





Historically, the President said, the death of leaders has not seemed to have an immediate serious effect. He cited as an example the death of President Ho Chi Minh of North Vietnam. However, he said, in most previous cases the leader was an old man whose death was expected. He said this was hardly

the case with Nasser Secretary of State William P. Rogers, Secretary of Defense Melvin R. Laird and presiden-tial security adviser Henry A. Kissinger attended the shipboard meeting. An account of the President's views was made known to newsmen accompanying him.


Nixon and his aides this morning ran down a list of five possible candidates who might succeed Nasser, but all those on the list were deemed of second rank, and American officials were not making any predictions as to who might take power in Cairo.

Part of the problem, it is believed, is that there may be some unknown army officer in Egypt who has a potentially strong following. It is unclear to U.S. officials who may have the strongest power base.

Nasser's death came as a surprise to the presidential party.

### A Sobering Loss

As frequently happens with troversial figures, death has uncovered more respect for Gamial Abdel Nasser than was offered him during his life. Even his enemies, relieved at last of that bombast which was always so much fiercer than any actual blow he had it in his power to deliver, can now concede that he was, relatively speaking, something of a moderate, safe factor in the Near East situation.

Momentarily, at least, everyone is going to feel less secure, now that this one man is no longer holding the position he himself made the most powerful position in the Arab world.

The Egyptian people, to whom he gave their first modern hope of self respect, discarded, and henceforth withheld their first real liberation from domestic from the public view, something could and foreign enslavement, are going to be done to see that the great crop of feel leaderless.

The Arab world, which, in its jealousies and diversions, really never gave him much of a chance with his dreams of Arab unity, is nevertheless going to miss one solid point of reference and rally in time of crisis, and perhaps sink back toward its natural chaos and

The modern Russian empire, which, ollowing the blunders of United States diplomacy while it was under the stewardship of the late John Foster Dulles, had welcomed the opportunity to try to make Nasser into a cooperative agent with its age old dreams of a position of influence in the Mediterranean, now has to realize that it is suddenly without anybody responsible to deal with, which makes its meddling in the area twice as risky as it was beford.

Finally, the hope of the Nixon Administration that it could lead the way toward negotiation in the Near East was a hope which depended greatly on the fact that President Nasser was, alone of almost all the figures and powers in the Near East, willing to take the risks which could help the American peace effort get off the ground.

If there was little enough hope in the peace effort as it now stood, marred by ' Nasser's own violations of the cease-fire agreement he helped bring about, there seems still less hope today.

Still, things could hardly become much more desperate than they have seemed to be in the last few weeks. In the conference he hosted just before his death, there had been achieved a semblance of civil peace in Jordan. But prospects for any fruitful negotiation in the basic confrontation in the Near East were still dark and dim.

The world may surprise itself by making up for Nasser's loss, by tempering its conduct out of a new wariness of the potentially - uncontrollable situation. Presient Nixon, on the Sixth Fleet, ready to play those war games which were to warn Nasser and Russia about that American "presence" in the Mediterranean, has cancelled the display out of deference to the news from Cairo, and the knowledge that the general situation has now become even more explosive may stimulate others to more careful conduct.

### **Information Without Ugliness?**

Secretary of the Interior Walter Hickel is sharpening up his department's crusading against the existence of billboards on any federally owned land, and this will be hailed, by the admirers of America beautiful, as a logical continuation of the effective use of federal power to ban billboards completely from the great new roads of the federal system. It is indeed pleasant to see the country, without having to try to peer between billboards to see it.

preciate having, as he enjoys his passage down the modern scenic superhighway Various possible solutions suggest themselves. There could be businesslike directory billboards at the approach to

exits, with listing space to be sold to enterprises which wished to advertise just their name and their location. There might be, at various intervals, turn-offs into billboard parks, screened from the highway, in which commercial enterprises along the road could take as much space as they wished for whatever kind of promotional advertising they desired. The billboard was, and is, a blight 'on the countryside. At the same time, there was, and is, a service the billboard could render to the motorist which was valuable to him, since it saved him time and trouble. There ought to be found some way of getting vital travel information to the motorist without interfering with the visual pleasure of his journey.

### "Lifelike" White House "Flowers"

As with those new uniforms for the White House special police, the main issue is one of taste, and a certain amount of damage has therefore already been done, beyond repair.

But it still could be that, just as some elements of the banana republic grandeur in the first appearance of the new White House constabulary could be artificial flowers now being prepared for the White House could be lost,

I manipulate the flowers to suggest a droop here, some wilting there. The effect should be lifelike, never stiff. Another important thing to remember is never to use too many flowers. I don't believe in tight arrangements."

So, if it has to be artificial flowers, the White House seems in good hands. But couldn't the garden clubs of

Or pay the salary of a special White House arranger and vase emptier if that is the trouble? Would it even be objectionable to have all the nation's taxpayers invited to share whatever extra financial burden might be involved in keeping the White House floral displays authentic representations of the beauty these 50 states produce?
