Israeli Member of Parliament Outlines His Plan for Peace

By JUNE LINTON (Herald Reporter)

A plan for peace in the Middle East was presented last night at the University of Connecticut by its author, one of the young and most controversial members of Israel's parliament.

Uri Avnery, 46, also one of his nation's top-rated journalists, is touring the United States, speaking mostly at colleges to promote his solution to the continuing crisis, and in his own words, "to alert especially young people to the wide variety of opinion in my own country."

He said he really believed Nasser would have played an important role in an ultimate solution to the crisis, but he was well under way to doing this, Avnery said, but after Nasser's death "I wouldn't see the such an unqualified statement."

He said he had been very close physically to Nasser when they were both soldiers fighting in the same section during the Israeli war, "on one side and I on the other." "These were all night battles," he said, "and there must have been dozens of times we met," but he added, "we were never properly introduced."

Avnery said he felt Nasser had evolved in his thinking at the point where, as the Israeli expressed it, "I don't feel he was finished."

He cautioned that the death of Nasser shouldn't take the focus off the real problems which he feels are not based on a war between Israel and Egypt but rather between Israel and the people he said Nasser couldn't control, the Palestinians. They, he said, are at the bottom of all the problems. He called them "the forgotten people in the Middle East."

They are forgotten to the extent that Israel's Premier Golda Meir says there are no Palestinians. Added Avnery, "except that there are three million people who think they are Palestinians and that's good enough for me."

He spoke of prospects under the plan for a healthy economy for dealing with the refugee problem. He emphasized that what Israel wanted more than anything was recognition by the Arabs.

He said he feels that instead of dealing with governments in Israel, especially those displaced equally unrealistic, although plans for this exist among both those pushing a movement for a gaggle Israel and the fed-ayeen.

A liberated Palestine would not be accepted by Israel and there would have to be total destruction. A single state with Israel controlling the Arabs would soon outgrow her the Jews, "not the kind of state the fathers had in mind."

He stressed that it's a question of nationalism rather than religion and the two peoples feel so strongly they could not live together. The only solution, he believes, is his plan for two states.

