CHICAGO (AP) -The Amer ican Medical Association has promised a broad legal and legislative battle against a plan by the Food and Drug Administra tion to include a health warning in packages of contraceptive

But FDA Commissione Charles C, Edwards defended the use of a lay language warn ing about oral contraceptives as "communications insurance policy" in the best interests of the patient.

The AMA's House of Delegates, meeting Tuesday at the organization's 119th armual con vention, approved a resolution attacking the FDA plan as "a dangerous departure from present practice."

Dr. Edwards announced on June 10 that the health warning should be included with packages of the pill within 90 days. The warning would point out possible dangerous side effects, such as an increased risk of blood clotting. The AMA resolution asserted the proposal "intrudes on the

Edwards, speaking to the Midwest Pharmaceutical Adver-tising Club, told the drug industry it would be "englightened self interest" to supply more useful information about drugs in its medical communications

"I think," the FDA chief said, "we tend to lose track of the fact that you are not selling new cars or TV sets, but rather you are selling products to professionals whose only reasons for being is the health and wellbeing of the people." As for the required warning

on contraceptive pills, he said: "Our action was intended to supplement rather than intrude upon the normal doctor-patient relationship, and indeed in our judgment need not intrude. 

Good Deeds By Stealth?

There is, of course, some kind of reason underneath the strange compulsions

seem soft, or reasonable, or unnecessarily civilized, or even to have too much regard for the possible consequences of its own acts of war.

Under the compulsion of such a rule, the Nixon Administration, or its milidepartment, could never possibly behind it, or because, for that matter, it had proved to be militarily inefficient.

tween two administration purposes First, it removes the cessation of defoliation from any possible classification as a soft policy, or as an admission of failure for the program itself. Second, it adds luster and weight to the administration wish and necessity to prove there have been rich returns from its Cambodian decision. If it takes all these planes away from defoliation to carry out the spoils, the spoils must have been

There is a possibility, of course, that some suspicious characters may express their skepticism about such a neat story. So, to prove that there is nothing

wrong with defoliation, and nothing soft about our command, the public is told that the defoliation will probably be resumed, after we have completed our pull out of Cambodia. It will probably be resumed, we are told, but perhaps on a very limited scale. The real chances may, then, be read

this way: That the Nixon Administration has decided, for soft ecological reasons, to phase out the long-controversial defoliation program in Vietnam, and that it has used the story about needing the planes in Cambodia as the cover for its good, civilized act. But we had better all reserve our pleased congratulations, for fear we might cause the Nixon Administration to exercise its option of going back to defoliation full scale. It might, some day, want to do that for sudden emergency military purposes in Vietnam. Or it might feel forced to do it in order to keep the ecological doves out of its hair here at home.

There are some good deeds and good decisions any administration concerned with giving itself a practical, hard-boiled public image would just as soon not get too much credit for, If you have to turn soft, you do it by stealth.

Hopefully, the Cheshire study can be a major step in the right direction. -

By SYD KRONISH The small village of Oberammergau in the Bavarian Alps has become world famous as the home site of the religious Passion Plays, Every 10 years this play with the individual to family.

To honor the 1970 performance marking the 86th time the Passion Play has been given in Oberammergau, the West German government has issued a special 30-pfennig stamp, re-ports the World Wide Philatelic Agency.
