

Pick Your Own Explanation

When the F.B.I., the other day, reported that crime in the United States had ncreased 148 per cent in the 10 years since 1960, a spokesman in the Department of Justice has this somehow comforting comment:

"No human being alive can explain these trends. That's the great debate of the century - what causes crime."

We are also reminded, for our comfort of mind, that President Johnson's Commission on Law Enforcement and Administration of Justice reported, three years ago, that "no single formula, no single theory, no single generalization can explain the vast range of behavior called crime."

Such assurances extend to us all the privilege of roaming, without any particular responsibility, or obligation to reach a conclusion, among all the possible explanations.

Television might be the criminal, for it would be in the decade just past that the first American generation which was raised on that new form of culture moved forward into the age of action on the social scene.

Those who like to blame the war in Vietnam for everything wrong with case, too, for was toward the middle of this decade that this country experienced the definding itself, and its noralization of own living room, deep in the brutalities of a war it wasn't sure it should be in

This was also, we believe, the decade in which we had more and more debate and discussion about what the role of religion, school, and home should be in holding our civilization together, and, therefore, in the very process of such discussion, less and less sense of sure direction and less and less power of influence for religion, school, and home.

This decade was also the decade in which the use of dope of various kinds made sudden and unprecedented leaps through the whole population, dragging increased crime in its wake, not so much, because, as in the time of prohibition, rival gangs fought each other and the law to wage their illicit business, but because the customers of the drug trade were in continual need of money with which to finance their habit, and took to violence in order to get the money

So we can blame the increased crime on television, on the war in Vietnam, on the collapse of church, school, and home, and on the drug use epidemic.

Thanks to those assurances that nobody really has the final explanation, and that, indeed, there is no single theory which gives an answer, we don't have to choose

Luckier still, we don't have to propose an answer, which is something everybody and nobody has been busy doing for almost all of this decade, too.

Somewhere, we ought to be able to discover and take a turn toward being more civilized people. How wonderful it would be to wake up some day and find ourselves without instinct to watch violence on television, with a clean cut willingness to submit our role in Vietnam to the judgment of mankind, with a new yearning instinct to rebuild church, school and home into ahining, loved, revered places, and with a positive sense of the miracle of human life which would shrink from cheapening itself with artificial stimulus one way or another!

We suspect one thing, which is that we will blunder or happen or drift or bore or wish ourselves into such a better state long before we get there by feeding stuff about ourselves into the computer in our departments of sociology

Our Nerve Gas Image It should be quite obvious that this country has little or no talent for the business of making itself a favorable mage in the world.

It is bad enough for us to be indulging in so much public controversy over how we are going to dispose of the 12,000 rockets full of nerve gas which are now at that North Carolina dock, waiting burial out at ea.

But, on top of that, there is now coming into public view the question of how we are going to dispose of some more nerve gas which we now have stored on what is still legally the territory of another nation. The Pentagon has its Idea of what to do about the nerve gas on Okinawa. It would like to transport it to a tiny Pacific atoll called Johnson Island, and leave it there.

Believe it or not, however, our Congress is now in the midst of action on a bill which would forbid the Army to move this nerve gas, which we exported to Okinawa for our own potential use against Pacific enemies, into any part of the United States. One slightly embarrassing thing about this is that Johnston Island is, legally speaking, a part of the United States.

The major embarrassment is that we stand before the world as a people willing to spill our own poison on others, but apparently determined to guarantee ourselves by law that none of our own polson products shall ever come back to the land which originally produced them.

What kind of people are we, to try to put it into law that the one thing that must not be done with our own nerve gas is to bring it back to our own shores?

We had better ask ourselves that question, for it is the question others are going to be asking about us, now that, by Pentagon planning and Congressional debating, we invite the world to watch us handle the issue.

Youth And Slum Pressures

The sheer greater masses of young people, in recent years, have vastly amplified youth's effect.

The young are not themselves so dif ferent. An essentially anarchist element was always there, Jackal gangs, looting, sexual attacks. Just as virulent. Though less reported.