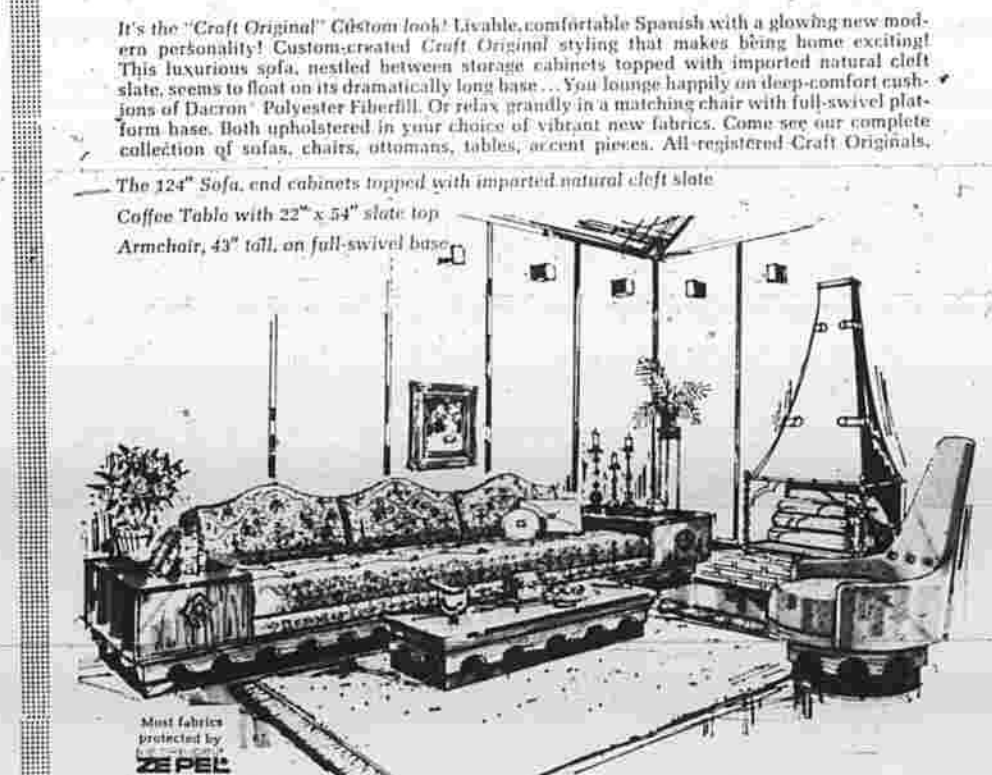

Humiliation, Frustration Were on Nasser's Mind

Editor's Note: Miles Copeland, former U.S. diplomat and author of "The Game of Nations," had been a close friend of the late Gamal Abdel Nasser since 1953, when Copeland first served as a consultant to the Egyptian government. He still visits Egypt every two months and held day-long talks with the Egyptian president in April. In this article Copeland describes some of Nasser's attitudes toward Israel, the United States and the Arab world.

LONDON (AP)—"Israel is a country of two million people," the late President Nasser told me recently, "and we are a country of 30 million."

"For Israel to be able to fly its airplanes over Cairo any time it wants is as humiliating to me as it would be to you if the Cubans were able to fly over Washington and your armed forces were powerless to stop them."

Humiliation. This was the feeling which was particularly painful to Nasser, and up to the day of his death it was the most on his mind.

Next to frustration, that is, in September 1969, Israeli raiders struck deep into Egyptian territory and for an enclave kidnapped a radar base. A group of senior Egyptian army officers reacted by partly curbing Nasser's power, at least to the extent of inducing him to cancel a number of dismissals, and to agree in the future to accept their "advisory" on promotional assignments and transfers.

At the same time Nasser suffered a heart attack then described as a severe case of influenza. His doctors advised him that his life expectancy would be short unless he agreed to cut down his working day from the usual 14 hours to a reasonable four or five.

Since then Nasser had been trying to operate in a sort of chairman of the board capacity. To one whose style was tactics rather than strategy, the experience must have been terribly frustrating.

One of his closest subordinates told me a month ago, "The boss feels very uncomfortable in delegating to us, and he's right."

By the time of the peace initiative by U.S. Secretary of State William P. Rogers, it appeared that Nasser had simply begun to let things slide.

The world will never know how Nasser really felt about the Rogers initiative, or the possibility of peace with Israel.

