Dispute Surrounds Moves Of Prime Interest Rate

NEW YORK (AP) — The prime rate is coming down, but there still remains considerable dispute over who is pushing or pulling it in that direction, or who the good guys and the bad guys are in the scenario.

In other words, what makes interest rates rise in the first place and what causes them to come down again?

Rep. Wright Patman, D-Tex., claims it is all the doing of the big commercial banks. Some of the banks are inclined to blame it on the Federal Reserve's management of the money supply. And the Fed sometimes has been known to be disturbed over administrative policies.

The bank doesn't stop there, of all places, of course. Certainly, the administration men admit, their policies might put burdens on the productive ability of the nation and tend to raise money rates, but they blame it all on international events, domestic problems, and the previous administration.

The most recent dispute over interest rates involving Patman, chairman of the House Committee on Banking and Currency, and David Rockefeller, chairman of the Chase Manhattan Bank.

In a letter to Rockefeller earlier this month, Patman stated that large banks want an "un-necessary and highly inflationary" interest rate binge after the recession.

Patman says that the Fed has raised the rate to 12 1/2 percent, but that it is not doing this to help the economy. He says the Fed is raising the rate to help the banks.

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Consumer Faces Corporate Barrier

NEW YORK (AP) — "The responsiveness of a firm to the consumer is directly proportional to the distance on the organizational chart from the consumer to the chairman of the board."

Whether that statement is true can be argued. But that millions of Americans believe it to be true can hardly be disputed, and among their number is Virginia Knauer. She made the statement in a speech.

Knauer is the President's assistant for consumer affairs, and so it is rather surprising to hear her speak out so unequivocally on the issue of corporate business, an issue that touches every single American.

Bigness, after all, has never been officially regarded as either bad or good. Regulation has been passed limiting a company to a certain size; its profitability, yes, as in the case of utilities, but not its size.

Perhaps the nearest we as a nation have come to declaring business is badness is in a relative sense: if a company monopolistically dominates its industry, for example, then we might declare it to be too big.

But, as a lot of consumers have learned in recent years, a company need not be a monopoly to abuse its customers, to ignore their complaints, to refuse their service, to threaten their credit ratings.

Much of this treatment, it is argued, is really not intended. It is the system, it is said, the impersonality of the seller-buyer relationship. It is the mechanisms that have failed, companies say, not the intentions.

This may be so, but regardless, it is the substance out of which much of the consumer movement has emerged. In many instances, the mechanism does not recognize that it is dealing with real, flesh and blood, thinking, feeling, suffering human beings.

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Agnew Called A Precursor Of Violence

NEW YORK (AP) — Vice President Spiro T. Agnew, debating with a student who called him a precursor of violence, has laid the blame for the disturbances on the "pernicious attitude" of college administrators.

Agnew's colorful rhetoric was aimed out as a cause of college unrest by Richard Silverman, student body president at the University of Washington, who was one of four students participating in a taped television debate with the vice president Monday night.

During the 90-minute discussion on the David Frost Show, to be seen in most cities Friday, Agnew and the four students frequently disagreed over the causes of student violence.

Silverman charged that Agnew was "one of the greatest precursors of violence our country has ever seen."

The vice president replied: "To use me as a beta note for the violence that has existed in this country because of my gusting and permissive attitude of the people in command of the college campuses is one of the most ridiculous charges I have ever heard."

The exchange became heated when Silverman brought up the shooting deaths of four Kent State University students in a confrontation with National Guardsmen.

Agnew called the burning of the university's ROTC building, the harassment of firemen and the chanting of obscenities as "extenuating factors, said he nevertheless deplored the killings."

"It is most unfortunate, as it appears now that the National Guardsmen overreacted to the killing on the 'human debris' dumped on him by the Ohio force simulation program."

Crime's Cost To Victims Gets Paid

LONDON (AP) — The British government gave \$26,000 to a girl whose face was marred when a former boy friend threw acid at her. It awarded \$12,000 to a young steward deprived of fatherhood when he was hit in the groin by a shipboard bullet.

The Criminal Injuries Compensation Board had paid out \$17 million, and more people are appealing to it every year.

Anybody can apply who suffers physical injury from violent crimes, either as a victim or by trying to stop the crime or the police.

The board can refuse people with a criminal record or whose way of life is "unsuitable."

Those claiming compensation are investigated by civil servants and medically examined. Then one of a panel of lawyers decides how much compensation is called for.

In difficult cases or appeals, evidence is heard by three lawyers. The board takes into account state welfare payments or court reparation orders.

Reclaiming Campground Effluent Water from a Gamma Ray

WOODBRIDGE heads the physics department and is research director. He founded FTT's Unit-Down as he can enter the search in 1968.

