The pilot, Capt. Dale C. Hupe, was wounded in the stomach when he tackled the gunman as

FBI agents stormed the TWA The hijacker's right thumb was alightly nicked by a bullet.

It was his only injury. Arthur G. Barkley, 49, a husky truck driver from Phoenix, Ariz., whose tax appeal was rejected by the U.S. Supreme Court only a few weeks ago, was arrested—bare-chested and bloodied—for air piracy. The copilot, Donald Salmon-son, 33, Overland Park, Kan,

said, "I saw his gun go off-and we jumped him immediately." Salmonson said Hupe was knocked back into one of the seats and the hijacker "fell on him and had his gun in his stomach. That's when I got the gun and wrenched it away."

Hupe was listed in good condition at a Fairfax, Va., hospital. Not a passenger was hurt. Salmonson said he was convinced the gunman had meant to crash the plane and kill everyone aboard even if he had been paid the ransom.

Barkley was given \$100,750 as the first payoff to a hijacker in air history after the captured jetliner landed here on its flight from Phoenix. But the sandy-haired hijacker

"You Cannot Stop Technology" As we all really know, we are neve going to repeal the Manhattan Project, stifle the reaction which began in that subterranean squash court out at the University of Chicago, or unlearn the process by which we added Hiroshima to the list of historic places. If there is to be any cure for our i

ventiveness, any safety against our scientific progress, it is not going to be found in prohibition of any arbitrary

It is scientific news from Europe which underlines all this for us once

It is news of what seems pretty certain to be an engineering break through in the business of uranium enrichment by what is still a top secret gas centrifuge method.

If this breakthrough comes, it will have the immediate result of making atomic power cheaper and more available to everybody, and ending the dominance in the atomic fuel market the United States now holds.

Furthermore, the process involved would offer such a cheap and easily concealed source of nuclear power that be maintaining its own secret store of of other perfections passing by.

One of the European scientists now engaged in this project has this to say about it

"Anybody could develop a gas centri fuge if he applied enough money and brains to it. You cannot stop technology. There can't be any real safeguard against secret centrifuge development."

At present, this experimentation is being carried on as a cooperative effort on the part of British, Dutch and West German scientists, and the reason it was organized as a three-nation project was the theory that it might be easier to control the new discovery if it were under tri-nation control than if it were something being done by some individual nation. And those inside the project are hoping that, if it proves successful, its precious but highly dangerous fruits can be shared with as many nations as possible under some common agreement which will regulate

In that instinct to share the knowledge and the power with as many nations as possible, in the hope that they will then make and somehow observe and enforce sensible laws among themselves, lies the possible kind of cure and control for our technological knowledge and progress and power which should, obviously, be the target for the policy of nations which want to choose a world of survival.

But before nations will submit themselves to such sane disciplines, there must also come, from somewhere, that tempering of the human spirit which surrenders the right to kill, by whatever

A Special Logic

The latest appearance of the special logic we have been applying to the war in Southeast Asia was in the Dole mendment, which sought to soften the potential Senate restriction on the Presiient's freedom of military action in Cambodia by putting in a proviso that the President could command as he pleased as long as any Americans were being held prisoner in Cambodia.

The amendment failed, perhaps beause even the Senators couldn't accept its full logic.

The logic it offered seemed to be this; hat if anybody took and held Ameri

cans prisoner in Cambodia, that was an inexcusable and illegal act of villainy on the part of an enemy.

There would be, on the other hand, no question whatsoever of the virtue and legality of the American action by which Americans were taken into a position where they might conceivably be taken prisoner by the fortunes of war.

This is the same curious logi by which it is considered criminal for any enemy of ours to have what is called a "sanctuary" on the territory of some non-belligerent nation, while we ourselves use and employ a whole string of sanctuaries in support of our operations in Vietnam.

And it is also the logic which seems to make it an unforgivable act for the anti-aircraft gunners of any enemy country to fire upon our planes when our planes fly over them.

Underneath these various examples of the curious assumptions we make, there is one basic presumption. It is that we have some kind of high right to move our men and our planes wherever we choose, for our own high national purposes, but that other people have no right to decide that their own national necessities require that they resist us.

What it really means is that we have managed, these last few years of the war in Vietnam, to evolve a highly ingenious kind of doubletalk which ends up denying the rights of belligerency to our enemies, but not to ourselves All this illustrates, of course, the

chronic inability of human nature- and national nature - to see itself as other

Probably the worst danger our special logic involves is the danger that we ourselves should really begin to believe it.

Probate Court Criticism


Once again the state's Probate Court system is coming under attack. This ime it is from Prof. Robert Whitman of University of Connecticut Law School, who investigated the system at the request of the Probate Court Administrator, Judge Jay Rubinow. Several of the complaints merely repeat what the public, the bar, the courts and the General Assembly have known for years. The solution is getting someone to do something about it The biggest problem involves the state constitution. Under the constitution, the udges are elected for four-year terms. e only qualification which is stipulated that they must be "electors." Justices of peace are also elected, but

ualifications for their holding office Many judges, particularly in the small towns, are not even lawyers. Lawyers who do business with the Probate Court in any substantial way admit they often are asked to give the officials of small courts advice on how to handle matters. Court procedure, court hours and re-

cord keeping were all criticized by Prof Whitman. He was also critical of the fact that the probate judges who are lawyers continue with their private practice. As long as their private practice does not include probate matters there does not appear to be any conflict of interest. However, there was criticiam by Whitman of the fact that some judges conduct court in their private law offices. It would seem the legislature could easily remedy that by requiring that court facilities be provided by the district or the district be dissolved and included in an

Probate judges insist there is a need, informality in much of the work they Such an atmosphere can be main tained in a court office as well as the lawyer's personal office. It can be main tained at the same time that reasonable court procedures are followed, that records are properly maintained, that the court maintains reasonable office hours. As far as qualifications are concerned it may be necessary to revise the state constitution on the election of probate judges. 



