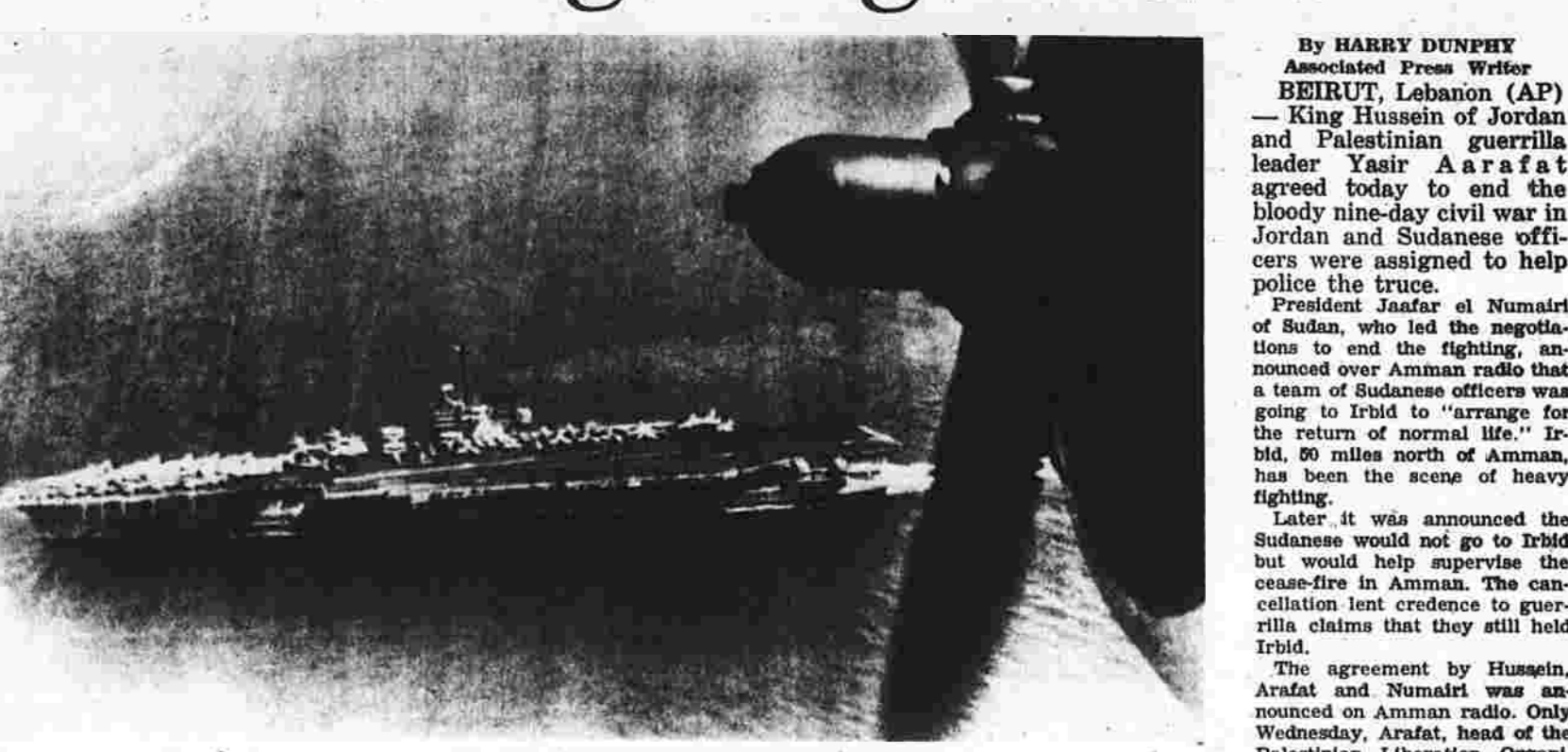

After leaving the Porter Reservoir, the brook ran free until it came to a small earthen dam on the upstream side of Porter St. This turned the water into a small ditch that crossed under the street then followed the building of a new covered contour along the north bank of the valley until it turned to the south. There opposite the Calhoun Farm and on the side hill it flowed across under Oak Grove St. O. C. remembers the bank going toward Autumn St. has been a shoddy mill. About at this point the brook entered "Ingals Pond." That was a deep pit in it's day but now it had an immense water-wheel of the dam had gone out before O. C. can remember, leaving only a small pond then known as the "Ricky." The washout in the highway hit a deep narrow ravine. Two long tree trunks

