Manson's Newspaper Act Leads to Jailing of Counsel



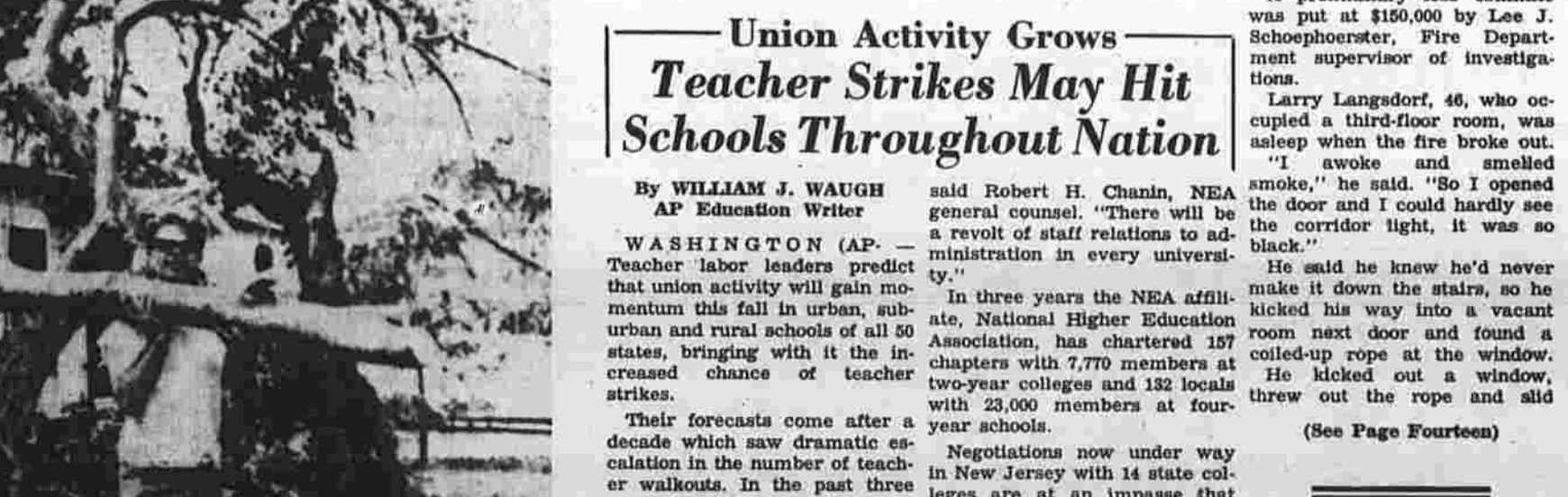
By LINDA DEUTSCH Associated Press Writer LOS ANGELES (AP)—A defense attorney is spending three nights in the same jail as Charles Manson, the shaggy-haired cult leader who briefly halted the Sharon Tate murder trial by flashing at the jury a newspaper headline reading: "Manson Guilty, Nixon Declares."

The trial judge ruled attorney Days Shinn committed "a willful and deliberate contempt" of court by leaving the paper with Manson's reach at the court table. Shinn said he'd done it by mistake.

Manson's move came Tuesday after Superior Court Judge Charles H. Older denied without comment a defense motion for a mistrial based on Nixon's statement—later withdrawn—that Manson was guilty directly or indirectly of eight murders.

Press Vocal on Nixon's Tongue... The New York Times: "It is clear that Mr. Nixon cannot speak as carelessly as the anonymous man-on-the-street without endangering his belief that an accused person is guilty, then that man is innocent before a jury." Several newspapers commended the President's criticism of the press coverage of the Sharon Tate murder trial in Los Angeles, where Manson is a defendant.

Cereal Industry Scored For 'Propaganda' in Ads

WASHINGTON (AP) — A pro-fessor of nutrition accused the cereal industry today of brainwashing the American public with a Communist-like propaganda campaign aimed directly at children.

"In a country where there is a considerable amount of malnutrition among the poor and where rates of infant mortality are disgracefully high this advertising may be indirectly contributing to ill health and mortality," declared Dr. Michael C. Latham, a physician and nutrition professor at the University of Maryland.

Latham commented in testimony before a subcommittee of the Senate Commerce Committee's inquiry into the nutritional value of dry breakfast cereals.

"These consumers did not get this information from their health education classes or nutrition textbooks or from news articles. They got it from the skillful and heavily advertised breakfast cereals that are no more nutritional than hard liquor."