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

Two Youths **Bound Over** In LSD Case

Two youths accused of giving LSD to a 15-year-old girl were ordered bound over to the next criminal session of Hartford Superior Court, after probable cause was found yesterday by Judge Henry Goldberg at (a hearing in Manchester Circuit Court 12.

Companion charges against two other boys arrested in the case were dismissed by Judge Goldberg, who ruled that the state had failed to present sufficient evidence to implicate them in the alleged incident. Bindovera were ordered for Paul Stankiewicz, 17, of 22 S. Adams St., and Kenneth Hack, 16, of 127 Deepwood Dr., both on charges of giving of a con-trolled drug. Additional charges of risk of injury to a minor were nolled. Both were released on a promise to appear. David Mumford, 16, of 15 Trebbe Dr., and Scott Thresher, 16, of 76 Scarborough Rd., were the two against whom charges were dismissed.

A fifth boy charged in the case, Ronald J. LaBonte, 17, of 52 Fulton Rd., was not present at the hearing. He was granted a continuance to June 18 earlier in the court session.

All five had been arrested after police investigation of an incident early in April at Manchester High School. A soph-omore girl allegedly took LSD, became frightened, and went to the school nurse.

The girl, unidentified because of her age, took the stand and testified that she and a girlfriend had been in a car with LaBonte, Hack and Thresher the night of April 2, and that as the result of a discussion between LaBonte and Hack, they "went to look for some acid." She said they then drove to the Stanklewicz home, where

one of the boys talked to Paul briefly, and that about 20 minutes later Stankiewicz met them in his car at the Green. She said they later obtained a plastic bag from Stankiewicz,

trailer truck owned by the company after he had followed it for more than a mile on Interstate Route 95, according to the ourt's written decision.

The trooper reported that the exhaust from the truck was so thick it "engulfed" his cruiser. He described it as "a big billow ing smoke, which had a heavy, sooty, oily odor."

The company was found guilty in Circuit Court of maintaining a truck that violated the state law prohibiting "excessive fumes or smoke." The conviction was appealed by the company, which argued that th law was too vague to be en forced.

Drawing on related decisions. the appellate court rejected the omplaint. 'Every motor vehicle when in normal operation necessarily makes some noise, emits some smoke and permits gas or steam

to escape to some extent," the decision stated. But "we think any ordinary and interested person would have no difficulty in determining," it concluded, "whether o not an excessive and unusua noise or offensive or excessive exhaust fumes accompanied the operation of a motor vehicle."



This is the portion of a pond which is most affected by the bacteria count influx by bathers using the facilities, the health department official explained. Dr. Marjorie Purnell, town health director, noted the pond remained suitable for swim-

ming all of last year. Problems sometimes develop during August when the wate level is lower and not enough water comes into the pond to "flush it," she explained. This occurs when there is no overflow over the dam. **Funds** Not Jeopardized

Despite reports printed elsewhere, the open space funds for the purchase of the Crandall's Park area are not jeopardized by the current situation.

The contract to be signed by the Board of Selectmen for state funds was delivered personally to Thifault yesterday by Richard Wallace of the Department of Agriculture and Natural Resources. Wallace sat in on yesterday's meeting.

According to Wallace the town could expect to receive a check for the state's share of the open space funds in August or Sep-Once submitted to the state

by the selectmen it will be approved by Commissioner Louis Gill of the Department of Agriculture and Natural Resources and then forwarded to the State Bonding Commission.

Wallace explained the contract should be placed on the bonding commission's agenda for either the July or August meeting. It will then take three to five weeks to process the check after the commission's approval is rendered.

Nation's Campuses Quiet; **Memo of Dissent Lingers**

Also awaiting disposition are the cases of 15 students arrested Feb. 19 on charges of destruction of property and vandalism following a window smashing incident in East Lansing.

Earlier, a student was convicted of assault and sentenced to three days in jail in connec tion with a protest against a General Electric Co. recruiter and two students were arrested on charges of attempted arson after a fire at the school. The

arson charges are pending. At Indiana University, eight students were arrested for disorderly conduct. One was charged with disobeying a police order. All were fined \$50. Later in the year, five more students were arrested. All were charged with disorderly conduct and one with assault. Two of the five cases are pending, charges in one have been dismissed, one student was fined \$100 and an-

The arrests have clogged court calendars in some areas. The Columbus, Ohio, Municipal Court, normally closed Memo rial Day, stayed open to try to catch up. The court reported 900 arrests stemming from campus disorder since April 27, but was unable to determine how many were Ohio State University students. Charges ranged from curfew violations to rioting and most were still pending.

essed by the municipal court, In California, at Stanford University, there were 52 arrests in a series of anti-ROTC demonstrations that began April 1. Of these, 44 were for misdemean ors. None of the cases has come to trial.

Still pending also, are charges against most of the students arrested at the University of California at Los Angeles, Seventyseven students were arrested in several protests.