west across Autumn St. and came to the attention of the Charter Oak for some distance when it makes quite a sharp angle south to pass under Charter Oak St. O. C. remembers the foundations of a long gone shoddy mill in the back of that turn of the brook. Its power came from water leaving Ingals Pond, crossing Autumn St. in a ditch that followed the hill contour north of the brook. Many of these old mill-races were still there when O. C. was a boy, but many have now been obliterated by land developers. Even brooks and ponds have disappeared. It is not clear to O. C. how this water was led all the way to the Charter Oak woolen mill. To maintain its level, the ditch or race must have followed close to the line of Charter Oak St. It seems that those houses on the south side of the street and west of Spruce St. were on land filled over the race. O. C. remembers the west end of the race ditch from the houses along the base of the retaining wall. (all built below) Below on the bottom of the valley was the Charter Oak mill that brought O. C.'s family to Manchester. It seems that his grandfather was a wood carter and spinner from England. Because the water wheels would vary so much in the years, the threads were not uniform in size. He invented a governor that closed the gate to admit less water when the wheel started to speed up and opened to increase the flow when the wheel tended to slow down. For many years he moved with his family around New England, New York, Ohio and Michigan installing his water-wheel spinning mills. The Charter Oak operation was his last.

That mill had long since gone out of operation when O. C. remembers the building still standing and used as a storage warehouse, but there was no sign of a water wheel or race. Its water must have gone into Gould's pond.

Coventry Board of Education To Meet With Curriculum Committee

The Board of Education last meeting of the council on Oct. 13 will be implemented. Stanford Names New President

STANFORD, Calif. (AP) — Richard W. Lyman, who called police to the Stanford University campus for the first time last year to end what he called a "tyranny of coercion," has been named the university's seventh president.

The 46-year-old historian has served as Stanford's fourth president since the resignation of Kenneth S. Pitzer last June after 18 months on the job.

Pitzer quit after a turbulent spring in which radicals disrupted the pain-free, 11,000-student campus and did half a million dollars property damage.

Lyman's unanimous appointment was announced Thursday by W. Farmer Fuller III, president of the Board of Trustees, and received immediate endorsement of faculty, student leaders and alumni.

In Primary Vote
BOSTON (AP) — The official vote tabulation from the Sept. 15 Democratic state primary shows Sen. Edward M. Kennedy dropped about 7 percentage points from the vote he completed in the 1968 primary where he also ran unopposed.

Figures released Thursday show Kennedy received 517,463 of the 704,102 vote cast, or about 74 per cent. Six years ago, Mrs. Kennedy got 668,791 of the 700,838 vote total, or about 95 per cent.

South Windsor Library Plans To Join Region Lending Project

The South Windsor Public Library and the Rockville Public Library announced today that their respective library boards have approved participation in the Reciprocal Borrowing Demonstration Project inaugurated by the Capitol Region Library Council.

On Sept. 21, the Hartford Public Library extended guest privileges to suburban residents, and suburban libraries are now lending to Hartford residents free of charge. To borrow books from Hartford, a suburban resident need only present a valid card from his home library. Suburban libraries will reciprocate by honoring valid cards from Hartford.

Hartford Librarian Edwin Jackson explained that the Hartford Library Board has authorized him to open Hartford's facilities to suburban borrowers on an experimental basis. Hartford, where expected demands will be heaviest, will receive the bulk of \$200,000 in special funds awarded to the Capitol Region Library Council to operate the regional project.

If public response in the first year of the project is favorable, the Council may seek to extend the experiment beyond June 1971 for a second year. More libraries would then grant guest privileges to all area residents on a cooperative basis.

The Capitol Region Library Council was established last year to promote improved library services for all residents of the Capitol Region.

More than 70 libraries in the Capitol Region and nearby areas are working together under Council sponsorship to pool resources for the benefit of all.

The Council operates a Capitol Region Reference Service for member libraries and will soon announce new projects for member libraries, including public and private schools, colleges and universities, business and special libraries.

Dispatchers work in police headquarters, initiate transmit and receive radio, teletype and telephone calls for police, and handle broadcasts to the fire department. They must have the ability to speak correct English and operate deftly, and be able to keep records, follow written and oral instructions, and have limited clerical ability. Also they must possess normal hearing and normal speaking tones.

