Nixon Panel Raps U.S. Health Care

WASHINGTON (AP) — A operating health institutions with the federal government were involved in developing the nation's health care system. The chairman of the advisory committee, President Walter McHenry, announced some form of universal national health insurance. The panel suggested a second committee to consider possible national health insurance legislation that could be introduced in 1971. The administration already has incorporated some of the panel's recommendations in its own legislative proposals, notably government-run health care for the poor and a small-scale trial of federal health insurance for welfare recipients.

ALBANY, N.Y. (AP) — The state's new abortion law goes into effect Wednesday, and nobody is quite sure what to expect. The most permissive abortion law in the country, the statute will allow a woman — with the consent of her physician — to obtain an abortion up to the 24th week of pregnancy. That's it. There is nothing about residency requirements where the abortion is to be performed, the reasons for abortions, or the cost.

Apollo 14 Moon Flight Now Scheduled for 1971

WASHINGTON (AP) — Executive changes costing \$10 million will be made to speed up future Apollo spacecraft before men can be launched to the moon again, the National Aeronautics and Space Administration said today. As one result, Apollo 14 will be launched no earlier than next Jan. 21, NASA Administrator Thomas O. Faine said the Senate space committee. This marks a further delay of nearly two months for the Apollo 14 flight scheduled to land three men on the highlands of Fra Mauro. The flight, first scheduled for October, was postponed to Dec. 7.

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Nixon Pledges Renewed Attempts To End War in All of Indochina

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Nixon, reporting on the end of all U.S. ground operations in Cambodia, pledged today that "we shall renew our efforts" to end the war in all of Indochina. Without elaborating, the President said he seeks "genuine negotiations" both in Paris and for all of Indochina. The Paris talks involve only the Vietnam segment of the conflict and Nixon did not indicate what further steps he might take to seek an expanded settlement that would also embrace Cambodia and Laos.

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The occasion for Nixon's pronouncement was passage of the deadline for the exit of all American troops from Cambodia. Nixon's declaration, however, still faces substantial problems which will enable us to pursue our policy with greater confidence. Looking ahead, he said in a 7,000-word statement: "With American ground operations in Cambodia ended, we shall move forward with our plan to end the war in Vietnam and to secure the just peace on which all Americans are united."

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Tolland County Politics GOP Convention Slated On Senate and the House

Republicans take over the convention spotlight this week, with conventions to select state representatives, Thursday night, and the district convention, Friday night.

A two-way struggle for the GOP nomination for state senator, re-election to a fifth term in the 38th District (Toll. Legislature) between Vernon's King represents the 4th District Town Chairman Thomas Carruthers and Manchester's John Powers, will be determined tonight in Vernon's town hall.

The convention will be called to order at 8 p.m. in the Memorial Building, Rockville. A total of 41 delegates from the 13 town towns will participate in the convention.

Carruthers is reportedly in the lead, although Powers is optimistic about his chances.

The Vernon political leader has served seven years as town chairman, four years on the Board of Representatives and lost an election for state representative to Gerry Allen two years ago.

Powers is retiring an director of placements for the United States Senatorial nomination, if selected, to devote full time to the role of a state legislator.

The victor of tonight's convention will face Democrat incumbent Robert Hooley of Ver-

non, who scored an upset victory for the post two years ago. Hooley was endorsed by acclamation two weeks ago.

Seeks Re-election

With only two days to go before the district convention, incumbent 48th District State Rep. Robert D. King of Tolland, re-election to a fifth term in the 38th District (Toll. Legislature).

A prominent figure in the late Legislature, King has had no problem in being re-elected to his previous terms, and is expected to win again this year.

He has been an ardent supporter of GOP gubernatorial challenger Wallace Barnes, and for this reason has wanted to seek re-election to the Legislature.

Democrats have endorsed William Patena, a farm equipment salesman from Somers, as their candidate for state representative to run against King.

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Rail-Bus Test Basis For Possible Grant

Somewhere in Bloomfield Friday afternoon, two wide-eyed young boys probably spent hours trying to convince some of their friends that they had seen a bus riding on the old railroad tracks that are not used too much anymore.

The night would have been surprising to anyone except approximately 40 local, state and federal officials and interested businessmen who attended Friday's demonstration of the Connecticut Company's rail-bus on the Hartford to Bloomfield line.

The Connecticut Company's bus is one of several similar buses being used experimentally in other cities demonstrating a country as a possible new form of mass transit.

The Hartford Company's bus is a 1968 General Motors vehicle, 40 feet long and designed to hold 81 passengers. It was bought last year by the Connecticut Company.

The bus, driven by Horace Bromley of East Hartford, Connecticut, made its last stop at Central Road in downtown Hartford then proceeded down Pearl St. to Asylum Ave. and on to the tracks of the Bloomfield spur.

The 2 four-wheeled bogies which had been hidden under the Union Station in Hartford, paid close attention to the condition of the tracks, some of which were being replaced.

The front bogie supports the weight of the bus and the side rods which propel the bus during rail use.

The small units which are not as wide as the bus and only four feet long are made by Fairmont Railway Motors Inc. of Fort Washington, Pa. A attendant the demonstration and explained, among other things, over a safety feature of the bogie which prevents derailing.

Once the transition from road to rail was made, Joseph Spring, superintendent of Penn Central Railroad, took the driver's seat, gently pressed the accelerator, and the bus was on its way to Bloomfield.

