

A 36.3 Per Cent Victory So much has been made, in the past, of the supposed inability of Communist parties and causes to win votes in free elections that it is perhaps only approable over - emphasis, in news and comment, of a Communist victory in

It is indeed, as is being said, the first instance in Latin America in which a Communist head of state has been chosen in a free election.

But that concession, standing alone, does not reflect the whole truth. What happened in Chile was a plurali-

ty, not a majority victory, not for the Communist party, but for a coalition ticket which had been put together behind the Communist candidate. And this coalition ticket managed to

come out victorious by obtaining only 36.3 per cent of the popular vote cast that day, which was only 1.4 percentage points higher than the vote obtained by the independent candidate the far right

had the unusual advantage of support from a Catholic political party which once originated out of sympathy for Dictator France in Spain but which has since evolved itself into a group of left wing Catholic revolutionaries.

Finally, the victory for Communism in Chile was itself a victory for one brand of Communism-the Russiansponsored and relatively moderate "popular front" approach as contrasted with the more radical theory and strategy of all out revolutionary war being preached in Latin America by Cuba and Communist China.

All these factors temper down, somewhat, the drama involved in the election victory of Salvador Allende. The dramatic question is going to be

that of how the country is going to take the extremist measures he is apparently going to try to invoke on the basis of his minority victory.

Our Age Of Protest

President Brewster of Yale seems to have said that, unless the elections this November bring victory to some of the anti-war candidates some of the young college people are going to work for, there may be continued trouble on the campuses this year.

And down on Long Island, a special Human Rights Commission survey has decided that school administrators, who can't aim at anything except the status quo, and teachers, who don't know how to lead toward change, are chiefly responsible for present day student un-

It is the revolt which is the thing, not to be appeared by concessions, or bought off by realization of some of its own listed objectives This is the great age of protest. Ceasefire In Jeopardy

A Middle East peace settlement looks remote while the parties involved are not discussing it. The decision by Isreal to delay in sending its representative must be in virtual suspension. Israel's problem is the question of alleged Egypan violations of the ceasefire arrangement, the effect these may have on relative military strengths, and just what the United States, as author of the peace initiative and Israel's protector, proposes to do about it all.