AP Filmstrip Features China

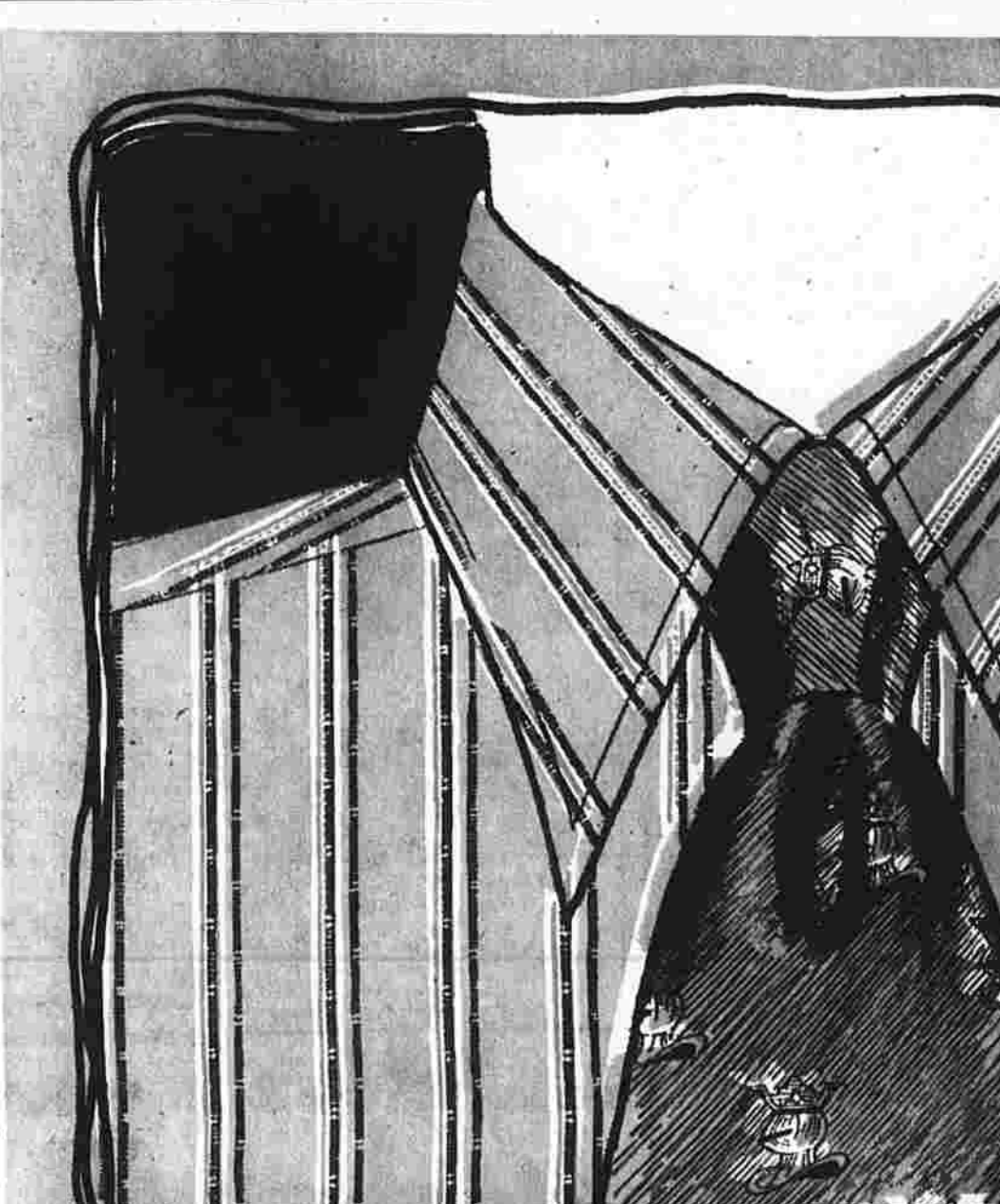

Second Steele-Pickett Debate Carried On in Subdued Tones

The second round in the two-part debate series between the two candidates for the congressional seat from the sprawling Second District was held last night in Vernon.

Republican candidate Robert Steele took on his Democratic opponent John Pickett on familiar territory in his home town church.

The debate proceeded smoothly on a subdued level throughout the evening. It lacked the emotions of Tuesday's first round debate on the Middle East situation before the Hadassah group of the Temple Beth Israel, but the room temperature was far more conducive to listening to political statements.

