Rogers Almost Back In Line

Friday, July 1

Secretary of State William P. Rogers a gentleman who obviously got his posiion in the Cabinet because of his long ersonal relationship with Presider Richard Nixon, had to do some fancy skating the other day to try to recover his proper place in the Administration formation

What he tried to do, in a surprise appearance of a routine State Department press briefing session, was to recover from what he had done in London two days before.

In London two days before, not many days after President Nixon had said that our success in our Cambodian adventure might very well have the result of inspiring Hanol to serious negotiation at last, Secretary Rogers had said that the result of the Cambodian operation, and the set back for the enemy there, might very well have the result of making Hanoi unwilling to negotiate at this time.

This, taken by itself, might seem surprising good sense, to be coming from a igh administration official. Unfortunately, it collided directly with the obviously superior good sense and judgment of the highest of all administration officials, the President himself.

So, in his penitential, remedial public reading of the signs, Secretary Rogers, in his next public appearance, revised his analysis until he saw the Cambodian operation possibly leading toward negotiations, perhaps not immediately, but in a year or two.

Since this didn't sound as if the Secretary of State had guite made it all the way back toward the White House position, the White House press secretary undertook, later on, to assure newsmen that "It is wrong for you to assume there is any lack of unanimity. There is not." Especially, he added, in the White House, where foreign policy is really made.

One thing the Secretary of State apparently did not feel called upon to retract, perhaps because his chief had no particular public position on it. That was his observation, made in the London interview which got him into trouble, and still held to during his next appearance in Washington, that one result of our move into Cambodia had been to strengthen Communist China's influence with Hanol, by increasing prospects for the long drawn-out kind of struggle China is believed to wish Hanoi to con-

Perhaps even the White House can't figure a way to deny the gain of influence for China, or a way to interpret such a development as something favorable to us.

But the important, troubling thing is that some of the pronouncements of the President are such glib wishful thinking that intelligent members of his own administration have a hard time not contradicting them just by some carelessly innocent adherence to their own rules of common sense.

The more whatever man it is in the White House insists on telling it the way he wishes it were, the more important it is to have somebody who has courage enough, or bad luck enough, to tell it the way it is.

The Shrublifter

The best of man, and the worst of man are both illustrated in the same esperate news item from New

How could there be anything lowe than the stealing of a beautiful tree or shrub from a place in which it has been planted to add pleasure to the lives of many people?

The Park Department, however, is satisfied that these thefts are not thefts of malicious vandalism, or thefts for profit which might be gained from selling the shrubs on some black market.

People steal these trees, the Park Department believes, because they cannot resist trying to have them for their own in same corner of dirt of their own. So it is time to ask the second ques

Could there be anything more touching and tender than a hunger for a green growing thing which could lead otherwise normal and law-abiding people into

a life of crime? We have at once, then, some of the meanest people in the world and some of the gentlest people of the world, mean enough to rob others for their own sly taste of pastoral pleasure,

How they can be one and the same person-that is the baffling question. The answer, if we had one, would explain more than thefts of trees from Central

Dirty Business

is fashionable these days to say about pornography that it is boring and harmless. I'm beginning to have my doubts. A walk through Times Square these days is like a walk through a disease. Skin flicks for homosexuals have burst upon us everywhere in the area; the good old-fashioned hetero skin flicks are booming. Russ Meyer who used to turn out simple-minded sagas featuring the largest mammary glands in the Western world, is now a respectable director working for a respectable Hollywood company. And the city grows more and more vile and rotting in its heart.

