Pointed to in Migrant Probe ASHINGTON (AP) - Four physicians have urged their profession to grubstake the nation's poor to proper medical

care. Dr. Harry S. Lipscomb of Houston made the plea while testifying Monday before the Senate migratory labor subcommittee investigating migrant la borers in Texas, Michigan and Florida. Lipscomb was one of four physicians who recently completed a study of migrant farm workers' working and living conditions. He called physicians and hes-

pitals apathetic toward the poor and urged the profession to develop local health programs to care for them. The physician's fee or prom-

ise of future charges "constitutes the single most significant barrier in the minds of the poor to their seeking early medical treatment," he said. "One way or another we have

to help them get over the initial hurdle," he added, "We have to grubstake them until they are able to get into the mainstream on their own."

reports of: -A year and a half old boy with a grossly swollen head and neck suffering from a near-fatal infection caused by insect bites. The child had a 106 degree temperature when the doctors saw him at their temporary clinic in the Rio Grande Valley, Quick and intensive use of antibiotics saved his life, but he nearly died one block from the McAllen General Hospital which wouldn't admit him because his parents couldn't pay for treatment, they said.

-Gross protein malnutrition caused by a diet of beans, rice and tortillas among workers in the Rio Grande Valley. The arm muscles of the children were the size of pencils, their skins were rough, dry and brittle and the doctors said "the children we saw that day have no future in our society. Malnutrition since birth has already impaired them physically, mentally and emotionally." the report added.

-In Florida, the physicians said they found "housing and living conditions horrible and disbelief." Dr. Raymond R. Wheeler particularly condemned quarters designed and operated by the publicly funded Homestead Housing Authority.

Families were assigned a single room with concrete block walls, with a small window high near the ceiling, no water, no toilet, no heat, no refrigeration and light too dim for any migrant child to study by, the Char lotte., N.C., physician said,

In Traverse City, Mich., Dr. Gordon Harper of Boston learned from a young migrant that doctors had refused to look at his three-month-old son because he didn't have the advance payment. When the baby finally was admitted a day later, the illness was diagnosed as meningitis and intensive chera py was begun but the baby died shortly thereafter, he said.



Maybe Youth Did Do Better

Tuesday, July 21

The World Youth Assembly at the United Nations, held to give the youth of the world a chance to show what it might do if it were handed the world's great problems, turned out to be, in almost all aspects except one, a replay of the United Nations itself in its latter-day, down-grade days.

The Communist bloc was as highly and as artificially organized as it is in the senior world organization. The third force or neutralist nations were equally willing to condemn the United States role in Southeast Asia. It was as usual, impossible to get the Communist bloc delegates even to discuss the possibility that their countries might conceivably be something less than perfect in all respects.

But there was one difference. It appeared in the conduct of the young delegates representing the United States.

The difference between their conduct and that of the normal United States adult representation at the United Nations was that they were willing, occasionally, to admit the possible imperfection of United States policy.

We're not sure that any of the observers or analysts following these youth essions found such instance of frankness and candor on the part of the young Americans a demonstration of principle and strength.

We're afraid that the normal trend of comment and analysis went toward evaluating the v conduct of the young Americans as if it were a strategical weakness, particularly in view of the fact that their unwillingness savagely to defend every American position and policy left the way open for ruthless and unprincipled monopoly of the Assembly's voting and headlines by the well disciplined Communist bloc.

That is the trouble with the adult world, that it woefully confuses what is strong and what is weak, what is truly realistic and what is illusion.

The weakest and the lowest points for American diplomacy in the United Nations have repeatedly been those moments in which an American ambassador has had to stand up in the world forum and make declarations he himself knows are questionable, trying to defend actions and policies with which he himself disagrees. And the more the United States has treated the United Nations as a forum where it endeavors to meet and match Communist bloc tactics, rather than to wage United Nations principles, the more the world position of the United States itself has declined and the more the United Nations has been downgraded.

On the other hand, the potential moment of strength and true world leadership that some of us have hoped the United States might be the first nation to 'seize and exploit at the United Nations would be a moment in which, instead of seeking to use the United Nations merely to judge others, we ourselves found the strength and grace to submit ourselves to its judgment.

