He also had this thing worked out where he wanted to blow up the Brooklyn Bridge with a garden hose. He wanted to hook the garden hose up to a gas line." When Demmerle was asked how many others were performing similar labors, he replied: "Quite a few." For Messrs. Hoffman, Rubin and Co. there is the parallel, tormenting inquiry: now many of those whom they believe they have inspired to absorb their "life style" are provocateurs acting out as-

Thus, the elements of water are common on the moon. And if not in the free form, water may exist in crystallization in rocks. However, many scientists insist that water is present in the free form. Such water would probably derive from rocks heated to high temperatures, perhaps by radioactivity, as in the case of the earth. Thus one