Politically, the spread of pornography can only help the right wing. The loosening of the obscenity laws (which are not really concerned with pornog raphy) was led by liberals. The skir flicks have boomed under the admin istration of a liberal mayor. When 'the reaction comes - as it

must - it will be indiscriminate. Por ography will be just one of the objects, and a lot more serious things will vanish with it. The next time meone tells you that sado-masochist books written by morons have any thing to do with a fresh new vision of society, remind him that every revolution that has taken place in the West has been puritanical before it has been anything else. If there has ever been hedonistic revolution, I haven't heard about it yet. A lot of this junk wouldn't bother

These are not women with intelligence, with hopes; with fears or complicated desires; they are fantasies for people who think happiness is somehow involved with a succession of accessible vaginas, lace ated flesh, or the infliction of violence Pornography worships technique and nechanics; it has nothing at all to do with human feeling. It is violently selfish , built around the pleasure of men it the expense of women.

The liberals cannot have it both ways when it comes to pornography. If the stores were flooded with books advocating the physical violation of Jews, there would be an uproar. If those books were about castrating and torturing blacks, there would be court orders everywhere If they were defenses of segregation r apartheid, we would be revolted. Initead, pornobraphy is among us in a flood, designed to incite cruelty and violence against other human beings who do not fit into any "acceptable' category. Just women. Just objects.

We cannot be moved any more by the picture of the Vietnamese woman hold ing her murdered child in her lap. The irst time the Marines set fire to a building in Vietnam there was an upoar; now not even the slaughter at My Lai seem to move us. The language of jingosim is not much different rom the language of pornography; it wants to excite without true feeling or a sense of consequence.

This is a town which seems to be growing more inhuman and grimy by he day, and the pornography wave is only part of it. But if some things will take time, the pornography busitess can be dealt with in easier ways. iberals can begin by thinking about heir catechism like responses about uman freedom; pornography does not ree people, it imprisons them. The skin flick joints are licensed by

the city; those licenses can be picked up. The more swinish sex papers can be out out of business, if not in the courts, then by simple ostracism. The liberals should lead that fight,





"We are open targets without dequate protection," Kelley aid. He claimed that there i an "appreciable time lag" between the time fire equipment gets to a fire and when a po ice cruiser arrives at the scene 'We have been monitoring po lice calls for six months, and after we complained the time between the alarm and the dis patching of a cruiser improved -but not the actual arrival of the cruisers at the scene of a fire," Kelley said.

Kelley added there were 23 false alarms in the month of June and 81 so far this month. He said the firemen are con cerned about protection of the people in the city, "but when hey start shooing at us-well, hat's a different ball game." Mayor Uccello said that she feels the situation can be settled without any boycott. "If it becomes incumbent upon the city to provide increased protection for firenen in certain areas l am sure we will do it." Fire Chief Curtin said that 'arrangements for extra protec-

tion" of firemen had already been made with police. The union president said, how ever, that the police have only been paying "lip service" to any agreement with the fire chief and that a more concrete as surance of protection for the firemen must be obteined.

AP Millitary Writer WASHINGTON (AP) -American generals in Vietnam run a greater risk of being killed on the battlefield than in -any previous 20th Century war partly because they often travel to ill-defined battle zones to oversee troop movements.

Seven generals have been killed to date in Vietnam. Three perished when their helicopter or planes crashed after being struck by enemy groundfire Two were killed when their hellcopter crashed. Another was picked off by a Viet Cong sniper. And an Air Force general died when the B52 in which he was riding collided with another big bomber during a Vietnam mission.

Veteran officers and military historians, noting the high num-ber of battlefield deaths, cite the ill-defined battle lines of the guerrilla style conflict as part of he reason.

In World War I, World War II, and Korea, they said, the action was fought along clearly identi-fied lines. General officers rarey appeared on the front lines, they said, directing the opera-tions from the rear by issuing commands over the telephone and radio.

But in Vietnam, where there is no battle line, a division or brigade commander may fin his units widely dispersed and fighting as individual elements. Thus, the generals often have felt it necessary to fly over the battlefields to monitor and direct the actions of troops under their command. They also have adopted a practice of making fiying visits to units in the field. The helicopter also has come into its own, replacing the horse of the Indian campaigns and the jeep of World War II as the fa-


