Hi-Jacking The Chance Of Peace As if there weren't trouble enough trying to lead the governments formally responsible for life and death in the Near East toward negotiation toward peace, the world is confronted with a third force to which life or death seem unimportant irrelevant things. The Palestinian guerrillas are the

violent by-product of two decades turmoil in the Near East. They represent the worst possible combination of characteristics.

They are, on the one hand, extremist in their objectives. They are, on the other hand, complete-

ly beyond the control or influence of any recognized form of government. They have one objective, and govern their attitude toward everything else by

that one objective. That objective is to drive the Israelis into the sea, and then recover the homes some of them once had inside the area now controlled by Israel.

Any willingness on the part of any Arab government to negotiate peace with Israel — as the governments of Egypt and Jordan now seem willing - is, to the Palestinian guerrillas, sheer betrayal of the Arab cause.

any chance that anybody in the Near East would accept the American formula for a cease fire and for negotiations, the goal of destroying any such possibilities. They have been waging, apparently on equal terms, civil war against King Hussein in Jordan. They have apparently taken a savage joy in continuing guerrilla attacks on Israel and in the fact that Israel did not let the cease-fire stand in the way of its own immediate retaliation for such attacks.

Finally, it has to be judged that the main purpose of their plane hi-jackings has not really been the capture of hostages to use in bargaining for release of some of their own commandos, but to strike a blow at whatever hope is left in the possibility of negotiations to

The plane hi-jackings constitute an outrage, committed, no matter how innocent established Arab governments may be, from the Arab side of the con-

one who dares try to specify just how t can or should be done, the first present emergency, after the safety of the innocent human beings in guerrilla control, is to see to it that the comnandos do not succeed in giving a final knockout blow to the possibilities for continuation of the cease-fire and the resumption of talks at the United Naions. Israel, Egypt, Jordan, Russia and the United States should all have equal interest in this, for it is the life of all of us which is equally at stake.

If the chances of peace stay alive, one eventual necessity will have to be recognized. There has to be, eventually, homeless, stateless Palestinians, a solution which, even if it didn't appeal to their leadership, would have a chance, by its reasonableness, of siphoning away some of the support the leaders now

There is no perfection of solution possible in the Near East. There is no justice possible, in a situation where injustice has compounded injustice for so long a time in so many ways. The International Wine and Food Society recently held its first tasting of English table wines in London. Nine white wines and a rose, made by members of the English Vineyards Association, were shown. They came from outdoor vineyards as far apart as Somerset, Lincolnshire, Hampshire, Sussex, and On the whole, members' reactions

The president of the association and one of its most experienced growers with 17 seasons behind him, is Major-General Sir Guy Salisbury-Jones, In his five-acre vineyard at Hambledon, Hampnire, which lies on a chalky hillside in ight of Broadhalfpenny Down, the birth place of cricket, he grows Seyve-Villard 5-276 grapes. His 'sixty-nine is a clean dry wine with quite a lot of body.

The chairman, Mr. Jack Ward, is already a veteran of British fruit wines and ciders through his interest in the Merrydown Wine Company Limited, of Horam, Sussex, who are now in the fore front of the new English wine industry. His firm not only have their own vineyard, but run a cooperative scheme for English vine growers, collecting their grapes and making their wine for them return for a proportion of the crop.


the "Brede Riesling-Sylvaner 1969," which Merrydown had made under the cooperative scheme for Mr. R. D. Thor ley, from Muller-Thurgau (i.e. Rieslinglvaner) grapes grown at his vineyard Broad Oak, near Rye. It was mediumiry, with the delicate complexity of nose and flavour which is found in the better quality German wines. Another highly successful wine was Pilton Manor Somerset Riesling-Sylvania 1969. This had been made by Mr. Nigel de Marsac Godden from his four-acre vineyard, near Shepton Mallet. It was a dry wine with a showy nose and a full fruity flavour which lingered on the palate.

a very interesting tasting of Hocks and Moselles from the 1969 vintage given by English agents of the celebrated German firm of Langenbach and Company. 'Sixty-nine was a highly successful vintage in Germany, as in England. As a result of Langenbach's generosity I was able to take to the English wine tasting two bottles of 1969 Muller-Thurgau (Riesling-Sylvaner) from the Berger vineyard in the Rheinhessen pe ish of Westhofen. It retails at about 22s 6d, which makes it exactly comparable in price to the Brede and a shilling more than the Pilton.

How did it compare in quality? The Hock was rather fuller in body than the English wines and while it was more obviously fruity, it had less complexity of flavour. It was perhaps just the better wine, but there was surprisingly little in it and quite possibly some people would have preferred the English wines. In making this comparison it is as well to remember that both English wines came from vineyards of under five years of age and that young vines rarely produce such good wines as older ones.

The late summer and autumn of 1969 were, of course, very warm and dry ideal for the wine grower, but it should not be forgotten that the spring came very late. This meant that English vines did not flower until mid-July, whereas this year they came into flower two to hree weeks earlier.