The sewage flows from there into an air-bubbling aeration tank where ash created disposal plants. 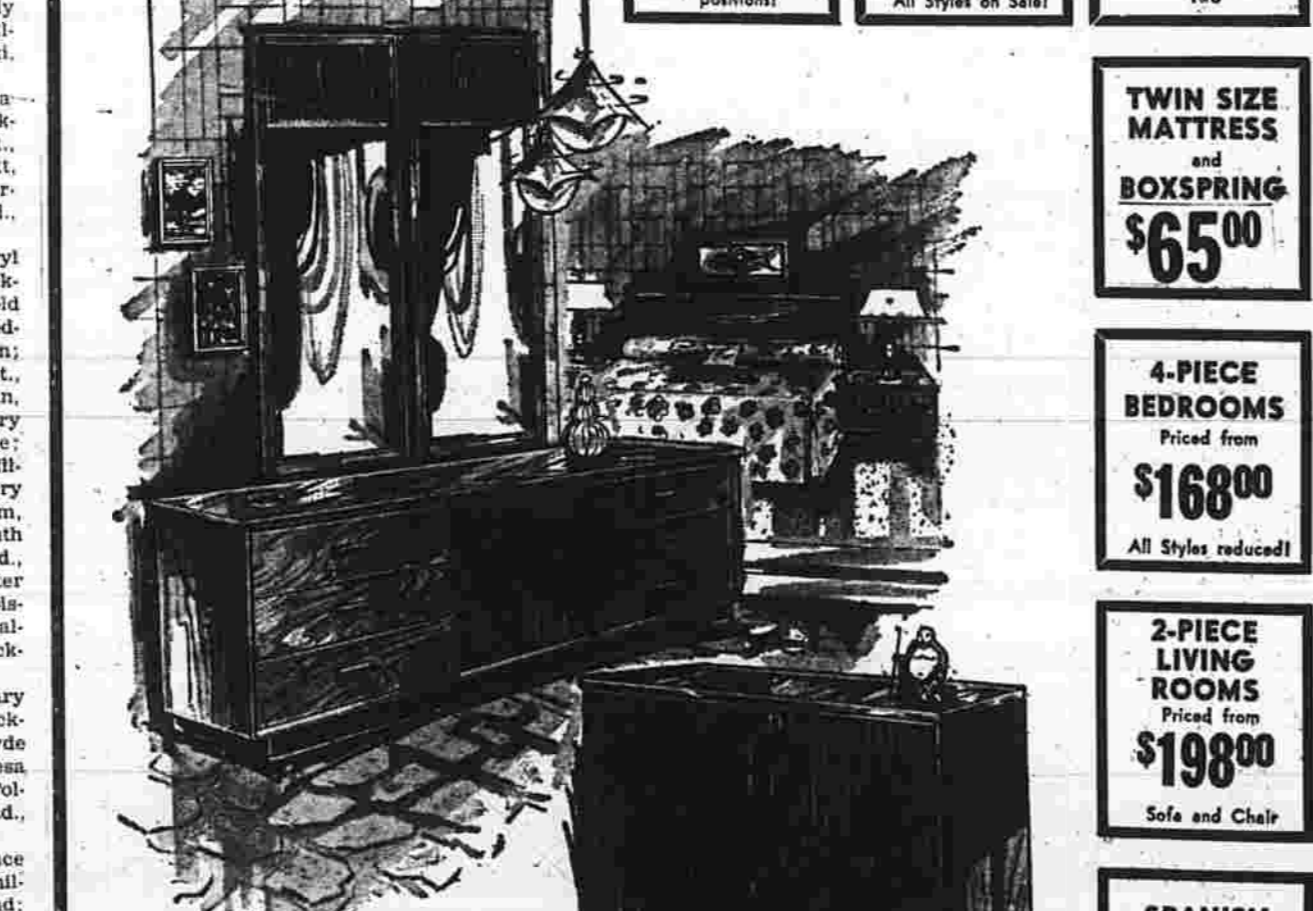

The 87,000 plant essentially until just before final filtering, the effluent is bombarded with gamma rays from a cobalt-60 source. The process is flexible. Water can be treated to such purities it can be drunk, or it can receive lesser treatment for use in irrigation.

Tradition with cobalt does more than rid the sewage of disease-causing viruses and bacteria; it also breaks up deadly pesticides and reduces by up to one third the quantity of phosphates and other nutrients in the water.

The plant has been in commercial operation for more than six months, treating sewage from trailers, bath houses, toilets and laundry machines at the Flaheating Creek Campground west of Lake Oketchoke.

He noted that water put through conventional plants, with chlorine added, will stunt vegetation. The irradiated water is so pure that not one weed has been affected at Flaheating Creek, he said.

The Flaheating Creek plant was approved by the Atomic Energy Commission and the state of Florida.

