a fully automated system of filing, printing and keeping track of bills.

It wasn't too long ago that only one copy of each bill was available—and whoever had physical possession of it controlled destiny.

And as recently as last year, the governor was being asked to sign bills which had amendments written in by hand. Rumor has it that Gov. John Dempsey was so offended by the sight of some of these documents that he refused to sign them until they had been reprinted.

But that will be a thing of the past if the data processing system planned for the legislature proves to be as effective as International Business Machines says it will.

No more will copies of bills be unavailable because the printer hasn't caught up with the volume of legislative business. Even the journals and bulletins and calendars used by the state House and Senate will be printed by offset methods through a system using coded tapes.

It has been a long haul for Mrs. Lucille Dow, the veteran assistant to the clerk of the House, who has been fighting for more national ways of doing things for many years.

"I had to fight to get them to make two copies of each bill," Mrs. Dow recalled Tuesday. "Then I had to fight to get three copies."

But progress has been made since the notorious winding of the 1965 session when certain key tax bills were "lost" and could not be passed. They turned out to be in the pocket of the House chairman of the finance committee, and a special session had to be called to enact them.

An even stranger scene occurred in Colorado not long ago when a state legislator trying to prevent the passage of certain bills was cornered in a room of the state capitol, climbed out a window, and was chased along a ledge while he tried frantically to eat the precious documents in his possession.

Newsmen got the whole crazy scene on film, and it has served as an instructive lesson for state legislators at national conferences.

What's Next After Bikini?

LOS ANGELES (AP)—A fashion history lesson: Today's bikini may be tomorrow's museum piece.

The system of drafting, filing and keeping track of exactly how bills they are in the legislative process—in committee, awaiting action in one chamber or the other—would be completely automated.

It would, in fact, be the only completely automated legislative data system in the nation, according to Mrs. Dow and IBM.

The State Bond Commission last week approved the \$97,000 to pay for the system. It only remains for the contract to be signed, in order for the work to proceed.

Alabama Governor Race May Hinge on New Voters

MONTGOMERY, Ala. (AP)—The June 2 gubernatorial runoff primary between Gov. Albert Brewer and former Gov. George C. Wallace could hinge on how 30,000 newly registered voters cast their ballots.

Attempts to predict the outcome must also try to assess how many of an estimated 800,000 voters who abstained from the May 5 primary will turn out, and who will receive the votes of the third-place finisher.

Brewer ran ahead of Wallace, the 1968 third-party presidential candidate, by 11,763 votes May 5, but was forced into a runoff because he fell far short of a heavy turnout and "we're going to make an all-out get-out-the-vote drive."

Two Washout Accounts Approved by Directors

The Board of Directors in unanimous action last night, appropriated a \$3,660,000 washout fund to the current General Fund budget, and a \$700,000 washout item to next year's General Fund budget.

The \$3.66 million, to be carried over into next year as an account receivable from the Federal Improvement Reserve Fund, is for low-income sanitary sewer projects. It will be financed by federal and state grants, as they are received, and by contributions from the Utilities District and private parties, for their cost share of the entire project, estimated at \$5.96 million.

The \$700,000 is to cover an anticipated \$100,000 deficit in the current year's tax collections, and to pay outstanding bills pertaining to the sewer project. It will be financed by short-term notes in the same amount. The notes, to mature Aug. 15, will be paid by late tax receipts and by federal and state grants, as received.

Bids on the short-term notes will be opened Monday in the Municipal Building.

Town Manager Robert Wells said last night that the directors may be asked to authorize \$900,000 more in short-term notes when the \$700,000 bids due. He said that payments to the contractors are averaging about \$300,000 per month, and that federal and state payments may not be received until the fall.