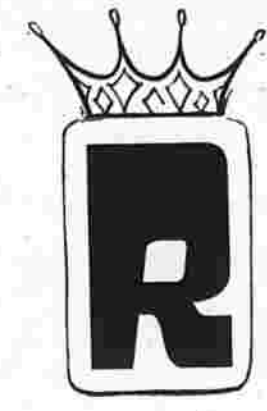

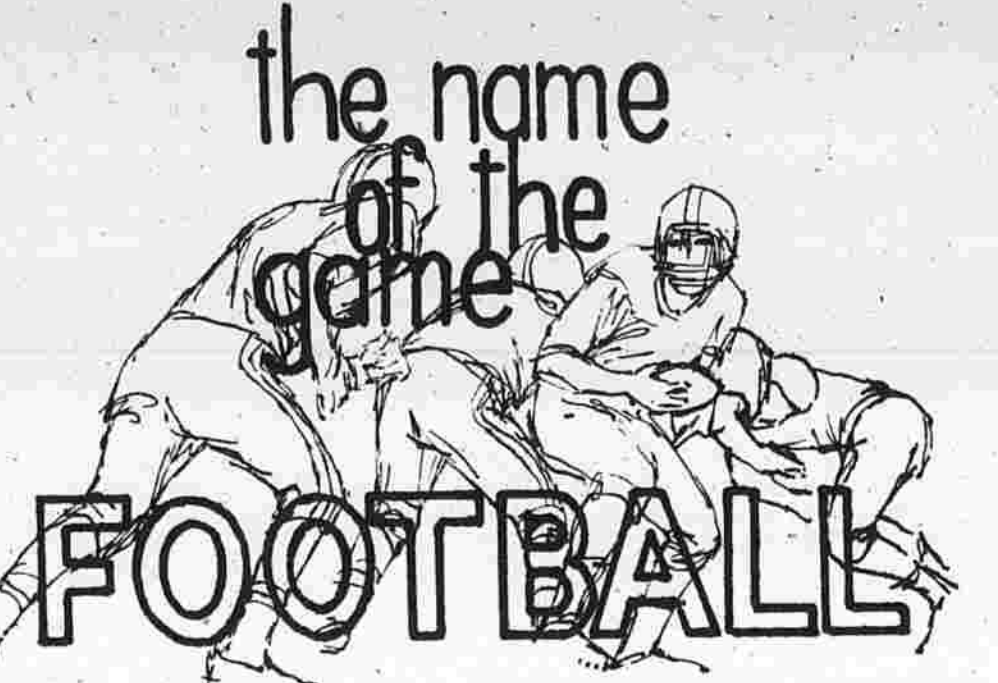

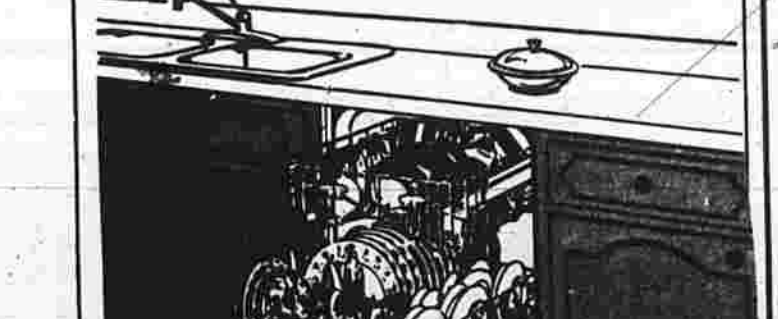

Drugs Held OK to Use On Pupils

WASHINGTON (AP) — Government specialists have told a House subcommittee that behavior-modifying drugs are apparently medically sound and perfectly safe for treating certain learning disabilities in school children.

But the congressional subcommittee also heard testimony Tuesday from witnesses who complained that school administrators in Omaha, Neb. and Little Rock, Ark. had pressured parents to allow drug treatment for their overactive youngsters.

Harvard lecturer John Holt, author of the book "How Children Fail" and a "lively, curious, energetic children" may be so bored by classrooms they become hostile and are inattentive, only given drugs to quiet them in class.

Rep. Cornelius E. Gallagher, D-N., chairman of the subcommittee looking into the use of tranquilizing drugs to change children's behavior patterns, said he remains skeptical of the merits of such drugs.

Dr. Ronald Lipman, a National Institute of Mental Health clinical psychologist, estimated that 150,000 to 200,000 children are being treated with such drugs.

Although the drugs act as stimulants in adults, for some reason they calm overactive children up to 12 years old, said Dr. Thomas Points, a deputy assistant secretary of the Department of Health Education and Welfare.

Complaining of the use of the drug, Mrs. Daniel Youngs of Indianapolis said she and her husband had had their 4-year-old son after a three-year "nightmare" of harassment from school officials who wanted her son and daughter to be given drugs at a child center at the University of Tennessee Medical Center.

But Dr. John E. Peters, head of child psychiatry at the University of Arkansas Medical Center, said he was not aware of any pressure by school administrators to send children to the center.

Theodore J. Johnson, an Omaha medical research chemist, told he knew of parents there who also said they were pressured by school officials to allow drug treatment, he said Oct. 12.

Hess Sits In Shadow At Spandau

BERLIN (AP) — Rudolf Hess, once Adolf Hitler's deputy, begins his fifth year in a private prison Thursday as a sick old man who whines away his hours in private shadows on a hillside near the city.

Hess has been brighter and in better spirits in recent weeks, informants say, although they concede his overall condition has deteriorated during the last year.

Hess now is 76 and the only inmate of Spandau prison, built for 600 inmates. He entered a British military hospital for treatment of a perforated stomach last November—the first time he has left confinement since he parachuted on his own in 1941 and was captured.

The Nuremberg war tribunal found him guilty in 1946 of plotting and waging aggressive war and sentenced him to life imprisonment. The only other prisoners at Spandau—Albert Speer, the Third Reich's War Production minister, and Hitler Youth leader Baldur von Schirach—were discharged on Sept. 30, 1969, after serving 20 years.

During his hospitalization, a Navy enlisted woman charged that because of terminated pregnancy was based on a double sexual standards and violated her constitutional rights.

