Prayer Sessions Set for Schools in Cambridge

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. (AP) — Prayers are slated to return to all Cambridge public schools at opening of classes Sept. 10, despite the U.S. Supreme Court ban.

The city school committee said Tuesday night that orders will go to all 19 school principals to set up a system allowing a five-minute prayer session.

Mayor Alfred E. Vellucci said the order will affect more than 20,000 pupils.

The order directs that pupils "be permitted five minutes before the start of school each day for the purpose of individually, or in groups, reciting a prayer of their choice on a voluntary basis without the benefit of the classroom teacher's presence or advice."

Vellucci said the order follows weeks of committee discussion and legal research.

There was no immediate comment from the state Department of Education.

The Cambridge action follows a pioneering move by the school committee of Leyden, a town in Western Massachusetts, which set up a system of prayers last spring.

On a challenge by the state, the Leyden plan went to Superior Court where Judge Paul V. Rutledge ruled that children could say prayers in public schools—provided teachers take no part.

The state Board of Education has unanimously voted to appeal the ruling.

Under the Leyden system, which replaced an earlier proposal ruled invalid, the youngsters in the four-room elementary school hear one bell to signify the beginning of prayers, another bell to indicate the end of the session and a third to denote the beginning of classes.

Gov. Francis W. Sargent last May signed a bill allowing public school prayers—provided they follow Rutledge's ruling.

Leyden officials plan to ask the state Supreme Court to clarify whether a teacher may be present.

The conflict centers on a 1968 Supreme Court decision in which the court ruled that children in public schools could pray if a teacher is not present.

Lindbergh's Continuing Illusion

Revival of the Lindbergh argument—that winning World War II turned out worse for us than it might have been to let Nazi Germany win because it promoted Russia and China to the status of world power enemies—is not likely to contribute anything significant or valuable to our present day opinions and choices.

The inference of the Lindbergh argument—that we had a choice in 1919 and 1940 and 1941—is as much of an illusion today in retrospect theory as it was then in actual fact.

The world, by that time, had gone beyond its power to choose.

All the significant decisions had been made, before Lindbergh or anyone else first raised a voice in the debate over what America should do.

Then, as now, civilization had made its crucial, binding decisions by a process which was essentially negative. Then, as now, civilization eaned back, frustrated and tired, and let the same old things begin to happen again.

The decisions that made World War II inevitable, and inevitably a world war, began with the refusal of the United States to join, let alone strengthen, the League of Nations. These fateful decisions continued through the great power tacit permission of the Japanese invasion of Manchuria, and the Mussolini attack on Ethiopia, through the revival, in Europe, of the big power game in which Britain, France and Russia all began trying to play the resurgence of Germany as a power against one another, into the failure to react collectively when Hitler led Germany into its first armed move back into the Rhineland.

There was one summation for all these decisions. There was to be no other way to be treated outside, once again, in favor of power politics alchemy.

Nobody applied the brakes; the old kind of history began its downhill runaway course toward disaster. By the time Lindbergh and others were debating America's potential role, that role had already been decreed, beyond debate or escape.

After World War II, there came a new era in which choice was possible. We chose to erect a new symbol of collective security to replace nationalistic rivalry—the United Nations. We made the positive choice to use the United Nations to halt wars in Korea, in Suez, in the Congo, and in Cyprus. Could we have kept on making that kind of choice, the United Nations today would be the strongest, most effective, most respected force in the world.

But some of the members of the United Nations reneged on their share of the responsibility for action in the Congo. The United States itself refused to submit the situation in Vietnam to United Nations judgment and possible decision, and preferred to try to handle the job itself as if it had never heard of a collective security world, in which world law, not fanatical "national security necessities," governed the military actions of nations. In the Palestine war theatre where new world war now threatens to find its birthplace the United Nations concept is clinging to life by the skin of its teeth.

The world is not far, today, from being just as powerless, and decisionless, as it was back when Lindbergh thought we were somehow free to make up our own

plans to stay out of the holocaust civilization's disorganized permissiveness had already made inevitable.

We might still manage a decision. But the only way anybody can decide to stay out of the next war is to prevent it from arising. And the only way the next war can be prevented from arising is through a real and positive reach for the ideals and the law and the machinery of collective security, the United Nations, which means an end to the Lindbergh illusion assumption that we can continue to let things just happen, and then sidestep the result if we please.

Law And Morals

Morality of the ancient world were in no doubt that level spectacles debauch public morals. Periodically the Roman emperors agreed with the moralists, suppressed the shows, and banished the actors. The records do not relate whether this provoked a chorus of eant about the inalienable prerogative of the artist and the liberty of the human spirit. The records do show that the prohibitions were of little avail and short lived. It has generally been supposed since those days that digressions into that kind of licentiousness are injurious to society, and attempts to check them simply by legal prohibition have generally come unavailing.

