In each case, however, the motivation was really the same. In each case, those who questioned the performance of the courts, or who tried to tilt it in one direction or another, had lost respect for the

The New Haven Panthers expect the courts to convict their leaders no matter what the evidence is. The Connecticut politician, feared, or at least pretended to fear, that a Hartford judge and jury might find a policeman criminally responsible for the death of a citizen. The President was afraid that the great demoralizing combination of publicity and legal maneuver which seems possible these days might somehow enable the California murder cult to escape responsibility for its deeds.

The sad thing is that all those who invade the province of the courts because they are afraid the courts can't be trusted to be judicial are themselves contributing further to the decline of respect for law and order, and, by their own intemperate, ill-considered example, inviting other citizens and other elements to join in the game of public kibitzing pressure, even of trial in progress.

The President's crime - its omission of the word "alleged" was obviously a slip of the tongue, but a slip of the tongue generated by the passion of his own feeling of fear that such alleged human monsters might escape the consequences of their alleged deed - was not as serious as his habitual critics will try to make it seem, or as those California lawyers will certainly claim it was. But it will do damage not in proportion to its intent, but in proportion to the highness of its source. And if many others now feel licensed to join in the process of picking the legal process apart, the eventual question is going to be whether anybody can ever succeed in fusing it back together again. All the kibitzers of whatever school and purpose welcome, one can be sure, the addition of a President to their ranks. If he is going to insist on watching John Wayne movies, he should make a rule not to speak extemporaneously in public for a period of at

Only a few years ago the nation's shortage of qualified school teachers was so acute and had existed for so long (since World War II) that many people

It wasn't. Today there are tens o thousands of surplus teachers with the number expected to grow in the next fer years. One U.S. Labor Department of ficial has told Congress that the teacher surplus is on its way to equaling 75 per cent of the number of teachers employ-

many young people to forgo careers in education. Nevertheless the trend today signals personal hardship for those teachers who cannot find work, even as t signals new opportunities for improving the public schools. The obvious social benefits include the

replacing of marginal teachers with fully qualified personnel, and very likely a general upgrading in teaching quality as school administrators are at last able to pick and choose in the labor market. We may expect, too, that teachers will be less anxious to go out on strike if they know their jobs can be filled with rela-

Too. ther for school officials to improve studentteacher ratios, institute more remedial programs, and broaden curriculums The local taxpayers will still have to be sold on such measures, but at least the personnel will be available when the

The picture, however, is not entirely rosy. A surplus in a profession has a way of being self-correcting, and it's certainly possible that when the pendulum swings back, it will swing back too far and another teacher shortage will develop sometime in the future. There are many reasons for the teach-

er surplus, and not the least is that many people who attended overcrowded understaffed schools in the 1950s and early 1960s decided to become teachers because of the many opportunities the shortage itself presented. Now if we just project the opposite problem ahead a few years, we can expect many young people to eschew careers in education because of the current excess. A traditional drawback to the profes-


sion, especially in the view of particularly gifted and ambitious newcomers, teaching does not lend itself to the merit system that operates in most elite fields. The keys to salary increases have generally been length of service and the graduate work accomplished Many teachers' groups have fought against merit systems because teaching effectiveness is difficult to grade and such systems are vulnerable to school-

And yet if a profession is really a profession, there should be some way to peg reward directly to performance. There should be some way for the teaching profession to gain in stature from the competition within it, so that more talented candidates for teaching careers will be encouraged by the promise of recognition, and less talented candidates might be encouraged to choose a different line of work.

We have long admired-and wondered at—the teaching vocation. Even as we are at a loss to understand the prediction that turns brilliant young people toward careers as, say, heart surgeons, so do we stand in some awe of those who gladly assume the high responsibility of nstructing a class of 30 or 35 untamed hildren. Partly for this reason, we are not prepared to suggest to the nation's teachers eactly how they might take advantage f their swollen numbers to upgrade their profession. Perhaps there's no vorkable method of tying salary directy to classroom effectiveness. And yet it eems unfortunate that teaching quality cannot benefit more from the folding incentive. **Providence Rail Cuts Opposed** By Governor

PROVIDENCE (AP) - Gov Frank Licht and the state's two congressmen Tuesday night joined nine citizens in protestin he plans of the Penn Centr Railroad to cutback the number of passenger trains operating between Providence and Boston. last of a series of hearings conducted for the Interstate Com-merce Commission. The railroad presented its case, citing deficit operations and meager passenger loads, in two days of hearings last week in Boston. Representing Licht, Public Utilities Commissioner Archie Smith urged the ICC to retain the trains, "because they render indispensible public service essential to the economy and welfare of the inhabitants of this state." He claimed the railroad decided long ago that it did not care about passenger service. U.S. Rep. Robert O. Tiernan said "the Penn Central has not put forth a reasonable effort to sustain and improve their pas-

senger service." Joseph Scanlon, administrative aide to U.S. Rep. Fernard St Germain, said St Germain also was strongly opposed to any discontinuance of service. The ICC must decide by Oct. 21 on the railroad's petition. The strongest objections during the several hearings were to the discontinuance of two trains, 506 which operates Monday through Friday mornings from Providence to Boston, and 565, operating weekday afternoom from Boston to Providence.

