The Brazilian Way

rom Brazil there comes a chilling ccount of a vigilante system of justice which, unfortunately, not only represents something some thoughtless Americans have sometimes felt like advocating, but also something that a few other Americans may have begun practicing.

There has now appeared, in several Brazilian cities, the work of self-appointed "death squads," believed to have been organized and staffed by off-duty policemen

Their work consists in ridding society, by private, unofficial execution, of some of its more annoying petty criminals.

type these Brazilian "death quads" execute is the same type which nnoys many American citizens and poce forces. They keep on committing crimes. Although they can be ught and brought to trial, they seem to get off with light punishment which permits them to be out committing new crimes again almost immediately afterward. In community after community they appear in the police news week afr week and year after year.

And it is notable that, although the Death Squad killings have been reported again and again, and although the killings are obviously murders there has never yet been any arrest or trial for anybody suspected of having had a role in one of these executions,

There is one theory which departs from the idea of an organized "Death Squad" in operation. One Brazilian police official has been quoted as speculating that "if a policeman kills a criminal in legitimate defense, well, he might as well dump the body somewhere without any identification because any investigation would be long and troublesome."

In this country, perhaps we should be thankful, we have a system of justice petty criminals can slip through in order to offend again. In this country, if we suspect that an execution has taken place, there can be an official investigation. In this country, an officer who kills in the performance of his duty can still expect an official evaluation of his conduct.

But perhaps the actual news of what has been happening down in Brazil comes just in time to stop some of us from beginning to wish, out loud, that we, too, had some efficient system for ridding society of its expensive, worthless criminal trash.

The ultimate thing about what has begun to happen down in Brazil is that the man with the gun in his hand is the grand jury, the prosecutor, the defense attorney, the trial jury, the judge, and the executioner all in one, and that it is, in the end, the gun alone which elects, appoints and empowers him to play all these roles, including that of God, without any other qualification.

Mrs. Binh And The Dow Jones Recently, the Wall Street Journal daily commentary on the behavior of the stock market led off with this statement: "The stock market was jolted at noon yasterday out of an early sinking spell by what at first seemed an easing in the Vietcong's adamant negotiating stand, but much of the gain later drained away. A few minutes before noon came a press service report that the Vietcong's foreign minister, Mrs. Nguyen Thi Binh, said she favors formation of a coalition government in South Vietnam that could include some members of the present regime. The Dow Jones industrial average, which was off about 2 1-2 points just before this news broke, immediately surged and was ahead 9.52 points at the end of the next half hour. But the gains then started slowly melting after the news tickers carried more of Mrs. Binh's statement in which she said South Vietnam's President Thieu and Vice President Ky couldn't be part of a Vietcong-supported coalition government."

Meanwhile, the New York Times description of the same day's trading went like this:

"Stock prices surged upward in heavy trading in a brief noon-hour rally yesterday, only to lose most of their gains in slower and quieter trading later in the session. The rally, which carried the Dow-Jones industrial average from a loss of 0.89 point at noon to a gain of 9.62 points a half-hour later, was triggered by a news report that the Vietcong would accept members of the present Government in South Vietnam in a coalition government. To market traders, the report seemed to indicate a possible breakthrough in peace negotiations. Later reports, however, indicated that there was nothing new in the Vietcong position and prices faded steadily."

We have several questions to ask

First, does the stock market mov first for certain reasons, or does it just move, and then wait for the analysts to tell it why it moved as it did?

If the stock market does move for such reasons as were ascribed to it in these two newspaper accounts, when is it going to grow up and become as knowledgeable and sophisticated as the great keeper of the nation's wealth should be?

There happened to be, on the day in question, several optimistic circumstances in the news which might have been considered worth a rally. Corporate reports were continuing to be better than expected. If it was peace the market was interested in, there were rumors of a positive upturn in the chances for the American truce plan in the Near East which might have been far more important than the flimsy report from the

If the market did move the way it did for the reasons these two prominent oberver-analysts say it did, then it must just what some of us erstmillionaires have been thinking lately-a crazy, irresponsible place for any sound speculator to be patronizing.

A Tremendous New Fact





Mob Beats Frenchmen who Fly Cong Flag

SAIGON (AP) - Two young Frenchmen climed atop a war statue in Saigon today and waved a large Viet Cong flag until a crowd pelted them with rocks, pulled down the flag and beat them.

A policeman and a few spectators finally rescued the pair identified as Andre Marcel Men ras, 24, and Jean Pierre Debris 26 both former French school teachers in Vietnam. They were arrested.

The incident occurred in Lam Son Square, the city's main intersection. The 25-foot statue depicts two Vietnamese Marines charging into battle.


One of the youths unfurled the 4-foot by 10-foot Viet Cong flag and sat on top of the helmet of one of the marines. The two demonstrators threw down copies of what appeared to be a Viet Cong leaflet calling for immediate withdrawal of U.S. troops from Vietnam and overthrow of the Saigon govern-

About 50 persons gathered and began hurling rocks at the pair, hitting them several times. Both youths carried gas masks. Debris remained atop the nighest part of the statue, holding the flag and dodging the rocks. But a Vietnamese youth scaled the statue and ripped the flag from its metal pole.