Thomas Savage, an environmental biologist from the Florida Department of Natural Resources, said the process "certainly seems to be very promising, especially the nutrient-reduction aspect."

We can hope, that, at the end of however many dark hours it takes to negotiate this passage through chaos, the United States can emerge with its military not unshaken again, its good intentions alive again, and find a more sober appreciation of these good intentions rising again among all those vitally concerned, who, as we have so frequently observed, include all of us everywhere.

Divorce Plagues Soviet
In the Communist East as in the capitalist West the high divorce rate is part of the price of increasing urbanization and industrialization. According to the Soviet youth magazine, *Smena*, more than a million Russian men and women were affected by the break-up of their marriages in 1967. But there was only one new marriage for every 10 divorces.

The step rise in divorces continues, the journal reports, and Soviet sociologists are increasingly concerned at the emotional damage and personal suffering inflicted by the failure of so many marriages. The Kremlin leaders, on their part, are disturbed by the adverse effect of divorces on the birth rate and, consequently, on Russia's labor resources. Their prime interest lies in the success of the "materialist" economy.

The First Clenched
Events in the Near East have this week reached the grim stage which may be beyond human management. No one—not the coolest head in the State Department, not the most case-hardened aide, not the most carefully prepared to guarantee what will or will not happen before we emerge, somehow, at the other end of the dark passage created by too many elements of crisis coming indistinguishably together.

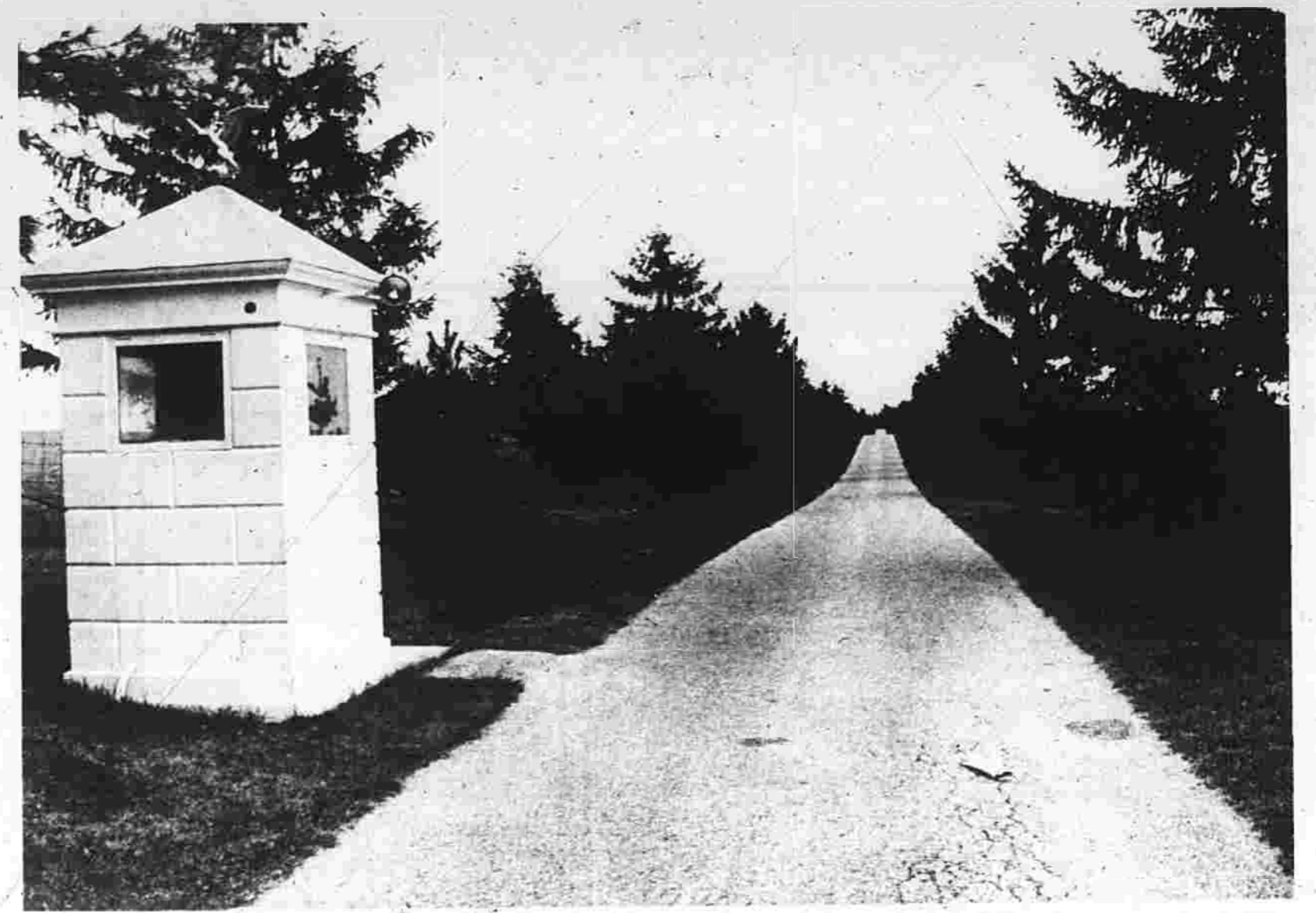

Bolton Finance Board Mulls How To Use Surplus

(By CLEMENCELL YOUNG, Herald Reporter)

According to the auditor's report, discussed at a Board of Finance meeting last night, the town ended the fiscal year last June with a surplus of \$241,396.

