Salazar Dead At 81 Years

LISBON (AP) -Antonio de Oliveira Salazar,' premier and dictator of Portugal for 36 years, died at his home in Lisbon today after a long illness. He was 81 and Europe's longest surviving government chief in modern times

The government secretary of information said Salazar died at 9:45 a.m. Among those at his bedside was Dona Maria de Jesus Caetano Freire, his housekeeper for the past 40 years. President Americo Thomaz,

the admiral Salazar elevated in 1958, was touring Portuguese provinces in Africa and was immediately notified of the death. He was expected to return to Lisbon immediately.

The bachelor premier suffered a stroke in September 1963 which left him partially paralyzed and forced his retirement. He developed a kidney infection 12 days ago, and since then his condition had steadily wors-

Lockheed Facing Financial

WASHINGTON - An Agena rocket pushes a Samos satellite around the world, enabling its cameras to scan the earth below for signs of new Russian SS-9 missiles sites. The Agena is made by Lockheed.

What Samos misses, high flying SR-71 and U-2 reconnaisnance planes often obtain. Those planes, and their world famous designer, C. L. "Kelly" Johnson, are from Lockheed. Off the Florida coast, Navy

Both planes also carry the Lockheed trademark. This scenario is real. What is that the nation's top defense contractor (2.07 billion dollars in total sales in 1969), and the archetype of the vaunted American industrial - technological base, is now facing potential

bankruptcy.
As Lockheed's problems unfold, it sends new shuddera through an aerospace industry, already shaken by a 3 billion dollar dip in sales last year and the loss of more than 200,000 jobs. Among Lockheed's fellow aerospace giants, there is little smugness. "There, but for the grace of God, go I," is the attitude expressed. In its broadest terms, the

question is whether American defense needs require the government to keep a faltering defense industry afloat as a matter, of national security; or whether such companies should suffer the classical free enterprise penalty for failure to keep solvent - corporate death or merger with a healthy partner.

The Lockheed case is special, however, because the firm claims the government is at fault over "unrealistic" contracting procedures, since abanoned by the Pentagon. The case is also not without

irony. The Lockheed C-5A proj-

ect ran up a billion-dollar cost overrun, but the excess was not the biggest one ever to hit a single program. Other defense contractors have similar problams but have escaped through a system whose principle objective for years has been to get the weapons the country needs and worry about the details lat-

Yet Lockheed got caught in a new contract and a new era. Ironically, had the company and the Air Force been secretive during the early stages of trouble, many Pentagon observers believe the Congress as it has in the past, would have been understanding.

Instead, the C-5A exploded upon them and the Air Force as a scandal, and the outcome for the company, the military and the country is still mixed up in the debris. Pentagon officials privy to

Lockheed's critical cash flow problems believe two key questions will determine whether the company, that has delivered more than 31,000 airplanes and 1,000 strategic missiles to the armed forces in its 38-year history, will face either takeover or bankruptcy in the next

Senate go along with House authorization of 200 million dollars in contingency funds for the C-5A in the military spending bill now on the Senate floor and 2.) Can the firm raise an estimated 250 million dollars from private sources without government guarantees to see them through first deliveries of their commercial L-1011 Airbus in the fall of 1971.

Most observers believe that Lockheed could survive failure to obtain government authorization of the 200 million dollars on one hand, or, on the other, of failure to raise the 250 million dollars from sources. But it would be fatal to Lockheed in its present form if it got neither.

On Capitol Hill, some staunch foes of the C-5A and high military spending believe bankruptcy might be a good thing, catharsis for the industry.

One economist and C-5A critic, Richard Kauffman of the Joint Economic Committee, says there is no hard evidence that Lockheed's going into bankruptcy would have an adverse effect on the national economy.





with the many exasperating manifestations of this horticultural craze. Mother Earts decorates the doorways of her tome and almost indelibly blackens the soaps and sinks of the bathrooms. Her husband's compulsion to linger in his garden until the last glimmer of daylight disappears beyond his horizon of tomatoes and lettuce can delay endless supper hours. And the supper menus, themselves, often have a tell-tale monotony. One week's entrees, for instance, might rhubarb sauce, rhubarb pie, rhubarb cobbler, and rhubarb consomme. For another week, it might mean buttered peas one night, peas with avocado the next, followed by minted peas, peas with almonds, and mushroom-cur

Despite these irritations, a gardener's wife must be educated to the fact that an avid horticulturis is sick. He must be approached with understanding and sympathy, if he is to be cured. Based on my own experience as both a daughter to an amateur gardener and the wife of one, I offer here a few suggestions to al leviate, maybe even eliminate, the ravages of this gardening epidemic. Primarily, however, they will be aimed at preserving your marriage (and your mind) until the crisis passes, Or at least

until winter brings to an end most of the feverish activity of the growing season. (1) Don't raise the roof when your husband pilfers all your platters and cookie tins. (Such handy trays for seedlings!) Don't wince or whine when all the pencils and rulers in the house become props for tiny tomato plants. Through it all, just smile and practice the power of positive thinking: "You're a genius at mprovisation, dear! Who would have

thought of boring drainage holes in my freezer containers to make extra pots." about a compost pile. Recycle garbage in this way, and you'll be placed on a pedestal by your adoring husband, particularly if he's an organic-gardening enthusiast. Yes, the romance will never go out of your marriage — it it's worth that much to you.

(3) Never, never keep track of the true costs of home-grown produce. After all, gardening is supposed to be dirt-cheap! But that's the trouble right there. Dirt isn't cheap anymore, nor is the paraphernalia needed to keep it in top condi that her husband's tomatoes were worth \$2 each, and peas a nickel each-in view of the expenses of his gardening venture.
(4) Aggravating as the whole situation may be, console yourself with the knowledge that it's worse on the gardener He's the one who, under the illusion that he's enjoying a leisurely hobby, is actually more overworked than a subsistence farmer in an underdeveloped country.