This happened, in a small degree, at the World Youth Assembly, a gathering in which, by all superficial accounts, the United States was a loser. We would not be surprised if, in the actual impression which is going to linger in the memories of all those who attended and watched, even including some welltrained minds from totalitarian societies. it was the United States which was the winner on the UN scene for the first time in a long time.

Police Are People One can make quite a list of the ways in which members of police forces, and their supporters, have valiantly and cheerfully tried to turn the "pig" business around. There are "Pig Days" in which communities tell their police they appreciate and support them. There are buttons that say "I am a Pig Rooter." A police association has acquired itself a pig as a mascot. There are various accessories, like pig sweat shirts, tie bars, cuff links and lapel buttons, on the market for people who want to demonstrate their support of the police.

All this is supposed to take the sting out of the "pig" term, frustrate the hipple or Panther effort to discredit the cop, and give all the rest of us a chance to show that our hearts are in the right place.

We salute the spirit involved, and we have some respect for they psychology which tries to turn the epithet around. But we reject the idea that there should be any necessity for such spirit or for the resort to such psychology.

We don't think our police forces should be called upon to try to wear a dirty epithet with a smiling, forbearing face.

And we don't think a proper defense of the police has to slip into any perpetuation of the term which came into use in an effort to bring the police into disrepute.

The point is that police are people. They are people as people in other occupations are people. Sometimes they are brutal and sometimes they are dishonest and sometimes they are extraordinary heroes. But most of the time they are men of moderate virtues and moderate faults, moderate intelligence and moderate performance. like the rest

On top of such qualities, they have the uniform and the badge. It used to be that the uniform and the badge entitled them to the general respect of the society they served.

Now there is an effort to turn this same uniform and this same badge, ever though the men wearing them are the same kind of men they have always been, into some automatic classification of dishonor, which pays no attention whatsoever to the individual inside the uniform.

This kind of automatic judgment and epithetage is brutality of the worst kind. The police themselves should not have to try to pick the epithet up and turn it around. Their would - be supporters should not have to stoop to any use of the same term.

What we all really know is that "pig" doesn't even come close enough to deit to those who continue to be willing to label their own brutal lack of fairness and tolerance by using it.

Con Son-And Why Not Hue? Con Son-that's the big name this week and probably next week and the one after that for those who are deermined to get the government of Thieu and Ky, at whatever cost, and to ncreasingly and compulsively prove the 'immorality" of United States involve-

nent in Vietnam The spectacle of prisoners being mistreated is not a pleasant one. Not a very new one, either. But that the outrage was mostly political was quickly evident. There was the remark, for example, of Rep. August F. Hawkins, Democrat of California, that Con Son is "a symbol of how some American of ficials will cooperate in corruption and orture because they want to see the war ontinued and the government they put n power protected." Getting Thieu and Ky is a long-standing game - in which there has been far more weeping and mashing of teeth over what they have allegedly done than hard evidence of ill ioing - of which Con Son, though not really dramatic, is rather heaven-sent As we say, the spectacle of prisoners being mistreated is not a pleasant one. Atrocities never are. But how much outry have we had over some other atrociies-Hue, for example, where thousands of South Vietnamese were murdered by

Viet Cong. Hue is not publicized, of course, because it would harm the image of a benign Viet Cong, more sinned against han sinning. Smith Hempstone, writing in the Evening Star of Washington, D.C., recalled some other atrocities - the South Korean "spy" mangled in a North Corean prison, the Belgian nun beaten to the bone by bicycle chains in the Conto. Somehow these incidents never causd the outcry that Con Son, for example,

Do the young people going from here to cut sugar cane for Castro recall how he abolished elections and sent his foes before Kangaroo courts and on to the firing squads? Or do they condone it? And how about their parents who coninually push for closer relations with Cuba? How about the mass murders perpetrated on the China mainland by e Chinese Communists? Are they likewise condoned by those who so ardently seek to embrace that land? Why all the utory over Con Son and so little over the treatment of U.S. prisoners in the ands of the Viet Cong? Well, the difference isn't hard to find.

If the atrocity is perpetrated by a rightwing government, it is built into a major vent. If it comes from a left-wing government, it is ignored, or swept under We would be more impressed by all