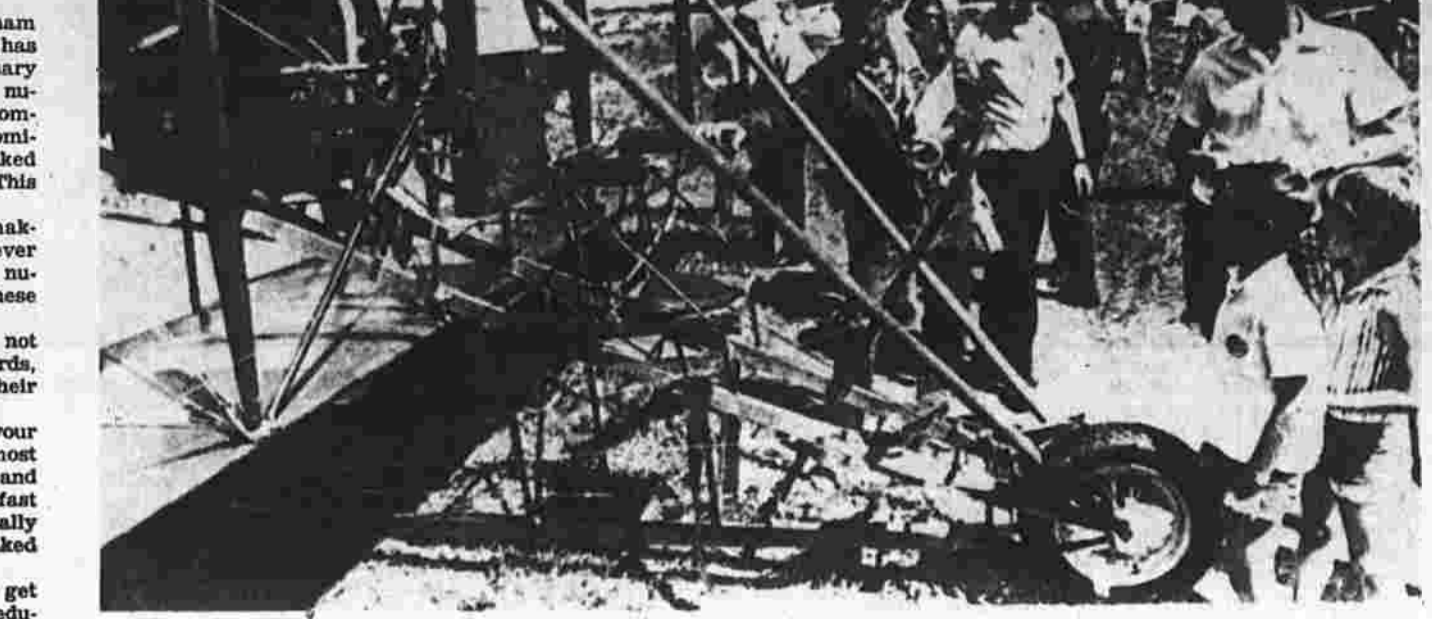

MOSCOW (AP) — Like other Kremlin's at the Black Sea resort of Cape Pitsunda, in Moscow both the Communist party chief and Premier Alexei N. Kosygin like to spend their non-working hours at nearby country "White Houses" besides the one in Washington, and relaxes at the Camp David in Maryland. Leonid Brezhnev has a "summer resort" it has a luxurious garden, tennis courts and an indoor swimming pool.

Mideast Guerrilla Units Swap Gunfire in Jordan

AMMAN, Jordan (AP) — Two groups which were not involved in the clash, described the situation between the antagonists as "a hot war" and "a hot war" during the night in northern Jordan, guerrilla sources said today.

They said two members of the anti-Nasser group were killed, the commander of the group backing the Egyptian leader was taken prisoner, they added.

It was the first report of fighting between the Palestinian guerrillas since a rift developed in the Arab world over Nasser's acceptance of the American peace proposals for the Middle East.

The sources said the fighting was between the left-wing Popular Front for the Liberation of Palestine — PFLP — which strongly opposes the Egyptian leader, and the Action Organization for the Liberation of Palestine, which backs Nasser.

The Action Organization is a small group that has specialized in sniping at Israeli troops and attacking Israeli property in the Jordan River and in the West Bank.

There were no details available on how many were killed or injured. It was said to have occurred near the northern town of Irbid.

Finger Sight Is Revealed As a Fraud

MOSCOW (AP) — A Russian housewife who started the world seven years ago with her claims of "finger vision," a Soviet newspaper reports.

Five scientists who tested Rosa Kulshova concluded that she had been peeking through holes in her blindfold.

Mrs. Kulshova, about 40, a coterie in her home town, gained an international reputation when her alleged powers to see with her fingertips were published in the Soviet press in 1963.

A lengthy report, published in Literaturnaya Gazeta, noted that her powers were most dependable when she was doing her blindfold act.

"Blindfolded magicians have been demonstrating 'sight without eyes' for a hundred years," the commission wrote, "using a narrow slit at the lower edge of the blindfold. The new tests drive us to the conclusion that the subject uses time lights averaging from the time 70s to low 80s."