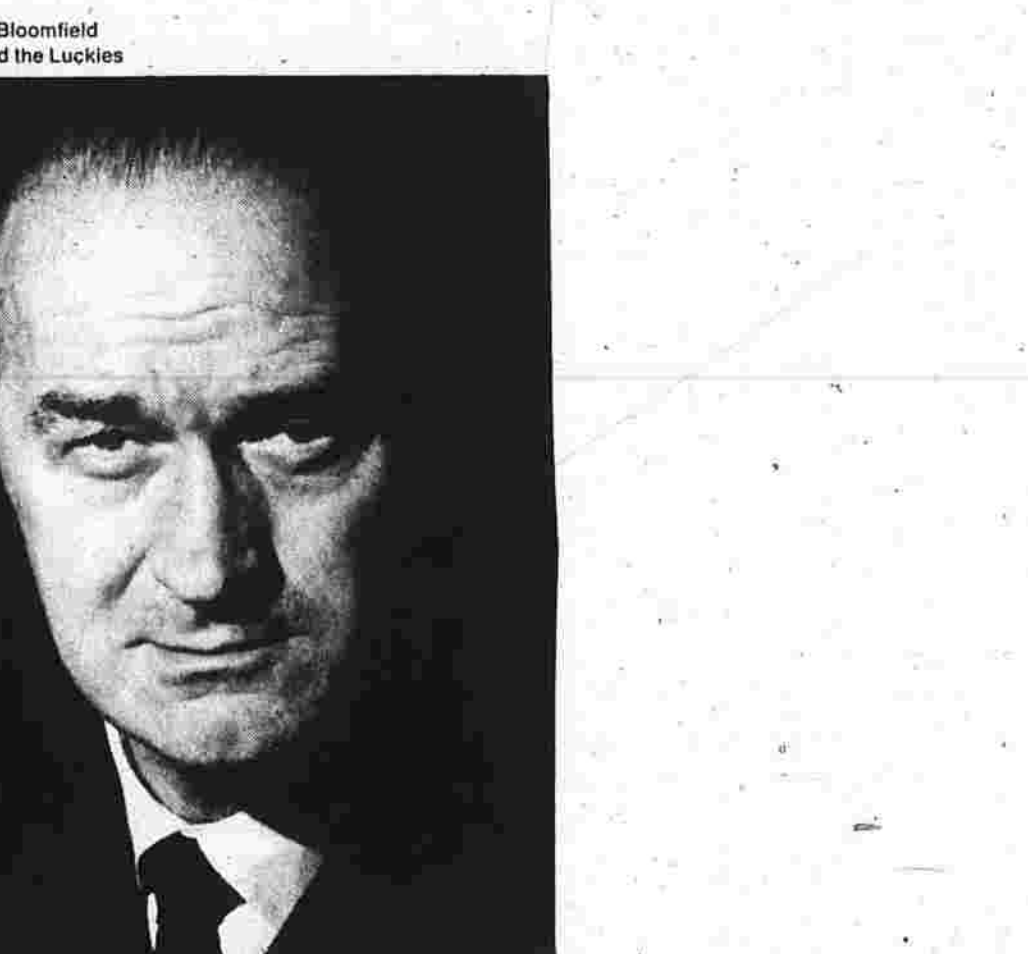

NEW YORK (AP) — If anything is more likely to rise than taxes it appears to be payroll fringe benefits, as they are called. Experience in the past 20 years shows that taxes don't always rise annually. But the record shows benefits do.

In fact, so large a portion of payroll consists of indirect payments that the word "fringe" has become a misnomer and the word "benefit" in beginning to sound as dated as corporate paternalism.

The latest survey of the situation shows that benefits now average 27.9 per cent of employer payrolls, which is to say that more than a quarter of your income may not show up in your paycheck.

The sharp contrasts from one company to another in the amount of such compensations make salary comparisons almost meaningless these days, and often disguise tremendous advantages and disadvantages in certain companies.

