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

Mob Beats Frenchmen who Fly Cong Flag

SAIGON (AP) - Two young Frenchmen climed atop a war statue in Saigon today and waved a large Viet Cong flag until a crowd pelted them with rocks, pulled down the flag and beat them.

A policeman and a few spectators finally rescued the pair identified as Andre Marcel Men ras, 24, and Jean Pierre Debris 26 both former French school teachers in Vietnam. They were arrested.

The incident occurred in Lam Son Square, the city's main intersection. The 25-foot statue depicts two Vietnamese Marines charging into battle.

One of the youths unfurled the 4-foot by 10-foot Viet Cong flag and sat on top of the helmet of one of the marines. The two demonstrators threw down copies of what appeared to be a Viet Cong leaflet calling for immediate withdrawal of U.S. troops from Vietnam and overthrow of the Saigon govern-

About 50 persons gathered and began hurling rocks at the pair, hitting them several times. Both youths carried gas masks. Debris remained atop the nighest part of the statue, holding the flag and dodging the rocks. But a Vietnamese youth scaled the statue and ripped the flag from its metal pole. French sources in Saigon said



Could Loose A Bigger Crime From this distance, at least, one is inclined to join in the despairing cry of Senator Sam J. Ervin, Jr., the conservative North Carolina Democrat who said. as he saw the new crime bill getting through the Senate:

"I hear the siren voice of that old devil, political expediency, whisper in my ear, 'You better vote for the D.C. bill because it's a law-and-order bill. It's not politically wise, to vote against a lawand-order bill.'

"We are told," said Senator Ervin during the debate on the measure, "that it is necessary for us to throw provisions of the U.S. Constitution into the judicial garbage pail in order to cope with crime in the District of Columbia."

The bill passed, 54 to 38, and its importance is that, although it applies merely to the District of Columbia, which is under the direct rule of Congress, there is obviously going to be an effort to enact the same measure to apply in all the 50

What is questionable about the bill? Merely that, in its effort to get tough on crime, it gets rough on some of the traditional safeguards of the English system of law by authorizing "no knock" searches, so that a man's home is no longer his, by authorizing detention without bail for up to 60 days of defendants judged likely to commit further crimes if free on ball, and by a new authorization for wiretaps.

To be sure, the intended target of all these provisions is not the ordinary American citizen, but the habitual criminal. To be sure, with the best kind of use by the kind of law enforcement officials most of us know, such provisions would not be likely to work out to the injury of anybody innocent.

But that, unfortunately, is not the responsible way to calculate the wisdom of proposed legislation.

One has to calculate not merely whom the legislation intends to hit on purpose. but whom it may hit by accident.

And one has to calculate not merely what aid it may give conscientious public officials in a better legal performance of their own duties, but also what openended temptation and opportunity it might place in the way of unscrupulous

and dishonest public officials. These kinds of provisions make laws which are overly dependent, for their success and fairness, upon the type of men who administer them.

The original intent of our Constitution makers was to guarantee us a rule of law in contrast to a rule of men, Accordingly, they set as their ideal an amount and kind of law which could not be used, by unscrupulous or power-mad officials, against the basic freedom and privileges of the people.

Senator Ervin of North Carolina is no permissive, crime-coddling beatnik, but one of our most highly respected conservative lawmakers. He should have had more than 33 votes on his side. For such short-range expediency for our war against crime in the streets carries the danger of a much larger future crime against our own whole way of life.

## Are Results Worth It?

Last November, when President Nixon announced that he was going to ask our Senate finally to ratify the treaty against use of chemical and biological warfare other nations negotiated and signed at Geneva way back in 1925, there was considerable praise for his willingness to have the United States bind itself by some of the same rules of warfare already accepted by most of the other nations of the world.