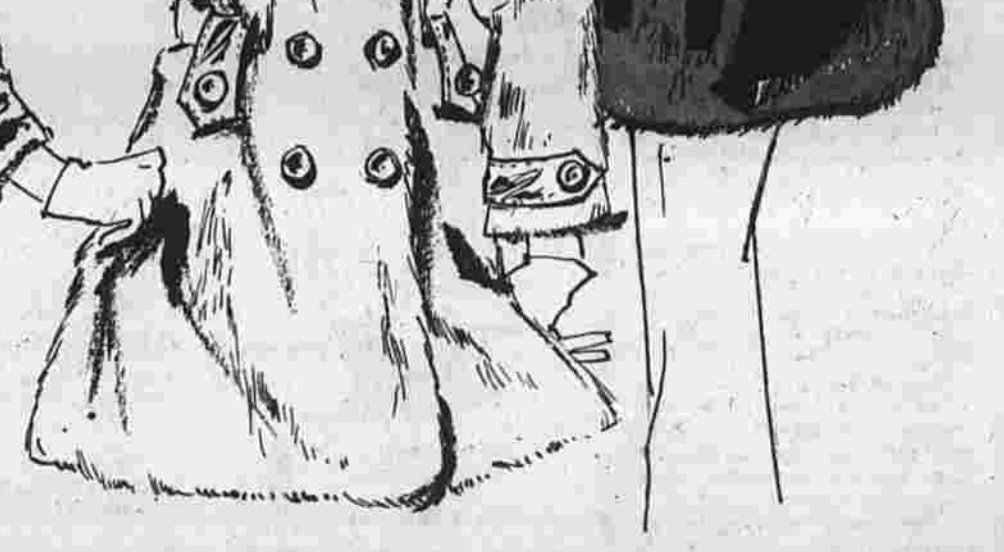

FDA Commissioner Scores Overproduction of Pep Pills

WASHINGTON (AP) — The commissioner of the Food and Drug Administration today accused the pharmaceutical industry of fostering abuse of "pep pills" through overproduction and unneeded tight labeling for the drugs known as amphetamines.

"Industry has not faced its responsibility with these drugs," said Dr. Charles C. Edwards, the FDA commissioner. "It is time for the manufacturers to accept the challenge of working closely with the FDA and the Department of Justice to stop the unnecessary production of amphetamines."

The appeal to the industry and the announcement of new labeling for amphetamines was described as the government's most aggressive action so far in attempting to limit the use of the drugs.

Misuse of amphetamines is considered one of the nation's most severe drug abuse problems. They are stimulants that can cause euphoria but also homicidal behavior, addiction, possible brain damage and psychotic states resembling schizophrenia.

Edwards said the \$1.5 billion amphetamine pills and tablets manufactured in the United States in 1969 were "many more than medical need required."

"Such tremendous production makes easy the diversion of large supplies into improper channels of trade," he said.

The Justice Department's Bureau of Narcotics and Dangerous Drugs was unable to account for the sale of 38 per cent of the amphetamine supply produced last year, the FDA commissioner said.

The labeling changes will sharply limit the use of amphetamine.

Teamwork Brings America International Bridge Prize

DALLAS, Tex. (AP) — "Decision-making is the essence of bridge," says Ira Corn. "It's intellect versus intellect. I love it. I love to make decisions and I love to win. It's a thrill to be a winner."
Ira Corn's love for decisions, bridge and winning produced the first American team to win the International Bermuda Cup championship since 1964.
He and his Dallas Aces, the team of American bridge champions he organized, brought the coveted cup back from Stockholm in June.
Corn is founder of and chief officer of Michigan General Corp., a vast and highly successful conglomerate which permits him unlimited indulgence in his No. 1 interest — bridge.
Corn began playing tournament bridge nine years ago. An accomplished life master, he won his first national title in 1963.
"I thought I was good at first. But it was like being in the two-hour category when you're talking about four-minute titles," he said.
But something gnawed at Corn. America was not winning international bridge tournaments. Though there were many talented American bridge players, there were no great teams.
Corn began to recruit players, there were no great teams. "I observed then that there is a fundamental principle to bridge which had been overlooked. We ought to be playing the partnership philosophy rather than as individuals. It's not a player game but a partner game. You must look out for each other," he said.
Under his concept, any one player is only half of "who" the team is.
Two years ago Corn enlisted a formidable front line to wage bridge war against the world's best.
"To develop partners is time-consuming. I quit work for a year to concentrate on it," Charles Goren retired in 1966 and that gave us an opportunity to replace him," he said.
Goren's retirement from active tournament competition left an opening at the top of American bridge world. Corn felt it was a good time for someone else to move in, namely his own.
"The successful companies regard themselves as entrepreneurs, and not merely as good customers who do not have administrators," he writes.
"These are the companies that will earn the highest profits for their stockholders by discharging their highest responsibilities to the society."

South African Economy Works Against Apartheid

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — South Africa's theory of separate racial development is one thing, economic reality is another.
The white government looks ahead to a time when the policy of removing blacks from the cities to segregated rural "homelands" will put the races completely into compartments. Government theorists maintain that blacks are only temporary sojourners in "white" areas who must be enticed away by better economic opportunities in tribal homelands.
Yet the homelands, and the jobs they are supposed to provide, exist largely on paper. For all officialdom's efforts to stem the labor-seeking black tide to urban areas, the national economy remains multiracial.
Encouraged by this a large department store chain hired colored cashiers and sales assistants to help start a new branch in Cape Town. The minimum allowed is \$66. Sales clerks get \$115-\$133 monthly against \$115-\$140 for whites.

