Something Right

To find that there is one area of the vorld's business where somebody must be doing something right -- where indeed more than one somebody must be cooperating toward a good end - is the kind of news worthy of being beamed to the antennas on every housetop.

The area in question is the area of economic aid by the world's better off countries to those less developed.

And the good news runs in two channels, both emptying into the same good final result.

in one channel, that of the functioning of the World Bank, or the International Bank for Reconstruction and Development, the annual report of tha institution shows that the amount of its annual aid to developing countries has now grown to the point where it exceeds the foreign aid program of the United States itself.

Such a statistic makes the World Bank president,- one Robert S. McNamara, very happy, because he has set it as his as it was when he took office.

While the World Bank is thus increas ing its own functioning, there is a cooperative trend under way in the policy of the Nixon Administration at Wash-

It has begun the healthy and longsensible business of channeling a higher proportion of our foreign aid expenditure through international channels, such as the World Bank, instead of distributing it, in political fashion, through direct deals with one foreign government or another

Reports from Washington are that the Administration is about to recommend additional shifts in the American practice, until we reach a stage in which we are giving more abroad through international agencies than we put into our own direct foreign aid program.

Congress is going to have to have some say in this, and Congress has never been enthusiastic about taking the dollar sign, or supposed negotiating power, off the billions it is asked to appropriate for foreign aid.

But an excellent case can be made for the view that this country serves its own long range interests best, and accumulates most prestige and power, when it takes the modest attitude on the world stage and does not seek specific advantages for itself from the good it does. We hope the shift in the channeling of our foreign aid continues.

TV And Not TV

On the Democratic side of the primaries down in Florida, two surprise andidates came up fast to finish second in the race for the gubernatorial and senatorial nominations, and thus qualify for the run-offs-to be held Sept. 29.

One of them was a legislator named Lawton Chiles, who walked the 600 mile length of the state to get himself publicity he could not afford to buy with limited campaign funds. He got his second place spot by beating out a better known Speaker of the Florida House of Representatives, one Fred Schultz who had, moreover, nearly \$500,000 to spend on his campaign.

The other surprise high finisher was another legislator, Reubin Askew in the race for the senatorial nomination.

The most noteworthy thing about these two candidates, to the outside world at

least, was the fact that they achieved their surprising degree of success with very little exposure on television, the supposed necessity of modern politick-

The comment of political observers was that Florida voters were apparent ly bored with the "packaged campaign formulas" everybody else was using.

On the same primary day, out in Arkansas, one Dale L. Bumpers, an unknown country lawyer who had, back in 1962, lost even a race for a seat in the legislature, achieved sudden national fame by defeating former Governor Orval Faubus for the Democratic gubernatorial nomination, scoring 258,-68 votes to 182,028 for Faubus.

Bumpers had entered a field of eight Democrats, all better known than he, and had come up to be the big winner entitled to run against Republican Governor Winthrop Rockefeller.

And what, bearing in mind the success of the two Florida candidates who didn't use television, was the strategy in Bumpers' success?

This small town Arkansas lawyer sold all the fine Angus cattle he had been raising, saved his money, and blew it all on television in the closing days of his campaign.

But, bearing in mind what the Florida political observers thought about the electorate's attitude toward routine campaign formulas, what kind of television did Bumpers offer?

Candidate Bumpers would have nothing to do with a script, or with carefully staged panel interviews of himself, but went before the camera, climbed up on a stool, and just started talking, small town style.

The conclusion suggested is that campaigning pays off not so much by the medium as by the message, and that, contrary to some careless political hopes, the medium alone is not necessarily any kind of message.

New York City hasn't even got it parlors for off-track betting on horse races open yet, and already it is beginning to fascinate itself with the idea that it ought to pass additional law making it possible for its parlors to take betting on other sports, too.

The idea is that the wicked bookie goal to increase the world organiza- can't really be put out of business until tion's business until it is twice as great the city takes away from him not only less on the horses, but also hi custody of the money of those who wish to place gentlemanly wagers on the outcome and scores of baseball, football and basketball games.