Made aware at the budget meeting last spring by the superintendent of schools and other residents that there would be a surplus of the amount to pay off notes amounting to \$60,000 of the anticipated surplus to reduce the mill rate on taxes raised to cover this fiscal year's expenses.

Specialty equipped rooms to handle various types of emergencies.

For example, there will be one room for patients with bone complications, another for eye-ear-nose-throat patients, and one for gynecological - obstetrical problems, and so on.

Also planned for the ground level are new clinic facilities, a new outpatient clinic, conference and classroom, a staff meeting room with 120-person capacity, and new initiation therapy facilities.

The second, or basement, level will contain the physical therapy department, which will be at least three times larger than the present department. It will include a large gymnasium, a separate hydrotherapy section with enlarged shower and whirlpool treatment booths, plus individual treatment booths and dressing rooms.

Part of the basement section is presently allocated for storage areas.

Phase I-B and the second level of the newly voted expansion, are both based on a long-range planning study made several years ago by a permanent hospital consultant in advance of the new east wing construction. The planning was confirmed by the trustees, medical staff and administration. Kenny pointed out.

Phase I-B, if begun this fall, is slated for completion by January or February of 1972, he said.

The timetable for the east wing calls for its opening in early 1971. That section-of-three stories and adding some 60,000 square feet of additional space to the hospital—constitutes a new suite of seven operations rooms, new radiology department with nine diagnostic x-ray units and new central sterile supply area.

The east wing will also increase the hospital's beds by 34 and will include a five-bed coronary care unit, three new intensive care units, and 22 intermediate care beds in 11 rooms. There will then be a total of 336 beds.

The architect for both the east wing and the other present expansion and renovation is Frid, Ferguson, Mahaffey & Perry of Hartford.

The second phase of the program voted last night is planned to begin after the new emergency room—physical therapy section is completed.

It has been dubbed in the planning as Phase I-A and will consist of the alteration and renovation of the present north, central and west wings at a projected cost of \$1.6 million.

Kenny pointed out that Phase I-A cannot begin before the completion of I-B because it will utilize spaces presently occupied and whose services cannot be curtailed.

The spaces to be gained under the second phase will be those vacated by the services moving into the new east wing; for example, the present surgery moves to the new suite.

"The process will be something akin to moving men around on a checkerboard," Kenny explained.

He said that the work for the two phases of the \$3.3 million program will be finished from the hospital's development funds (through the annual gift program) from gifts and bequests, and from borrowing through local commercial banks.

It is presently foreseen that the total to be borrowed will range between \$2 and \$2.6 million, he said.

Observers in Israel reported the retreat of the forces from the west bank of the Jordan. They said about 20 tanks had pulled back into Syria but it was not yet clear whether the Syrian withdrawal.

Jordan authorities said 91 Syrian tanks had been destroyed so far, with 26 of them knocked out in the past two days of fighting with Jordanian army tanks.

The roar of gunfire sounded through Amman during the night and throughout the morning, with most of the firing in the Jebel Wehbi residential district.

This is a district that the Jordanian army has been trying to clear of guerrillas since Sunday. Guerrillas told newsmen the army had been unable to return to the district despite attacks. But it looked as if the army had wrested control of most of the district from the guerrillas, who were still holding out in pockets.

Campus FBI Has Friend In Congress

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Nixon's request for authority to send the FBI onto campuses by bombing and arson is getting prompt and favorable action in Congress. Rep. Emanuel Celler, D-N.Y., chairman of the House Judiciary Committee, said the provision would be added to an omnibus crime bill on which the panel is putting finishing touches. Nixon outlined his request Tuesday to Republican congressional leaders at a White House conference attended by Atty. Gen. John N. Mitchell and FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover.

Plutonium Pile Triggers Alarm In British Plant

LONDON (AP) — A buildup of plutonium residue began an unplanned nuclear reaction and rang the safety alarm at Britain's Windscale Nuclear Power Plant, an inquiry has revealed. The radiation alarm rang Aug. 24 in a laboratory separate from the main plant in Cumberland, on the northwest coast of England. The laboratory, where plutonium is recovered from atomic wastes, has been closed since the alarm pending investigations.