Sentenced to Die
MOSCOW (AP)—A Mariupol, convicted of masterminding a gang that swindled restaurants and cafeterias in the southern city of Stavropol more than \$100,000 has been sentenced to death, the newspaper Trud reported today.
The newspaper gave no details of the operation of the swindle but said it went on for three years. Four accomplices were given 15-year prison sentences after the eight-month trial.
The court said Mariupol, a second offender, was an "especially dangerous incorrigible criminal." He will die before a firing squad in the Soviet method set of capital punishment.

Greek Colonels Try Tolerance on Critics

ATHENS (AP) — The Greek regime has begun surprising some of its intellectual critics by tolerating them.
A little book by 18 authors who oppose the army-backed government has become a best seller in Athens, and summer theaters have resumed their tradition of poking fun at politicians.
Opposition newspapers are deriding the government in cartoons.
Even so, those demonstrations are cautious.
The 200-page book called "Brighten Texts" opens with the first poem by George Sefertis published in Greece since the 1967 coup. It includes short stories and essays obliquely criticizing the regime.
There apparently was some official thought of banning the book but authorities decided this would give it more publicity. Evidently the regime now feels secure enough to allow some freedom of expression.
Sefertis' poem, "The Cats of Saint Nicholas," is based on an old Cypriot legend about cats trained to wipe out a plague of snakes, after which they too are destroyed.
One chapter includes a stinging conversation between a strolling converser and a passenger, portraying military and fear under a totalitarian regime.
A story titled "El Procurador" refers to a dictatorship in a mythical Latin-American country called Volguay and deals with the disappearance of a prominent poet who had signed a manifesto calling for the restoration of press freedom.
Richard Attenborough stars in the role of Christie, with John Huston as the disappearance of a young man executed for Christie's crimes. Judy Geeson portrays Hurst's wife, Beryl, herself a victim of Christie.

Pope Berates Philosophers' Dead Theory

CASSELL GANDOLFO, Italy (AP) — Pope Paul VI today weighed in against philosophers who claim "God is dead" and predicted that one day they would realize they were "failures as men, and were walking in the dark."

"The temptations of modern man in regard to God and religion are manifold and very serious, the Pope told his weekly general audience at his summer residence, "Among these, there is a formidable one: that God and religion are outdated concepts."

The Pope attacked such dead philosophers as "Mars and Nietzsche," who proclaim that man is the supreme being for man. He called these interpretations subversive and noted that "in these past years they have been strong and widespread, reaching even into the theological domain and occasional forays into the Catholic field."

Thus, the Pope added, "a religious man would be branded as a reactionary, simple-minded person who doesn't follow the current philosophy of the times, not yet emancipated from the roots of an outdated mentality."

The Pope deplored the "fascination of this form of atheism" which he said was based on public opinion trends rather than on the truth.

