



Captured Cambodian Cache From the field in Cambodia, in a news story from Peter R. Kann of the Wall Street Journal, comes what would be the proper scenario for a light comic opera version of the whole war in Southeast Asia-if, that is, anybody could ever forget the seriousness of the conflict and the lives being lost in it daily and thus have freedom to enjoy its comic aspects. The scene for Correspondent Kann's story was the provincial capital called

Correspondent Kann first came into contact with these rifles when he talked with the commander of the South Vietnamese troops who had, the day before, chased the North Vietnamese out of the

Kompong Speu. The plot involved 4,025

The South Vietnamese commander told Correspondent Kann how his troops had swept into town "killing 148 enemy troops and capturing 4,025 weapons. The weapons, he proudly reports, had been turned over to the Cambodian Army in a ceremony the day before."

Correspondent Kann's account next encounters the 4,025 weapons when he is talking to a Cambodian general at the latter's headquarters outside the city. This is the way Correspondent Kann tells the rest of his story;

is a large bonfire, being fed with rifles. Why is the Cambodian Army, so short of weapons, burning rifles? 'Frankly,' says the general, 'these are the 4,025 rifles presented to me yesterday by the South Vietnamese.' " 'The guns,' says the general, 'were

not in fact captured from the Vietcong. South Vietnamese troops actually had taken a Cambodian arms warehouse. The warehouse contained 4,025 ancient weapons. Many were shotgung and hunting rifles dating back to before World War I, and no ammunition was available for any of the weapons. 'It is all

most unfortunate, says Gen. Fernandez. "The general had graciously attended the Vietnamese ceremony the previous day and had accepted the gift of 'captured Vietcong weapons' with profuse thanks. 'I let the Vietnamese make their propaganda. I understand such things,"



It was perhaps symbolic of the whol mreachable nostalgia of the day down washington that the Rev. Billy Graham, in one of his exhortations to that magnificent turn-out of Americans who would like things to be again what we fancied they were once before, should call upon us all to demonstrate that we "still proudly sing 'My country! 'tis of thee, sweet land of liberty."

Until 1931 the chores between the two songs had been nicely split; "America" was for audiences who wanted to sing of their love of their country; "The Star Spangled Banner" was for bands to play at 'ceremonial rituals.