Plutonium Pile Triggers Alarm In British Plant

The main Windscale plant, which produces nuclear material for bombs and generators, has remained in operation. The Atomic Energy Authority, in a statement Monday night, said another full inquiry was underway to determine exactly how the unexpected plutonium accumulation occurred. The radiation leak caused no active contamination, the statement said, and two men working in the secondary plant were unharmed. The plant itself was undamaged and no radioactive materials were released from it, the statement added. There was no danger of a massive explosion.

Test Tube Democracy

Think of television networks and jet transportation, and the United States will appear to be one vast, interconnected unit. But think of traffic laws and fishing regulations and the real estate taxes and grounds for divorce, and the United States will appear to be a jumble of diversities.

Such diversities can be confusing. But they are also rewarding in a way that is too often overlooked. Supreme Court Justice Louis Brandeis once put the matter as follows:

"It is one of the happy incidents of the federal system that a single courageous state may, if its citizens choose, serve as a laboratory; and try novel social and economic experiments without risk to the rest of the country."

This advantage of diversity is not the least bit theoretical. On the contrary, there are countless examples of one state leading the way, trying out a new idea, while other states wait and see how it works—very much like a scientist watching an experiment in a test tube.

For instance: is it a good idea to give the customers of door-to-door salesmen a "cooling-off period," during which they may reconsider and cancel the order? Some say this would protect the gullible buyer from high-pressure salesmanship. Others say it would put an unfair burden on the legitimate firms engaged in this field. A number of states are now putting the idea to a test.

Or: is it a good idea for the state to pay compensation to the victims of violent crime? Some say this would be fulfilling a moral obligation of the state. Others say it would be just another costly boondoggle. Several states are now trying it out.

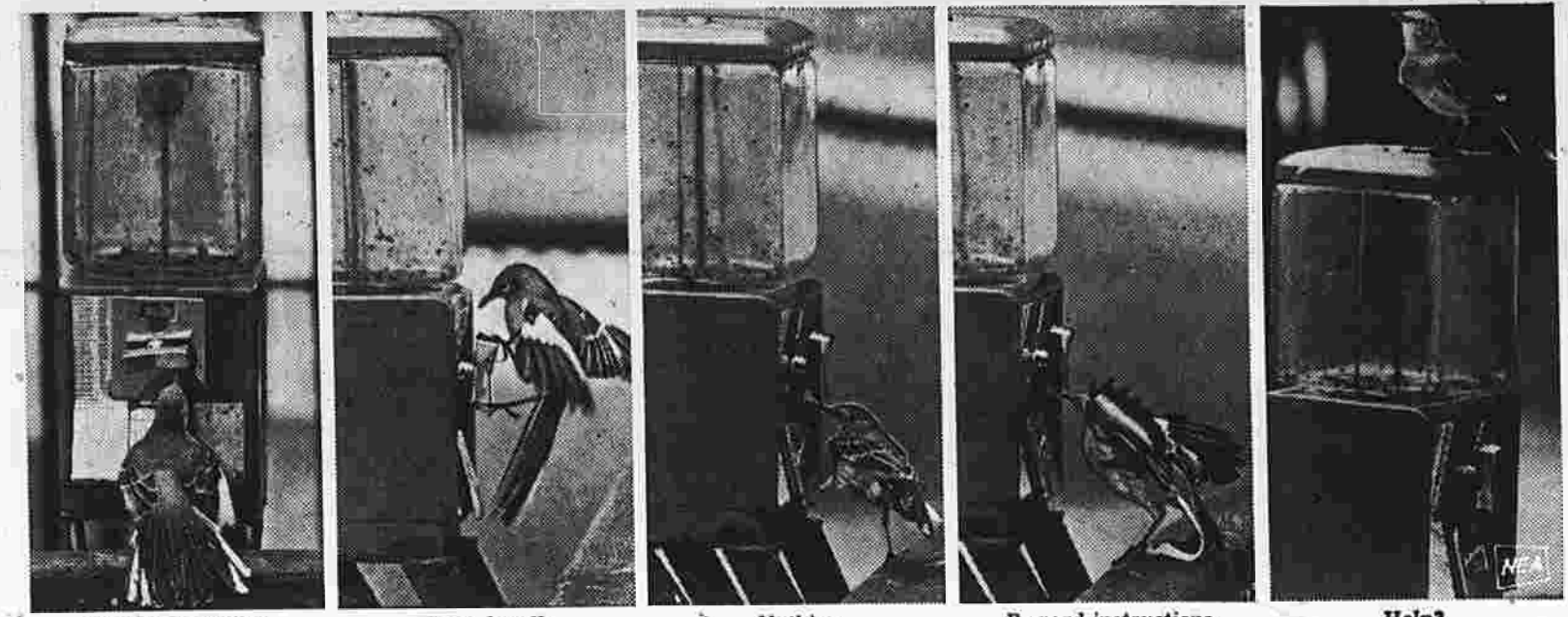
Of course, no two states are exactly alike. Lawmakers, considering a new program, will weigh local conditions and consult local opinion. Yet, they will also be influenced by finding out what actually happened when the idea was tried in a sister state.