Now it is July, and the President still has not actually sent his ratification proposal to the Senate, and, according to Charles Yost, our ambassador at the United Nations, the absence of action to follow the pledge is beginning to put

American diplomacy in an embarra ing position. There is a possible explanation of our

After the President had announced that we were ready to join the rest of the world inside the Geneva Convention the United Nations General Assembly by a vote of 80 to 3, decided that the Geneva protocol does include tear gas and herbicides among the things it bans

Tear gas and herbicides have been things the U.S. military has insisted it needs to use in Vietnam. Possibly, therefore, the United Nations vote has either frightened us away from the Geneva Convention again, or suggested to us that we delay ratification until we have brought the war in Vietnam to a point where we no longer need to use tear gas or herbicides.

If this is the case, the explanation of our delay in ratification is as embarrassing as the delay itself.

If, among all the presumably civiliz ed nations of the world, only Australia and Portugal can be found willing to vote with us in the United Nations to exclude tear gas and herbicides from world agreement against the use of chemical and biological warfare, why should we have any hesitancy, in fact, about putting our actual practice where we ourselves always fancy ourselves to be, which is somehow a little more civilized, a little more humane, a little more idealistic, than anybody else? It might be that not using such weapons in Vietnam might do us more good, and even, for that matter, help us more in our struggle there, than they do when we use them.

# **Open** Letter To Ireland

Cool it, brothers! You've got enough problems, north and south, and you've in making sufficient progress solving them, not to go whanging back into ancient feuding and Europe's forgotten religious wars.

To Americans who sprang from Irish and the Scotch-Irish and all who have loved Ireland-and there are mil lions upon millions of us - it tears the heart to see extremists indulging in selfmeamerized violence and hate-sowing. And moderates insufficiently forthright so that British troops have had to be sent

Ulster proudly boasts that 10 American presidents are of Scottish-Irish descent, from Andrew Jackson to Woodrow Wilson. Belfast even makes tea towels recounting the splendid names. What would these no-nonsense forebears think of this miserable "Paialeyism." playing on old grievances and building strawmen

out of outmoded fears? Aren't you Ulsterites proud that Brit ain's most illustrious field marshals of World War II - Alanbrooke, Alexander Auchinleck, Dill, Montgomery -hailed from Ulster? Without them, Hitler might have won. What would these grand individuals, now aged or gone, think of peoole who fail to find the charity to lift a rity from second - class status? Would they not support Premier Chichester-Clark in his plea for calm so that the Ulster government can get on with reform?

And the Republic of Ireland, with the most likable, most individualistic people on the face of the earth, can give thanks that a moderate government under Pre mier Lynch has been able to hold exremists in check. Cannot hotheads below the border see that plans for seizing Ulster against the might of the British Army and Navy have about as much chance of success as peddling penguins o Antarctica?

Who remembers when Ulster's Captain O'Neill and the Republic's Premier Lemass began quiet talks, to unify tourist boards and discover other useful cooperation? 'Ihat's the way to promote common cause - gradually, with care, not with paving stones of IRA weapons. And there's no future for subtle efforts, Dub lin-born, to undermine Ulster's constitutional allegiance to Britain. That cat won't jump

There have been long injustices against the Roman Catholic minority of Northern Ireland - discrimination in ousing, jobs, votes. And a rough Cathoic reaction. But give remedial measures time to operate. The Orange-men have had their anniversary, using up a lot of energy parading. Now is the time to use energy in peacemaking.

Sure you've got big problems, north and south. But they're mostly economic. our big need is to attract new industry. You've been making some success of this. In the Republic, everything from a German firm building giant cranes to a evival of the lovely Waterford crystal. in Ulster, giants of industry have moved in: du Pont, Dunlop, Courtaulds, Goodyear, Imperial Chemicals, many more. But to keep the Irish lads from emigrat ing and combat Ulster's aircraft and shipbuilding decline, there is need for much more industrial development. Do any extremists think riots and bloodshed will cause American or European firms to locate in Ireland? How idiotic can

passions become? So it's time to wake up. Christianity teaches that men are all brethren.
