#### **Highway Deaths** Down in 1970's First 5 Months

CHICAGO (AP) -There are more cars and more drivers on U.S. highways than there were a year ago but the highway fa-tality rate for the first fivmonths of 1970 decreased to 20,560 from 20,660 for the same period of last year. 'It's not enough to say merely that this year's delvers are

more careful," said Howard Pyle, president of the National Safety Council. "We have t oexamine the er tore road, vehicle and driver situation. For instance, we know here is a much lower deat rate on the limited access, safety-engineered interstate high-

way system.
"Automobiles built today are safer in many ways than the cars they are gradually replacing. Motorists are being required by law to drive more res-ponsibly as illustrated by efforts to get drinking drivers and oth-er unqualified persons off the

Pyle said if the rate of fatalities for the first five months continues, "we can hope to experience several hundred fewer traffic deaths than last year. This may happen in spite of the fact that there are at least two million more motor vehicles and about two million more license drivers on the roads today."
The 1989 highway toli was 56,400 lives.

Pyle said other factors in th decline of the fatality rate in cluded enrollment in driving courses, greater use of seat belts and efforts to "get drunken drivers off the road." Pyle said drunken drivers are responsible for killing at least 28,000 Americans in traffic crashes each year."

The Treasury Departmen said Monday the \$373 billion re corded on a preliminary basi last week at the end of the fiscal year represents a sizable jum over the \$367 billion a year ago. The sum is not the nation's deepest indebtedness. The govrnment approached \$377 billion last March 30 just before in ome tax payments prevented rom going over the legal debt







A flagrant example is California, where rising aerospace unemployment has put a rosy glow on Democratic chances for November. The stakes are im mense: A seat in the U.S. Sen ate, the governorship, and perhaps more important, control of the state legislature. With the legislature about to redistrict a state Congressional delegation swollen by the 1970 census, state legislative control could affect no fewer than 10 seats in Congress.

What has brought ulcers to Democratic pros in California has been the inattention in recent years to party registration. Vast numbers of nominal Democrats in California are really conservatives who habitually vote Republican. Thus, state Democratic victories have not been produced with Democratic registration much below 57.5 per cent of the statewide total. Today the Democratic proportion has slipped to a telltale

John Baldyga demonstrates the new 3M Green-Lite paint sprayer recently purchased by the police department. The new machine, used to paint stop bars, cross walks, and curbing, utilizes a paint in powder form. The paint goes through the machine, is heated, and is sprayed on the road at a temperature f about 225 degress. Since the paint takes only three to five seconds to dry, an entire intersection can be completed with no traffic tie-ups. The road machine, in the background, will still be used to paint center lines, and to supply air pressure to the new unit. The first unit in the state, it will be a great laborsaver, said Police Chief James Reardon. The old method called for a drying time of one to one and one-half hours, and required the use of cones to prevent cars from driving over the lines. The machine, listing at \$995, was purchased by the department for \$538. Baldyga expects the unit to be in full operation by the end of the week. Reportedly several other towns are interested, and will probably come to Manchester to inspect the sprayer next week.