"The science of government," said an earlier Supreme Court, "is the science of experiment."

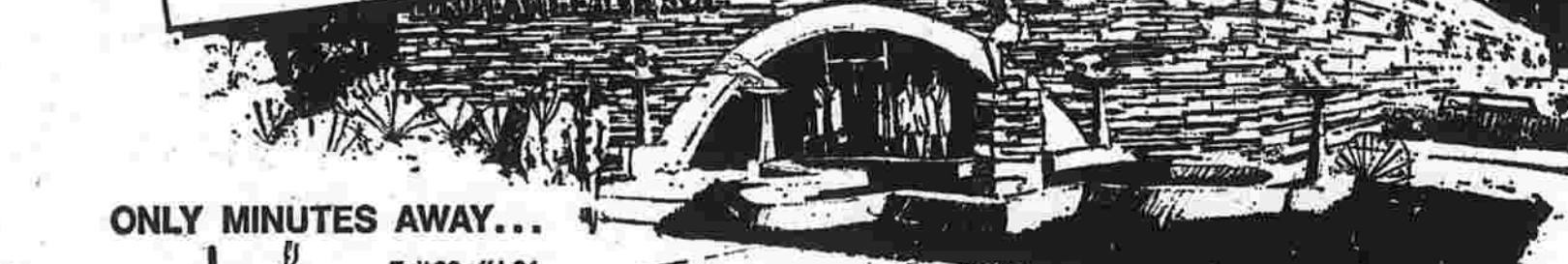

Nation's Weather

Autumn arrived today with fair and mild weather along the eastern seaboard, lingering rain over much of the Midwest and crisp temperatures from the Rockies to the Great Lakes.

Clear and generally pleasant weather prevailed in most of the Far West, but weeks of rainless days created serious fire hazards up and down California. Flames raced over 200 acres Tuesday in the Berkeley Hills area and destroyed 27 homes.

Too much rain—up to seven inches in two days—caused flooding in parts of eastern Kansas and Missouri. Six inches swamped the Kansas City area since early Monday and forced evacuation of some homes. Although flood waters receded in some areas, light rain continued.

Fifty inmates and two guards were isolated by high water from a creek on a Kansas prison farm at Lansing. Officials added, however, that the men were in no danger and had food and drinking water.

Downpours through most of Tuesday ranged from Oklahoma to the Great Lakes. Soakings in excess of two inches were common.

The rains sometimes came in violent thunderstorms. A tornado do swopped into Urbana, in west-central Missouri, late Tuesday and demolished a trailer home. A man inside suffered minor injuries.

Temperatures before dawn of the storm fell soared to record late-September highs in the 80s and 90s Tuesday and created a power shortage from New York to Virginia. Overnight lows in the middle 70s were common.

A fresh wave of cooler weather slipping in behind the storm region dropped temperatures into the 40s and occasional 30s from the interior of the Pacific Northwest to the northern Great Lakes.

Gusts up to 60 miles an hour swept Great Falls, Mont., as a deepening storm developed over southwestern Canada.

Temperatures before dawn ranged from 34 at Hibbing, Minn., to 83 at Pensacola, Fla.