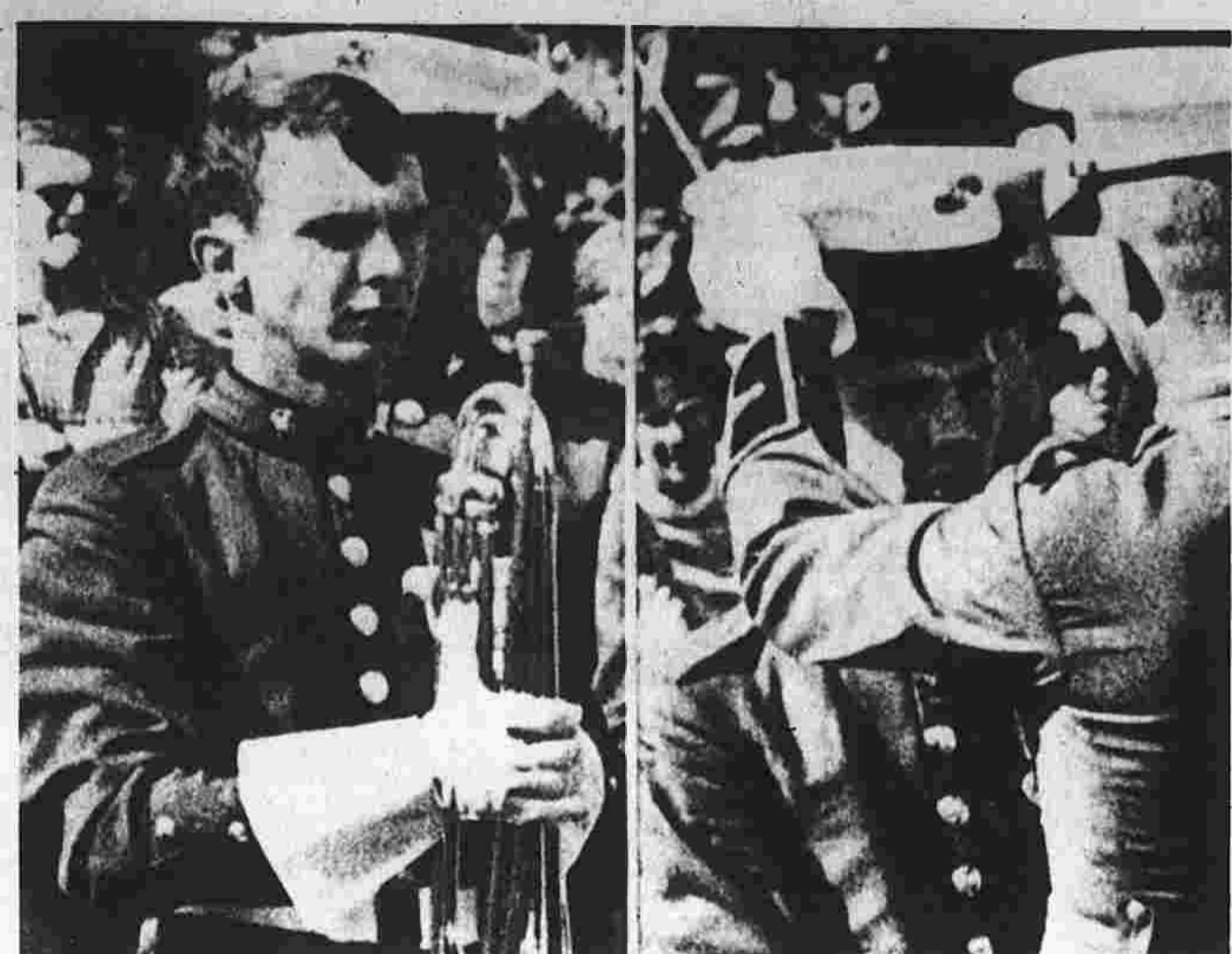

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. John I. McClellan has refused the request of two black ministers to take his subcommittee to Chicago to investigate the Black P. 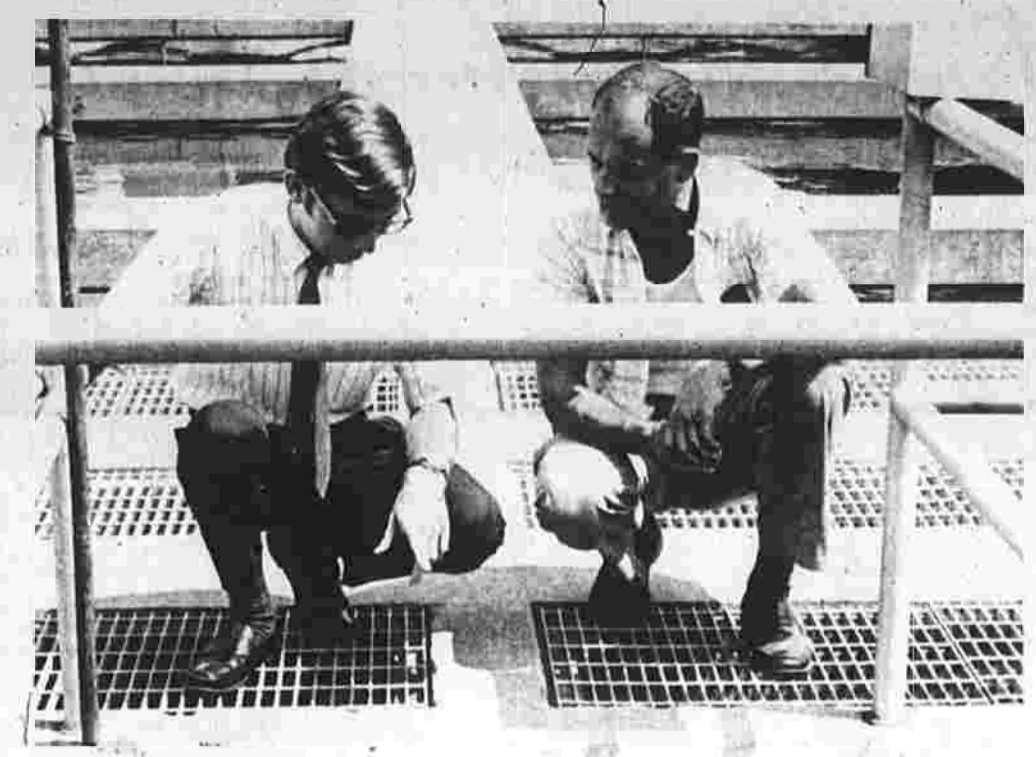