The epithet appropriate to "Oh Calcutta!" is a matter of choice. It is safe to say that it strikes most people as going beyond the bounds of decency. It is not to the point that worse, or better, has for long been on tap in Soho.

"Oh Calcutta!" is a production for the legitimate stage by one of our most celebrated aesthetes, paragonized by a fashionable audience, and dutifully considered by dramatic critics. It contributes to the general idea of what is publicly acceptable.

That is why those who are of the opinion that it passes the bounds of decency are justified in denouncing it. It is not because they personally are affronted (they need not attend), but because it shifts the limits of publicly permissible sexual display, and shifts them in a direction that they have reason to believe is hurtful to the values they uphold and to the well-being of their society.

"Oh Calcutta!" is a notorious, but not a particularly important, example of the slide into public licentiousness. The book trade and the advertising profession are more pervasive in their influence. But just because "Oh Calcutta!" is notorious it provides an occasion for those who feel that the values they respect are threatened by this unilateral revision of frontiers to stand up and protest. They deplore the production less for what it is than for what it portends. We are with them.

To denounce is one thing; its advocate prohibition is another. Legal suppression of intellectual and artistic work and of entertainments is consonant with a liberal society only if there is a very broad measure of agreement within the political nation about the classes of matter to be suppressed.

The disagreement is not principally about the length of permissible digressions from standards of sexual morality. It is a more radical disagreement about what those standards should be. At opposite poles there are those who found their standards of sexual conduct, private and public, in chastity, fidelity, restraint and reticence; and those who found their standards in experiment and the presence of the right-wing Gahal party, which walked out of the government last month.

What then, is it anything? People who hold that sexuality including its perversity ought not to be within censorship's field of fire the authors, for instance, of the recent report to the Arts Council on the law of obscenity do not usually hold that the censor should be without employment. They are usually strong on the law of obscenity, but not usually on the censorship of the theatre.

The duty of society to perform in defense of that morality. The conclusion does not remove the acute difficulty of deciding in what circumstances and in what measure the law should be invoked to prevent dissolution without blocking change. It is better for it to exert its stabilizing influence by being slow to change in the face of fashion than by being quick to react against it, something which the last Parliament failed to appreciate. It is better that its powers of least resort should be enabled to remain inactive by reason of the cohesive influence of those free institutions of society that form public attitudes by persuasion and example—the churches, the schools and universities—the mass media of the press, radio, television, and the private and uniquely efficacious influences of the family. The moral bonds uniting society can only grow and be sustained from within. Law makes its contribution to this process. If it is a time when law has to be invoked as a substitute, it is likely to be too late.

First, NASA will mothball a couple of giant Saturn 5 moon rockets.

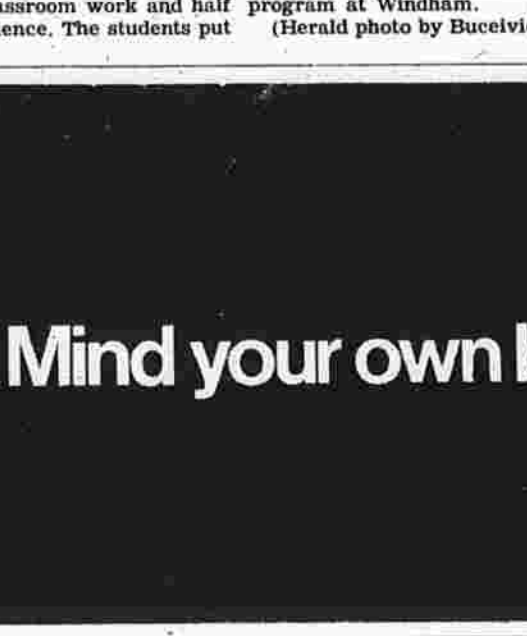
These launch vehicles, costing \$18 million each, will become a part of a "national resource of heavy lift rocket capability," NASA administrator Thomas O. Paine told a news conference Wednesday.

Secondly, some mighty diappointed astronauts—including six who would have taken a moon flight on the Apollo 15 and 19 missions, now canceled for budgetary reasons—will have to be reassigned.

"The astronauts have been very unhappy along with the scientific community, about the reductions in flights over the past several years," said Dale Myers, associate administrator for manned space flight.

"Many of these men have dedicated themselves to development of the space shuttle. There are 49 on the astronaut rolls. The U.S. has launched 28 of its astronauts on space trips, some two or three times, and one, James Lovell, four times.