> It would, of course, be merely as ncidental result that the city, instead of getting merely the \$25,000,000 or \$50,-000,000 a year it expects to realize from taking bets on the horses, might double or triple the income from its betting

To eliminate the sinful bookie on the one hand, and fill the city's coffers on he other so that the burden on all honest taxpayers can be lightened-what could be more salubrious

But the most pleasant aspect of all this growing official interest in providing betting facilities for the people is the sure, swift transformation of gambling, which used to be considered a moral deficit for any society, into the foremost contemporary civic virtue. What some evangelistic crusaders once proclaimed would be the downfall of America is now going to be the thing that saves America. To be a good citizen it is necessary to be a good loser, and it will soon be that the one activity we can't afford to allow to dwindle will be our gambling.

State Legislation Not Needed The General Assembly's Subcommit

tee on Higher Education has been look ing into campus unrest at the University of Connecticut to determine if then is need for legislation to control such nonstrations in the future. It is sincerely hoped that the state's lawmakers decide on a "hands off" attitude toward passing any legislation that would cause an overreaction before here is justification.

Students, administrators and faculty embers told the committee the probems at UConn this spring were blown out of proportion because of violent acts campuses around the country. The fact that there was some violence and disruption is indisputable, but this turbulence was minor and participated a by a very small group of UConn stu-The school's administration was fully able to handle the situation and

The only thing that the legislators could do by enacting legislation to insti-tute state or federal police action during isturbances would be to further alienate the college student body which is aleady upset with current U.S. policies in least Asia and in the domestic area. While there is no need to coddle students who institute violent acts on college campuses and disrupt classes, there likewise no need to overreact. The gislators will be making a grave mistake if they begin taking over the powers of college administrators .-- WATER BURY REPUBLICAN.



The Board of Finance had earlier turned down a request from the Board of Education for a town meeting an on appropriation to bring the incinerators at the Center School and High school up to new state health department standards. The finance board recommended that the trash from all three schools be taken to the dump. The new Elementary School trash has been taken to the dump this past year, since that school does

not have an incinerator. The Board of Finance reasoned that it would be cheaper in the long run to take all trash to the dump, and that new state anti-pollution regulations might make refurbished incinerators

illegal in a few years. The incinerators presently in use will become illegal to op erate after Oct. 12. If there is considerable favorable reaction to the school board's recommendations for refurbishing them at the public hearing, th proposal will be placed on the agenda of the annual town meet-

The two appropriations to be voted on at Monday's town meeting are: "\$3,500 from the contingency fund to cover ex penses of issuing short-term notes already due and in anicipation of future bond issue expenses." This is for the new elementary schools and the old elementary school renovation project, now carried on shorterm notes, but which may go to onding when the market is fa-

And, "an amount not to ex ceed \$1,500 from the contingency fund to reimburse the general nighway budget for damages to Williams Rd. when such funds are received by the town" from the contractor.

A pall of smoke rose over the Jordan desert today and Arab guerrillas said they had blown up three hijacked planes after removing the passengers They claimed this was only the first step of their warning to Western gov ernments to meet their demands.

They had said previously the planes would be destroyed with the passengers 'aboard 'unless Britain, Switzerland and West Germany released seven Arab commandos in their custody. The three jetliners-a Tran World Airlines Boeing 707, a Swissair DC8 and a British Overseas Airways Corp. VC10were blown up at 3:15 p.m. Jordan time, a spokesman for the

Popular Front for the Liberation of Palestine said. This was 9:15 a.m. EDT. He added that it was "the first step of our warning follow ing the delay of the three West-

ern governments to concede to our terms." The planes were worth a total of \$25 million. Their destruction would raise to close to \$50 mil lion the aircraft losses since the front began its air piracy activities last Sunday

At that time, a Pan American World Airways 747, a jumbo jet worth \$24 million, was blown up in Cairo after being hijacked there and releasing its passengers.

Witnesses reporting on the blast in Jordan said it was greeted by shouting and shots fired in the air by the guerrillas. Smoke from the airstrip, heavy and black in the clear blue sky, was visible 20 miles

away. Jordanian troops had pulled back 15 miles from the airstrip, which was sealed off after removal of the last pas