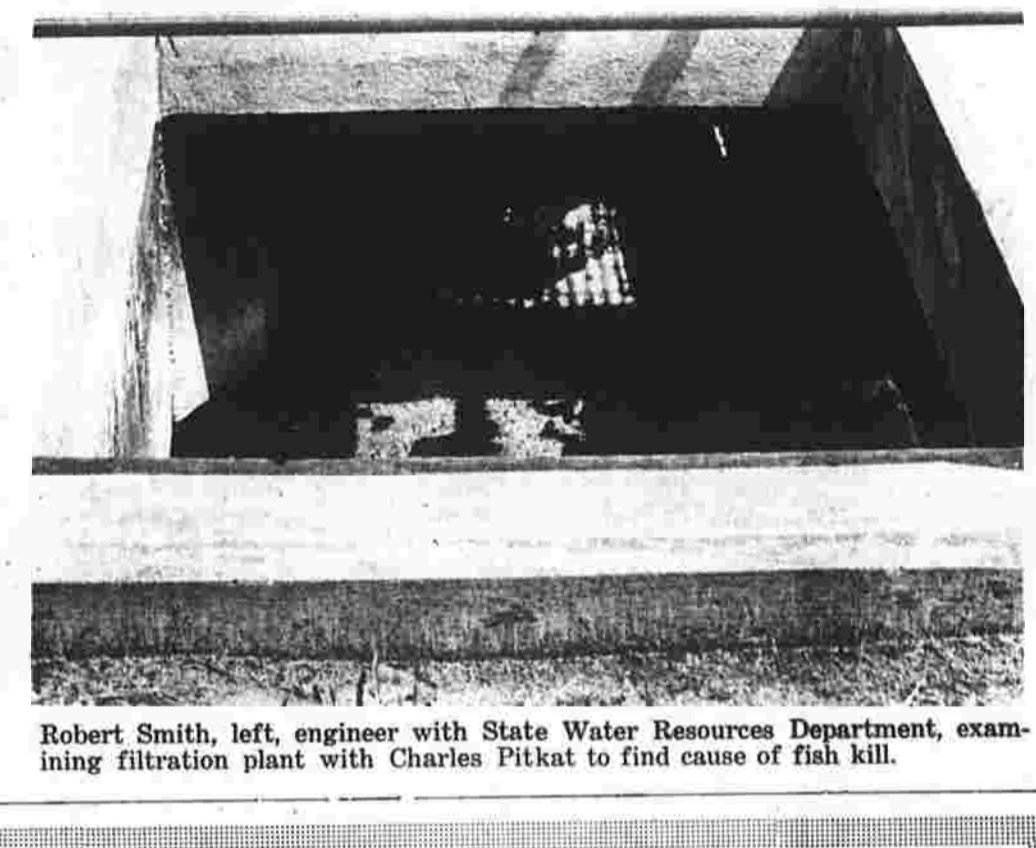

Chavez, Victor in Boycott, Turns to National Scene

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Cultivated acres. Pastures and when struck at harvest time, other tracts bring California Holms Roberts, one of the largest family farms in the state, with 46,000 acres in all sorts of crops, signed last June. California slowed last spring. For Chavez, the unionization

The farm workers have filed suit seeking an injunction to void contracts signed Tuesday between the Teamsters and growers and shippers in five California counties: Monterey, Santa Cruz, San Luis Obispo, San Benito and Santa Barbara.

That area produces 90 per cent of the nation's lettuce and more than half its carrots, celery and strawberries, plus other vegetable crops.

Chavez, in an uncharacteristic flare of anger, denounced the Teamsters Tuesday for "a Pearl Harbor-type of attack," and vowed "all-out war."

He said the Teamsters had pledged in 1967 to stick to the contract and leave the field hands to him.

On Wednesday, in Delano, signing a three-year contract covering about 5,000 workers of a major group of table grape growers, Chavez was noncommittal about expanding the organizing drive.

Instead, he predicted signing of growers of the remaining 26 per cent of table grapes possibly within a week.

Co-Founder Of Panthers Awaits Bail

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP) — Black Panther party leader Huey P. Newton is out of state prison.

He expected to be bailed out of county jail today, pending a new trial in the death of an Oakland policeman.

Newton was brought to Alameda County Jail Tuesday from the state prison at San Luis Obispo for an appearance in Superior Court on his request for bail pending a new trial.

Newton was arrested as a co-founder, whose militant organization has made "Free Huey" a national rallying cry for more than two years, announced a news conference to follow his appearance before Judge Harold B. Howe.

Sheriff Frank Madigan said no special security measures were ordered in connection with Huey's assignment of police manpower when Newton was convicted of voluntarily manslaughter in the same courtroom in September, 1968.

The state court of appeals overturned Newton's conviction and 2-to-15 year sentence last May. The court held that the trial judge erred in not instructing the jury on the possibility of unconsciousness as a defense.

Newton claimed he was unconscious after being wounded by gunfire by Oakland policeman John Frey, whom Newton was accused of killing in October, 1967.

"That reversal was not in the cause of justice, but because of the manner in which the trial judge erred in not instructing the jury on the possibility of unconsciousness as a defense," Newton said.

He predicted "it will be acquitted as it should have been last time ... I am convinced the police and the district attorney know that I am innocent."

Newton's life was at stake in his first trial, where the charge was first-degree murder. The jury's manslaughter conviction means that the retrial must be on the lesser charge.