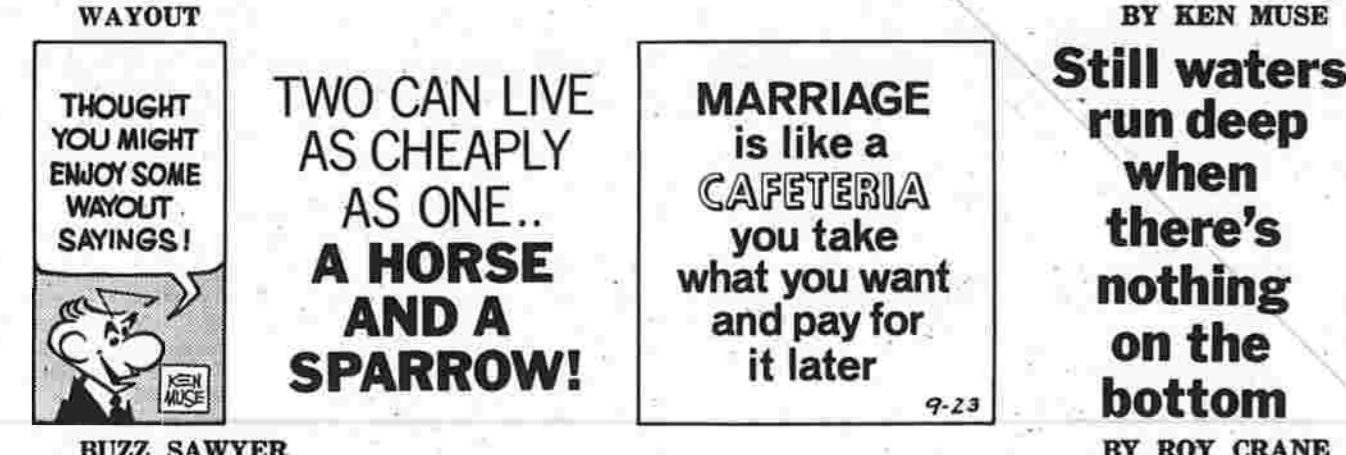

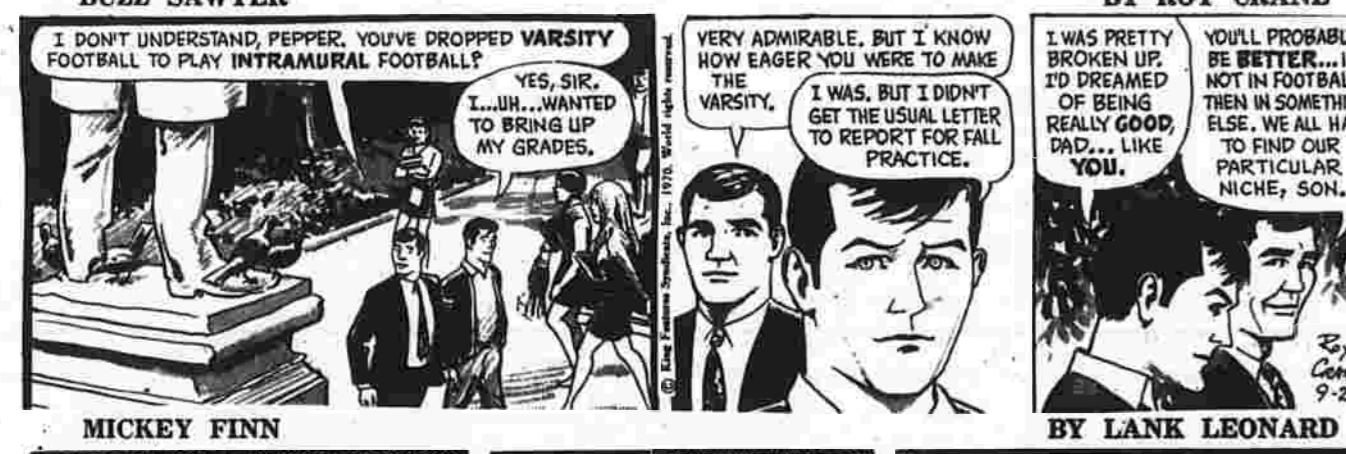

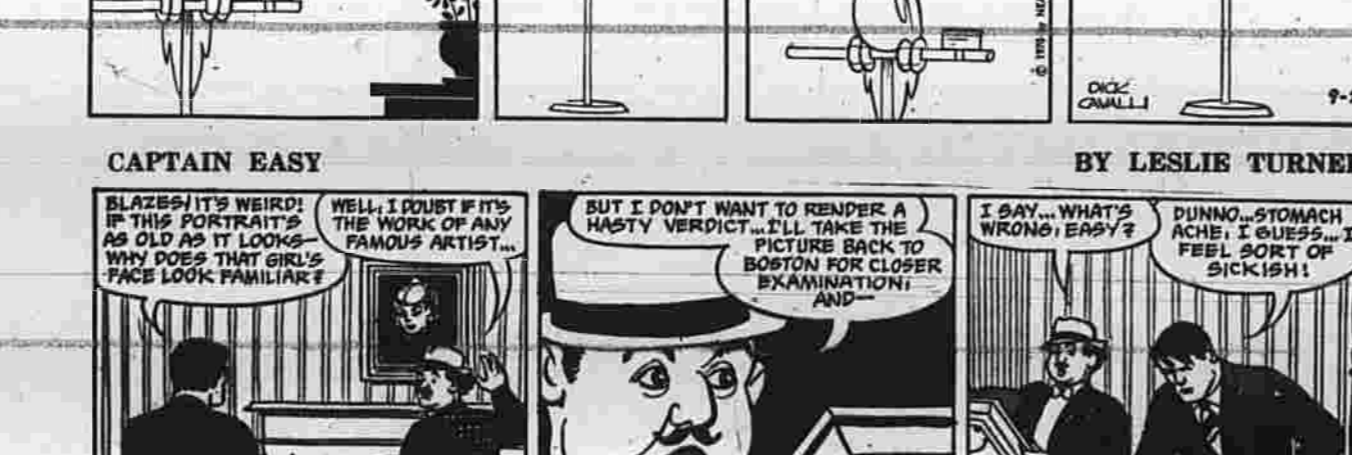

GI Casualty Rate Drops in Vietnam

SAIGON (AP) — The U.S. Command announced today that 82 Americans were killed and 333 wounded in action in the Vietnam war last week, the lowest overall casualty toll in 4 1/2 years.