Neither candidate revealed any new ideas or programs which they have not already been calling for during the campaign.

Pickett summed up the nation's problems in two words: "Money and unemployment." While Steele defended his record on congressional reforms in favor of the energy program in Vermont and the need for federal revenue sharing programs.

Steele was particularly strong in his criticism of the present Congress which he alternately described as "helthless, doing nothing, ineffective."

He claimed Congress has passed only a few bills which he said would help improve the welfare reform legislation, the federal revenue sharing program which would bring Vermont \$300,000, according to the Republican, and the creation of uniform federal standards of industrial pollution control.

Both candidates favor removing the present law cutting on income which can be earned under social security, and Steele would like to see automatic cost of living adjustments made under the social security program.

Steele called for more attention to be given to education proposals which "would enable the traveling between Vernon and Hartford in less than 45 minutes at 7:30 a.m."

The nation's priorities should be reevaluated, according to both Steele and Pickett, both of whom advocate withdrawal from Vietnam and cuts in defense spending.

Both also called for conversion of the district industry to a peacetime economy, a situation which, according to Steele, should have been planned for five or ten years ago.

Steele, 43, second Steele, is both candidates also favor a strong Israel in the Middle East, and at home use of federal funding to create and transfer industrial areas for small or companies throughout the district.

They are both adamant about their opposition of the jobport proposed originally by Pickett's primary opponent for the nomination William Stanley of Norwich.

Steele described eastern Connecticut as "the stepchild in the state's economy for the past 15 years of Democratic rule." He would place emphasis on the area of geology as a possible industry for eastern Connecticut "which could do for us what NABA did for Florida and Texas."

Pickett placed major emphasis on the need for federal judicial reform. "My bag is the court system," he hopes to apply his "expertise and knowledge gained from 12 years in the General Assembly and as chairman of the State Senate Judiciary Committee to this task." "An effective court system is the bedrock of democracy," he explained.

The difficulties of obtaining money for mortgages and business purposes and the other problems caused by inflation were described by Pickett.

Pickett would fight for increased spending in the areas of education, health and housing, and was critical of President Nixon's recent vetoes in these areas.

Steele stated his opposition to several programs including the federal financing of the super-jumbo transport, to wage and price controls (at present) and sending troops to Cambodia. He surprisingly would favor admitting Red China to the United Nations and will seek a seat on the Foreign Relations Committee if elected to Congress, taking advantage of his background in this area.

Pickett expressed the opinion it is important to have a Democratic Congress, "accumulating the President's lack of action" and the vice president of a "tendency to pull apart the people of the United States."

Steele on the other hand, stated "we don't need a Democratic or a Republican congress, we need an effective one." He attributed inflation to the large budget deficits accumulated under the previous two Democratic administrations.

Arab Leaders Say Hussein Violates Truce in Jordan



By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS King Hussein of Jordan formed a new government today to work for reconstruction of his strife-ravaged country as Arab leaders accused him and his army of violating the new cease-fire.

Ahmed Toukan, a Palestinian who was chief of Hussein's royal court, was named prime minister. Toukan is a former deputy prime minister.

From Cairo, President Ishtar el Numairi of Sudan, who led an Arab peace mission to Amman today, said the cease-fire Friday, accused Hussein of personal responsibility for the bloodshed.

Coming on the heels of President Gama! Abdel Nasser's harsh rebuke to Hussein's royal court, was named prime minister. Toukan is a former deputy prime minister.

"We tried to implement the cease-fire," Numairi told a news conference, "but we failed because one of the parties violated the agreement." He left no doubt that in his view the violations came exclusively from the Jordanian side.

Guerrilla leader Yasar Arafat flew to Cairo with Numairi Friday night to represent the Palestinian viewpoint at a continuing meeting of Arab leaders in the Egyptian capital.

Numairi said the Egyptian Embassy in Amman, which serves as headquarters for his delegation, was fiercely shelled by Jordanian artillery while the group sheltered there—despite a truce ordered by Arafat and Hussein.

He announced that he had received word from his 17-year-old son who is among the 38 Americans still in guerrilla hands.

David Raab wrote his parents, Rabbi and Mrs. Mena-chem Raab of Trenton: "Dear Mom and Dad, Feeling Fine. Hope to be home soon. Be Well, Love, David."