Providence Rail Cuts Opposed by Governor

PROVIDENCE (AP) — Gov. Frank Light and the state's two congressmen Tuesday night joined nine citizens in protesting the plans of the Penn Central Railroad to cutback the number of passenger trains operating between Providence and Boston.

The opposition came at the last of a series of hearings conducted for the Interstate Commerce Commission. The railroad presented its case, citing deficit operations and meager passenger loads, in two days of hearings last week in Boston.

Representing Light Public Utilities Commissioner Archie Smith urged the ICC to retain the trains, "because they render indispensable public service essential to the economy and welfare of the inhabitants of this state." He claimed the railroad decided long ago that it did not care about passenger service.

U.S. Rep. Robert O. Terman said the Penn Central has not put forth a reasonable effort to sustain and improve their passenger service.

Joseph Scanlon, administrative aide to U.S. Rep. Bernard St. Germain, said St. Germain also was strongly opposed to any discontinuance of service.

The ICC must decide by Oct. 21 on the railroad's position.

The strongest objections during the several hearings were to the discontinuance of two trains, 606 which operates Monday through Friday mornings from Providence to Boston, and 888, operating weekday afternoons from Boston to Providence.

The railroad seeks to eliminate 86 of the 227 trains that operate during a week. These trains, the Penn Central claims, operated last year at a deficit of \$109,000 and the deficit projected for this year on six-month figures would be \$150,000.

Love Thy Neighbor

In half a dozen places, the Bible tells us to "love thy neighbor." But it may be difficult to apply this general rule to the specific people who live next door.

Under traditional legal rules, a home owner owed very little regard for his neighbor's sensibilities. He could do almost anything he pleased, so long as he did not actually intrude upon his neighbor's property.

In an early case, a home owner dug such a deep excavation near the boundary line that his neighbor's house had to be abandoned as unsafe. Yet, even though he had acted with malice aforethought, a court held him not liable for ruining the neighbor's house.

And in another case, a court refused to enjoin an enormous "spite fence," carefully designed to shut out light and air from the people next door. The judge said "it would be intolerable to allow a man's neighbors to question his motives."

But in recent years, as people began living closer together, the attitude of the law has changed. Today the right to excavate is limited by considerations of safety and fair play almost everywhere, the spite fence is forbidden. As one court put it: "No one ought to have the legal right to make a malicious use of his property for no benefit to himself, but merely to injure his fellow man."

Of course, moderate annoyance—even if unneighborly—is still legal. A home owner may still be reasonably noisy, even if the neighbors like it quiet. He may still paint his house a color that the neighbors consider frightful.

In one case, a man turned a deaf ear to a neighbor's complaint about his four large maple trees. It seems the trees kept the neighbor's house in almost constant shade.

But after a court hearing, the judge ruled that the neighbor had no legal grounds for complaint. This was the kind of "wrong," said the judge, for which the law provides no remedy.

Government Leases Cars At Bargain Rates

WASHINGTON (AP) — The big three automakers have acknowledged that for many years they have provided luxury cars to government leaders at highly reduced lease rates.

Ford spokesman George Traylor termed the practice "a very straightforward business deal to get personalities behind the wheel of our cars."

EISENHOWER - USA

A New 6-cent stamp bearing a photograph of the former president and World War II hero will be issued with first day ceremonies in Washington, D.C., in August.

The exact date has not as yet been set, but the stamp will be printed in sheet, coil and booklet form.

This will be a regular 6-cent stamp and not a commemorative. The difference is that the regular stamp will be printed by the Postmaster in limited quantities reserved for commemorative addresses.

The Eisenhower stamp was designed by Robert Gelsman of New York City and is based on a Defense Department photograph. It is a vertical stamp in blue with the retired in civilian garb. Across the bottom of a white panel in blue sans serif capitals is "Eisenhower USA."

Collectors desiring first day cancellations may send addressed envelopes, together with remittance to cover the cost of the stamps to be affixed, to the Postmaster, Washington, D.C. 20501. The endorsement should read "First Day Covers Eisenhower Stamp."

Four options are available for the type of stamps to be affixed to the envelopes. Unless specified, sheet stamps will be placed on the envelope. Coil stamps, however, may be requested.

Another version is over-the-counter booklet pans, which comprise eight stamps in the full pane at 48 cents must be purchased.

The fourth version is vending machine stamps in a pane of five which costs 20 cents. Again, the entire pane must be purchased.

Collectors desiring service on the last two items are advised to place their address on the first day cover envelope to the far left end as low as possible to provide space for the multiple stamps.

Although no date has been set, you may send your requests early to be sure you will get what you want.

It isn't often that a stamp and coin shop will have an exhibit of items which are not strictly related to the hobby. But Dimpfel's Stamp and Coin Department recently carried a display dedicated to the 25th anniversary of the Liberation of the Johnston Camp as compiled by John D. Langwell. Shown were arm-bands, ration cards, jewelry made by prisoners, and other articles as a moving reminder of the persecution during the holocaust. These were samples of concentration camp money and stamps to complete the showing.