"Hey Sam! Why are you yelling sideways?" someone yelled to Samuel Knoll, deputy commissioner of transportation in charge of the Bureau of Railroads and Motor Carrier Services, as the bus built up speed. Despite this early kidding around, there was a serious consideration of the conditions of the ride and the need for the Bloomfield, Manchester and Hartford area for this type of service.

Harford is one of six major cities competing for a federal grant to test rail-bus service. Joseph R. Ellen and Frank Graves represented the federal Department of Transportation.

Several items of equipment were returned to Washington with their report which will be turned over to the Department of Transportation in Cleveland, Minneapolis, Miami, Philadelphia, and other cities under consideration for this grant.

In speaking of the possibilities of Hartford getting the federal grant, Graves said the situation in Hartford was "as good as any" that he has seen tested this form of mass transit.

Several items would have to be cleared up, though, if Hartford were to receive the grant. Adequate signal devices at the crossing along both the Bloomfield and Manchester lines and the need for upgrading the tracks.

The weight of the rail bus is not enough to assure that the blinking signals along the tracks will be activated every time a bus passes. The buses will receive the signals up to 85 percent of the time, but this still is not safe, he said.

Sheinwold on Bridge

EVEN STRONG TRUMPS MAY NEED PROTECTION BY ALFRED SHEINWOLD

There is sometimes more than one way of developing a trick in the opponents' long suit, and the best way may depend on the strength and length of your trump suit. In today's hand, South mistakenly thought his trumps were too strong to need protection.

Both sides vulnerable. Opening lead—Queen of Diamonds.

West led the queen of diamonds, and declarer covered with dummy's king. This forced East to win with the ace and threatened to set up dummy's ten if East returned a diamond.

The trouble was that South couldn't afford to discard when East returned a diamond; South was sure to lose three aces and couldn't give up a second diamond.

South had to lead clubs sooner or later, and then East could take the ace of clubs and lead his last diamond. West's jack of diamonds took the setting trick. South made his mistake at the very first trick. Instead of playing dummy's king of diamonds, he should play low from dummy. This allows West to win the first trick with the queen of diamonds but effectively stops the diamond attack.

If West continues with the jack of diamonds, declarer covers with the king to set up dummy's ten; and if West continues with a low diamond, dummy plays the ten to set up the king. In either case, South ruffs out East's ace. The difference is that dummy then has the top diamond, so that South cannot be forced to ruff another diamond. South can afford to ruff once but not twice.

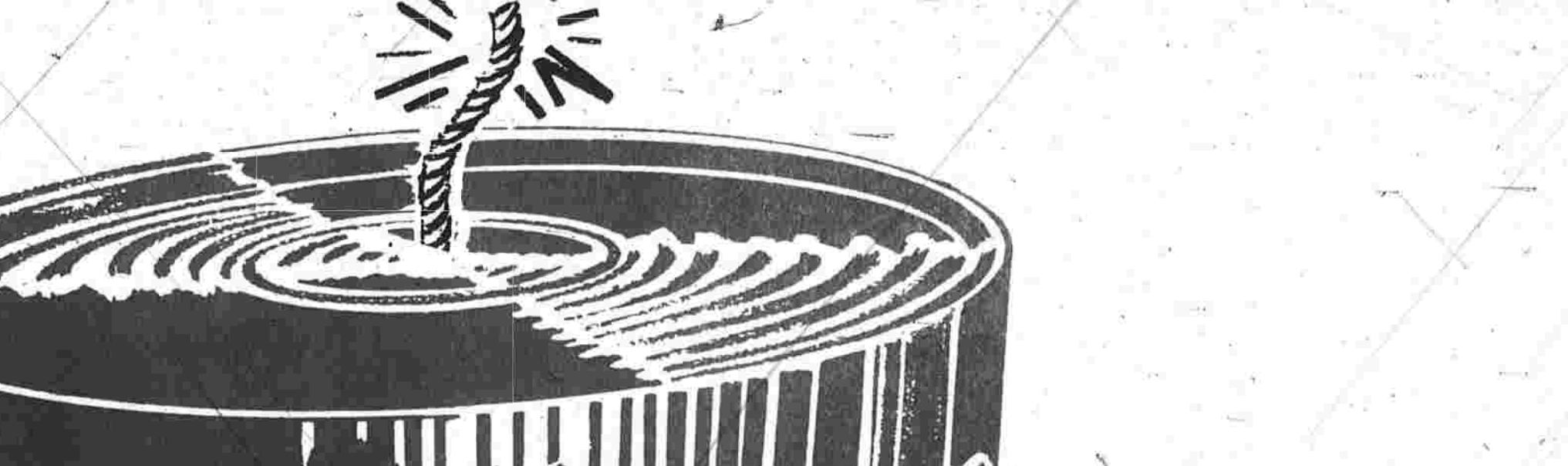
As dealer, you hold: Spades, A-5-7; Hearts, K-3; Diamonds, A-9-8; Clubs, A-5-2.

What do you say?

Answer: Bid one diamond. This hand is a borderline opening bid, but few experts would dream of passing a hand with three aces. The second problem is which suit to bid, and here experts differ. The diamond opening leaves you an easy rebid of one spade if partner bids one heart.

Joint U.S.-Mexican Pot War Shows Initial Good Results

WASHINGTON (AP)—The remote sensing device, the Justice Department says it is operation will be well under way by the end of the month.

Contract Let For Water Main

A town of Manchester contract has been awarded the Sandman Construction Co. of North Brookfield, Mass., for constructing a water main in Center St.

The main will run from W. Center and Cooper Sts. easterly into Center St., and then to about 300 feet east of Broad St., just west of the railroad overpass.