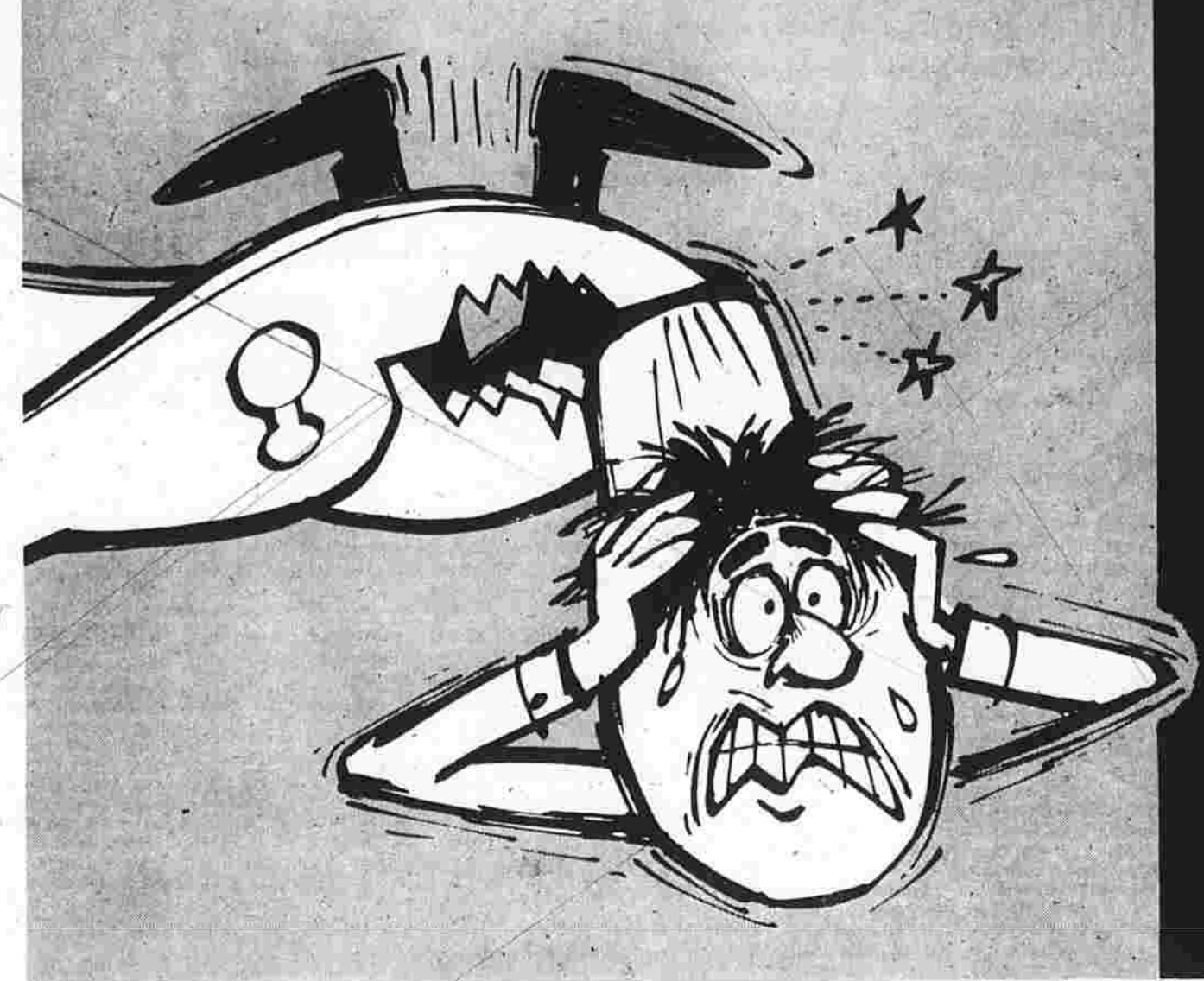

Banks May Merge
NEW HAVEN (AP) — It was announced here Monday that the directors of the First New Haven National Bank and the Connecticut National Bank of Bridgeport have approved a preliminary proposal to consolidate the two banks.

The proposal calls for a consolidated bank to be named the First Connecticut National Bank. It would operate under the charter of the New Haven bank, the oldest national bank charter in existence.

The head office would be in Bridgeport.

A merger must be approved by the boards of directors of both banks, shareholders, the comptroller of the currency and other regulatory agencies.

Dooley Urges Drugs Program in the Schools
A call for a comprehensive drug education program in the public school system, was issued today by Thomas H. Dooley, Democratic candidate for the post of state representative from Vernon.

