Bugbee also offered a detailed explanation of the village's peneficial resources, and in the process of this explanation came up with a rather facinating architectural history of Vantage Point

Sugbee described the vilage's "unique vantage point in opographical setting, lying intricately below a steep hill while being bordered on sides by steep slopes." This physical situation has protected he Main St. area from "strip commercialism and urban development to a large degree, while it has kept the lower par of Main St. in a distinct old New England setting."

As to its man-made advantages, Bugbee said, "It is selfevident from Coventry's Main St. and surrounding area that the town's architectural style has not been as conservative as most older towns in the Northeast. These towns have been persistent with their Late Colonial traditions and forms until almost the middle of the 19th Century. Coventry, on the other hand, pursued a faster growth pattern in population and prosperity, resulting in a variety of Greek Revival forms during the 1830's and 40's. This earlier de velopment of Greek forms was due to the growing trade in the textile industry and - persisted the late 19th Century

The Court And The Objector

The precise issue the Supreme Court religious training and belief" is uncon-

Since it definitely establishes a connection between what happens to an individual in this country and his connection with an established religion, the layman's guess would have to be that the conscientious objector law is uncon-

The Supreme Court, in its tortured and troubled ruling Monday, avoided direct confrontation of this issue. Instead, it let the litigant in question

have the advantage of conscientious

objector status without believing in God or adhering to any organized religion. It did this by conceding and arguing that an individual can have "beliefs which are purely ethical or moral in source and content" which can "certainly occupy in the life of that individual 'a

place parallel to that filled by God." Rather than hold the law as written to be unconstitutional, the Court chose to interpret it so that none of its results could be unconstitutional, whatever itsoriginal language might remain.

In this phase of its decision, the Court, last Monday, was merely reiterating and broadening a previous ruling it had handed down in 1965, when it also said conscientious objectors if their beliefs were as important in their lives as a be-Het in God would be in the lives of

While the Court, Monday, succeeded in sidestepping a real answer to the question of constitutionality, it still has facing it a question of interpretation which could have much more practical

This is the question of whether, having permitted some broadening of the motivation inside the conscientious objector, the Court is now going to give him the privilege of selecting among wars, so that he can object to one war in particular instead of to all war in both general and particular.

Should the Court, in the case it may soon rule upon, say that a conscientious objector has a right to make his own independent moral evaluation of each individual war as it comes along, and determine his willingness to fight in it on the basis of whether or not he personally thinks it a wise, necessary and moral war, then what the Court would be ruling would be that no one could be drafted for Vietnam or sent to Viet-

nam against his personal choice. This would leave the war-making power neither to the White House, where some people think it has been abused. nor to the Congress, where some people think it ought to be located in reality as it is by the Constitution, but to the individuals who would have to be the soldiers in any war that was to be

It is difficult to see, in theory, although the Court may educate us when it gives its ruling, how, once the right and status of the conscientious objector has been broadened, it can still be restricted from using its ethical and moral judgments

to distinguish among individual wars. On the other hand, once the right of a nation to exist and to guard its own existence is conceded, no national court is going to be happy to strike from its hands the authority and claim on its own citizens which are considered traditional and necessary for the preserva-

tion and protection of its sovereignty. In its ruling Monday, the Court gently sidestepped the precise issue of principle offered to it for decision. In its next ruling, it may feel itself required to

principle entirely, and give a ruling bas ed on considerations of sheer national pragmatic necessity, in which it finds that no nation can afford to give its individual citizens the right to determine which of its wars may be just.

Thinking Might Be Catastrophic Who can withhold sympathy from that college president who, announcing his esignation, said he found it important to give himself some "time to think?"

That, it might seem to all of us, is what college presidents ought to have time for. It might even be what they are paid for. Of all people, they should have those moments in which they can look at things so quietly and dispassionately the only sound is that of the slow, gentle distilling of wisdom which takes place inside their low-pressured

Having conceded this, and having dutifully regretted the fact that a college president who wants to have time to think these days will have to resign if he wants to find it, could we then go on and speak for everyone who is not a college president, and who never will be, and who, nevertheless, would great-

It might be dangerously catastrophic For if all of us ever stopped for a minute really to think what we are doing, what guarantee is there we would ever resume doing it?

Timely Words At Harvard Someday, perhaps months or years from now, we may look back upon our time of disquiet and point to June 9, 1970, as the date when the nation's colleges and universities began to regain contro of themselves. For it was on that date that a man holding a singularly distinguished tob in American higher education eloquently defined the true nature of

Such a definition by such a man has been badly needed. The comments of Nathan M. Pusey, president of Harvard University, are not new in themselves. But they are extraordinarily important because they go a long way toward returning rationality to the handling of

There are such things as fad and fash ion in the world of education and, as in so many walks of life, the many take unspoken direction from an elite few. While it is too soon to judge the effects of Mr. Pusey's remarks, the nation is justified in hoping that those remarks represent a new style that will win wide acceptance among college administrators and facul-

In an address at Harvard, Mr. Pusey recalled the tactics of the late Sen. Jo seph R. McCarthy. The Senator successully capitalized on the fear and uncertainty that troubled the nation in the early 1950s; he attached liberal sectors of society and was amazed himself at how much like jelly his targets often

Mr. Pusey compared the behavior of today's radical leftists with that of Senator McCarthy, who energetically assaulted universities, especially Harvard. "But this time," said the Harvard president, "the attack comes not from the outside but from within, from ex tremist splinter groups of the New Lett made up of students and I am corry to acknowledge-also some of the faculty who would like to see our colleges and

universities denigrated, maligned, and "They insinuate, distort, accuse, their aim being not to identify and correct real abuses, but always rather by crying alarm intentionally to arouse and in flame passions in order to build support for 'nonnegotiable demands.' Clearly the old McCarthy technique is at work

And then, putting his finger on what is the central reason campus unrest has persisted. Mr. Pusey declared: "It is my onviction that deceitful talk and the ten encies toward coercive action could no have made the inroads they have in academic communities in recent years had all of us to whom they are deeply repulsive been more ready to oppose them." The attention Mr. Pusey's comments received from the media in itself says something about how far down the garden path academics have been led by the radicals. Whatever the excesses of the New Leftists, they do mean so well - or such has been the rationale of too many

campus authorities. The Harvard president is noted for his restraint, and that quality of his personality enhances the impact of his remarks, Mr. Pusey is not immensely popular with Harvard undergraduates ecause he has refused to become jelly come jelly before Senator McCarthy. He has seen no reason to forfeit the integrity of a university that was founded long b fore the nation was, even though such forfeiture would have appeased - for a

time-the extremists. The nation is now looking for the display of similar strength at other campuses, strength and a restoration of lerance and civility. The day will come when we will all look back upon 1970, even as we now look back upon the early 1950s, and remember the courage and common sense of the Harvard president.

Within hours after her husband died, Grace received a long distance telephone call from his "Please hold off the funeral until I get there," he said. But Grace made him no promises. In fact, the funeral was already over by the time the brother arrived. Shocked and angered, he filed a damage suit-

against Grace, demanding compensation for the mental anguish she had inflicted upon him. However, the court turned down the brother's claim. Whatever his moral rights may be, said the court, he had no legal right to be present at the burial.