U.S. Rejects Part of Cong Peace Bid

PARIS (AP) — The United States formally replied today to the Viet Cong's "new peace initiatives" by affirming that Washington "will not impose any government on the people of South Vietnam."

At the same time, Ambassador David K. E. Bruce said the United States "continues to favor withdrawal of all outside forces" as a necessary condition for the Viet Cong's demand for a U.S. commitment to withdraw unilaterally from Vietnam by next June 30.

Last week, Mrs. Nguyen Thi Binh coupled a June 30 withdrawal demand with that of replacing the present Saigon leaders in return for a cease-fire against American troops and negotiations on prisoners of war.

In the first formal U.S. reply to Mrs. Binh's proposals of a week ago, Bruce said: "I have reviewed the statements at last week's session. While you have rearranged some of the elements of your earlier proposals and added certain detail to them, it would appear that your fundamental demands remain unchanged."

"However, if you intended in your latest statements to convey new positions, we would welcome further clarification from you."

Bruce seemed to be giving a direct answer to the political pleads in Mrs. Binh's proposals when he said: "On the question of a political settlement, you maintain your long-standing demand that the government of the republic of (South) Vietnam be formed by a coalition of all political groups in the country."

The position of the United States on the issue of a political settlement is clear: The United States will not impose any government on the people of South Vietnam. The question of a political settlement in South Vietnam is an internal matter of the South Vietnamese people.

In Israel, 50 miles north of Amman, Jordanians were reported to have broken through the Israeli lines and entered the city.

Mass Guerrilla Surrender Reported by Jordanians

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — Fierce Jordanian army attacks were reported to have broken Palestinian resistance in northern Jordan today and Amman radio said 5,000 guerrillas had surrendered to the new peace move was launched by the Arabs.

Two Palestinian leaders left Cairo for Damascus to try to win approval of a cease-fire from Yasser Arafat, the guerrilla chief. He rejected the cease-fire Wednesday. They were expected to meet him in the Syrian capital.

The two Palestinians were among captured guerrilla leaders released by King Hussein of Jordan. They flew to Cairo with a four-man Arab peace mission Wednesday night.

Fighting slackened in Amman, Jordan's capital, after a flare-up during the morning and was confined to pockets of guerrilla resistance. This cleared the way for the evacuation of Americans and others from Amman.

A chartered Middle East Airlines plane landed in Amman to bring out 100 Americans and other foreigners.

Amman, Jordan (AP) — The fighting centered in and around Irbid, Jordan's second largest city 50 miles north of Amman. Israeli observers said the Jordanian army opened up a heavy artillery barrage against the guerrillas.

They said that after the shelling ended, Jordanian troops pursued the guerrillas. One source described the activity as a "pogrom," and said the guerrillas were afraid and were giving up.

The main Syrian force withdrew across the border, the informant said, and was centered near Deraa in southern Syria. It left behind 20 damaged or destroyed tanks and a number of armored personnel carriers, they reported.

In Irbid, 50 miles north of Amman, the guerrillas said the 6th Royal Artillery Battalion was firing indiscriminately at the town, but our fighters are holding fast and their morale is high.

The guerrillas also said one of the units pulled a Jordanian post in Salt, 20 miles northwest of Amman, knocking out three machine guns.

Bank Robbery Suspect Captured in Woods

AVON, Conn. (AP)—One suspect was in custody Wednesday night and the search continued for two others following an armed robbery at a local branch of the Simsbury Bank and Trust Co. Wednesday afternoon.

Police had a running gun battle through a heavily wooded area with three men suspected of committing the holdup.

The suspect was identified by police as William Radcliffe, 40, of Hartford. The area where he was captured—about 1/2 mile from the bank—was immediately surrounded in search of two other men, but they were not apprehended.

Radcliffe offered "some" resistance and was carrying a sawed-off shotgun when he was arrested according to police. He was charged with conspiracy to commit robbery; two counts of assault with intent to commit murder; and carrying a loaded shotgun in a vehicle.

Bond was set at \$100,000. Several shots were fired at an off-duty policeman as the bandits emerged from the bank, police said. There were no reports of injuries.

The trio escaped with about \$40,000, according to the bank president, Thornton Morris. Police announced they had cornered the suspects in the woods. (See Page Four)