The railroad seeks to eliminate 65 of the 227 trains that operate during a week. These trains, the Penn Central claims, operated last year at a deficit of \$109,000 and the deficit projected for this year on six-month figures would be \$150,000.

Love Thy Neighbor

In half a dozen places, the Bible tells us to "love thy neigh bor." But it may be difficult to apply this general rule to the spe cific people who live next door To what extent does the law in sist on a "good neighbor policy?" Under traditional legal rules, a home owner owed very little

regard for his neighbor's sensibilities. He could do almost any thing he pleased, so long as he did not actually intrude upon his neighbor's property. In one early case, a home owner dug such a deep excavation

near the boundary line that hi neighbor's house had to be abandoned as unsafe. Yet, even though he had acted with malice aforethought, a court held him not liable for ruining the neighbor's house.

And in another case, a court refused to condemn an enormous "spite fence," carefully designed to shut out light and air from the people next door. The judge said "it would be intolerable to allow a man's neighbors to question his motives."

But in recent years, as people began living closer together, the attitude of the law has changed Today the right to excavate is limited by considerations o safety and fair play. Almost everywhere, the spite fence is forbidden. As one court put it: "No one ought to have the

legal right to make a malicious use of his property for no benefit to himself, but merely to injure his fellow man." Of course, moderate annoyances-even if unneighborly-are still legal. A home owner may still be reasonably noisy, even if the neighbors like it quiet. He may still paint his house a color

that the neighbors consider frightful. In one case, a man turned a deaf ear to a neighbor's complaint about his four large maple trees. It seems the trees kept the neighbor's house in almost con-

But after a court hearing, the judge ruled that the neighbor had no legal grounds for complaint. This was the kind of "wrong," said the judge, for which the law provides no

#### Government Leases Cars At **Bargain Rates**

WASHINGTON (AP) - The big three automakers have acnowledged that for many years they have provided luxury cars to government leaders at highly reduced lease rates. Ford spokesman George Trainor termed the practice "a very straightforward business deal to get personalities behind the wheel of our cars."

In Congress, committee chairmen said the practice has been n effect for years and they saw nothing wrong with it, even though some of the leaseholders have occasion to deal with legis-lation affecting the auto indus-

Trainor said his company has made new Lincoln Continentals available to key members of Congress and other federal officials for \$750 a year. The same car would cost the average customer about \$3,500 for a year's At Detroit, a spokesman for

General Motors said it currently is leasing 33 Cadillacs at \$1,000 annually and eight smaller cars at \$100 to government figures. A Chrysler official confirmed similar arrangements, echoing the point that "there is marketing benefit in having our products driven by prominent peo-

General Motors said its cars are leased directly to the government, which in turn apportions them to individuals.

#### **Use of Phone** For Sales Pitch Ruled Unfair

KARLSRUHE, Germany

(AP) - The West German Su-

preme Court has ruled that use of the telephone for sales or advertising campaigns invades privacy and is an unfair business practice. The court rejected a Dort-

mund newspaper's argument that any person who has a tele-phone and allows his name to be listed in the telephone book 'leaves himself and his home open to the world." A person secures a telephone

for his own use and for the use of his close family, friends and associates, and the instrument cannot be used to make the homeowner a victim of advertising and sales campaigns, he court said.

Another Dortmund newspaper brought the complaint objecting to its rival's telephone campaign to sell subscriptions. The court said such a campaign was an unfair business practice which would lead to an uncontrolled invasion of privacy.





Local readers of foreign publiestions, however, often find some of the stories covered by black ink or scissored out by distribution agencies.

Korean newspapers seldom show such scars because their editors scrutinize every story before it goes to press. They do so under an "anti-Communist law" enacted after a military

coup led by President Chung Hee Park, then an army major thor of an article, or for those who circulate an article that sympathizes with or encourages the cause of communism.

Many South Korean journal
ists have been arrested unde

this law.
Some opposition lawmakers have accused Park's government of abusing the law to suppress criticism against government relicies. South Korea is still technical ly at war with North Korea, although an armistice put an end to the shooting war in 1988. The Information Ministry an-nounced in June that it was persuading the owners of three ma-jor national news agencies to merge in order to establish a single, more businessifie ser-vice capable of competing with North Korea's official news agency in overseas propaganda.

The opposition New Democratic party called this a

scheme for news management, while one influential daily. Dong-a Ilbo, came out with an editorial opposing the merger. A popular monthly magazine Sasanggye—the World of Thought— came under fire after it carried a sarcastic poem ti-tled "Five Thieves" which ridi-culed alleged corruption among officials, lawmakers and busi-