At least this was the case in the Detroit hinterlands where I grew up, dur ing and after World War II. White Southerners moved into federal housing projects, flimsily built over the swamps and berry fields we had played in. Some what further in-city came the blacks. We went to school together, met in the (and the friend ships) a mong the European ethnic Southern white and black groups were

Much of Detroit was laid waste t slum, then-slums in part being the aftermath of modern urban ethnic war fare. It was largely felt that youth was at fault. Perhaps this was true, in that the young were the most footloose and free, acting out the tensions that played in different ways on their parents. In any event, the city has continued to succumb to the slum pall-in turns an apathetic and a desperate feeling that the city will never truly live again.

Of course, there are differences among the young today. The unthinking streetanarchists have been joined by ogical anarchists. Blacks and Northern and Southern whites are schooled in antagonism by elders or precocious peers. But the overriding aspec of the new virulence is not so much its kind, as the greater masses of young people involved

This impaction of the young is now most evident in college communities. Harvard, for example, is suffering from it. When I arrived at Harvard Square in the middle of one night in September 1954, it was like driving into a small town. No one was about. An all - night restaurant was open, in front of which I found a campus policeman. He took me to my dorm, and waited about as I unloaded the things I thought I'd need my freshmen year. Then he let me into my room, shining his flashlight on my roommates' faces to wake them up and intro-

How different now.

The city of Cambridge-the slum-making ethnic forces churning within it, to which has been added the new ethnic class of the college young and hangers-on-is ingesting Harvard Square. Not a quiet college town any more. At dusk. the city takes over. Wire-mesh screens unrolled or swung against storeglass fronts. Panhandlers, pushers, tting and vaguely menacing youths emerge. Hordes of silly and garish highschoolers come by bus, subway, and humb to revel in the new and decadent honky-tonk, A Jekyll and Hyde perfor-

The police are edgy now. Not that they are less helpful. But they have been branded "pigs," and at any moment hey may be whaling it out with angry

Beneath it all, of course, Harvard coninues to function. One should never unler-estimate the powers of the intellectual to offset interferences. Even during Yale games, the libraries traditionally are full. And during the past year's disuptions, research and study went on, albeit far more laboriously.

Still, survival amidst urban encroachment and youth impaction is perhaps he greatest challenge our universities and society itself can face. The ivory ower was leveled some time ago. A former Manchester man who quit the world of Wall Street for a career in art has created a striking plastic sculpture for a new office building in New York City's financial district.


When he gave up his job eight years ago, George E. Adamy was a securities analyst on Wall Street and had never had an art les-

Recently Adamy's fivedisc acrylic sculpture, "So-lar Fire Garden" (The Month of June), was installed in the ground-level arcade at 77 Water St.

His sculpture was among several commissioned by the builder especially for 77 Water Street. The building is situated in the new financial section, a block south of Wall Street and almost in the. shadow of Blyth & Co., the brokerage house where Adamy was

Slated to open this fall, 77 Water Street is a sparkling 26 stories of glass and satin aluminum, whose key tenant will be Walston & Co., another major stock brokerage.

BRATTLEBORO, Vt. (AP) -White-haired Miss Ida Fuller cashed her Social Security retirement check this month, her 368th since receiving the first one ever issued 30 years ago. That first check was for \$22.54, Miss Fuller recalls, but it was nearly five years later before she was told by Social Security officials that she was the first in the nation to receive benefits under the program. "When I got my first check, I didn't even stop to look at the number on it," she said. "I just cashed it, I wanted the money." South Viet Militiamen Claim Major Victory

SAIGON (AP) - Some 5,000 South Vietnamese militiamen, guided by Viet Cong defectors and intelligence that the enemy was planning an offensive next month, raided 80 Viet Cong base areas south of Da Nang and claimed one of their biggest victories of the Vietnam war. The South Vietnamese claimed killing 125 Viet Cong in two days of lightning raids with no air or artillery support. Gov-

ernment losses were put at four killed and 11 wounded, A high-ranking U.S. adviser said today the enemy dead included a lieutenant colonel, the military province chief of the region stretching from Da Nang 40 miles southward. Three other high Viet Cong officers were believed killed, including the chief

political officer. "I've never experienced any. thing like this as far as plan ning, coordination and spirit," said the senior American adviser, Lt. Col. M.G. Stafford of Eagle Pass, Tex, Small patrols of five to 15 men started in just after Thursday
