And with a flattery noble in purpose but unfair in its assignment of responsibility and performance, the Commission tries to place a great special burden on the President himself.

"Only the President," says the Commission, "can offer the compassionate, reconciling moral leadership that can bring the country together again, Only the President has the platform and prestige to urge all Americans, at once, to step back from the battle lines into which they are forming. "Only the President, by example and

by instruction, can effectively calm the rhetoric of both public officials and protesters whose words in the past have too often helped further divide the country, rather than unite it."

ecommended to the President is beautiful. But the Commission's similar, but alightly less eloquent exhortations to all the rest of us are no less important. There has to be responsive ground, for the good seed to fall upon and the good example to warm

One thing the Commission's report does do: It makes us all tingle with alarm over the state into which we have drifted: it makes us all wish there were some answers that could be put down on paper. If, in addition, it makes us wish, quite badly, there were something we ourselves could do, that will be better than par for a commission.

Toward Understanding

Service on President Nixon's Commis sion on Campus Unrest has come close to being the most stirring extra-curricular episode in my professional life. And that includes membership on President Eisenhower's Commission on Nations Goals in 1960.

The need for bridging the gap of u derstanding between the conventiona culture and the "new" culture, largely shared by young people, is very serious indeed It exists all over the world, but especially in an advanced industrial society like the United States.

At any rate, readers can ponder our report and recommendations for themselves, and reach their own conclusions came from our on-the-spot investigations and from direct exposure to many people, young and old. We also discussed and formulated our views for many long hours, pooling our observations and convictions.

We hope our report will not be made a regret the political attacks which preceded its issuance, based on misinmation and misjudgment.