Wells last night explained the \$5,658,792 cost of the town-wide improvements. He said that, item by item, the cost will be \$3,321,997 for the Secondary Treatment Plant, \$111,202 for the Center Relief Trunk, \$483,298 for the Northeast Interceptor, \$965,812 for the Interceptor Extension, \$129,621 for the Oldcott St. Connector, and \$66,984 for the Rt. 8 Sanitary Sewer trunk.

Wells said that about 25 per cent of the water will be treated.

WASHINGTON — The crews of the last three Apollo flights to the moon have seen flashes of light that scientists say are cosmic rays penetrating their spacecraft and physically passing through their eyes.

"It has to be dark in the spacecraft to see them," said Apollo 12 Commander Charles (Pete) Conrad, "but on seeing the flashes you feel nothing. No pain. Nothing."

While massive doses of cosmic rays would damage the eyes or brain, the three Apollo crews said they saw them in their eyes were not hit with enough cosmic rays to have been harmed. But some scientists worry that the cosmic rays might threaten future astronauts on long flights in deep space, like a two-year voyage to Mars.

"It's possible the particles could destroy small numbers of cells on prolonged exposure," says Dr. Charles E. Barnes, a radiation physicist at the NASA Spacecraft Center, "but we have no information to tell us what the hazards are. Most scientists feel it will be no problem."

Terrorists Launch Wave Of Robberies in Argentina

BUENOS AIRES (AP) — A spate of recent bank robberies and attacks on military posts is being officially attributed to terrorists' efforts to get money and arms.

Such crime has become common in other countries of the Western Hemisphere, but it is new in Argentina. This country's 23 million people were free of terrorism from 1962 until the middle of last year, and knew nothing of politically inspired bank robberies.

The interior minister, Gen. Francisco Imas, has blamed "subversive extremist groups" for most of the incidents. Twenty young people arrested on charges of planning or carrying out bank robberies are being held as suspects.

More than 40 major robberies have been reported this year, noting \$1.6 million. There have been a dozen assaults on police stations and military posts, apparently to obtain arms and uniforms.

In March the Argentine Liberation Front, a militant leftist organization, reported it kidnaped a Paraguayan consul. He was released unharmed even though the government of Gen. Juan Carlos Onganía became the first in Latin America to refuse to release political prisoners as ransom for a kidnapped diplomat.

But the administration opposes the amendment as an unacceptable restriction on the power of the commander in chief.

The effect of the amendment, said Senate Republican leader Robert F. Griffin, "is to let the president decide whether to send troops to Cambodia and whether to support the border at the end of April."

Republican leader Hugh Scott said GOP leaders do not want to see a Senate action on the Cambodia issue—but he indicated there may be several amendments likely to be passed in the next few days.

Woman's Age: Her Secret?

May a woman lie about her age? The question is not always a frivolous one. On the contrary, serious courtroom battles have been waged over this very issue. Suppose, for example, that a bridegroom finds out after the wedding that his bride is older than she said she was. Does her deception give him a right to an annulment on grounds of fraud? Generally, no. Annulments are indeed granted for fraud, but only when the fraud involves something truly fundamental to the marriage relationship—something more vital than mere age. The reason is that the law prefers, whenever possible, to preserve a marriage, not to destroy it. One judge has said: "Should the courts grant annulments just because women concealed their correct ages, the floodgates of litigation would be thrown wide open. In another kind of age deception, a woman motorist was haled into court for giving three different ages—all in the thirties—on three different registration statements. Here too, however, the court decided that her misstatements were not momentous enough to make her guilty of an offense. The court pointed out that the main purpose of the insurance company calculations is risk on the basis of the woman's life expectancy, which in turn depends primarily upon her age. In most cases, an understated age on an insurance application will mean that the beneficiary of the policy will collect proportionately less insurance. In fact, if the misstatement is due not to coquetry but to plain dishonesty, the entire policy might be held null and void. The law may condone vanity, but not cheating. One of his favorite inscriptions was found on a headstone in Vancouver, Wash., which marked the grave of a man named Haine. The stone says, "Haine Haint."
