

HARTFORD, Conn (AP) - An unprecedented three-way primary for the U.S. Senate nomination appeared today to be in the offing as the Democratic state convention buckled down to its main business of picking a state ticket for the fall election. There were reports that the

party leadership, including gubernatorial candidate Emilio Q. Daddario and State Chairman John M. Bailey, was working to narrow the primary to two contenders. But there was doubt whether anyone could Keep State Senate Majority Leader Edward L. Marcus from getting at least 20 per cent of the votes-the amount needed to qualify for a primary.

The rumors were that the leadership, which reportedly preferred Alphonsus J. Donahue for the Senate nomination, would rather see Donahus in a two way primary against the Rev Joseph Duffey than have him fight both Duffey and Marcus. Marcus has been claiming enough support to carry the con vention on the first or second ballot, and has generally been regarded as second only to Donahue in delegate strength However, members of Donahue's and Duffey's campaign staffs were saying Friday night that Marcus's following had been over-estimated.

Marcus's best chance for winning a place on the ballot is a three-way primary, involving himself, Donahue and Duffey Donahue's best chance is in a two-way primary, against either Marcus or Duffey.

Also in the running is former Congressman Donald J. Irwin. but he is viewed only as a pos sible compromise candidate in the event of a deadlock. 



Whole Houseful of Memories

Amy Lowell wrote about "lilacs watching a deserted house settling sideways into the grass of an old road." The lines might nearly describe the home in South Manchester at Spring St. and S. Main St. partially hidden behind a tall thicket of lilacs, and whose foundation has settled so that much of the wall paneling no longer sets plumb. Referred to by historians as the Col. Ireamus Brown house, it is now owned by Mrs. Henry A. Tiemann Jr. (Her usband died about two years ago.)

This house is far from deserted, as Amy Lowell's poem suggests. As Mrs. Tiemann says, "This is a house that has always been lived in and used." It has housed church meetings, a tea room, and normal family life. As Col. Brown was possibly one of

the founders of the early Baptist Church in Manchester, it is logical to assume that meetings were held, in this house prior to the building of a church in Highland Park. The "Minister's Tavern," it used to be called when the Browns entertained church representalives, passing through of preach.

Central Chimney An addition was added about hundred years later to the original

gambrel roofed portion creating an ell. The Tiemann house is typical of the central chimney plan used extensively in Connecticut in the late 1700s and early 18th Century. The low ceilings and quite small door-

ways are evidence that the house was not built for people of great physical stature. However, it is a cozy and comfortable home." The Tiemanns have maintained the early American antiquity of the home

and have furnished it with antiques of the period. Mr. Tiemann, with his keen eye for a gem in the rough, discovered most

of his antiques dirt cheap at auctions, sales, or, in one instance, thrown on a junk pilé outside a barn for discard. Mrs. Tiemann tells how "he would

bring home the awfullest looking things but he'd work at a piece, repair it if necessary, and refinish it so it shone like new.'

It was not that the Tiemanns were so fond of antiques; they had to have furniture, and this was the best that they could afford at the time. Today their fine antique furnishings with the soft patina of age would be the envy of any collector.

The front door opens into a small hall which opens on one side to the "parlor, and on the other to the dining room Directly in front is a very narrow stair way leading to the second floor, A coat closet under the stair conceals a hidden panel which, when removed, discloses a secret compartment, reportedly used to hide runaway slaves when Negroes escaped from the South through 'underground railroad."

Many who have attended South School will recall visiting this example of historical interest.


To the left of the entrance is the din the "keeping room," which was used as the family room. It has been beautifully preserved with its polished wide floor boards and dark red wall paneling over the fireplace. The other three walls are white.

The joinery work at one point in the paneling is asymmetrical. Mrs. Tiemann's comments was that "perhaps the carpenter who measured the wood had been drinking. Or perhaps he didn't want to waste the board by cutting it off. The perceiver is left to his own conclusion. It has doubtless been the subject of many a conversation as the family sat in thumb-back Windsor chairs around the pine and maple dining table while dining from fine old china which is displayed in an old hutch. Elegant desserts .were served from

"moon and star"-pressed glass bowls and compotes, and eaten with Tiffany silverware, - the latter, wedding gifts (See Page Five).

Beyond The Automatic Rejection The mere existence of any new proposal for peace in the Near East is always a signal for a whole series of cautious and almost automatic re-/ sponses, in which the various parties to the struggle there make haste to make it clear that they are not going to be the first to go along with it.

Thus the new American peace effort -to our mind the most creditable foreign policy effort which has been made by the Nixon Administration and actually far more important, perhaps, than whatever goes on in Vietnam-has been met with enough automatic rejections, from various parties to the Near East struggle, to suggest that it is dead

These various parties having taken their stands, for the public record, the next process for American diplomacy, and for Russian diplomacy, if it is cooperating at all, and for United Nations diplomacy, is to try to find out, by quiet discussion behind the scenes, which rejections are fierce and firm, and which are merely the surface cover for some private willingness to discuss. And if there are rejections which are fierce and firm, there has to be consideration of how to deal with might be to adjust the peace move itself in an effort to make it more acceptable to the parties involved. Another way might be to try to bring more pressure on these parties to accept the plan as it is.