The Cook Islands have announced the issuance of a new set of stamps honoring a double occasion—the visit of the royal family to New Zealand and the celebration of Captain Cook's discovery. The 8-centa portrays Queen Elizabeth, the Duke of Edinburgh, Prince Charles and Queen Anne. The 30-cent depicts a Wedgwood bust of Capt. James Cook and a view of his ship, HMS Endeavour. The highest value stamp shows the \$1 coin issued for the royal visit.

Females Mute

Hearing Crickets? It's the Male Voice

GAINEVILLE, Fla. (AP) — Like the katydid a cousin of the male is the chatterbox in the world of crickets, says a biologist who has spent 15 years studying the insects.

The female cricket, says Dr. Thomas J. Walker, is silent throughout her lifespan. "The male of each species of field cricket actually makes three different identifiable sounds," says Walker. "They are: saying hello to a possible distant lover, the billing and courting sounds and the angry sounds to warn of a rival.

"And contrary to misconception, this little insect makes its sound by rubbing his wings together," Walker adds.

He says his interest in cricket sounds was aroused while he was doing graduate work at Ohio State University. Now a professor at the University of Florida, Walker spends part of his time in the classroom teaching entomology and general biology.

"There are those crickets, like some humans," he says, "who wonder aimlessly through their life just tending to their five species of the field cricket, everyday cricket business."

Newsman Still Succumb To Siren Song of Politics

HARTFORD, Conn. (AP) — The siren song of politics, accompanied by a chorus of cash, is still luring newsmen away from their jobs. But few are finding themselves in the lobby of kingmakers.

"I'm not in on the policy decisions," confessed one former newspaperman recently. "I don't get paid enough to get involved."

This year's unusually large cast of candidates has made noticeable inroads into the state's corps of political writers. The candidates need someone to be a buffer between themselves and the news media, and who can write a favorable news story about them.

Alphonso J. Donahue, a candidate in the Democratic primary for U.S. Senator, obtained the services of Art Mattson, formerly of the Norwich Bulletin, and Fred Gross, once of the New Haven Journal-Courier.

The Rev. Joseph Duffey, one of Donahue's two rivals, hired Ed Butler, formerly of United Press International, but Butler is no longer with Duffey. His place was taken by a PR (public relations) man.

State Senate Majority Leader Edward L. Marcus has John Swepe, a former New Haven broadcast newsmen.

On the Republican side, State Sen. John M. Lupton has Harold Yulish, formerly of the Connecticut Herald of Bridgeport.

And his opponent in the GOP Senate primary, Congressman Lowell F. Welcker Jr., has had working for him a couple of newsman, a former newspaperman of the Connecticut Herald and a former newsman of the State Senate Minority Leader Wallace Barnes had with him for a time Bill Perez, who used to write for the Hartford Courant. Perez departed for the practice of law after the GOP state convention, where Barnes qualified for a primary for the nomination for governor.

Edwin D. Ethington, the former president of the American Stock Exchange and Wesleyan University, retained Ed Masasky, the Hartford Times' education writer. Ethington failed to qualify at the GOP state convention for the nomination for U.S. Senator, thus leaving Masasky without a career. But the ex-reporter landed on his feet in a job with the State Commission for Higher Education.

Masasky's monetary joblessness illustrated the risks involved in newspapermen hitching their careers to a political campaign. The political jobs may pay well, but they don't offer to use the cash to finance future ambitions.

Several of the state's best-known political writers have, in fact, turned down some attractive offers from candidates. Just ask them. They'll tell you.

There are more serious risks than job insecurity, however. And one of them is the loss of the quasi-independent status of newsmen, a position which has its intangible rewards. The reporter who quits and joins a candidate may find himself in the uncomfortable position of wedding his former colleagues for coverage of his employer's campaign.

He may also find himself lowly subordinate in a campaign organization dominated by the candidate's cronies and by high-priced professionals in the field of advertising, public relations, and fund-raising. The candidate may be solicitous at more appropriate for the job than a newsman?

However, there is always the possibility that the candidate may be successful, and he or she may be able to make a place for himself in government, an attraction in being a door opener in state government, including Keith Bohmrock, formerly of the Hartford Courant, Jack Ahern, formerly of the New Haven Register, and George Maclean, formerly of the Associated Press, all of them on the staff of Gov. John Dempsey.

Bill Kelsh, formerly of the New Haven Register, works for the Department of Transportation and will, McCowan, former of UPI, works for the University of Connecticut. And there are others.

One of the continuing advantages of the news business is that it can serve as a springboard to many other things.

Bounty Hunting Back

NEW YORK (AP) — Bounty hunting is back in style as a result of a judge's invocation of an 1889 law, this time the targets are polluters.

The first beneficiary of the decision was the Hudson River Fisherman's Association which accused the Penn Central Railroad of polluting the river.

When the railroad was fined \$4,000, the association applied for a bounty under the old law initiated to encourage citizens to assist the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers in reporting polluters—and received \$2,000.

The association says it plans to use the cash to finance future prosecutions of river polluters.