"One of the basic causes of the tragic drug epidemic in Connecticut today is lack of knowledge on the part of the potential victims — our children," Dooley said.

"At the point a youngster cannot answer the question 'What have I got to lose?' he may indulge just once and begin an addiction which will have grave consequences for himself and his parents," Dooley cautioned.

Dooley expressed concern that the available information taken to eradicate this problem in Connecticut that many of the children who are being recruited into the drug trade are being made to feel that the medical effects of many drugs are "may well fall victim to an even greater tragedy."

"It is my confident that a well-planned program of drug education can supply our youngsters with more than one satisfactory answer to their question, 'What have I got to lose?'" he continued.

Muskie told newsmen Monday following a luncheon that he does not believe the technology yet exists to safeguard the natural environment.

He told the York County Regional Planning Commission that steps have to be taken to protect the Saco Valley from "hazardous land development" if it is to be saved from urban and suburban blight.

THE FAMILY LAWYER

Slander, Unlimited

In the heat of political debate, a lawyer calls a lawyer a crook. It is not a crook. Could he be making a pay damper for slander?

No, because the law grants a special immunity to all legislators, both state and federal. No matter what slanders they utter, within the legislative chamber, they cannot be held liable in court.

This may seem to be rank favoritism. But the rule is meant for the benefit of the public at large, not for the benefit of the legislators themselves. It frees them to do a better job, unhampered by the lurking fear of legal liability in case they happen to say something wrong.

For similar reasons, immunity is granted also to officials of the judicial and executive branches of the government. Take this case:

A judge, while questioning an arrested man, scolded him as a liar and a disgrace to the community. As it happened, the man was guilty of nothing at all. After being released, he sued the judge for slander.

But the court dismissed his claim, on grounds of the judge's special immunity. The court said: "How could a judge exercise his office if he were in daily fear of an action being brought against him?"

However, the less important the occasion, and the less important the official is the less reason there is to grant him immunity. Consider a case which grew out of a local council hearing on bus service. One of the council members, angered by a complaining citizen, denounced him wrathfully as a fraud. The charge was made simply out of malice, without the slightest basis in fact.

When the victim filed suit for slander, the councilman claimed immunity as a "lawmaker." But the court turned down his defense and held him liable. The judge said that at this lower legislative level, protecting an official was not an important part of an innocent person's good name.

U.S. Court Backs Bra-Less Dancer

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (AP) — A topless go-go dancer fired when her act was outlawed "will suffer immediate and irreparable injury to her asserted rights and freedom of expression" if she is stopped from appearing without a bra, a U.S. District Court judge ruled Monday.

Judge William A. McFae said Eve Lowe Spencer, 32, can dance without a bra despite a city ordinance passed Sept. 8 forbidding such performances.

In an earlier federal court fight Miss Spencer failed to overturn a state law prohibiting dancing minus her panties, too. The dancer's employer testified last week that Miss Spencer from her \$250-a-week job after the city ordinance was enacted.

A hearing on the merits of the ordinance will be held later.

Weicker Cites Record of '60s

WATERBURY, Conn. (AP) — The Democratic party would like to throw away the history book of world and state affairs for the last 10 years, Rep. Lowell P. Weicker Jr., R-Conn., charged here Monday night.

Speaking at a fund-raising dinner for his U.S. Senate campaign, Weicker told an audience of about 100: "Going into 1960, we had for 10 years recaptured the war in Vietnam on the national scene and for 10 years the Democratic party in Connecticut failed to either broaden the base of the state's industry or attract new industry."

"If the Democrats didn't do the job in 10 years, do you honestly think they are so reformed in a year and a half that Connecticut should trust them with another 10 years in public office?" Weicker asked.

Sammy Davis Quits Show Biz Then Naps

SEATTLE, Wash. (AP) — Sammy Davis, Jr. has told a Seattle audience he will quit entertaining, except for perhaps "one show a year."

"I've been in show business for 41 of my 44 years, and it's just gotten too heavy, man," he said Sunday night. "Mentally and physically, I've had it. I'm going to get out of the business and put myself back together."

He said he had never been so tired in his life. He might direct or entertain in perhaps one show a year, he said.

Following his performance, reporters waited backstage 40 minutes before being told that interviews were canceled because Davis was asleep in his dressing room.
