





As for the more extremist fringe, as indicated for instance by remarks from three college newspaper editors carried in the New York Times, they are beset by a despairing impatience, and they toss around the facts pretty fancily. Do they not comment that electoral politics have become "farcical, dishonest," manipulative, and virtually lacking in real political content?"