What one has to hope for, behind the scenes, is that there will be no quick, final negative decisions rendered there, but that the situation is kept patiently open so long as hope can be kept alive.

In no other world situation, since World War II, has the issue of the survival of civilization itself been more clearly at stake.

The obstacles, to this survival are formidabler The front line belligerents have an exchange of hatreds sunk deeply into one another. They are snared deep in territorial and population tangles. Each is gripped by fear which is visceral, and not to be eliminated easily by processes of reason, even should these processes appear on the_ scene. And the outside world has hardly kept itself pure enough to be sure it really has moral force of its own to bring to bear in the situation. And the outside world's great powers have too much trouble giving up scheming against one another to permit strong hope they can somehow manage to scheme together to serve their own real best interests in the Near East.

Against all these difficulties, the alternative keeps showing itself more clearly day by day, in the continual escalation of military action. This is what will continue to grow, and grow, if no one manages to get anywhere with some chance for peace.

The Nixon Administration is making the effort that civilization has to make, if it is even to pretend to have a claim on the title of civilization.

It is to be hoped that, after their first eager, compulsive effort to prove they are not about to make any unilateral concessions to anybody, even to the cause of world survival, all the parties in the Near East can be brought to a serious exploration of what reciprocal concessions might be possible, were there an equal will toward peace on all

When Cost-Cutting Backfires

When an ill-fated candidate for Gover nor of Connecticut once made the unusual pronouncement that there was a limit to the amount of efficiency any state government could afford, the kindly thing to do was not to question his sanity, but to assume that his tongue had somehow got his words and thoughts

But the Wall Street Journal, the other day, in a survey of the present discomfort of some industrial concerns which went all out for efficiency during our long boom period, showed what the Connecticut politician may have had in

"During the long boom," said the Journal story, "companies installed costnew facilities to meet the constantly rising demand for products more efficiently. But now many of these firms are finding that demand is so weak they can't operate their new facilities at an efficient rate. As a result, they are finding that instead of contributing to profits as planned, their new plants and facilities are eating away at earnings because of higher depreciation charges, interest and other fixed costs, such as maintenance and property taxes."

The Journal quotes a bank economist as follows?

"When you invest in new equipmen o cut variable costs, such as labor you usually end up with higher fixed When volume falls off the fixed osts continue and unit output cost rises rapidly." The profits frequently fall faster than they would with less investment in cost-cutting equipment.

other words, in certain recession circumstances, cost-cutting becomes too expensive for some enterprises to af-

Eventually, if the companies survive and get back, some day, to the kind of production they thought they were going to have forever, they will reap dividends from their investments in ef-

Only the next time they are riding the crest of a boom and considering new capital outlays they may, possibly, remember that cutting costs seldont does, really, and turns into added liability when times go slack. If they remember, and have learned, which peop seldom do, they will proceed moderate ly, even toward efficiency.

How Important The Moon?

Many persons I've talked to, both here and in other countries, regard the Apollo moon landings as the most importa public event of their entire lifetime. I have some inclination to agree with that, but I might say privately, that my wife and I consider the birth of our five children as much more important and much more mysterious events.

The Apollo missions, to me, are straightforward though immensely difficult tasks. They do, however, yield relatively little in the way of fundamental understanding of nature. They are not'scientific in that sense. There is a long-standing controversy

as to whether a manned space craft is a better way to conduct science in space than an automated, commandable space

I'm sure there is no simple answer to that question.

As the general romance and entertainment value of manned flight tend to wear off a little, I think this question will be attacked in a thoroughly pragmatic way Some persons have compared the land ing of the Apollo 11 on the moon to the landing of Columbus in the West Indies. personally believe that is essentially a laise analogy.

I think it might properly be compared to the explorations of Amundsen and Perry and Byrd in the Arctic and Antarctic, or perhaps Lindbergh flying the Atlantic.

These are great achievements, heroic achievements, but the general potential of the moon in its relationship to humar oh a large scale is by no means obvious to me, I don't think any competent person has found a significant, econom-

c, human use for the moon. Despite the more or less negative remarks I've made about my judgment of the future of manned flight as an imporant method of conducting science - and echnological enterprises in outer space. there are nonetheless some extremely powerful constituents in the country who favor this.

These are mostly from the aeronauties industry and the allied industries that go with aeronautics.

There is a general feeling, somehowmostly intuitive at this time - that the development of space flight is very important to the general future of the Inited States in the same sense that the development of the aircraft has been. Again, I think this is fundamentally a false analogy, but it is one that is widely used by quite influential people. For example, there's an actively proosed so-called space-shuttle system to ly perhaps a flight a week, going up to the moon. There's a plan to have a man ned space station with approximately 25 men in it, doing various tasks that are undefined at the present time. All these things may very well happen. here's no doubt in my mind that they
